
Veterans enrichment center improves building, garden, opportunities for former members of the military

## More veterans find support at local enrichment center

The ground was still freshly tilled when the first vegetable plants were put into the soil at the Veterans Enrichment Center's new garden. The space was added to the center during a community service project through The Home Depot that saw the creation of the garden and other improvements to the center at 1431 Avalon St.

Ben Suby, manager of Klamath Falls' The Home Depot, said he and five volunteers came out Thursday morning to plant the garden, re-coat the center's deck and donate a new roof and flooring materials.

"It's going to give them a sense of ownership and a sense of pride in growing their own food, but also it's going to ensure they have a sustainable food source," Suby said of the garden. "It's just one more way we can help put food in the  $\underline{\text{mouths of the veterans that}}$ have served our country."

Suby said the project, funded by a \$12,000 grant, is one of the most comprehensive service projects the Team Depot volunteers have undertaken.

"This is kind of a big project; this isn't one of our normal projects," he said, adding that "We're always looking for veteran projects. We get a lot of this out of word of mouth."

Opened in late 2013, the Veterans Enrichment Center is a nonprofit organization dedicated to providing sober, transitional housing for homeless and student veterans. The goal is to provide a safe space for veterans who are trying to rejoin the workforce as they build up their skills and savings.

# City council **mulls \$110K** for police

Budget committee aims to keep officer position

There's a point where a department can't do more with less, Klamath Falls Police Chief Jim Hunter told members of the city's budget committee Wednesday, before eventually requesting the committee agree to fund a patrol position that could have been left unfilled.

The budget committee took the statement to heart, heeding Hunter's request to fund one patrol officer position after discussion about the \$110,000 position — which includes salary, benefits, recruitment and training costs.

The annual Memorial Day Parade will be in downtown Klamath Falls at 10 a.m. followed by a ceremony at Veterans Memorial Park.
