Langlois Market burglarized

Capture: Two of three suspects arrested after Coos Bay chase

LANGLOIS – A burglary at the popular Langlois Market ended in a car crash and the arrest of two men in Coos Bay last Thursday. A third suspect remains at large.

Richard Schlitz, 20, was arrested by Coos Bay police on outstanding Coos and Douglas county warrants. Michael Reid, 32, of Santa Maria, Calif., faces charges of burglary and theft.

The Curry County sheriff's office received two

reports of a burglary in progress at the Langlois Market around 4:30 a.m. April 25. Both callers reported seeing two people break into the store and drive north toward Coos Bay in a newer silver four-door car.

About 45 minutes later, a witness to the burglary reported seeing the car parked along the road at Beach Junction just south of Bandon. A Bandon police officer responding to find the vehicle gone, but the cash register from the Langlois Market abandoned in the area.

Coos Bay police chased the car after it entered the city limits. The car crashed near the Southwestern Oregon Community College cam-

COQUILLE – A Bandon woman was sentenced Monday to two months in jail after she admitted having sex with an adolescent boy twice last summer.

Ladonna Renee Moniz pleaded guilty to two counts of thirddegree rape. She had sexual intercourse with the victim twice between June 10 and Aug.1.

Moniz, 30, was originally charged with eight counts each of second-degree sodomy and second-degree rape, but the charges were reduced in a plea agreement. The plea saved her from a Measure 11 conviction, which would have mandated a minimum sentence of 70 months in prison.

Instead, Moniz was given two back-to-back 30-day sentences. She also must serve three years' probation, is forbidden to contact the victim or his family, must pay a \$1,500 fine and cannot be alone with anyone under age 18.

The comparatively light sentence reflected her lack of a prior criminal record. But the terms of the probation mean any

Chamber hosts Micro Biz Fair






2. Use the available authority of the Port Commissioners to prevent unilateral land grabs by federal agencies in the Coquille Valley. The Port of Bandon is a major landowner in our area and needs a public policy outlining its stewardship of properties it owns and manages. For example, the port owns property adjacent to the land the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service most wants to acquire in order to expand the Bandon Marsh. 

President Reagan amended the law in 1988, designating the first Thursday of May each year as the National Day of Prayer.

This year's theme, Pray for America, is based on Matthew 12:21: "In His name the nations will put their hope."

Port seeks items for time capsule

The Port of Bandon is accepting items to put in the 100-year time capsule it plans to bury on Saturday, Sept. 14, as part of its centennial celebration.

Submissions will be accepted through July 31 and the container will be buried near the port offices in the historic Coquille River Lifesaving Station, 390 First Street S.W.

A reception for the public, port friends and partners is being planned to coincide with the interment of the stainless steel capsule, which has a capacity of about 2 cubic feet.

Gina Dearth, port general manager, explained that before the box is welded shut, it will be purged with dry argon gas to help prevent oxidation or acidic reaction within the contents.


"We're told this is a specialized process that's used in the food, chemical, cryogenic and pharmaceutical industries," she said. "According to the manufacturer, the contents of our capsule will last virtually forever."

Public submissions, which must be limited in size due to the container's capacity, should be intended to inform people in 2113 about Bandon's culture in 2013.

"Or it could be advice or a small heirloom that you wish you could give to your great-great-grandchildren," Dearth said. "We encourage photographs or other paper items, like poems or drawings."

An engraved brass plaque with the port's name, date of burying and opening instructions will be affixed to the capsule, which will be registered with the International Time Capsule Society at Oglethorpe University in Atlanta, Ga. It is to be opened on Sept. 14, 2113.

"Use your imagination in deciding what to submit, and please join us and enjoy cake and help us celebrate the port's centennial on Sept. 14," Dearth added.

Schlitz was transported to the Coos County jail and Reid was taken to the Curry County facility.







Beloved 'Pastor John' honored

Recently stocked lakes giving up plenty of trout

Local lakes: Anglers fishing Bradley Lake reported great rainbow trout fishing last week. ODFW finished its spring stocking of Bradley Lake this week with 3,000 more legal-size trout. Anglers fishing from the boat launch pier are having better success in the morning and early evening. The trout are still taking a variety of baits fished under a bobber or off the bottom. Casting spinners or small spoons have also been very successful.

Recently stocked Floras, Empire and Tenmile Lakes should give South Coast anglers plenty of opportunities this coming weekend. Lake temperatures are starting to warm up a bit, which is good new for anglers looking to hook into a largemouth bass. Recent reports suggest a very slow retrieve when fishing plugs or tossing plastic worms.

Local rivers: Anglers fishing the lower Rogue River for spring salmon are seeing lots of fish movement, but with the low and clear river conditions getting them to bite has been tough.

Conditions have been similar for anglers springer fishing the Umpqua, along with a constant flow of moss. Local guide Bob Cobb told me one of his clients hooked and landed a spring salmon on 6pound line while drifting and casting plugs for smallmouth bass. Anglers are also catching a few shad on the Umpqua from Sawyer Rapids near Elkton upriver to Yellow Creek. Look for shad fishing to heat up with another high pressure in our area and plenty of sunshine forecast this weekend.

Pacific Ocean and beaches: Fishing for pink fin surf perch is starting to pick up on the beaches near Bandon. One angler caught some decent size fish south of the

jetty close to the shore rocks. A series of early morning high tides this weekend will give anglers a chance to fish the beach before the winds pick up.

Don't forget to sign up for the May Surf Perch Derby before your next trip to the beach. The derby started yesterday and will run until the end of May.

Decent ocean conditions had anglers back out bottomfishing last weekend. Ling cod fishing has remained awesome, and a

We did not receive many reports of Chinook salmon taken last weekend. Ocean temperatures dropped from 52 to 48 degrees which could have put the salmon off the bite.

The 2013 ocean sport salmon seasons have been established for Oregon and can be found online or stop by Port O'Call in Old Town and we will be happy to give you a copy.

Today is the opening day for the

2013 nearshore halibut season. The season will run every Thursday, Friday and Saturday through October 31 or when the quota of 23,038 pounds has been met. Next Thursday, May 9, starts the spring all depth halibut season.

Area shellfish: Some nice hard shelled Dungeness crab come off of Weber's Pier in Bandon last weekend. We are starting to see a lot of large female crab moving into the bay which is typical every spring. Crabbers willing to sort through the smaller crab and females are being rewarded with a few nice keeper-size crab.

Razor clam diggers reported good clamming off of Whiskey Run Beach last weekend. Look for another minus tide series to start next Tuesday. Local angler education instructor Jay Chojnacki will host a class of surf perch fishing tonight at the Port of Bandon's picnic shelter from 6-8 p.m.

Note: ODFW is holding a public meeting this Saturday, May 4 at 6 p.m. at the Millicoma School gym, 260 2nd Ave., Coos Bay. There are major fishing reductions proposed for the Elk Coos, Coquille and Umpqua rivers. All South Coast anglers interested in how these reduction can affect our sport should attend.
