### Clemson vs. Georgia Tech Series

Georgia Tech holds a 51-28-2 lead in the series against Clemson. The Yellow Jackets have beaten Clemson more than any other school. Forty-four of the wins have taken place in Atlanta where the Yellow Jackets hold a 44-13-2 lead in the series. Clemson has a winning record over Georgia Tech in games at Clemson, 13-6. Tech never came to Clemson to face the Tigers until 1974.

Since Georgia Tech joined the ACC for the 1983 football season, the teams are tied with 17 wins apiece.

This has been a home stadium advantage in recent years. The home team has won each of the last seven games in the series.

Twelve of the last 20 games have been decided by five points or less, including a six-game streak between 1996-01 in which every game was decided by exactly three points. That might be a first in college football history. We aren't talking by three points or less, but exactly three points. Eleven of Georgia Tech's last 14 wins in the series have been decided by a touchdown or less.

Over the last 20 years Clemson and Georgia Tech have played 12 games decided by seven points or less. Georgia Tech is 9-3 in those games.

Clemson has won the last four games played at Clemson, all under Dabo Swinney. Swinney is 4-1 against Georgia Tech in Memorial Stadium and the only loss took place in 2008 when he had been named interim coach the Monday before the game. Tech won that game, 21-17.

In 2009, Georgia Tech won in Atlanta in the regular season 30-27 and in the ACC Championship game in Tampa by a 39-34 score. It is the only time Clemson has lost to the same team twice in one year. That ACC championship game was a bizarre affair as neither team punted and both teams gained at least 300 yards rushing. It was the first game in Clemson history that both teams didn't punt, and the only FBS game in college football in 2009 in which both teams had at least 300 yards rushing.

Clemson was victorious in 2006 behind the running of James Davis and C.J. Spiller. The duo combined for 332 yards rushing and four touchdowns, three rushing, in the 31-7 Clemson win at Clemson, a day in which ESPN's College Gameday was in town for the first time. Davis had a career high 216 yards rushing and Spiller became the first player in Clemson history with a touchdown rush and a touchdown reception of at least 50 yards in the same game.

This series dates to a 23-0 Clemson win in Augusta, GA in 1898, just the 11th game in Clemson football history. In fact, Clemson won the first four games of the series, including games in 1902 and 1903 when John Heisman was at the helm. Clemson defeated Georgia Tech in Atlanta 73-0 in 1903 with Heisman as head coach. Heisman then left Clemson after that season to become Georgia Tech's head coach.

Clemson has struggled in Atlanta over the years as Tech has a 44-13-2 advantage in the series in games there. Clemson has lost five in a row in Atlanta with the last win coming in 2003 by a 39-3 score. Clemson co-offensive coordinator Tony Elliott had a touchdown catch in that game.

Clemson has won in the city of Atlanta since 2003 however. The Tigers defeated Auburn and LSU in the Georgia Dome during the 2012 season.

### Tigers Last Win in Atlanta over Georgia Tech

Clemson has not won over Georgia Tech in Atlanta since a 39-3 victory on Septem-

ber 20, 2003. That was one of the top road performances by a Tommy Bowden coached Clemson team during his 10 seasons as head coach. Clemson jumped out to a 23-3 lead at halftime before gaining the 36-point win. The Clemson victory ended a streak of seven straight games in the series that were decided by five points or less.

The 36-point margin was the best for Clemson against Georgia Tech since 1903 and the best for any ACC road game since 1984.

Sophomore quarterback Charlie Whitehurst completed 23 of 38 passes for 298 yards and three touchdowns. Airese Currie, Kevin Youngblood and Tony Elliott all had touchdown receptions for the Tigers. Youngblood had five catches for 101 yards and Currie had 6-78. Elliott, now Clemson's co-offensive coordinator, had 5-31, including a nine-yard score from Whitehurst that was Clemson's first touchdown of the game.

Derrick Hamilton had a fine all-around game with 5-79 receiving and he also had a 39-yard kickoff return and 20 punt return yards. Duane Coleman was the top rusher for Clemson with 13-86 and a touchdown. John Leake, who went on to play for the Atlanta Falcons, had 14 tackles, including three tackles for loss and an interception, while, Leroy Hill added 11 tackles, two behind the line of scrimmage. Five Tigers had sacks, including cornerback Tye Hill. Toure Francis had a career high four passes broken up.

### Last Year vs. Georgia Tech

Clemson did not have a letdown after defeating No. 6 Notre Dame, and defeated Georgia Tech at Death Valley, 43-24 on October 10, 2015. Clemson gained 537 yards and scored 43 points in inclement conditions. Clemson had a balanced attack with 201 yards rushing on just 41 attempts and threw for 336 yards.

Wayne Gallman led the Clemson ball carriers with 13-115 and scored twice, while Zak Brooks added 41 yards and a score on just three carries. Quarterback Deshaun Watson connected on 21-30 passes for 265 yards and two scores. Backup quarterback Nick Schuessler was 2-2 for 71 yards.

Deon Cain led Clemson receivers with five catches for 96 yards. Jordan Leggett had four catches for 56 yards and two scores. He tied a Clemson single game record for a tight end with his two touchdown catches. Jay Guillermo did an outstanding job on the offensive line and was named ACC Offensive Lineman of the Week.

Scott Pagano and B.J. Goodson led Clemson with 12 tackles apiece, while Ben Boulware added 11. Cordrea Tankersley had an interception. Dorian O'Daniel had a career high three tackles for loss for 16 yards and Jayron Kearse also had three stops behind the line.

Clemson had 11 tackles for loss in holding Georgia Tech to 71 yards rushing in 42 attempts. Tech entered the game averaging 310 rushing yards per game.

Clemson had a 33-10 lead at the half as Gallman scored on a 66-yard run on the first drive of the game. He scored another touchdown in the period to culminate a 10-play 80-yard drive. Leggett had both of his touchdown catches in the first half, including one with just four seconds left in the second period.

**Wayne Gallman (RB)**—Started and played 49 snaps in 2014. Had 15-88 rushing and 3-8 receiving, including one touchdown. In 2015, started and played 42 snaps and had 13-115 rushing with two touchdowns.

**Greg Huegel (PK)**—Made a 21-yard field goal and was 5-5 in PAT in 2015 game.

**Jordan Leggett (TE)**—Did not play in 2013 game. Played 19 snaps and had one catch for eight yards in 2014 game at Georgia Tech. Started and played 40 snaps in 2015 win. Had 4-56 receiving and two touchdowns.

**Scott Pagano (DT)**—Did not play in 2014 game. Started and played 26 snaps in 2015 game at Clemson. Had 12 tackles to tie for the team lead.

**Artavis Scott (WR)**—Started and played 38 snaps in 2014. Had 3-19 receiving and 1-7 rushing. In 2015, started and played 32 snaps. Had 4-50 receiving and returned two kickoffs for 40 yards.

**Cordrea Tankersley (CB)**—Had two tackles in 2013. Played 15 snaps and had one tackle in 2014 at Georgia Tech. In 2015, started and played 55 snaps. Had two tackles and one interception return for 10 yards.

**Andy Teasdale (P)**—Did not play in 2013 and 2014. Started in 2015 and punted three times for 135 yards.

**Trevion Thompson (WR)**—Played 29 snaps and had 3-47 receiving in 2015.

**Carlos Watkins (DT)**—Played 2 snaps at Clemson in 2012. Did not play in 2013. In 2014, had one tackle in seven snaps. Started and played 31 snaps in 2015. Had five tackles.

**Deshaun Watson (QB)**—Started and played 18 snaps in 2014 before he suffered a knee injury. Had four completions on six attempts for 21 yards. Had 7-40 rushing for 61 yards. In 2015, started and played 64 snaps. Completed 21 of 30 passes and had one interception. Threw for 265 yards and two touchdowns. Had 6-16 rushing for 281 total yards.

**Korin Wiggins (S)**—Played five snaps and had one tackle in 2013. In 2014, played 11 snaps and had three tackles.

**Mike Williams (WR)**—Played 33 snaps in 2013 and had 3-45 receiving, including one touchdown. Started and played 54 snaps in 2014. Did not play in 2015 game at Clemson due to injury.

#### Georgia Tech Assistant is Clemson Graduate

For the third time in four games, Clemson will go against a coaching staff that includes a former Clemson assistant coach. A Georgia Tech offensive line coach is Ron West, who coached at Clemson as a full time coach under Tommy Bowden from 1999-2008. He was offensive line coach from 1999-03 and outside linebackers from 2004-08. He is the only assistant coach in Clemson history to coach at least four seasons on both sides of the ball.

West's ties to Clemson go back to his days as a player. He was an offensive lineman who was on the Clemson bowl teams of 1977 and 1978. He lettered in 1978 when he was an off and on starter.

In his 10 years as an assistant coach under Bowden the Tigers went to a bowl game

nine years and they were bowl eligible all 10 seasons. Four times the Tigers finished in the top 25, including a No. 14 ranking in 2000.

#### Heisman Worked at Both Schools

John Heisman coached at both Clemson and Georgia Tech. He coached the Tigers program from 1900-03 and led to a 19-3-2 record and two conference championships. Clemson won the SIAA conference title in 1900 and 1902 under Heisman and played in its first "postseason" game ever in 1903.

Clemson played Cumberland in Montgomery, AL on November 26, 1903 in what was called "the championship of the South." The contest ended in an 11-11 tie. That was his last game as Clemson coach, as he left after the season to become the first full time football coach at Georgia Tech, who paid him \$2,250 per year and 30 percent of the net gate receipts for home games.

Later as Georgia Tech coach in 1916, Heisman defeated Cumberland 222-0 in the highest scoring game (by one team) in college football history. His Clemson team of 1901 defeated Guilford College 122-0 and that is the highest scoring game by the Tigers in history. So, Heisman coached the highest scoring game in each school's history.

Heisman had a 102-29-7 record at Georgia Tech for a .779 winning percentage. His 19-3-2 record at Clemson computes to a .833 winning percentage. He is the winningest coach in Clemson history on a winning percentage basis (minimum of four seasons) and is the winningest coach in Georgia Tech history on a percentage basis.

Heisman is one of the all-time examples that coaching can make a difference. As Clemson coach he was 2-0 against Georgia Tech and outscored the Yellow Jackets, 117-5. In 13 games as Georgia Tech coach against Clemson he was 10-2-1 and won each of the last nine games. Clemson scored just 15 points in those nine games combined.

One other unusual note on Heisman from a Clemson standpoint took place on October 28, 1903. Clemson defeated NC State 24-0 in Columbia that day at the State Fairgrounds. After the game, Heisman married Evelyn Barksdale in Columbia. He is the only coach in Clemson history to win a football game and get married on the same day.

#### Here are some other Clemson vs. Georgia Tech highlights:

- Every game between the two teams between 1907-74 era was held in Atlanta. Clemson's only wins in those 36 meetings came in 1907, 1936, 1945 and 1969. The 1969 victory was Frank Howard's final season as head coach. Howard won just twice (1945 and 1969) in his career in Atlanta. But, Clemson went to Atlanta every year to help balance the athletic department budget. Howard was also athletic director his entire time as head coach (1940-69).

- The two teams have played on a neutral site just three times. Clemson won a 23-0 victory in 1898 in Augusta, GA and a 41-5 win in Greenville, SC in 1899. Georgia Tech won the ACC title game in Tampa in 2009, 39-34.

- The first time Georgia Tech played at Clemson Memorial stadium was 1974, a 21-17 Clemson victory. Clemson won that game on a three-yard touchdown pass from Mike O'Cain (former Virginia Tech quarterback coach) to All-America tight end Bennie Cunningham with 8:26 left.

- Woodrow Dantzler had one of the best all-around games of his career with 164 yards rushing and 254 yards passing in the Clemson victory in Atlanta in 2001. He threw

for two scores and ran for two, including a 38-yard "Hail Mary Run" on the last play of the first half to cut Tech's lead to 19-14 at intermission. His 63-yard scoring pass to J.J. McKelvey with 1:58 left put Clemson ahead by three, but Tech tied the count with a 20-yard field goal with just six seconds left. Dantzler's "walk-off" 11-yard touchdown in overtime gave Clemson the win.

•Clemson has had just four games in its history in which both teams scored in the 40s. The first two took place at Georgia Tech. Tech won 45-42 in 1999 and Clemson won 47-44 in overtime in 2001 in Atlanta. The third game took place in 2011 a 56-45 Clemson win at Maryland. Another was Clemson's 62-48 win over NC State in 2012.

•One of the most unusual statistical occurrences in Clemson history took place during Clemson's 33-12 victory over Georgia Tech in 1987 at Clemson. Clemson entered the game with a streak of 999 consecutive combined punt returns and kickoff returns without a touchdown dating to 1970.

Then, on the 1000<sup>th</sup> return, Donnell Woolford raced 78 yards with a punt return for a touchdown. Then, later in the game Joe Henderson returned a kickoff return 95 yards for a touchdown. It is one of just two games in Clemson history that the Tigers have returned a punt return for a touchdown and a kickoff return for a touchdown. The other took place in 2009 when Clemson defeated Middle Tennessee State.

•C.J. Spiller had arguably the best game of his Clemson career against Georgia Tech in the 2009 ACC Championship game. The unanimous All-American had a career high 233 yards rushing in 20 attempts and scored four touchdowns. He had 301 all-purpose yards and was named the MVP of the game even though Clemson lost 39-34. It is the only time a player on the losing team has been named the MVP of any conference championship game.

## Clemson Opens ACC Schedule

Clemson opens its 64th season of ACC football at Georgia Tech. The Tigers have won the ACC Championship 15 times, tied for the most in the history of the league with Florida State. Clemson won the league title last year, the second ACC Championship under Head Coach Dabo Swinney.

Clemson has been in the ACC all 63 years it has been in existence, one of seven schools that have competed for the league title every year since 1953 (Virginia did not compete for the ACC title in that first year).

According to the ACC record book, Clemson has a 268-141-6 record in ACC games heading into this year. That is a .653 winning percent for its 415 league games. As far as overall games are concerned, Clemson has a 706-456-45 record for its 1207 all-time games, a .604 winning percentage. That includes the 3-0 start to this year.

As far as ACC openers are concerned, Clemson is 36-26-1 in its previous 63 league openers, a .579 winning percentage. So Clemson has found it more difficult to win the ACC opener than other league games over the years.

That is the case with Head Coach Dabo Swinney as well. Swinney is 47-14 in regular season ACC games in his eight years (including interim year of 2008), a .770 percentage, but he is just 3-4 in ACC openers. So he is 44-10 in non-ACC openers, or 81.5 percent.

One of the reasons for that disparity is Swinney has faced tough competition in his ACC openers. He has four losses in league openers, but all four opponents were ranked in the top 16 in the nation going into the game. Swinney has lost an ACC opener to No. 15 Georgia Tech in 2009, No. 16 Miami (FL) in 2010, No. 12 Florida State in 2012 and No. 1 Florida State in 2014. All have been on the road except for the Miami game in 2010.

## Clemson Has 3-0 Start

Clemson and Georgia Tech are both 3-0 entering Thursday evening's game in Atlanta. This marks the first time in the history of the

series (82<sup>nd</sup> game) that both teams have entered with perfect records and at least three wins.

Clemson is 3-0 for the 11<sup>th</sup> time since 1961. That includes the fifth time in the last six years under Dabo Swinney. Clemson opened 8-0 in 2011 before losing at Georgia Tech, 31-17. Clemson was 3-0 in 2012 before losing at Florida State, 49-37. The Tigers were 6-0 in 2013 before losing at home to Florida State, 51-14. The Tigers were 14-0 last year before losing to Alabama in the National Championship game.

Clemson has opened at least 3-0 six times since 2000 and the streaks have been broken by Georgia Tech three of the six. Tech ended an 8-0 start by Clemson in 2000 with a 31-28 win at Clemson. The Yellow Jackets ended a 4-0 Clemson start in 2007 with a 13-3 win over the Tigers in Atlanta. Then in 2011, Tech beat Clemson to ended an 8-0 start.

In the 48 seasons before Dabo Swinney became Clemson Head Coach, the Tigers started 3-0 just six times. Swinney has taken Clemson to a 3-0 start now for the fifth time in his eight years.

## Swinney vs. ACC Teams

Dabo Swinney is 49-15 overall against ACC teams since he became Clemson head coach. That includes a 47-14 mark in regular season games and 2-1 in ACC Championship games. His .766 winning percentage in ACC games is fifth best in ACC history.

The Clemson head coach has faced 13 different ACC teams since he became head coach in 2008 on an interim basis. That includes Maryland, who is no longer in the league. When the Tigers face Pittsburgh in November, he will have faced a 14<sup>th</sup> different ACC team.

Swinney has a winning record against every ACC team with the exception of Georgia Tech and Florida State. Ten of his 15 losses against ACC teams have been against those two schools. He is 4-5 against Georgia Tech and 3-5 against Florida State.

Swinney is 7-1 vs. Boston College, 2-0 vs. Duke, 3-5 vs. Florida State, 4-5 vs. Georgia Tech, 2-0 vs. Louisville, 4-1 vs. Maryland, 2-1 vs. Miami (FL), 3-1 vs. North Carolina, 6-1 vs. NC State, 3-0 vs. Syracuse, 3-0 vs. Virginia, 3-0 vs. Virginia Tech and 7-0 vs. Wake Forest.

In his 64 games as Clemson coach against an ACC team, the average Clemson victory has been by a score of 34-21. Only Florida State has outscored Clemson in games against Swinney's Tigers. The Seminoles have a 247-206 advantage in terms of points. Georgia Tech has a winning record against Swinney, but the Tigers have outscored the Yellow Jackets, 273-248.

## Swinney Looks for 50<sup>th</sup> ACC Win

Clemson head coach Dabo Swinney can become just the eighth coach in ACC history to record at least 50 wins over ACC teams if his Tigers defeat Georgia Tech on Thursday night. Swinney has a 49-15 mark against ACC teams since he became head coach on an interim basis in 2008.

Bobby Bowden, who coached at Florida State as an ACC coach from 1992-2009, had 118 ACC wins and just 27 losses. Other ACC coaches with at least 50 wins in league play are George Welsh of Virginia (85), Frank Beamer of Virginia Tech (72), Frank Howard of Clemson (66), Earle Edwards of NC State (55), Bill Murray of Duke (54), and Bill Dooley of North Carolina and Wake Forest (52). Dooley also coached at Virginia Tech, but the Hokies were not in the ACC when he was there coach.

In terms of overall wins as an ACC coach, Swinney is now ninth with 78. The win over SC State moved Swinney out of a tie for ninth with Jerry Claiborne and Earle Edwards, who both had 77. Bobby Bowden is the all-time leader in total wins as an ACC coach with 173.

It is interesting to note that former Clemson coaches Danny Ford and Frank Howard both had the same amount with 96, tied for fifth best in ACC history. Howard had 165 wins in his career, but the first 14 years of his career Clemson was not in the ACC.

## Clemson's Regular Season Winning Streak

Clemson enters Georgia Tech game on an 18-game regular season winning streak. The last time Clemson lost a regular season game was on November 15, 2014, a 28-6 loss at Georgia Tech. That is also the only regular season game Clemson has lost when Deshaun Watson started at quarterback. Watson only played 18 snaps in the game as he suffered a knee injury in the first period and did not return.

Entering Thursday's game, Clemson has won 20 of its last 21

overall, the best 21-game streak in school history. Clemson has won 26 of its last 28 and the school's current senior class is 38-6.

## Clemson On Thursday Night

Clemson has a 6-9 record in ESPN Thursday Night games over the years, but has won five in a row, all under Dabo Swinney. In fact, Swinney is 5-1 in Thursday night games on ESPN, with the last victory coming at Louisville last year, 20-17. This is the fifth straight year Clemson has played a Thursday night game. Clemson played two in 2013.

This will be the third time Clemson and Swinney have had to play a game on short rest (playing Thursday after a Saturday game). Clemson is 2-0 in that situation under Swinney, a 42-13 win at Wake Forest in 2012, and the win at Louisville last year.

While Clemson has a 6-9 mark on Thursday night, it should be noted that seven of the nine losses have been to top 25 teams, and seven of the nine losses have been on the road.

Clemson has had just three home games on Thursday night over the years, 1998 against Georgia Tech, 2002 against NC State and 2013 against Georgia Tech. Clemson is 1-2 in those games, but won the last one 55-31 in 2013 behind quarterback Tajh Boyd.

Playing on Thursday is not new for Clemson historically. Clemson and South Carolina met on "Big Thursday" every year between 1909 and 1959. The game was played in Columbia in conjunction with the State Fair.

Clemson did not win a Thursday game between 1964 and 2004. The Tigers played on Thanksgiving Day in 1963 due to the death of President Kennedy. Clemson lost its first six ESPN Thursday night games between 1998-04

## The 2010s, Winningest in Clemson History

With a 3-0 start, Clemson now has a 65-19 record in the decade of the 2010s. That computes to a .773 winning percentage, the best for any decade in Clemson history. This decade has moved ahead of the 1980s in terms of winning percentage.

In the 1980s, Clemson had a .767 winning percentage off an 87-25-4 record, the fifth best winning percentage in college football. Clemson did not have a losing season in any year in the 1980s under head coach Danny Ford, who coached every game in that decade. So far Dabo Swinney has coached every game in the decade of the 2010s.

Clemson quarterback Deshaun Watson was named to the All-state Insurance Company American Football Coaches Association (AFCA) Good Works Team for 2016. The Good Works Team® award is celebrating 25 years of recognizing college football players who dedicate their time to bettering the community and the lives of others.

Watson, the consensus All-American quarterback in 2015, has been significantly involved in Habitat for Humanity since he was in high school and his time with the Clemson Tigers. Last year he was presented with the Habitat for Humanity's Next Generation Award.

Watson is the fourth Clemson player to be named to the team. Robert Carswell (1999), Nick Eason (2000) and Xavier Dye (2009) were previous selections.

The players named to the Good Works Team® represent the sport's finest in terms of character and leadership, in addition to maintaining good academic standing. To help announce the landmark year of the Good Works Team®, Allstate and the AFCA have also teamed up with two-time national champion, Heisman Trophy winner and 2009 Allstate AFCA Good Works Team® member Tim Tebow.

The following players and head coach have been named to the 2016 Allstate AFCA Good Works Team® from FBS Schools:

## McCloud Making Moves on Punt Returns

Sophomore Ray Ray McCloud was made an impact on the Clemson special teams so far this year. It is without a doubt the most improved area on the Clemson team.

McCloud, also a starting wide receiver, has six punt returns for 152 yards, an average of 25.3 yards per return, second best in the nation. The native of Tampa, Florida already has more than twice as many punt return yards as the entire Clemson team had last year. The Tigers had just 63 punt return yards in 2015 in 15 games.

The last Clemson player to average 25 yards per punt return for the course of the season is C.J. Spiller, who averaged 26.3 per return in 2009. But, Spiller had just eight returns.

No Clemson player has had 250 punt return yards in a season since Justin Miller in 2004. Miller, who went on to be an NFL Pro Bowl kick returner, had 339 punt return yards that year.

McCloud was Clemson's top receiver in the win over South Carolina State. He had four catches for 60 yards and two scores. For the season, McCloud is third on the team in receiving with 13 catches for 154 yards and the two scores.

As a team, Clemson has 10 punt returns for 187 yards, an 18.7 average that is 10<sup>th</sup> best in the nation.

## Ninety-two Players Saw Action vs. South Carolina State

Clemson played 92 players in the victory over South Carolina State, believed to be the most in a single game in school history. Twenty-four players saw the first action of their careers.

There were many examples of the depth the Tigers showed in that game. A record five different quarterbacks completed passes, and a record 15 different players caught passes. Deshaun Watson, Nick Schuessler and Kelly Bryant all threw touchdown passes. It was the first time since the 2010 Presbyterian game that three different quarterbacks threw touchdown passes in the same game.

## Tigers Coming off 59-0 Win

Clemson is coming off a 59-0 victory over South Carolina State. It was the largest margin of victory for the Tigers since a 73-7 win over the same South Carolina State team in 2014. It was the largest margin of victory in a shutout since 1990 when Clemson defeated Long Beach State by the same 59-0 score.

Clemson scored 31 points in the first quarter, the most points in the first quarter in school history. It was the fourth highest scoring

quarter in Clemson history. The Tigers had a 45-0 lead at intermission, the most points Clemson has scored in the first half since taking a 45-10 lead at the half against Ball State in 2012.

The 59-point margin tied for the fifth highest margin in Clemson Memorial Stadium.

## Watson Breaks Boyd Mark

Deshaun Watson threw for 292 yards and three scores in Clemson's win over Troy and followed that up with three more scores in the win over South Carolina State. He has now thrown at least one touchdown pass in 19 consecutive games a school record. Tajh Boyd had a streak of 17 in a row between 2011 and 2013.

Over the streak Watson has thrown at least two touchdown passes 14 times. The SC State game was the eighth time during the streak and 10th time in his career he has thrown for at least three touchdowns in the same game.

For his career, Watson now has 56 career touchdown passes, ninth among active players at the FBS level. He also has 17 rushing touchdowns to give him 73 scores in terms of touchdown responsibility for his three years. That ranks seventh best among active FBS players. His passing efficiency rating is 158.7 is fourth among active FBS players and he is third in completion percentage at .663.

Watson went over the 6,000-yard passing mark against Troy when he accumulated 292 yards. He is the fourth Clemson quarterback to do it joining Boyd, Charlie Whitehurst and Woody Dantzler.

## Wilkins Touchdown a First

Clemson sophomore defensive lineman Christian Wilkins is rapidly getting a reputation as one of the most all-around football players in the nation. Wilkins burst on the national scene in the Orange Bowl last year when he caught a 31-yard pass from punter Andy Teasdall on a fake punt against Oklahoma. That was a momentum changer for the Tigers in their 37-17 victory.

Then, in the 2016 season opener against Auburn, he threw a key block in Clemson's goal line offense to allow Wayne Gallman to score a key touchdown in the Tigers six-point win. Gallman was quoted as saying, "That was the easiest thing I have done at Clemson."

Wilkins brought his offensive exploits to a new level against Troy last week when he caught a one-yard touchdown pass from Deshaun Watson on a third-and-goal play to give the Tigers a 20-10 lead. With the reception, Wilkins became the first defensive lineman in Clemson history to score a touchdown on an offensive play.

Wilkins has certainly been doing his job on the defensive line as well. He has 15 tackles over the first three games, including four tackles for loss, two sacks and three passes battled down at the line of scrimmage.

## Clemson Linebackers Productive

The Clemson defense has had a lot of firsts under coordinator Brent Venables. The Tigers have led the nation in **total** tackles for loss each of the last three years. Clemson is the first school to do that nationally. Clemson is third in the nation in tackles for loss so far this year with 31 in three games.

In the win over Troy, three different Clemson linebackers had interceptions, the first time that has happened since two-platoon football began in 1965. According to Whitey Jordan, an assistant coach on the 1964 staff, Clemson two-way players Ted Bunton, Jay Cooper and Pat Crain played linebacker when they were on defense that year. All three of those players had interceptions in Clemson's 29-7 win over Virginia in 1964.

Kendall Joseph, Jalen Williams and Dorian O'Daniel all had thefts in their pass coverage in the first half of Clemson's win over Troy. It was the first career interception for all three.

To put into perspective how rare it is for linebackers to get interceptions, Clemson players at that position had just four all of last year, two by Ben Boulware and two by B. J. Goodson.

Over the last nine years, the 2015 team is the only squad to have at least three linebacker interceptions for the course of a season. This is the first time since 2002 that three different linebackers have had interceptions in a season. That year Eric Sampson, Kelvin Morris and Altroy Bodrick all had one pick apiece.

A linebacker has had an interception just 17 times in Dabo Swinney's head coaching career and now seven of them have taken place over the last two years.

## Clemson Has Longest Active Streak of Top 5 AP Rankings

Clemson has been ranked in the top five in the nation in 12 consecutive AP polls. That is the longest active streak in the nation and the longest streak of top five rankings in Clemson history. The national record is 55 consecutive weeks in the AP top five by Miami (FL) from 2000-03.

Clemson has an active streak of 24 consecutive polls in the top 25, the sixth longest active streak. Clemson has been ranked in the top 10 for 15 straight polls, tied for the second longest active streak with Alabama. Ohio State has the current longest streak at 26 in a row in the top 10.

## Tigers Have Won 18 in a Row at Home

Clemson enters the Louisville game on October 1 with a school record 18-game winning streak in Memorial Stadium. The streak began with a 55-31 win over Georgia Tech in 2013. The Tigers finished the regular season home schedule that year with a win over The Citadel, and posted consecutive 7-0 records at home since then. The 2014 and 2015 seasons mark the first time Clemson has had consecutive perfect seasons at home since 1950 and 1951 when Clemson was 4-0 at home each year.

It should be pointed out that the Clemson record for consecutive home games without a loss, **has not been broken**. From the South Carolina game of 1980 to the Virginia Tech game of 1984, Clemson did not lose a game at home, a streak of 25 consecutive games without a loss in Death Valley. The Tigers were 23-0-2 at home during that time, a tie with Boston College in 1982 and a tie with Georgia in 1983.

Clemson's current home winning streak of 18 in a row is second longest in the nation behind Florida State's 22-game streak. The Tigers go to Florida State this year on October 29.

## Swinney 48-6 at Home

Head Coach Dabo Swinney is 48-6 at home at Clemson, including the 18-game active winning streak. His Tigers have lost more than one game at home just once, in 2010 when the Tigers were 5-2 at home.

Swinney and the Tigers lost their first home game, in 2008 by a 21-17 score against an unranked Georgia Tech team. That is the only unranked team Swinney has lost to at home. He has won 43 straight at home against unranked teams.

In the 18-game winning streak, Clemson has an average margin of victory of 26 points per game. Only three teams have been within 10 points of Clemson at home in the 18-game streak. In 2014, Clemson beat Louisville 23-17 and in 2015, beat Notre Dame 24-22. This year's Troy game was a six point margin. Fifteen of the 18 wins in the stretch have been by at least 10 points and nine have been by at least 20 points.

Swinney's 48-6 record computes to an 88.9 winning percentage (min 20 games). That is a Clemson coaching record for winning percentage at home. He is just ahead of Ken Hatfield, who was 22-3-1 at home between 1990-93, a .865 winning percentage.

Swinney is already third in Clemson history in total home wins. Frank Howard has the record with 81 between 1940-69, and Danny Ford is second with 53.

## Welcome Back Mike Williams

Playing in his first game since the 2015 opener, Mike Williams had nine catches for 174 yards in the Tigers 19-13 win at Auburn. The Clemson senior had 70 percent of Clemson's 248 receiving yards in the game, as he repeatedly made back shoulder receptions from quarterback Deshaun Watson.

Williams had 1,030 receiving yards as a sophomore in 2015. He had a career high 155 receiving yards and two scores on his birthday against NC State that year. Then in last year's opener he suffered a neck injury after making a touchdown reception against Wofford on the first possession of the season. The injury forced him to miss the rest of the season.

But he came back with a vengeance at Auburn as he wiped out his career high in reception yardage and tied his career high in terms of total receptions (also had nine against Oklahoma in 2014 bowl game).

Williams established a Clemson record for receiving yards in a season opener with his 174. The previous high mark in an opener was 152 by Airese Currie in 2004.

Williams now has 14 catches for 242 yards this season and 93 receptions for 1,605 receiving yards for his career.

## Clemson Opens with Thrilling Win at Auburn

Clemson gained a 19-13 win over Auburn in the season opener at Auburn, Ala. Here are some notes on that victory:

- First win to open the season on the road against a team currently in the SEC since 1903. The last time Clemson accomplished that feat was a 29-0 win at Georgia. John Heisman was the Clemson coach. Clemson was 1-8 all-time in openers on the road against teams currently in the SEC.

- First win at Auburn since 1950 when the Tigers defeated Auburn 41-0 behind the running of all-time great Fred Cone, who had 163 rushing yards in the game.

- Clemson had a 100-yard rusher and a 100-yard receiver in the contest. Wayne Gallman had 30 carries, second highest in his career, for 123 yards. It was his 13<sup>th</sup> career 100-yard game. He needs just two more to tie the Clemson record of 15 set by Raymond Priester between 1994-97.

- Clemson held Auburn to 13 points and one touchdown in the Tigers victory at Auburn to open the 2016 season. It was the fewest points Clemson has allowed against an SEC team since the 2009 when the Tigers defeated Kentucky 21-13. It was the fewest points Clemson has given up to an SEC team on the road since a 13-9 Clemson win at South Carolina in 2005.

## Boulware and Johnson Both Record Fifth Interceptions

Clemson won the turnover battle at Auburn, 3-2. That is usually a good sign for the Tigers who are 44-4 under Dabo Swinney when winning that stat.

Seniors Ben Boulware and Jadar Johnson each had the fifth interception of their respective careers and both of them came in the second half to stop Auburn drives deep into Clemson territory. In fact Boulware made his theft inside the five-yard line.

Johnson added another theft against South Carolina State, the school in his hometown of Orangeburg, S.C. So he has two this season and six for his career. His best game this year was at Auburn where he had an interception and pass deflections on plays in the endzone on each of Auburn's last two plays.

Boulware has made a name for himself making big plays in key games. Each of the last two years he has had an interception against Oklahoma in a bowl game, the only Clemson linebacker to do that in a bowl game two years in a row.

## 50 Years of Howard's Rock

The Clemson football program will celebrate 50 years of Howard's Rock at Memorial Stadium this year. Howard's Rock was first put on a pedestal at the top of the hill at the east end of the stadium for the Virginia game of 1966. Clemson won that game 40-35 thanks to a great second half comeback.

The Tigers did not start the tradition of rubbing Howard's Rock before they ran down the hill until the Wake Forest game of 1967, the season opener.

With the tradition something that took place over two seasons, the celebration of Howard's Rock will be a year long celebration in 2016.

Against Troy, members of the S.C. Jones family and the family of Gene Willimon, were honored. Jones brought the rock from Death Valley, California and gave it to Frank Howard, who in turn gave it to Gene Willimon, the former executive secretary of IPTAY. It was Willimon's idea to mount it on the pedestal at the East Endzone of the stadium.

## Wilkins and Lawrence Join the Jumbo Package

Christian Wilkins and Dexter Lawrence were quite a tag team on the Clemson defensive front line in the win over Auburn. They were a big reason Clemson held Auburn to 87 rushing yards, a program that averaged 196 rushing yards per game in 2015 and led the nation in 2013.

Lawrence finished with 10 tackles according to the Clemson coaches grading of the film, second behind Kendall Joseph's 14. Wilkins added seven. They had sacks on consecutive plays in the second period, and Wilkins ended the game with 2.5 tackles for loss, a fumble recovery and a pass deflection at the line of scrimmage.

Additionally, they both played in Clemson's "Jumbo Package" when the Tiger offense got close to the goal line. Both players had successful blocks on Wayne Gallman's one yard touchdown run on fourth down in the second period. Both players are also blocking backs in Clemson's punt formation.

## Joseph Has Career Best Night

Kendall Joseph was Clemson's top tackler off stats from the Clemson coaches grading in the season opener at Auburn. The red-shirt sophomore from nearby Belton, S.C. made his first college start and had 14 tackles, including three tackles for loss and a sack. As a freshman in 2015, Joseph had just 11 tackles all year in 63 plays over seven games. He is a former three-time state champion in the state of South Carolina in weight lifting.

Joseph was named ACC Linebacker of the Week for his performance against Auburn, his first career start. He was also named Clemson's top defensive player by the coaching staff in the win over Troy.

Joseph is Clemson's top tackler this year with 27, including a team best five tackles for loss.

## Tigers Continue to Make Tackles for Loss at Alarming Rate

Clemson had 14 tackles for loss in the season opening win over Auburn, tied for the fourth most over the first weekend of college football. It was a balanced performance in that area as nine different players were involved in the stops behind the line of scrimmage. Kendall Joseph led the way with three, the first three of his career in fact. Christian Wilkins had 2.5 and Cordrea Tankersley had two.

Clemson had seven more against Troy and 10 more against South Carolina State. The Tigers now rank third in the nation in tackles for loss per game with 10.5.

Since Brent Venables has been at Clemson the Tigers have done very well in this category. In fact, each of the last three years, the Tigers have led the nation in total tackles for loss. Clemson had 123 in 2013, 131 in 2014 and 126 last year. The Tigers were 28<sup>th</sup> in the category in 2012, Venables first year, with 87.

In his 57 games as Clemson defensive coordinator, Venables defense has had 498 tackles for loss, an average of 8.7 per game, best in the nation over that time. Those 498 tackles for loss have been for

2034 yards, or 1.16 miles of real estate.

Additionally, Clemson has recorded at least one sack in each of the last 33 games, second longest active streak in the nation. The Tigers had three sacks in the win at Auburn, one by Dexter Lawrence, one by Christian Wilkins and one by Kendall Joseph. Those were career firsts for Lawrence and Joseph. Clemson has 10 sacks for the year for 70 minus yards.

## Two Tigers Earn ACC Player of the Week Honors

First time starters Kendall Joseph and Taylor Hearn each earned ACC Player of the Week honors for their play at Auburn. Joseph was named the ACC Linebacker of the Week, while Hearn was named the ACC Offensive Lineman of the Week.

Joseph led the Tigers with 14 tackles from coaches film, and had three tackles for loss, also tops on the Clemson team. He was a big reason Clemson held Auburn to 87 yards rushing, 109 below their average from last year.

Hearn graded 90 percent overall, 98 percent in pass blocking and had four knockdown blocks in playing all 81 snaps. He did not give up a sack and was a big reason Clemson gained 399 yards of total offense.

## Milestone, Records and streaks in Range

- Wayne Gallman moved into the top 10 in rushing in Clemson history with his 34 yards against Troy. He has 2493 for his career entering the Georgia Tech game and needs just 7 to become the 10th Tiger to reach 2500. Gallman had 15-88 against Tech as a freshman and 13-115 last year.

- Watson moved ahead of Woody Dantzler on the all-time Clemson completion list. He had 12 completions against Troy and now has 484 for his career. He obviously needs 16 completions to reach 500 for his career.

- Deshaun Watson has thrown at least one touchdown pass in 19 consecutive games, an alltime Clemson record.

- Artavis Scott needs five receiving yards to become the 10<sup>th</sup> player in Clemson history to reach 2000 receiving yards.

- Mike Williams needs seven receptions to reach 100 for his career.

- Jordan Leggett needs 33 receptions to reach 100 for his career and 129 receiving yards to reach 1000. Leggett needs two touch-down receptions to set Clemson career record for a tight end.

- Artavis Scott has caught a pass in 26 straight games.

- Clemson has won 40 consecutive games against teams who are unranked in either of the two major polls, the second longest streak in the nation behind Alabama's 61.

- Clemson has had at least one sack in 33 straight games.

## Clemson Career Leaders

Clemson has an active player in the top 10 in school history in the major categories of passing offense, total offense, rushing yardage and receiving yardage. Wayne Gallman is currently 10<sup>th</sup> in school history in rushing yards. He moved into the top 10 against Troy. Gallman is also coming up on the school record for 100-yard games. He has 13 for his career, two fewer than Raymond Priester had between 1994-97.

Deshaun Watson is now third in school history in passing yards with 6262. He moved ahead of Woody Dantzler when he had 292 passing yards against Troy. Watson is also fourth in total offense with 7651. Artavis Scott is 10<sup>th</sup> in school history in receiving yardage. He needs just five yards to 2000. He moved into the top 10 in Clemson history in career receiving yards against South Carolina State. He moved ahead of Jacoby Ford, who was watching from the sidelines.

## Watson Has Top Winning Percentage

Of all the records Deshaun Watson owns, winning percentage would have to be the one he covets the most. The junior has a 21-2 record as a starter for a 91.3 percent mark, ahead of the .813 by another DeChane, (pronounced the same) DeChane Cameron, who quarterbacked the Tigers in 1990 and 1991. He was 19-4-1 as a starter.

As far as total wins is concerned Tajh Boyd and Rodney Williams have the record with 32 wins apiece. Boyd was 32-8 between 2010-13 and Williams was 32-10-2 between 1985-88. Williams is now the color commentator on Clemson's radio network.

Alabama ended a streak of 51 straight wins for Clemson when leading into the fourth quarter in the national title game. Clemson led 24-21 entering the last quarter of that game, then lost 45-40.

## 40 Straight Wins over Unranked Opponents

One of the most incredible streaks for the Clemson football program the last five years has been its streak of 40 consecutive games without losing to an unranked opponent **in either poll**. (It is a 42-game streak against teams not in the top 25 of the AP poll).

Alabama is the only school with a longer streak of wins over unranked teams at 61. Clemson last lost to an unranked team on November 19, 2011 when the seventh-ranked Tigers lost at NC State 37-13.

Dabo Swinney has not lost at home to an unranked opponent since the first game he coached for the Tigers. That was on October 18, 2008. Georgia Tech won a battle of unranked teams 21-17. Since then Swinney and the Tigers have won 43 in a row at home over unranked teams.

## Watson Named Top College Player by ESPN

Clemson quarterback Deshaun Watson was named the No. 1 college football player in the nation by ESPN.com over the summer. The website took votes from 32 ESPN college football media and came up with a top 100 players in the nation.

Watson was ranked No. 22 in the nation entering last year and finished third in the Heisman Trophy voting, the first Clemson player to be a Heisman finalist. He led the Tigers to a 14-1 record and No. 2 national ranking at season's end. He became the first FBS player in history to throw for over 4,000 yards and rush for over 1,000 in the same season. He was a first-team All-American and ACC Player of the Year.

Eight different media outlets selected top 40, 50 or 100 players this off season and Watson was named the nation's top player by five of them. The others to pick him No. 1 were Sporting News, CBS Sports, NFL.com and Athlon Sports. Bleacher Report chose Watson No. 2, while Sports Illustrated and Pro Football Focus chose Watson sixth.

ESPN.com had six Tigers in their top 100. Wide receiver Mike Williams was ranked 48<sup>th</sup>, offensive tackle Mitch Hyatt was 55<sup>th</sup>, running back Wayne Gallman was 58<sup>th</sup>, wide receiver Artavis Scott was 76<sup>th</sup> and defensive lineman Christian Wilkins was 85<sup>th</sup>.

Ten current Clemson players were listed as top 100 players by at least one of the eight media outlets. Ben Boulware was ranked 23<sup>rd</sup> by Si.com and 32<sup>nd</sup> by Sporting News. Jordan Leggett was ranked 79<sup>th</sup> by NFL.com and 92<sup>nd</sup> by Si.com. Carlos Watkins was ranked in the top 50 by NFL.com (14), Sporting News (38) and Si.com (49). Cordrea Tankersley was ranked 57<sup>th</sup> by Pro Football Focus and 90<sup>th</sup> by NFL.com.

Watson was the only Tiger ranked in the top 100 by all eight services. Gallman was ranked in six of the eight, Mike Williams was ranked in five of the eight, Hyatt, Watkins and Scott were listed in three of the eight.

Football coaches from around the state were together for the evening, all in the name of charity. The list of college head coaches included Dabo Swinney, Will Muschamp, Brent Thompson, Mike Ayers, Bruce Fowler and Buddy Pough.

Each coach chose a charity that benefits from his participation, as well as his Jerry Richardson Community MVP Award honoree, who were recognized during the evening.

Watson had an outstanding year on the field, helping the Tigers to a 14-1 record and the ACC Championship. The Tigers finished second in both wire service polls after reaching the national championship game against Alabama. ## Facts on Head Coach Dabo Swinney

- Clemson is the only program in the nation to finish in the top 25 of the AP poll and rank in the top 10 percent of the academic APR scores each of the last five years.
- Has led Clemson to at least the same, or higher final ranking than its preseason in the AP poll each of the last five years. Has tied the all-time record for that accomplishment. John Cooper of Ohio State and Bill Snyder of Kansas State also had a streak of five straight years.

Clemson, Alabama, Oregon and Florida State are the only schools in the country to finish in the top 25 of the final AP poll each of the last five years. Dabo Swinney's program is the only school in the nation to finish the same or better in the final poll than its preseason ranking each of the last five years.

Clemson received 16 first-place votes, the most first-place votes Clemson has received in the preseason. The previous high was 11 in the 1984 preseason poll. It is the first time since 1991 that Clemson has received any first place votes in the preseason poll. Clemson had one that season.

## Leggett Challenging Clemson Tight Ends Records

All-American tight end Jordan Leggett finished the 2015 season with 40 receptions for 525 yards and eight scores. His eight touchdowns tied a Clemson season record for a tight end.

The Mackey Award finalist did establish one record, as he had at least one touchdown reception in five consecutive games, a record for a Clemson tight end. He added a score in the ACC Championship game against North Carolina, and scored Clemson's last touchdown of the year against Alabama.

Leggett enters his senior year with 66 career receptions for 862 yards and 11 touchdowns. He needs just 28 receptions, 394 yards and two touchdowns in 2016 to become Clemson's career leader in all three areas for a tight end. John McMakin had 93 catches for 1255 yards and 12 touchdowns for Clemson between 1969-71 at the tight end position. Dwayne Allen and Brandon Ford also had 12 touchdown receptions.

## Tigers Prominent in Herbie Awards

For the 16<sup>th</sup> straight year, ESPN college football analyst Kirk Herbstreit released his preseason College Football Herbie Awards. The awards feature various categories of college football.

## Clemson Football Schedule Notes

•Clemson's **ACC home** opener is against Louisville on October 1. The Tigers have won each of the first two meetings with the Cardinals since they joined the ACC, but both games have been close. Clemson won the meeting at Clemson in 2014 by a 23-17 score, then downed the Cardinals, 20-17, in Louisville last year. That was the second closest game Clemson had during its undefeated regular season in 2015.

•Clemson plays at Boston College on Friday night October 7. It will be Clemson's first Friday night **regular season** game in 60 years, but the Tigers did gain victory in their last Friday night game at any point in the season. That came in the 2014 Orange Bowl when Clemson beat a sixth-ranked Ohio State team in Miami, 40-35.

•It will be Clemson's first regular season game on a Friday since November 16, 1956 when the Tigers lost at Miami (FL), 21-0. Clemson's last regular season win on a Friday actually took place in Boston. The Tigers defeated Boston College at Braves Field, 13-0 on Halloween, 1952.

•Clemson plays at Florida State on October 29. Clemson has won in Tallahassee just once since 1989 and that was in 2006.The winner of the Clemson vs. Florida State game has won the ACC Atlantic

Division every year since 2008, Swinney's first year at Clemson.

- Clemson closes the season with home games in three of its last four contests, the first time that has been the case since 2012. Syracuse comes to Clemson on November 5, then Pittsburgh plays at Clemson for the first time on November 12.

- Swinney's Tigers have 10 games on Saturdays, one on a Thursday and one on a Friday. All seven home games are on Saturdays, but the Tigers will play at Georgia Tech on a Thursday and at Boston College on a Friday night. As a result of the Thursday and Friday road games in the first half of the schedule, Clemson will not have a road Saturday game between September 4 and October 28.

## Clemson National Rankings under Venables

Clemson defensive coordinator Brent Venables has led the Tigers defense to some outstanding national rankings over his four years as defensive coordinator, especially over the last two years. Clemson ranked first in the nation in total defense in 2014, then ranked 10<sup>th</sup> in 2015. The 2015 ranking was quite an accomplishment considering Venables lost eight starters from his 2014 defense.

Clemson ranked first in the nation in pass efficiency defense in 2014 and 11<sup>th</sup> in 2015. The Tigers were in the top five in completion percentage defense each of the last two years and in the top four in third down conversion defense in both 2014 and 2015. Overall, Clemson led the nation in 12 different defensive categories in 2014 and ranked in the top 10 in six of those areas in 2015.

The aggressive approach has paid off for Venables as Clemson has led the nation in **total** tackles for loss each of the last three years with 123 in 2013, 131 in 2014 and 126 in 2015.

## CLEMSON FREQUENT VISITOR TO AP POLL

With Clemson's No. 2 finish in the final AP poll for 2015, the Tigers appeared in the Associated Press Poll 75 times out of a possible 82 polls between 2011-15. That means Clemson was in the AP poll 91.5 percent of the time since the start of 2011, tied for the fifth most frequent appearance over that time with Oregon.

Alabama is first as the Crimson Tide have been in all 82 polls over that time, with an average ranking of 2.6. Clemson's average ranking over the last five years when it appears is 10.8. Only Alabama, Oklahoma, Florida State and LSU have been in the poll more often than Clemson over the last five years.

Clemson is eighth in terms of the number of top 10 appearances the last five years with 35 of 82 polls. Again Alabama leads the way with 80 top 10 rankings in the last 82 polls.

## CLEMSON ENTERS 700 WIN CLUB

Clemson won its 700<sup>th</sup> game in history on November 21, 2015 with a 33-13 victory over Wake Forest. Clemson became the 23<sup>rd</sup> program in FBS history to win 700 games, the fifth to do it in 2015. Other schools who reached 700 victories last year include Florida, Arkansas, Pittsburgh and Washington.

Clemson enters the 2016 season with 703 total wins, 20th in the history of FBS football. Clemson has made quite a run the last five years with 56 victories, an average of 11 per season. And the Tigers have done it against good programs.

A check to the chart below shows that Clemson is 18-4 against the other programs ranked in the top 20 in the nation in total victories the last six years. That includes a 4-1 record against the Top 10 under Dabo Swinney over the last three years. Clemson has won a bowl game each of the last four years against a program ranked in the top 12 in the nation in total wins.

Clemson is the preseason favorite to repeat as Atlantic Coast Conference football champion, according to a poll of 191 media mem-

bers in attendance at the 2016 ACC Football Kickoff in Charlotte

The Tigers, who posted a 14-1 overall record last season and reached the College Football Playoff national title game, are also picked to again capture the Atlantic Division, while North Carolina is favored to repeat as the Coastal Division winner.

Clemson junior quarterback Deshaun Watson was the overwhelming choice to repeat as ACC Player of the Year after his record-setting 2015 campaign. Watson was also the media's preseason selection as conference player of the year last season.

The Tigers were picked the likely 2016 ACC champions on 144 ballots, followed by Florida State with 39 votes and North Carolina with seven. One voter chose Louisville.

In the Atlantic Division preseason voting, Clemson received 148 first-place votes and finished with 1,293 total points. Florida State received 42 first-place votes and placed second with 1,176 points, while Louisville had one first-place vote and was third in the voting with 961 points.

North Carolina was selected the likely Coastal winner by 121 voters and finished with 1,238 total points, followed by Miami with 50 first-place votes and 1,108 points. Pitt received 14 first-place votes and was third in the balloting with 859 points.

If the overall prediction of the voters proves correct, the 2016 ACC Dr Pepper Football Championship on December 3 at Charlotte's Bank of America Stadium will be a rematch of last year's event. Clemson defeated North Carolina 45-37 for the 2015 ACC title after both teams posted 8-0 records in conference play during the regular season.

Watson led the preseason ACC Player of the Year balloting with 164 votes, followed by Florida State running back Dalvin Cook with 18. North Carolina running back Elijah Hood received four votes, while Miami quarterback Brad Kaaya and Louisville quarterback Lamar Jackson picked up two votes apiece. Duke cornerback/return specialist DeVon Edwards received one vote.

The ACC Male Athlete of the Year and the MVP of both the Dr Pepper ACC Football Championship Game and the Capital One Orange Bowl, Watson ranked fifth nationally in pass completion percentage (67.8) and was voted the ACC Offensive Back of the Week four times in 2015. Watson is bidding to become the first student-athlete to be named ACC Football Player of the Year in back-to-back seasons since Florida State's Charlie Ward in 1992-93.

## Clemson Has Positive Ranking by Wall Street Journal for Third Straight Year

Each year the Wall Street Journal publishes its Grid of Shame. It is a grid with four quadrants that take into account a team's performance on and off the field. Some of the off the field considerations are the school's APR ranking, graduation rate, NCAA probation history and player arrests.

The goal of college football programs is to be in the upper right quadrant of the grid at the intersection of Powerhouse on the field and Admirable reputation off the field.

This year 14 programs were in the upper right quadrant, including Clemson, who was the team furthest to the right, which meant it was the top program on the field among the programs who are considered to have admirable qualities off the field.

This marks the third consecutive time the WSJ did the grid that Clemson has been listed in the upper right quadrant. Clemson, Stanford, Washington, Michigan State, Florida, Michigan, Iowa, Boise State and UCLA are the nine schools who have been in the upper right quadrant each of the last three times the WSJ has done the grid.

## Dabo and Kathleen Swinney Pledge \$1M to IPTAY

Dabo and Kathleen Swinney recently pledged \$1 million to IPTAY in support of Clemson football to provide future funding for programmatic and building initiatives that will continue to propel the program forward.

It is not the first time that the Swinneys have chosen to support programs at Clemson. In addition to past gifts of more than \$340,000 from the All In Foundation in support of Call Me MISTER, ClemsonLIFE, Clemson's Bio-Engineering Department (for breast cancer research), Clemson Community Engagement Department (breast cancer program), Clemson's Education Department (Reading Recovery and Early Literacy), Clemson's Outdoor Lab (new dock project) the Swinneys have personally donated more than \$265,000 of their private funds to need-based scholarships, Golf Paws, the Clemson chapel project, IPTAY's annual fund, and the completion of the WestZone

"I love Clemson, and I believe in our program, and I feel like Clemson has been pulling for me since that first game in 2008," Swinney said. "But no matter how much we win on the field, my passion is building and empowering successful young men through the game of football. Kathleen and I are blessed. And we have always known we need to use those blessings to do good for others. It's so important to us that we give back to this program that has been so good to us.

"Over the years, the Swinneys have left no doubt about their dedication to helping others. One of their largest and most visible avenues is through the All In Foundation. Founded in January 2009, the foundation has four major focuses: breast cancer research, the Family Effect, Call Me MISTER and the ClemsonLIFE Program. Their efforts through the foundation alone have resulted in gifts of over \$2 million to these causes.

Two focus areas, ClemsonLIFE and Call Me MISTER, offer young people the opportunity to improve their lives and the lives of others through the power of education. Involvement with special-needs young people began as a tribute to the touching life of John Mark Stallings, the special-needs son of Gene Stallings, the coach who deeply impacted the Swinneys during their time at the University of Alabama. The ClemsonLIFE program has helped hundreds of young people learn to live independently as self-sufficient adults.

Call Me MISTER, a program begun at Clemson and now spread to 20 colleges and universities, is an initiative that increases the pool of available teachers from a broader more diverse background particularly among the state's lowest performing elementary schools. The program has created a group of educational leaders who serve as mentors and role models to the communities they serve.

"It is hard to find programs that are closer to my heart than ClemsonLIFE and Call Me MISTER," Clemson President Jim Clements said. "The Swinneys generously gave to an endowment established in the name of my daughter, Grace, that offers grants to students who need financial assistance to be a part of ClemsonLIFE.

"And, anyone who has seen Call Me MISTER in action has witnessed the incredible impact of this program in building leaders across the country. These men are changing lives every day — not just in the classroom, but in their families and the community. It's great to have a head football coach who continuously shows his commitment to Clemson University through these tremendous programs and others,

and is an advocate for and supporter of the entire community.”

Changing lives is the overarching theme of Swinney philanthropy. And much of that vision stems from their own personal experiences. The Family Effect works to reduce alcohol and drug addiction as a leading cause of family collapse and harm to children. The Swinney family has felt the impact, understands the risk and knows the need for intervening healing in these homes.

“There’s no doubt that times were tough for my family when I was younger. But what I try to do with those experiences is turn them into empathy. I do understand. I do know how these people feel. And as long as we have the financial resources to try to make a difference, we will,” Swinney said.

The Swinneys have also experienced first-hand the toll that breast cancer can take on an entire family. Kathleen’s older sister died of breast cancer, and Kathleen discovered that she and her younger sister carry the BRCA gene mutation, making the risk of the disease very close to her. That passion has led to support of early detection as well as the breakthrough research being done on the Clemson campus by Dr. Brian Booth of the Institute for Biological Interfaces of Engineering.

As Kathleen says, “I really dream of a day when no one suffers from this disease. That’s why I am so passionate about the work of the foundation. I want to help find the cure and meanwhile make things just a little easier for the families who are in the battle with this disease.”

While Kathleen and Dabo Swinney have a long history of generosity, they would never call their missions accomplished. Dabo sounds like the passionate coach he is when he talks about getting behind these Clemson programs: “You know; Clemson is a great school. But we can’t rest on that. We’ve got so much more to do. We have to always strive to get better and that’s why we’ve got a new strategic plan at the University called ClemsonForward. That says it all. Just like playing offense in football: It’s all about the forward progress. No progress. No win. We can’t stop now.”

## Renfrow to Miss at Least Four Weeks

Clemson starting wide receiver Hunter Renfrow will miss “a few weeks,” according to Head Coach Dabo Swinney. Renfrow suffered a broken hand in the Tigers win over Troy on Saturday while making a 35-yard touchdown reception. Preliminary reports on Saturday indicated it was not a serious injury.

“We thought Hunter was going to be fine, but the MRI on Monday showed a little crack below his thumb,” said Swinney on his Monday night radio show, Tiger Calls. “He could play with it, but the injury would make it more difficult to hold on to the ball when he tried to tuck it away. He will have surgery to repair it and miss a few weeks. We hope to have him back for the NC State game, but certainly by the Florida State game after the open date.”

Renfrow was one of Clemson’s top players in the school’s run to the National Championship game last year. He had 33 receptions for 492 yards and five touchdowns in 2015. The original walk-on had seven receptions for 88 yards and two scores against Alabama. He has caught at least one touchdown pass in each of the last four games. He has four receptions for 62 yards and two scores in two games so far this year.

Ray Ray McCloud is expected to move into the starting lineup with Renfrow’s injury. Renfrow also served as the backup punter. The backup punter will now be Carson King, a red-shirt freshman walkon from Nashville, Tenn.

AUBURN, ALA. - Clemson opened the 2016 season Saturday with a 19-13 win over Auburn in front of a sellout Jordan-Hare Stadium. The Tigers batted down a Hail Mary pass attempt on the final play of the game to move to 1-0 on the season.

Deshaun Watson passed for 248 yards and a touchdown, while wide receiver Mike Williams signaled his return with a career night. He caught nine passes for 174 yards to lead the playmakers. Defensively, Clemson came up with three takeaways and held Auburn to just 262 yards.

A scoreless first quarter saw the Tigers put together a pair of drives that resulted in points in the second. After three big completions to Williams — who returned from a neck injury suffered in last year's opener — Wayne Gallman plunged in from a yard out behind two defensive tackles lined up in the backfield. With just seven seconds left before the half, Greg Huegel tacked on a 30-yard field goal to put Clemson up 10-3.

Auburn pulled to within a touchdown at 13-6 heading into the fourth quarter, but Hunter Renfrow provided the play of the night. Facing third-and-goal, Watson lofted a beautiful pass from the 16 to Renfrow, who made a spectacular catch in the corner of the endzone. It was his third straight game with a touchdown reception.

CLEMSON, S.C. - The No. 2 Clemson Tigers defeated Troy 30-24 at Memorial Stadium on Saturday afternoon. The victory extended the Tigers' home winning streak to 17 games.

The Tigers (2-0) were led by quarterback Deshaun Watson, who was 27-53 passing for 292 yards and three touchdowns, as he moved ahead of Woodrow Dantzler for third place on Clemson's all-time passing yards list.

The first quarter featured little scoring, as both teams struggled to develop any type of offensive rhythm. Favorable field position following a punt allowed the Trojans (1-1) to convert a short drive into the game's first score, a 39-yard field goal by Ryan Kay. On the ensuing possession, the Tigers reciprocated with a 26-yard field goal by Greg Huegel.

The second quarter was a far different story. Watson took advantage of a Troy turnover by throwing a 35-yard touchdown pass to Hunter Renfrow, marking the sophomore's fourth straight game with a touchdown reception.

Interceptions played a key role in the second quarter, with Troy quarterback Brandon Silvers throwing three to Clemson linebackers. Interestingly enough, these were the first career interceptions for all three (Jalen Williams, Kendall Joseph, Dorian O'Daniel). Williams' interception, which was the byproduct of a tipped pass at the line,

bailed out the Tigers, who had just turned the ball over in their own territory.

Despite several electrifying offensive and defensive plays, including a 66-yard touchdown run by Troy running back Jabir Frye that tied the score 10-10. Late in the quarter, Clemson's Ray-Ray McCloud dropped a sure punt return for a touchdown on the one yard line, and after a lengthy video review, Troy took over on a touchback.

After Kay missed a 48-yard field-goal attempt in the final seconds, the Tigers took a 13-10 advantage into halftime.

McCloud, who had seven catches for 86 yards in the game, had three receptions on a key third-quarter drive en route to a goal-line situation. Defensive lineman Christian Wilkins then made the second-most important reception of his college career later in the drive in the fourth quarter, a one-yard touchdown grab, the first of his career, that gave the Tigers a 20-10 lead.

Clemson scored to take a 27-10 lead with 10 minutes remaining in the game when Watson found Deon Cain in the endzone for a 23-yard touchdown. After a Huegel field goal with 2:25 remaining, Troy drove 68 yards and scored to cut the deficit to 30-24, as Silvers connected with Deondre Douglas for a one-yard touchdown pass with 44 seconds remaining. The Tigers recovered the ensuing onside kick and held on for the 30-24 victory.

Fueled by a 31-point first quarter, No. 3 Clemson routed SC State 59-0 on Sept. 17, 2016 in Memorial Stadium. That opening frame was the highest scoring first quarter in school history. With the win, the Tigers improved to 3-0 on the year.

"Today was a great day," said head coach Dabo Swinney. "It's hard to play 92 guys and still get the shutout...I don't care who you're playing. I'm so proud of our guys. They played a clean game for four quarters today. This was great for our team, for our spirit and our morale. It was great to get out there today and go play."

On the offensive side of the ball, the Tigers were led by Deshaun Watson, who was 12-15 passing for 152 yards and three touchdowns, and Ray-Ray McCloud, who totaled 60 yards and two touchdowns on four receptions. Clemson finished with 555 yards offensively, and 92 Tigers saw playing time.

The Tigers started scoring with 11:33 left in the first quarter on a seven-yard touchdown pass from Watson to McCloud, and they did not look back from there. Later in the quarter, the Bulldogs fumbled a Tiger kickoff in the endzone and Denzel Johnson pounced on the ball for his first career touchdown, upping the lead to 21-0 with 5:20 remaining in the first quarter.

Nick Schuessler then added to the scoring with his first career touchdown pass, a 45-yard connection with freshman Diondre Overton. A 26-yard field goal from Greg Huegel rounded out the first quarter, giving the Tigers a 31-0 lead.

Second-quarter action picked up with a second touchdown pass from Watson to McCloud, marking McCloud's first career game with multiple scores. One more touchdown from Watson to Deon Cain later, and the Tiger took a 45-0 lead into halftime. Clemson's 45 first-half points were the most scored in a first half since the Tigers' matchup with Ball State in 2012, when Clemson also scored 45 points.

With the third and fourth quarters shortened to 12 minutes each, the Tigers kept rolling. Bringing the Clemson point total over 50 was Tavien Feaster, who scored his first career touchdown midway through the third quarter. Trevion Thompson also hauled in his first career touchdown in the third quarter on a seven-yard strike from Kelly Bryant. With Bryant's scoring pass, Saturday's game marked the first time three Tiger quarterbacks threw a touchdown pass in a game since Clemson's win over Presbyterian College in 2010.
