BROOKVILLE - Kenneth Lees II, the self-styled "mastermind" of a methamphetamine lab near Brockway, could spend the next 10 years in a state correctional institution.

The charges against Lees II, 25, arose when the police were investigating a marijuana growing operation, methamphetamine and MDMA, (Ecstasy) lab at the Lees home, Cemetery Hill, Snyder Township, Jefferson County. Kenneth Lees Sr. opened fire from inside the house, shooting PSP Trooper Bradley K. Wilson twice. Lees Sr. later took his own life.

Lees II was apprehended just off of Route 219 in the Brockway area. The state police attempted to stop Lees II, who was driving a borrowed blue Honda Civic, but he attempted to flee and a pursuit ensued. The police searched the Honda Civic and found unknown pills, an iPhone, a multi-colored glass smoking pipe and a blue binder.

The blue binder contained an eight page handwritten note in the outer sleeve, "Kenneth R. Lees II" was handwritten under the NAME block on the first page. It was dated Sept. 27, 2013. Under the words "EXPERIMENT/ SUBJECT" was written "FINAL EXPRESSIONS.

The last three sentences written on page 7 were: "I dedicated my time to learning about how to grow high quality marijuana and succeeded. I put all my \$ from the 1st yr. of college (excess shorlarships/grants, etc.) into a grow hit that my dad helped me install. I was the mastermind and he the laborer."

On page 8 was written: "I really did this for personal satisfaction, as I knew I could easily make vast amounts of cash by 'flipping pounds' but he saw it differently. Without a job, no wife, and retirement just a future dream he wanted me to do this seriously. I was all about it at first. We set up an indoor and outdoor (greenhouse) growing op. We made a lot of \$ and split it down the middle. He kept meticulous records on excel spread sheet. etc. Years after I grew bored w/the operation & tried to teach him how to grow. The qual-

CURWENSVILLE — A local church will participate in a national event to honor firefighters killed in the line of duty.

Charlie Wall, event organizer, said he found information about "Bells Across America" on the National Fallen Firefighters Foundation's website.

"I was surfing the web one day and found a link to the National Fallen Firefighters Foundation website. Through there I found the link to Bells Across America," Wall said. Wall is a lifetime member

of the Clearfield, Curwensville and Grampian/Penn/ Bloom Fire departments.

Each year, a memorial is held in the chapel at the fire academy in Emmetsburg, Maryland, for firefighters killed in the line of duty.

"The families are escorted by uniformed fire personnel. Then they're given a flag which was flown over the capitol and a rose." Wall said.

However, Bells Across America was started in 2011 for families of fallen firefighters across the country who aren't able to come to Emmetsburg.

Wall said he organized the first event as part of the regular service at the Curwensville United Methodist Church.

Last year, he invited all fire departments in the county, but didn't have much of a turnout.

"This year, I'd love to go up to the pulpit and look out to a sea of blue (uniforms)," Wall said.

For this year's service, Wall said he is going to read the names of all the firefighters killed in the line of duty in Pennsylvania and he will ring the bell.

Wall said the pastor of the church has also arranged for a bagpiper to play "Amazing Grace."

"There's just something about hearing 'Amazing Grace' on the pipes," Wall said. "Last year, when he played, people left with tears in their eyes."

There will also be a video screen that will have the names and pictures of firefighters killed in the line of duty.

Wall said this year's service will begin at 10:45 a.m. Sunday, Oct. 12. The service is open to all firefighters from all departments
