builder/operator for early Harvest Days Festivals. She was a prolific writer and story teller of living history, grower of gardens and nurturer of bodies and souls. Her greatest joy in life were children and her house was filled with flour dusted little bakers learning to make Maw's cinnamon rolls and other goodies! Her other passion was dancing.

Common Maw'isms: "Looking for a good right hand man? Then look at the end of your arm!" "Don't sweat the small stuff, especially when it comes to kids," and "I needed this long life—I have so much to do!"

Leona was preceded in death by her husband John Holyk, Sr. and her adopted son/nephew Harry Smick, parents and siblings. She is survived by her three children, John Holyk, Jr. (Shirley), Mary Cramer (Danny) and Sherri Holyk; nine grandchildren, 19 greats and 12 great-greats; numerous nieces, nephews and friends, all of whom she loved, adored and was so proud of.
