Local businesses that rely on the housing market focus on strategies to stay afloat during recession

Fallout from the housing market crash in Klamath County reaches far beyond the real estate business.

It's affecting everyone from roofers to carpenters to cabinetmakers — anyone whose living depends on financially healthy homeowners.

Sales at William Stovall Cabinets in Klamath Falls were down 70 percent in 2010 compared to 2007. Owner Bill Stovall said he gets most of his business today through referrals.

But sales just can't keep pace with his old numbers.

Fewer people own homes today than they did several

Rep. David Wu urged to seek psychiatric aid

PORTLAND (AP) — A newspaper report says aides to U.S. Rep. David Wu were so alarmed over the Democrat's erratic behavior just before the Novem-

ber elections that they urged him

to enter a hospital to get psychiatric treatment.

The Oregonian, citing interviews with a number of anonymous staff members, reports on its website Friday evening that Wu was increasingly unpredictable on the campaign trail and in private last fall.

The report says several aides and a psychiatrist confronted Wu about his behavior three days before the Nov. 2 election.
