

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
SUDOKU

Good defenders will help each other out by giving count signals when they can. On the lead of a suit by declarer, a defender with a free choice of plays will play a high spotcard with an even number of cards in the suit or a low spot-card with an odd number.

North had forgotten his partnership no trump range and apologized as he put the dummy down. South needed


tricks from the club suit, so he won the opening heart lead in hand and led a low club. West inserted his queen, trying to mislead declarer. Dummy won the king as East played the three of clubs. South continued clubs from the dummy, and when East played the four, West realized that his partner held the club jack! Had East started with only two clubs, he would have high-lowed with the seven and three.


West won the second round of clubs with the ace and shifted to the king of spades. After an encouraging card from partner, he cashed the ace of spades and led the 10 of clubs to East, who cashed the spade queen for the setting trick!

The defense was terrific, but declarer could have prevailed. Can you see how? Declarer should have ducked the queen of clubs! He could now return to hand in a red suit for another club play and West would not be able to create an entry to East's hand. The lucky 3-3 club split plus the diamond finesse would have enabled South to come to nine tricks.




