## Opening lead: Five of

Thanks to Knut Kjaernsred, of Norway, for today's deal. South was Jørn Arild Ringseth, a young Norwegian expert. We're not sure what North's three-heart bid means in Norwegian, but North-South arrived at their best contract.

Ringseth won the opening spade lead with dummy's queen and led a
low club, won by East with the jack. South won the heart shift with the ace and ducked another club into East. With no more hearts to play, East tried the jack of spades, and was allowed to hold the trick. Another spade was won by declarer, who cashed the king of hearts and then had an excellent count of the hand. West was known to have started with four spades, seven hearts, and one club, leaving him with a singleton diamond.

At this point, Ringseth simply cashed the ace of clubs and continued with another club, putting East on lead and forcing a diamond return. East's low diamond ran to West's queen and dummy's ace, before declarer confidently led the 10 of diamonds for a finesse of the jack. That was nine tricks - two spades, two hearts, three diamonds, and two clubs. Well done! This deal helped Ringseth lead his team to victory in this important national event.
