COLUMBUS JCT., Iowa -

An effort to establish a housing trust fund in a four-county area of southeast Iowa has received the unanimous support of the Columbus Junction City Council. The council agreed to join

the Great River Housing Trust Fund, which is being developed by the Southeast Iowa Regional Planning Commission, Burlington, in Lee, Henry, Louisa and Des Moines counties.

Communities that agree to join would be eligible to share in the \$300,000 in funding that is anticipated to be available each year.

Those funds could then be used for low- to moderateincome families to rehabilitate owner-occupied housing or assist with down payments.
