





Review: Disappointing 'Pixels' falls apart before it begins

The most believable element in "Pixels" is that alien videogame creatures could attack our planet.

The core concept is clever - space aliens misunderstand a recording of old video-games as a declaration of war, and send digital monsters based on those games to Earth as their army. But its execution in the hands of director-producer Chris Columbus and star-producer Adam Sandler is a mess.

This disappointing comedy falls apart before it begins because no one would behave the way its characters do, and their ridiculous choices drive the action.

Part of the problem is that it's unclear who the filmmakers think their audience is. This is a big-budget spectacle about 1980s nostalgia aimed at kids who have no emotional connection to the decade. "Pixels"

is also insanely sexist, culminating with the winning male characters each rewarded with a woman. Seriously, they get human women as prizes. They literally call one a trophy.

Only the film's opening moments ring true. It's 1982, and Sam Brenner and Will Cooper are a couple of pre-teen boys excited about the new arcade in their neighborhood. They're so good at video games that they compete in the world championships, and Sam almost wins. A cocky, mullet-wearing kid who nicknamed himself "The Fire Blaster" takes first.

Flash forward to present day, and Sam and Will are still best friends. Only now, Sam (Mr. Sandler) installs home-theater systems, and Will (Kevin James) is president of the United States. He launches a kids' reading program to boost his sagging approval ratings, but he can't pronounce the multi-syllabic words in a children's book.

these guys as grown-ups is the two of them discussing which Hollywood actresses are hottest.

Will snaps into action when a U.S. territory is mysteriously attacked from the sky. Forget the elite military and special services - Will calls up Sam, the one-time video game championship runner up, hoping he might spot some arcade-inspired pattern in the airborne attack. Whaddaya know; it looks just like Galaga. Sam is a loser who feels his

best days are 30 years behind him, at the arcade. He's the kind of guy who shows up to the White House wearing shorts and hits on the pretty homeowner whose theater system he's installing. When she rejects him but ends up driving behind him on the street, he declares to no one: "She went from zero to psycho in 3.4 seconds." Because women are crazy, get it?

That homeowner turns out The first introduction to to be Lt. Col. Violet Van Patten

(Michelle Monaghan), a defense rating. Jane Krakowski is terrileader forced to work with Sam and his team of childhood friends against the alien threat.

Sam's friends are the only source of levity, even if they're as unbelievable as Paul Blart as president. Josh Gad plays Ludlow Lamonsoff, a former video-game prodigy turned reclusive conspiracy theorist. He stows away in Sam's van for some unexplained reason and ends up part of the military operation. Peter Dinklage is "The Fire Blaster." He's still wearing a mullet, but now he's in jail for criminal hacking. The president frees him, because as the 1982 video-game world champ, the Fire Blaster needs to help protect the world from the alien invasion.

Mr. Dinklage is a bit unevenhe goes in and out of his toughguy accent — but he gets the most laughs. Mr. Gad is always endearing, and his performance of a Tears for Fears song saves this film from a dismal half-star

bly underused as the First Lady. An Emmy-nominated comedy actress, she's given few lines here-none funny - and is left with nothing to do but gaze adoringly at the goofy president.

The few bright spots in "Pixels" come from the music, celebrity cameos and special effects. The soundtrack of Cheap Trick, Queen and Spandau Ballet match well with the '80s game imagery. Viewers who were alive during the '80s will also appreciate cameos by the likes of Tammy Faye Baker and Max Headroom. And the special effects dazzle. The alien video-game creatures pixelate everything they touch. Too bad they couldn't get their digital hands on this script.

"Pixels," a Columbia Pictures release, is rated PG-13 by the Motion Picture Association of America for "some language and suggestive comments." Running time: 106 minutes. One star out of four

These longtime local favorites will have an opening reception in their honor from 5-7 p.m. Friday, July 31, at the gallery on the grounds of the Beaufort Historic Site.

The Forwards work in different mediums and are a talented couple with long ties to the area.

The Duke University Marine Lab brought them to Beaufort in 1971, Mr. Forward as a marine biologist and professor, Mrs. Forward as an illustrator providing pen-and-ink drawings, graphs and maps to the researchers there.

Artistically their paths diverged with Mrs. Forward working in acrylics, jewelry and sculpting birds from gourds while Mr. Forward began turning toward wood creations.

An ardent supporter of and volunteer for the Mattie King Davis Art Gallery, Mrs. Forward's work has shown in the gallery since its inception, and her colorful acrylics have become favorites there.

She also has a unique line of jewelry called "Peeple" for the

people-like birds featured in her designs and sculpting birds from N.C. gourds.

One of Mrs. Forward's biggest fans is her husband, who turns wood in his Beaufort workshop.


He began using a lathe to create bowls, plates and boxes in 1999 under the guidance of wood worker John Chandler. His works are often made of local salvaged wood and are examples of artistry using natural resources.

The Carteret County Arts and Crafts Coalition counts them both as members while Mrs. Forward is on the Arts Council of Carteret County and Mr. Forward is a member of the American Association of Wood Turners.

Both have exhibited their work in the Mattie King Davis Art Gallery, the oldest gallery in Carteret County, for years.

Gallery proceeds benefit the ongoing educational and restoration projects at the Beaufort Historic Site.




As a part of the program, Teacher's Sorority, she taught special education classes from 1967 to 1975.

Weaving demonstration in plans at Beaufort Historic Site

Historical Association's Living History series, Nancy Vaughan will conduct a weaving demon-stration from 1-3 p.m. Saturday, Aug. 1.

The demonstration takes place in the Beaufort Site's Welcome Center at 130 Turner St.

While the process is completed through automation today, weaving was a manpowered process for thousands of years.

Ancient Egyptians are generally credited with inventing the art form and the machine on which it is performed – the loom.

Weaving cloth is a long process.

Historically, weavers worked with cotton, flax or wool and were required to spin material into thread before it could be woven.

Weaving has been practiced by many different civilizations in nearly every stage of development, from the Egyptians to the American colonists.

Over time, the loom was refined and became an increasingly more sophisticated machine. By the colonial period, it was still in operation and weaving took on

As part of the Beaufort a new level of importance when the American colonies began pulling away from Great Britain.

Under British rule, colonists could import cloth from England; however, this luxury stopped when the war started and Americans were left to weave their own cloth. These American weavers were generally men, and they worked on looms similar to the barn-frame looms used by the Warped Weavers at the Beaufort Historic Site.

The Warped Weavers meet at the Beaufort Historic Site in the Mattie King Davis Art Gallery or the Leffers Cottage from 9 a.m. to noon every Monday and Wednesday.

They create rag rugs, placemats, towels, napkins, blankets and more that are donated to the Old Beaufort Shop to aid in the preservation and education efforts of the Beaufort Historic Site. Newcomers are always welcome.
