Klein TRAVEL Here in Cleveland, travelers sometimes have difficulty coordinating lights from Hopkins Airport into John F. Kranschlantic flights. They may have to fly into LaGuardia or Newark Airports and transfer to Kennedy. Choices are few.

You can have a freehelicopter ride via New York Airways helicopter between airports. This is included in the price of your regularly scheduled overseas airline ticket. Or most airlines provide free shuttle bus service on Carey Limo from LaGuardia into Kennedy on regularly scheduled flights abroad. This shuttle service must be utilized within six hours of arrival into the New York airports.

Carey Limo Service also provides this shuttle transporta-tion between Kennedy and LaGuardia every hour from 7:30 A.M. until 10:00 P.M., and from LaGuardia to Kennedy with service starting at 8:30 A.M. until 10:00 P.M., hourly. The charge is \$3.00 if you are not going overseas.

There is an inter-terminal bus service (yellow bus) between all of the terminals at Kennedy, which costs 50c and is available every 10 minutes between 7:00 A.M. and 1:00 A.M., and every 15 minutes from 1:00 A.M. to 7:00 A.M.

Newark Airport is an International Airport and has two terminals, A and B. The Port Authority provides a free connecting bus service between these terminals. This bus runs about every 10 minutes from 7:00 A.M. to 11:00 P.M. There is less frequent service after that time.

We would definitely suggest that you do not fly into Newark Airport expecting to transfer into Kennedy, since we have found this to be extremely expensive, even though actual distance in miles is not too great. This is due to the fact that you are crossing a state line.

Service into downtown New York from Kennedy is about \$3.50 by bus, and about \$12.00 by cab. From LaGuardia, service into downtown New York is about \$3.00 by bus, and approximately \$9.00 by cab.

Always feel free, at any time, in any airport, to request services of any airline desk, as all personnel are there to serve you.
