




What Makes A Great Leader? 🖈

Qualities of an excellent political leader:





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
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Political Ideologies

Just as the rainbow spectrum contains different colors, there are a number of different ideologies on the political spectrum. A political ideology is a series of beliefs and ideas about what a government should and should not be able to do within a country. As you probably know, there are many political parties within the United States. Think about what actually makes one political party different from another. Each political party has very different ideas about the role of government in running the country. It's important for citizens to understand the difference between various political ideas in order to determine what they believe is best for the country.

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Political Campaigns

Throughout a campaign, candidates use many forms of communication to convey their political platform. A political platform is a series of positions on political issues that show the goals and principles of a candidate.

You may have seen campaign signs along the streets of your community, bumper stickers on cars, ads on TV, posts on Facebook that were part of a political campaign. You may have seen debates, speeches or interviews with the candidates as well.

Think about various campaign messages you've seen or heard. Which messages caught your attention?
