have been suffering from heat exhaustion, and after giving her some water, Steve marked the spot by placing his walking stick vertically in the ground and took off his coat before trekking a mile back to his truck.

# Police chase suspects face court

Hernandez, Jackson, Morris receive various charges from Tuesday's stabbing, pursuit

The three suspects in a multi-hour, high-speed chase throughout Klamath County Tuesday made their first appearances in court yesterday.

Appearing before Judge Roxanne Osborne via video monitor from the county jail, Seth Gregory Hernandez, 22, Keith Lee Jackson, 29, and Joshua Thomas Morris, 22, each had their charges read and their initial bail amounts finalized

Wednesday.

Morris is accused of trying to run over at least one police officer during the chase. He is the person currently suspected of driving a white Chevrolet Camaro from Klamath Falls to Malin, Bonanza and back to Klamath Falls

Boyd family says goodbye after 74 years

When some boys are young, they dream about becoming football stars. When Don Boyd was young, he dreamed of running his family's farm machinery business.

"This is what I was going to do from, probably 10 years old," the third-generation owner of Floyd A. Boyd Co. said Wednesday. "It's normal to me. This is what I did. This is who we are."

Everything is going to change for Boyd and his family's company after Friday, but he said things won't change for the customers.

Friday will be the last day the company headquartered in Mer-

rill will be Floyd A. Boyd Co. The business that has served agriculture in the Klamath Basin and supported the community for more than 70 years is changing hands to Papé Machinery.

"Friday at 5 p.m., it will no longer be Floyd A. Boyd Co. Papé will reopen Monday morning with the Papé name," Donnie said. "If you

turn off that light switch, the lights go out. They're going to flip the switch back on and it's going to be Papé. Floyd A. Boyd Co. will basically be gone."

What will stay the same is the employees. About 65 people will continue to work at the five locations, just under a new boss.

For some time, both Don and Donnie Boyd — the second- and third-generation owners of the business — said the John Deer company had been asking them to get larger.

"Suppliers no longer want momand-pop dealers; they want big dealers. We don't fit the modern mold," Don said. "We felt this was get out while you're strong."

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
