CHRISTIAN COUNTY HIGH SCHOOL New-look Cols ready for big season

As the 2013 high school football season quickly approaches, there's no such thing as job security for the Christian County Colonels.

Just ask head coach Steve Lovelace, who is entering his seventh season with the Colonels and takes over a team that lost a number of senior leaders from a year ago.

"Just because you played last year doesn't mean you'll be starting this season," Lovelace said. "We have battles at every position."

Christian County is coming off a 9-3 campaign last season, which ended in the second round of the Class 5-A playoffs with a 31-17 loss to host Bowling Green, which eventually went on to be crowned state champion.

A year later, the Colonels have reloaded.

Their youth is evident, but the talent is overwhelming.

Christian County's first key position battle will be to replace quarterback Ryan Knight, who threw 27 touchdowns, nine interceptions and 2,268 yards before signing a letter of intent in February to play collegiately with Campbellsville.

"We don't want our quarterback to win the game for us," Lovelace said. "We want our quarterback to maintain the game."

The battle for this year's starting quarterback has come down to three sophomores, including 6-foot-1, 156-pound Dixon Craft, who amassed 99 yards, one touchdown and one interception a year ago, Donovan Keith (5-10, 157), a transfer from Kenwood High School in Clarksville, and Muncie Prater (5-9, 144).

"It's good to have that competition there," Lovelace said. "We'll make a decision after camp who will be 1,2 and 3, but that doesn't mean anything early. If whoever wins the job doesn't produce right, we have two other guvs we can go to."

The departure of running back Korey Mosley, who carried the ball 208 times for 1.640 vards and 22 touchdowns last season, will be tough for the Colonels, but Lovelace doesn't necessarily see it that way.


"I don't know if we want to replace those guys. It's hard to say right now," Lovelace said. "As far as leadership skills, I think we'll be better this year. One thing we've really been working on all winter, spring and summer is how to be a true leader."

Christian County will look to use a committee approach at running back this season. Juniors Vernon Porter (5-8, 157), Jamarius Taylor (5-10, 155), Kaleb Mosley

(5-11, 175) and sophomore Jordan Crawford (5-6, 192) will likely split carries for the Colonels.

Former Colonels Jeff Alexander, Jarvis Irby and Jonathan Shanklin will also need to be replaced at wide receiver. Freshmen Keyron Catlett (5-9, 156) and Kenneth Major (5-9, 150) will see plenty of playing time in the passing game, along with senior Shaquan Nicholas (6-2, 157), who missed time last year due to a concussion.

Seniors Stevie Mason (5-10, 215), Tyler Waldrop (5-10, 192) and junior Seth Stevenson (6-1, 151) will take over at tight end for Christian County.

"You don't have to be the best player on the team to be a leader," Lovelace said. "You've got to be able to take the criticism when you're not doing something right. The leader has to be the one who goes out there every day and gives it all they've got but can also take the criticism from other teammates to get better."

The strength of Christian County's team is the experience that returns on the offensive and defensive lines. Seniors Dylan Barnett (6-4, 251), Tate Baker (6-2, 256), Ethan Edwards (6-2, 230), Lashawn Evans (5-11, 254) and juniors Tayshaun Cayce (6-1, 243) and Jon-Tyler Moore (5-5, 230) are a few of the key players in the trenches. Jacob Chesher will also see playing time after recov-

ering from knee surgery.

"It all starts up front," he said. "We've got a lot of guys coming back on the offensive line and defensive line with good varsity experience."

Junior defensive back Devon Wharton (6-3, 206), who finished last season with a team-high five interceptions, should give the Colonels a solid defensive presence with an additional year of experience. Senior T.J. Bell (5-9, 158) joins Wharton to give Christian County an experienced and formidable threat.


Several players have been moved around at linebacker for the Colonels, including senior Marcus Cook (5-9, 195), who was primarily used as a running back last season, and senior Terrell Wimberly (6-0, 183), who was moved from strong safety to linebacker. Terrance Sowerby (5-10, 212, Jr.) should also start at linebacker.

Senior kicker Taylor Cunningham, who kicked a game-winning field goal against Lone Oak last season, returns for Christian County as well.

The Colonels will play three of their 10 games this season on the road, beginning on Aug. 23 against host Caldwell County.

Outside of district play against Hopkinsville, Graves County, Apollo and Ohio County, Christian County will meet Caldwell, Hillsboro (Tenn.), Henderson County, Fort Campbell, Fulton (Tenn.) and McCracken County.

TODD COUNTY CENTRAL HIGH SCHOOL Rebels retool for 2013 campaign

ELKTON, Ky. — The Todd County Central Rebels football team knows that getting back to the Class 2-A playoffs is going to take a great deal of hardwork and patience.

Entering his fourth year as Rebels head coach, Bryan Jones says there are plenty of positives to take away from last year's 2-8 season to propel Todd to its first playoff appearance since 2010.

"We did a lot of learning and a lot of growing," Jones said. "We played some really tough games against some really tough teams and just couldn't find a way to finish them out. I was a little disappointed in our wins and losses, but I was happy with our team overall.

"We did some things that haven't been done in a really long time here, if ever. We weren't shut out of a single game, averaged 24 points a game and had four kickoffs returned for a touchdown. There were definitely some things we're excited about carrying over into this season."

The Rebels' two wins came in a 27-16 victory over host Logan County and a 53-7 thrashing against Class 2-A, District 2 opponent McLean County.

This year's squad has only five seniors, but Jones says there is something unique about the way his entire team is creating cohesion.

"We're young, but there are some characteristics of this team that I haven't seen in any other team I've ever coached anywhere," Jones said. "It's the most team-oriented group of players I've ever been around in my 10 years of coaching. It's definitely a team-first mentality with these guys, and that's something that excites us."

CADIZ, Ky. — Trigg County High School football fans hoping to catch a glimpse of the 2013 Wildcats had better look quick because coach Coby Lewis said this year's team has more speed than ever.

"We have 10 kids who are 4.6 (seconds in the 40-yard dash) or faster, and a few years ago, we only would have had a couple," Lewis said.

Trigg will need that speed playing in Class 3-A, District 1 along with state championship contenders Paducah Tilghman, Fort Campbell and Webster County.

"It's tough playing in this district because we don't have the numbers to emulate in practice the speed we will be seeing," Lewis said. "The good news is our speed is up this year."

Trigg completed a 5-6 record including a first-round playoff loss to South Warren in 2012. The defeat was part of a threegame losing streak at the end of the year for the Wildcats.

However, Lewis said the team isn't dwelling on that as the new season approaches. A small senior class is ready to lead by example and put the team on its back as it chases a deep run in the Class 3-A playoffs.

"We don't have a lot of seniors, but the ones we do have, have been starting since they were sophomores so they are pretty experienced," Lewis said.

Leading the way for Trigg will be senior quarterback Luke McKenzie (6-foot-2, 198 pounds), who threw for 1,724 yards and 19 touchdowns while tossing 12 interceptions a year ago. Several small colleges are recruiting McKenzie, who has his eyes on the school's all-time passing record.

"(McKenzie) has around 3,000 career yards and we feel like we're better with receivers this year and the record is around 5,000 by Dan Mosier," Lewis said. "We feel like Luke has a great chance to break the record."

At tailback, the Wildcats return 5-7, 175pound tank Jayven Jones, who led Trigg with 1,084 yards and 11 touchdowns last season.

Jones, who runs a 4.47 40-yard dash, also is a two-time state powerlifting champion with a 360-pound bench press and 260pound power clean lift. Several Ohio Valley Conference schools and Southern Illinois are recruiting Jones.

Junior Skylar Pool (6-0, 190) will join Jones in the backfield, along with junior

Quan Kirby (6-0, 230) and freshman Darious Radford (5-7, 165).

"We have a stable of backs and they all have speed," Lewis said. "We should have plenty of backs to throw at you any night."

At wide receiver, Quentin Bird returns. The 6-foot, 170-pound senior caught 14 passes for 180 yards and three touchdowns a year ago. Joining bird are freshman Tyreak Wilson (6-1, 170), junior Brandon Wilson (5-11, 165), sophomore Tyler Estes (6-0, 168) and sophomore Reggie Radford (5-9, 151).

Brandon Wilson and Pool also will serve as backup quarterbacks for Trigg.

The offensive line is powered by three returning starters, including junior Gra-

ham Lawrence (6-6, 280), who is being recruited by Mississippi, Vanderbilt and Nebraska among others. Senior Jacob Mason (6-2, 225) and senior Aaron Stevens (5-10, 220) also started last season.

Junior Michael Drake (6-2, 220), sophomore Dylan Parker (5-10, 195) and junior Dallas McLeod (6-0, 223) will challenge for starting spots.

On defense, the Wildcats return nine players who started at least one game last season.

Leading the way is an aggressive linebacker corps of Pool, Jones and Stevens.

Senior Daniel Ingram (5-7, 155), junior Cody Huntsman (6-1, 230), junior

CALDWELL COUNTY HIGH SCHOOL Tigers seeking return to state finals

PRINCETON, Ky. — The Caldwell County Tigers and their followers make no bones about it. The goal this year isn't just to get back to the Class 2-A state finals in Bowling Green — the goal is to return to the finals and win the state championship.

"We know the expectations are high, but that's a good thing," said Caldwell head coach David Barnes, who begins his eighth year at the Tiger helm. "It's great for the community to be excited.

"Anytime the community is involved in the school and supporting the school, it's a good thing. Look at what we did last year when we went to the playoffs and had the big crowd at Louisville DeSales and in Bowling Green. And the parade when we came back, even though we lost."

Barnes said most of his team is battletested after last year's playoff run that saw Caldwell come within just a few minutes of a state crown before bowing to Newport Central Catholic 30-26.

"We didn't play very well at Mayfield (in the regular-season finale) last year, but we came back, regrouped and got better each week in the playoffs. We can't get complacent this year and think it will just happen.

"We've got to work, get better and we've got to believe in ourselves and each other. Last year's team was like a family. It was a tight-knit group. That was the biggest factor."

Caldwell enters the 2013 campaign in lofty heights — ranked either first or second in almost every Class 2-A preseason ranking.

That attention is due to last year's state runnerup showing and a high-powered offense led by prized college recruit Elijah Sindelar, one of the top-ranked junior quarterbacks in the nation.

"We've tried to tell the kids what to expect, and the kids are smart," Barnes said. "They recognize Elijah is a pretty highly sought recruit, but what we've told them is that when college coaches are watching Elijah or watching film of him, they're also going to see anyone who is out there making plays. They may not be interested in you, but they have coaching connections and may recommend you to someone else and give you an opportunity you might not have had."

Sindelar set school records last season with 2,961 yards passing and 32 touchdowns. He already has college offers from Kentucky, Western Kentucky, Toledo and

Bowling Green and is also drawing interest from Alabama, Ohio State and Louisville, among others.

"He's gotten a lot stronger," Barnes said. "I've got a weight class at 6:30 in the morning and that's helped him a whole lot.

"The good thing about Elijah is that he came to me after the scrimmage and said 'Before we watch the film, here's what I did wrong.' He knew what he did, and he can correct that. That's why he's the way he is. He'll watch the film, then we'll watch it together and he takes criticism. He's got lots of ability but he also understands he can get better."

Sindelar's main target last year was Tez Sivils. Sivils is now at Kentucky Wesleyan after originally signing with the University of Pikeville. He owns virtually all of Caldwell's receiving records. Sivils no longer is in the Tigers' picture, but Sindelar figures to have plenty of targets this season.

"On offense, we've got a lot of guys that

he likes what he's seen from his new quarterback.

"He's mechanically sound but hasn't had gametime reps," Jones said. "We expect a learning curve there, but we know he can make all the throws. It's just about getting him some experience making reads and throwing the ball at this point."

Several guys will likely contribute in the ground game for Todd, including junior fullbacks Dylan Wilkerson and Dylan Nichols and junior running back Zack Coots.

Jones says the addition of senior Gary Moore, along with sophomore Joe Johnson and junior Daniel Kaiser, should make for a solid duo at tight end.

"We've got Gary Moore, who's been a three-year basketball guy that we convinced to come out and play for us," Jones said. "He's a big, tough kid. I think he'll see some time at tight end. We'll also have Joe Johnson, who's about 6-foot-3. He's a specimen."

Senior Brett Bostic, junior James

Bishop and Johnson make up the Rebels' primary wide receivers. Jones says Bostic has stood out as one of the team's special playmakers.

"Those three guys will probably get most of the work out there," Jones said. "Our standout guy is Brett Bostic. He's going to be the guy we play at receiver, in the slot, at running back and maybe play him at quarterback and run a wildcat formation with him. He's probably our most dangerous athlete."

Junior Javon Byars (6-1, 285) will start his third season at left tackle for Todd. Senior Will Settle will start at left guard, junior Mark Brooks will start at center, sophomore Connor Cole (6-2, 250) will start at right guard and sophomore Brian Willis (6-4, 300) will start at right tackle.

"We're going to be maybe as big as I've ever seen us up front," Jones said.

On defense, Jones has been overly pleased with freshman Treva Henry (5-9, 155), who will start at cornerback.

"He might be the most naturally skilled cornerback I've ever seen as a freshman," Jones said. "He's just a natural ball-hawk, a great openfield tackler and already has good size."

Bostic and Nichols will rotate at safety, while junior Bishop will play cornerback as well.

Todd has a new group of players who will make up their linebacking corp this season, including Wilkerson, Moore, Kaiser, Brooks, Coots and sophomore Naytrimus Harris.

Willis and Byars will likely see time at the defensive tackle positions, while Willis, Coots, Kaiser and Brooks will all spend time on the defensive line as well.


"Nobody's really played a ton at their positons, but we think we've got some talent," Jones said. "We're really excited about this team and the way they've responded since our quarterback left us."

The Rebels have made several changes to their schedule by dropping perennial Class 2-A power Glasgow and Trigg County from their schedule and adding opponents West Creek (Tenn.) and Clarksville Northwest, which Jones believes is more suited to his team's level of play.

Isaiah Johnson (5-9, 150) and sophomore Tyler Allen (5-7, 150) also are in the mix.

"Jaylen has led us in tackling for two straight years and we're moving him from inside to the outside and moving Stevens from defensive line to middle linebacker," Lewis said. "We're hoping that is going to make a big difference there."

On the defensive line, Colton Livingston, who benches 315 pounds and runs a 4.6 40-yard dash, joins senior Mikey White (5-10, 205) at defensive end. Kirby and senior Jacob Mason (6-2, 225) will play on the inside.

"We feel like we have eight to 10 guys total we can put in there and we don't lose much," Lewis said.

In the secondary, Estes and Brandon Wilson are returning starters and should get help from senior Raekwon Stubblefield (5-6, 140) and junior Tristen Jordan (6-0, 165).

"We are preaching flying to the ball," Lewis said. "We want to get as many people to the ball as we can. In practice, we don't give the defense any credit at all unless there are five people at the ball when the play is over."

McKenzie will handle some of the kicking duties along with punting the ball. Sophomore Raegan Hyde (5-7, 130) and senior Clark Adams (5-8, 175) also will handle some of the kicking duties.

Trigg has beefed up its schedule in 2013, opening with Class 1-A power Russellville before taking on Class 6-A Marshall County, Hopkinsville and defending Class 2-A state runner-up Caldwell County.

"Our schedule is just brutal, especially the first four games," Lewis said. "I know we are better than last year, but our record may not indicate it."

can make plays," said Barnes.

Running back Jaylen Boyd, a junior, is the top returning pass-catcher after grabbing 35 passes last season. Senior Jordan Young caught 32 passes, including eight for touchdowns.

Meanwhile, sophomore Dee Cain looks to take on an expanded offensive role this season after playing primarily on defense a year ago. Newcomer JaMichael Ellis, a sophomore who moved here from Minnesota, also figures to make a big impact.

Two other players making a return to the football field after sitting out last season will give Caldwell's receiving corps good size. Eli Pepper, a 6-foot-8 junior, and Elijah Anderson, a 6-3 junior, will be in the rotation along with senior Austin Palmer, junior Jacob Burke, sophomore Josh Young and senior Charlie Traylor. Dylan Riley, junior, adds even more depth at receiver along with Damonta Hopson, a junior who is out for football for the first time, and freshmen Zach Gaither and Javonte Riley.

"Our receivers need to get better when Elijah (Sindelar) gets out of the pocket," Barnes said. "We haven't worked on that a lot, but our receivers need to get to where they're supposed to be so Elijah will know where to look for them.

"And the biggest thing with our receivers is blocking on the perimeter. I'll probably never be completely satisfied with our blocking downfield, but that's a critical part of our game."

Caldwell also has a ground game that more than complements its aerial assault.

Boyd became the first Tiger in the program's history to rush for over 2,000 yards last season, finishing with 2,041 yards and 29 touchdowns.

With Cain being moved around on offense and Ellis providing another interchangeable cog, Boyd could also see more time as a slot receiver.

Chandler Blackburn, a senior, could also see time in the backfield as well as Javonte Riley

Caldwell appears to have a wealth of options at the skill positions on offense, but is also extremely solid up front. However, what the Tigers are missing at the line of scrimmage is the depth that the rest of the offensive unit enjoys.

"We've got six kids that we feel really good about," Barnes said. "Five of them played last year."

Tyler Beavers, a senior, sat out of Caldwell's scrimmage against Butler County with concussion concerns. That forced the Tigers to do some scrambling up front, with junior Kale Dyer taking over at center and senior Kyler Kendall moving from center to left guard. Austin McGowan, another senior, is back at left tackle. Noah Kennaday, also a senior, will play right guard while junior Chas Scott plays right tackle.

Defensively, the Tigers return most everyone from last year — with the notable exception of lineman Cole Webster, who is now at Campbellsville University.

Webster led the team with 128 tackles last season and finished as the school's alltime leading tackler with 361 stops.

Up front, juniors Sean Conger and Chase Harper will start at the defensive tackle spots with Blaine Hickman, a senior, also figuring into the mix.

Drake VanHooser, a junior, will start at right defensive end with either sophomore Landon Mitchell or junior Preston Thomas at left end.

The inside linebackers will be seniors Colin Brasher and Landon Burns, with Thomas and sophomore Trevor Davis pushing for those spots.

Blackburn returns at right outside linebacker while Palmer is back at strong safety.

Cain will start at left cornerback with senior Michael Watkins on the right side. Burke returns at safety.

"The good thing is we're going to be able

to play a number of kids," Barnes said. "But we will have some that have to play both ways. Last year we were able to play 11 on each side, which was a big advantage. This year some of them are going to have to play on both sides, but we think we can still rest those kids some. The good thing is that none of our linemen have to go both ways, although Austin and Kyler may play some defense in certain situations."

Caldwell's special teams also look to be in good hands.

Sindelar handled the majority of the punting duties last season, averaging a solid 37.1 yards per kick. Cain can also punt, and both give the Tigers an added pass/run threat when they receive the snap in punt formation.

Senior Brett Seymore was a key find for the Tigers last season. A member of the CCHS soccer team, Seymore joined the football squad in the second week of the 2012 season and went on to set school records with nine made field goals and 66 PATs.

In the return game, Cain developed into a feared threat when opponents had to punt the ball away.

Cain, Boyd and Ellis all look to be dangerous return men on kickoffs.

HOPKINSVILLE HIGH SCHOOL HHS looks to continue winning ways in 2013

What a difference a year makes for the Hopkinsville Tigers football team.

À year ago, the Tigers were mired in an 11-game losing streak, and most high school football fans didn't give them much of a chance to win a game in 2012.

But a funny thing happened on the way to November: Hoptown nearly beat Greenwood and Madisonville-North Hopkins before knocking off Allen County-Scottsville to end a 14-game losing streak. Two more victories followed, and the Tigers advanced to the Class 5-A playoffs for the first time since 2009.

"I think what really turned it around for us was getting that win over Allen County," third-year coach Marc Adam Clark said. "We had been on such an emotional roller coaster. We were up on Greenwood. We came from 14 points down against Madisonville, and we just didn't close them out."

As the 2013 season draws near, the Tigers have a

whole new outlook on the season.

They return their entire backfield and offensive line from a team that averaged 27.3 points per game last season.

Leading the way will be 6foot, 184-pound senior tailback Dee Killebrew, who rushed for 915 yards and 10 touchdowns, and 5-10, 190pound junior Zach Atkins, who ran for 841 yards and eight scores a year ago.

"Both of these guys are bigger, stronger and they are hungry," Clark said.

"They are more explosive and they look much faster."

Seniors Khalil Baker (5-9, 183), Qua Coleman (5-5, 142) and sophomore Vincent Brown (5-8, 157) also will see time in the Tigers' backfield.

At quarterback, sophomore Tyler Graham is back after starting seven games last season as a freshman. The 5-8, 140pounder threw for 526 yards and 10 touchdowns with 12 interceptions in 2012.

"He plays a lot bigger than his size," Clark said of Graham. "He's a tough, gritty kid and he's not afraid. The biggest thing we're emphasizing with him this year is trying cut down on his turnovers. He has to understand he doesn't have to make every play."

Perhaps the brightest spot for the Tigers this season is at offensive line where 6-6, 280-pound junior Chad Cessna resides. Cessna already is garnering attention from several colleges including UK.

Others expected to play major minutes for Hoptown include Bailey Carroll (6-0, 260, Jr.), Derek Lincoln (5-10, 220, Jr.), Jonathan Thomas (5-10, 214, Jr.), Marcus Wade (6-1, 254, Jr.), Jacob Ezell (5-11, 213, Sr.) and Elijah Rowher (6-3, 208, Jr.)

"It's a great problem to have," Clark said of the offensive line's depth. "I may be pulling my hair out in 2015. The best thing is they all started multiple games last year."

The Tigers will be athletic at wide receiver this year with the addition of basketball player Jordan McGee (6-3, 183, Jr.) as well as Devontae Coleman (5-11, 186, Sr.) and LaQuarius Davis (5-8, 140, Jr.)

The key for Hopkinsville will be on defense. Last year, the team gave up nearly 50 points per game. Clark noted that the number couldn't be blamed completely on the defense.

"We have to be better on special teams, and we have to do a better job on offense of not turning the ball over and giving the other team a short field to work with," he said. "Our best leaders are on defense. We think, being a year older, we are tougher and more physical."

Wade, Rowher and Wyatt Thomas (5-11, 220, Soph.) lead the defensive line, which also includes many of the same players on the offensive line.

Baker, Cliff Thomas (6-0, 192, Jr.), Jay Smith (5-8, 164, Jr.) and Corey Nibert (5-7, 179, Sr.) form the Hoptown linebacker corps.

"This is a group of guys who have been through the tough times, and they are looking for something better. They're hungry," Clark said.

In the secondary, Killebrew, Ameer Love (5-11, 187, Jr.), Davis and Oates started most of the games last season. Freshmen Don Parker (5-11, 136) and C.J. Henagan (6-0, 152) also are expected to fill in at times.

The kicking and punting game will feature seniors Sam Stevens (5-11, 165) and Austin Bucko (5-9, 160) along with sophomore Houston Ray (6-1, 165). Stevens had 32 extra points and two field goals a year ago.

"They are very competitive in practice and each will punt and kick," Clark said. "It depends on which one is kicking best that week who will play that week."

The Tigers have made some changes to their schedule. They open with Greenwood, while Madisonville-North Hopkins remains on the schedule and Trigg County returns to the schedule.

However, Clark, a Bowling Green native, has added Warren East and Franklin-Simpson to the schedule.

"It's a competitive schedule. We don't have any gimmes," Clark said. "Warren East was a state semifinalist. West Creek, who we're playing in the Claiborne Bowl, has a linebacker and running back who has committed to Vanderbilt. We're going to have to bring it every week."

FORT CAMPBELL HIGH SCHOOL Falcons press on with new coach

If first year Fort Campbell High School head football coach Tony Butler is nervous at all about the upcoming season, he certainly isn't showing it.

"Being my first year, as things come about, I just handle them," Butler said nonchalantly as his players lined up for the team photograph. "It's been good, it's like anything else new. It's new for me, but the game of football hasn't changed."

He replaces Shawn Berner, who won 112 games in 11 seasons while winning three state championships and sending 55 young men to play college football on scholarship. His overall record of 112-31 (.783) is among the best in school history with his win total second only to former coach Marshall Patterson's 227 victories.

The Fort Campbell program certainly has a lot of tradition, but there are plenty of positive things to look toward in the future for Butler.

He returns junior running back Triston Luke, who rushed for 1,935 yards and 30 touchdowns last year.

Butler says Luke has worked hard to improve on those impressive numbers.

"He's been doing good," he said. "He's gotten a lot stronger this summer, and he's gotten faster. He's picked up on the stuff that we're doing, and he's making good decisions with what to do with the football in the backfield. He's coming along."

Luke is healthy and confident going into 2013 and believes hard work this summer will pay dividends.

"We stayed in the weight room every day," Luke said. "And we had a lot of speed training in Coach Butler's off-season program."

The Falcons' starting quarterback will be junior Jalen Williams, and junior Jonathan Jethroe has the experience to fill in should he be needed.

"He's back healthy," Butler said of Williams. He also voiced his confidence in Jethroe, who filled in admirably last season. "That was big last year letting Jonathan get some experience in Jaylen's place."

Williams is excited for the opportunity to start and finish a season as "the guy."

"I'm coming in with a lot of experience," Williams said. "We've got a lot of skill position (players) coming out. We've just got to come out and work hard and

keep fighting to get better every single day. It's pretty easy for me. I've just got to get them the ball."

Butler also believes the skill positions are where the Falcons can set themselves apart.

"We've got skill guys. All of those guys come back from last year," the coach said while quickly pointing out where work still needs to be done. "We graduated offensive linemen, so that's what we're working on in our fall camp practices, trying to get those guys developed because we graduated three of the five."

Among the other skill players returning are seniors Isaiah Washington, Nygell Bradley and Nighell Davidson, who will likely all get their share of touches this season. The Falcons finished 9-3 last year and lost 24-7 to South Warren in the second round of the Class 3-A playoffs.

"Teach these kids to be successful," Butler said. "It's my philosophy that if you teach these kids to be successful, you practice with them, you go through the process of what it takes to be successful — the winning and losing takes care of itself."

The regular season begins Aug. 23 at home against Mayfield.
