History

For more than 150 years, the Chimney Rock Inn has offered warm hospitality with great food and great people.

The original "Rock," located at 800 North Thompson Avenue, Bound Brook, dates to 1863 when the Chimney Rock Hotel was established. It began as a bedand-breakfast serving liquor, oysters and cigars to patrons.

By 1873, Chimney Rock had become a restaurant, store, butcher shop and ice dealer using the old barn to store and cut the ice. Thirteen years later, German immigrant William Haelig purchased the inn and the adjacent property, the Chimney Rock Gorge, to form the Bound Brook Crushed Stone Company, which would provide the stone to make all of the roads in the area. Haelig built a dance hall in the rear of the inn, and the second floor was used for Sunday School.

In 1954, the original Chimney Rock Hotel was torn down, and The Chimney Rock Inn was built on the lot next to it. Just a year later, the famous Chimney Rock pizza debuted. The restaurant uses the same delicious, thin-crust pizza recipe today.

In 2000, the Chimney Rock Inn was expanded and updated to prepare for the next century. The restaurant expanded to two locations in 2004 after the purchase of Sestri's in Gillette, formerly Linda's Fireside.

Despite all the changes through the years, some things have remained the same, with high quality fresh food and great hospitality topping the list. Some employees have been with the company for 20 years, and gathering at the inn has become a tradition for generations of local families and workers who have dined at The Rock for decades.

Soo Bahk Do Karate celebrates 35 Years in Long Hill Township

Toddlers, seniors and all in between welcome at Gillette studio

Soo Bahk Do Karate of Gillette, located at 630 Valley Road, will be celebrating its 35th anniversary in April.

The karate studio was founded in 1982 by Linda Morey, Certified Master Instructor and seventh-degree black belt, the highest-ranked woman in the traditional martial art of Soo Bahk Do Moo Duk Kwan in the world.

Morey originally started her school by holding classes in the Long Hill Community Center, and then moved over to the building housing the post office. Eventually, a purpose-built facility was constructed at the current location.

"Under Master Morey's guidance, we have trained thousands of Long Hill children in self-esteem, courage and discipline," said Michelle Cavett, program director and Certified Instructor.

Cavett, along with Certified Master Instructor and fifth-degree black belt Lydia Chu, Certifed Master Instructor and fourth-degree black belt Andrew Masini, and Certified Instructors and third-degree black belts Michael Chu and Ria Zazzarino, make up the teaching staff.

"Combined, we have over 100 years of teaching experience," said Cavett. "Through the years we have instructed and helped many children referred by physicians, teachers, psychologists, and other professionals who recognized the proven ability of martial arts to enhance focus and concentration, as well as develop better balance, hand-eye coordination, strength and flexibility.

"In 35 years, the activity level of children has changed dramatically, and there is an even greater need to provide children the opportunity to develop their bodies in a balanced way."

The studio starts children as young as 3 years old in its very popular Little Dragons program. Children in the program learn important concepts and attributes such as sharing, respect and self-control. Soo Bahk Do also teaches the children basic self-defense techniques, and what to do if they get separated from their parents or caregivers.

"We practice having them identify police and firemen, so if they need help they can recognize those who can provide it," said Masini, who conducts the Little Dragons Program. "At this age it is about them having fun, while still learning basic martial arts principles of balance, concentration and self-awareness."

While the majority of Soo Bahk Do students start their martial arts training between the ages of 5 and 7, the studio also offers a dynamic adult program.

"We've had many students start their training in their 40s and 50s, and recently we had a new student begin training who is in her 70s," said Cavett.

"We have been very fortunate to have both Master Morey and Soo Bahk Do Karate in our lives," said Chu, who has been teaching karate for more than 30 years, and whose three adult children are all blackbelts.

Chu, who also teaches at Watchung Regional High School, holds a Masters Degree in special education and administration from Rutgers University.

"I have seen first-hand the benefits of karate to increase focus and concentration, and highly recommend our program for all children, but especially those who struggle with self-discipline and self-control."

The studio offers complementary assessments for both children and adults for whom areas of potential improvement are identified and a plan of action is discussed.

Soo Bahk Do Karate is also exceedingly community-minde. In addition to being a member of the Long Hill Chamber of Commerce, for which Cavett serves as president, the studio sponsors various local events such as the Easter Egg Hunt, the Stirling Street Fair, Millington Downtown Day and the Halloween Parade.

There is an acre of covered greenhouse where customers can purchase houseplants, annuals, vegetables and poinsettias, and several acres outside of nursery stock, perennials, mums and Christmas trees during the Christmas season.

Over the years, Great Swamp Greenhouses has employed many locals, from teenagers to mature adults with plant greatswampgreenhouses.com.



Something for everyone available at Meyersville Grange Antiques Market Only three Sundays left in 2016-2017 market season

LONG HILL TWP. - Every Sunday from late fall through early spring, residents are invited in from the cold to an endless assortment of baubles, collectibles, items they haven't seen in years.

For more than 45 years, the Meyersville Grange Antiques & Indoor Market has set up shop at the Grange Hall on Meyersville Road. Open from 7:30 a.m. to 2 p.m. on Sundays from November through March, the market attracts a diverse group of vendors and customers.

Steve and Carol Boyle have been running the market for the past four years. Carol, speaking on Sunday, Feb. 5, said she and Steve first started attending the market on Sunday mornings in 1976 after service at Meyersville Presbyterian Church.

"We were a newly married couple and we were looking for things to put in our house," she said. "A lot of other people just come for the ambiance, to see people they've become friends with over the years. There are people who have been here as dealers, some of them for more than 30 years."

Seventeen vendors attended the Jan. 5 market, selling everything from vintage movie posters to American Indian art to antique jewelry – "A little bit of this, a little bit of that," as multiple vendors explained.

"There's different stuff every week,"

said Steve Boyle. "You name it, eventually we have it. Knicknacks, bric-a-brac, silver, gold, records, collectible dolls – all kinds of stuff. It changes every week."

Steve Boyle said the building can house as many as 35 vendors. In addition to running the market, he and Carol sell some of their own antiques and collectibles on the hall's main floor. Their son, Russell, sells a variety of collectibles in the basement. Carol said there is such a variety of items that customers can find something one week but if they don't buy it there is no guarantee it will be there the next week.

Vendors come from as far away as Toms River and Pennsylvania, Carol said, and their local customers follow.

"Some do it as a livelihood, some do it to clean out, and others do it just because they love it," Carol said of the vendors. "I think it's the sociability of it, also. You get to meet the most interesting people."

"And you learn a lot too," Steve chimed in. "People come by and they say, 'Oh, you know what this is?' And I'll say I had no idea what that was. They inform you."

In addition to the century-old postcards, vinyl records, coins, stamps and 1950s toys, visitors are invited to the basement for a cheap, hot breakfast served by Chef Bob Edge. The Boyles said the atmosphere attracts a number of repeat customers.

"It's a nice weekend morning," Steve said. "You walk around, you check it out and you have a dynamite breakfast or lunch."


