The bidding:

| WEST | NORTH | EAST | SOUTH |

| 1 $\diamond$ | 1A | Pass | 1NT |
| Pass | 3NT | Pass | Pass |

Opening lead: Queen of $\diamond$
South had plenty of values for his bid, but his diamond stopper was a bit dubious. On the lead, he was anxious to see dummy's diamonds. The sight more than satisfied, and dummy won the first trick with the king.

South took a moment to assess his chances. A 3-3 split of the missing spades would give him nine tricks, so
that's where he started. Declarer cashed two rounds of spades, getting the bad news there.

East was known to hold the spade jack, so only 13 high-card points were missing. Listening to the auction, South decided to play West, the opening bidder, for both the queen of hearts and the king of clubs. Declarer led a heart to his ace and a low heart, inserting dummy's 10 when West played low. So far, so good. South next cashed both of dummy's major suit winners and exited with a diamond. There would have been some trouble had East produced the 10 of diamonds, but all was well when East played the eight. South covered with the nine, West won and cashed three more diamond tricks, but was then forced to lead a club into South's ace-queen for the last two tricks. That gave declarer three spades, three hearts, one diamond and two clubs. Nine tricks and the contract. Well done!
