father, Adam Armstrong said it's something special for him.

"For me to beat my dad....," Adam Armstrong said. "He's taught me everything about driving these things and building these things. For me to beat my own dad is an accomplishment. For anybody to beat my dad, they should feel pretty good about themselves."

Several years ago, Roy Armstrong had decided to retire from racing.

But, much like professional basketball star Michael Jordan or quarterback Brett Favre, his initial retirement was short-lived.

"If he wasn't racing, I don't know what he'd do," Adam Armstrong said. "He can't just come out here and watch. He tried that one year and after six races he was back in the race car. He has a blast being out here and being competitive."

"I see him racing out here as long as he possibly can. He's going to continue to race, I guarantee that."

Roy Armstrong said racing is something he and his son can do together and something they both enjoy.

When his son started racing in 2005, the elder Armstrong said he didn't think they'd still be racing together six years later.

"I figured he'd be doing something else, and he will eventually, but right now this works for both of us," Roy Armstrong said.

Roy Armstrong said both he and his son work on their cars during the week in their shop.

"We trade off different things," Roy Armstrong said. "We swap parts all the time, tires, wheels and everything else."

Both he and his son build their own cars and it's fun to compete against other drivers, whose cars are manufactured by others across the state and region, Roy Armstrong said.

Being able to put a car he's built on the racetrack is one of the things

the elder Armstrong said he likes about the Hobby Stock class.

"Adam and I can build our own cars in the shop," Roy Armstrong said. "We can go down to the parts store and buy the parts and it's affordable for us."

Since the engines for both cars are built by Roy Armstrong, he said when his son wins, it's like a win for him, too.

"When he wins, it's like a win for both of us," Roy Armstrong said.

Adam Armstrong said it feels "really good" to win in a car he's built himself.

"He builds the motors and he built his car and I built mine," Adam Armstrong said. "It feels really amazing when you're sitting in victory lane and you see all these store-bought cars, but yours you've done yourself. You put all the hard work into it and it's the best feeling."

While the younger Armstrong said he's learned much of what he knows from his father, the elder Armstrong said he's learning some things from his son, too.

"I have some old-school things I've used for years that still work," Roy Armstrong said. "He (Adam) has new ideas that he tries and then we both use those ideas, too. Using ideas from each other keeps us competitive."

With more than 25 years of racing experience, Adam Armstrong said his father knows a lot about the cars.

"I've been able to learn from him and it's benefited both of us," Adam Armstrong said. "This year, we've got some things figured out."

Working together may be what keeps the Armstrongs "close" when they're on the track racing, too.

"It's the competitiveness that keeps us going," Roy Armstrong said. "That's what keeps us on the top of our game."

Adam Armstrong said a lot of hard work goes into being among the top drivers week-in and week-out.

While they both race at Beatrice on Friday nights, this year the Armstrongs split up on Saturday with Roy Armstrong going to Eagle to race and Adam heading to Minneapolis, Kan.

Currently at the Beatrice Speedway, Lincoln driver R.J. Macku, who finished between the two Armstrongs Friday, leads the Hobby Stock point standings, but by the narrowest of margins.

Macku has 194 points, while Adam Armstrong is second with 193 and Roy Armstrong is third with 192.

"The point standings are something that keeps you coming back," Roy Armstrong said. "I figure as long as I'm competitive and can get top four finishes I'll keep doing it."

"We kind of watch the points, but it's early in the year and there's a lot of guys up there competing."

At this point, Roy Armstrong said he just hopes he can win a few more races this season.

And, of course, he'll also be working to keep up with his son.

"Hopefully, I can beat him (Adam) again," Roy Armstrong said, laughing.

changes at Penske Racing that have sparked both Busch and teammate Brad Keselowski, who won at Kansas earlier this month. Busch, despite three consecutive poles, was winless but inching closer and closer.

It finally came on a road course, of all places. Busch was winless in 10 career starts at both Sonoma and Watkins Glen, the only two road courses on the Sprint Cup circuit. And Busch helped Keselowski finish 10th with advice and a tour of the track on Friday.

"It's a good feeling to know that the two teams are working as closely together as they ever have," Busch said. "Knowing that Brad is definitely maturing, seeing him bust off a top 10 at a road course is great. We went around the race track, I pointed out some of the apex points, exit points, shifting points. He absorbed it like a sponge."

"That's what it takes as a veteran of the team to help the kid that's coming up through and to help his information help us. That's exactly what's helped both teams get stronger."

Beating Gordon made it extra special for Busch, who was one of many drivers wrecked by Gordon here last year. It was fresh in his memory when he arrived, and one of the first things Busch said was Gordon had apologized to every driver he wrecked last year but Busch.

"It was a definite boost at the end of the day, to see him finish second," Busch smiled.

Gordon congratulated Busch in Victory Lane, but said "I still didn't apologize."

Carl Edwards, who decided Friday to skip Saturday's Nationwide Series race at Road

America, finished third. He was scheduled to miss both of Saturday's practice sessions so he could be in Wisconsin for the race.

"It was very tough to watch the race from Road America, but I think staying was the right decision," Edwards said. "It worked out. It was a good call."

Sunday's race featured several on-track flare-ups, most notably Brian Vickers' paycheck spin of Tony Stewart.

Stewart knocked Vickers out of his way early in the race, and Vickers gave it right back later. The bump sent Stewart's car spinning into a stack of tires, and the rear of his Chevrolet came to a rest on top of the stack.

Stewart didn't seem angry over the retaliation, but he wasn't apologetic, either.

"I probably had it coming, because I dumped him earlier, but I dumped him because he was blocking," Stewart said.

While Stewart was calm, tempers were flaring across the rest of the garage. Juan Pablo Montoya was mad at Keselowski, Kasey Kahne was mad at Montoya, Joey Logano was mad at Robby Gordon and Denny Hamlin was mad at AJ Allmendinger.

"(Seventh) week in a row I've had a winning car and then Boom. We get Dinger'd," Hamlin posted on Twitter immediately after the race.

Hamlin, who led 12 laps and was competitive with Busch, wound up 37th.

Clint Bowyer finished fourth, Marcos Ambrose was fifth and pole-winner Logano was sixth. It was a huge turnaround for Logano, who used coaching from Max Papis to score his career-best road course finish.

Indiana high school hoops star in drug-induced coma after crash

INDIANAPOLIS — An Indiana high school basketball standout who survived a plane crash that killed his father and stepmother is in a drug-induced coma as doctors monitor the badly injured 16-year-old's brain swelling, his father's business partner said Sunday. Austin Hatch suffered brain bruising and swelling and deep facial cuts in Friday's crash that killed his father, Stephen Hatch, and stepmother, Kim, but has shown some hopeful signs at a northern Michigan hospital, said Dr. G. David Bojrab.

Friday's crash was the second one Austin has survived. A 2003 crash killed his mother and two siblings. His father was piloting both times. Austin, a high school junior from Fort Wayne, Ind., recently accepted a scholarship to attend and play basketball for the University of Michigan after graduation. Bojrab said Austin's brain swelling was going down and he had been moving all four limbs when doctors reduced the coma-inducing drugs they placed him on after Friday's crash.

"He has bruising to the brain but there's no structural damage as far as they can tell right now, so they're hoping that that's a good sign and he'll have a better recovery or a full recovery," he said.

A spokeswoman for the hospital in Traverse City, Mich., said the teen

remained in critical condition Sunday.

A relative, Jason Bowersock of Fort Wayne, said Sunday evening that doctors planned to begin

taking Austin off of the coma-inducing drugs on Monday afternoon, while closely monitoring his neurological signs as he regains consciousness.
