School district asking residents to approve three forms of funding

STILLWATER — The Stillwater Area Public Schools will have three questions on this November's ballot — an operating levy, a capital projects levy and a bond. Polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m. Tuesday, Nov. 8. The Press asked Carissa Keister, district communications coordinator at Stillwater Area Public Schools, to answer questions about the election.

Q: How much money does the operating levy (question one on the ballot) currently generate, and how much money will it generate if it is renewed or increased?

A: The existing operating levy (approved in 2007) generates about \$996 per student. The new operating levy would revoke the existing levy and replace it with a new levy of \$1,465 per student.

Q: How has that money been used to date, and how will it be used if renewed or increased?

A: The 2007 levy was designed to decrease class sizes, provide quality educational programs, purchase textbooks and curriculum materials, and maintain transportation service levels. Despite numerous funding challenges, the district has ensured the commitments from the 2007 levy were honored. Our students have made significant gains in achievement, specifically in the areas of elementary math and science. We've also reduced class sizes in targeted areas such as science at the junior highs and high school. The existing operating levy helped us to maintain transportation services and all of our strong academic, arts and athletic programs at the same time other districts across the state have had to make drastic cuts in these areas.

Our district will face a \$10 million budget shortfall at the end of this school year. This is largely a result of state funding not keeping up with inflation, which equates to \$1,161 per student in lost revenue. The new operating levy request ask our community to work together to make up the budget shortfall. We will reduce our budget by \$5 million and ask the community to meet us in the middle to make up the difference. This new operating levy would better help us protect and preserve quality learning for our students by:

•Continuing to provide high-quality instruction in all academic areas.

•Implementing innovation in schools.

•Ensuring appropriate resources are available for students and the programs that have been identified as community priorities in Vision 2014.

•Creating new 21st century learning opportunities in areas such as STEM (science, technology, engineering and math), and elementary visual arts and world language.

Q: If the operating levy is not renewed, how will it affect the district?

A: A failed operating levy would result in \$10 million in budget cuts for next year, It is likely budget reductions would impact the following areas:

•Increased class size across all grade levels

·Decreased number of student instructional days on the school calendar

•Reduced transportation services (ie. adjust start and end times, decrease number of bus routes, extend transportation zones and shuttles)

·Consideration of fees for all day kindergarten

·Decreased athletic and co-curricular activities Increased student activity fees

•Consideration of alternatives to the current el-

ementary building grade configurations (ie. grades K-3 and 4-6 schools rather than K-6 schools)

•Decreased/elimination of resources for aging and outdated technology

In general you are eligible to vote if you are 18 or older, are a U.S. citizen, are not a a convicted felon and are a resident of the precinct in which you wish to vote.

•Update heating, ventilation and air conditioning (HVAC) systems at Afton-Lakeland, Lake Elmo, Lily Lake, Oak Park, Oak-Land and Stillwater Junior High.

Q: What is the wording of the actual ballot questions?

Question 1:

The board of Independent School District No. 834 (Stillwater Area Public Schools) has proposed to revoke the school district's existing referendum revenue authorization of \$996.57 per pupil and to replace that authorization with a new authorization of \$1,465 per pupil. The proposed new referendum revenue authorization would increase each year by the rate of inflation and be applicable for seven years unless otherwise revoked or reduced as provided by law. Shall the increase in the revenue proposed by the board of Independent School District No. 834 be approved? Question 2:

The board of Independent School District No. 834

(Stillwater Area Public Schools) has proposed a capital project levy authorization of 1.25495% times the net tax capacity of the school district. The money raised by this authorization will provide funds for the purchase and installation of computers, printers, classroom audiovisual equipment and peripherals, interactive whiteboards, learning management systems, productivity and curriculum software, and staff development. The proposed capital project levy authorization will raise approximately \$982,300 for taxes payable in 2012, the first year it is to be levied, and would be authorized for seven years. The estimated total cost of the projects to be funded over that time period is approximately \$6,876,100. The projects to be funded have received a positive review and comment from the Commissioner of Education.

Shall the capital project levy authorization pro-

posed by the board of Independent School District No. 834 be approved?

Question 3: Shall the board of Independent School District No. 834 (Stillwater Area Public Schools) be authorized to issue its general obligation school building bonds in an amount not to exceed \$18,375,000 to provide funds for the acquisition and betterment of school sites and facilities, including the renovation of existing and construction of new science labs at the Stillwater Area High School and the Oak-Land Junior High School facilities; the construction of new Science, Technology, Engineering, Mathematics (STEM) labs at the Stillwater Area High School and the Oak-Land Junior High School facilities; and the updating of the

Heating, Ventilation, Air Conditioning (HVAC) syspro- tems at various school facilities?
