Mixed bag for local growers

BANDON — As the Coos and Curry county cranberry harvest season wraps up, it's turned out to be a mixed bag for local growers.

Some call it an average to good year, while others are left wondering if it's worth it to continue in the business, making barely enough per barrel to cover the costs of maintaining the farm.

Growers who are feeling hopeful this year include those who belong to the Ocean Spray co-op.

Others, who grow independently and deliver to local receiving plants for processing, have seen the price drop to a low they weren't expecting this season.

"The big story is a tale of two cities," said Charlie Ruddell, an Ocean Spray grower whose family owns 54 acres of cranberry bogs on Randolph Road.

Ruddell said the discrepancy in pricing between Ocean Spray and non-Ocean Spray growers is wide. Ocean Spray growers, who are divided into an "A" pool and a "B" pool, may get as much as \$50 a barrel for this year's crop, Ruddell said. Independent growers might receive as much as \$30 a barrel, or as low as \$10-\$12 per barrel.

A barrel is 100 pounds of berries and the average cost to produce that product is \$38, according to the National Agricultural Statistics Service.

"When you operate at or below cost, it's not a favorable business model," Ruddell said.

Another change this year is the tremendous pricing pressure on the cranberry commodity market. While Ocean Spray takes its fruit from farm to retail, other growers sell to the commodity market, which is then sold to a third party and so forth, until it reaches the retail market. Often, the commodity market includes berries from the prior harvest, sold as frozen product.

The low price this year convinced some growers locally to deliver fresh fruit, which requires a dry-pick method that is more labor intensive, but results in a higher payout.

According to Don Kloft, Bandon Ocean Spray receiving plant manager and agricultural scientist, the crop yield for the 45 Coos and Curry county Ocean Spray growers was slightly lower than

last year. The slight decline in production could be attributed to cold temperatures in July. A dry fall also presented challenges for some growers, who had to

wait until it rained to start harvest. "We had an excellent pollination

Bandon land swap approved

SOUTH COAST - The proposed Bandon Links golf complex south of Bandon took another step toward becoming reality on Nov. 20 when the Oregon Parks and Recreation Commission approved, in principle, a land exchange that makes the project possible.

Bandon Biota, owned by Bandon Dunes Golf Resort owner Mike Keiser, will receive 280 acres of Bandon State Natural Area south of town, where Keiser hopes to build a 27-hole championship golf course.

In exchange, Bandon Biota will transfer 208 acres to the state park system - 111 adjoining the Bandon State Natural Area and 97 adjacent to Bullards Beach State Park. Bandon Biota also will spend about \$300,000 on gorse control in the Bandon area, and pay as much as \$2.95 million to help the

Crab season delayed

NEWPORT – The opening of the ocean commercial Dungeness crab season in Oregon will be delayed through at least Dec. 15, fishery managers announced.

The commercial Dungeness crab season along the Oregon Coast normally opens Dec. 1, but can be delayed to ensure a high-quality product to consumers. The testing measures the percentage of meat in the crab, by weight. Delaying the season allows the crab to fill with meat.

Coastwide testing showed some areas did not meet minimum preseason test criteria. Fishery managers from Oregon, Washington and California met last week and decided to delay the season opening from Klipsan Beach, Wash., south to the Oregon/California border through at least Dec. 15, pending further results. Testing is still underway in Northern California to determine the season status from Point Arena to the Oregon/California border.

Recreational harvest of crab in the ocean off Oregon will open as scheduled on Dec. 1. The recreational harvest of Dungeness crab in Oregon's bays and estuaries is open year-round.

ODFW to present Redfish Rocks survey results in meeting Dec. 2

PORT ORFORD — The Redfish Rocks Community Team will hold its next regular meeting at 6 p.m. Monday, Dec. 2, in the Port Orford City Council

Chambers.

At the meeting the community team will be discussing past, current and future projects related to the Redfish Rocks Marine Reserve. The Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife will also be in attendance to give

the team an update on their work. Katie Pierson also will be giving a special presentation on the results of the 2013 hookand-line surveys done at Redfish Rocks.

The Hook and Line Surveys at Redfish Rocks yielded many interesting results and interesting sights, including whales, according to a news release from the Redfish Rocks Community Team. The purpose of these surveys are to find out how

big and heavy the fish caught at the marine reserve are, since these are the first indicators of a reserve effect on fish populations.

During the surveys, volunteer anglers caught everything from lingcod and salmon that were over 40 inches long, to a 1-inch sculpin.

"Come and join us to learn more about this project and the fish of Redfish Rocks," release stated.





Another golf course?

What can the State Parks and Recreation be thinking? Yet another golf course for Bandon? Michael Keiser already has five or six (lost count) near Bandon.

Also near Bandon is the Face Rock Golf Course and another just south called Bandon Crossings. Doesn't Parks and Recreation know that there are other forms of outdoor recreation? Only a very small part of the population play golf, (less than 10 percent) or even want to. It's an expensive sport, takes up a lot of space, uses a lot of water and pesticides.

Michael Keiser says, "I see it as a \$15 million gift to Coos and Curry county golfers and juniors who don't even know they miss golf." He also sees a new course as being a "philanthropic" offering to the community (Capital Press, Nov. 15, 2013). My friend says it would be much more philanthropic to simply write a check for \$15 million to be used for the swimming pool that Bandon has always wanted and could not afford and perhaps some covered year-round tennis courts. That would be a real gift and not one that simply puts more money in Keiser's already deep pockets.

Please also remember that the trade that is about to be allowed, is supposed to "provide overwhelming public benefit." Included is taking a 6,100-acre ranch in Grant County essentially out of production and off tax rolls. What benefit is there in taking a ranch out of production there and providing more golf here? Good for folks who don't even know they want it and producing a cadre of young caddies to serve the needs of those who can afford to play the expensive sport?

Also consider that two new golf courses are being considered for Cape Arago on "poor quality farm land" and two near Pistol River. Even poor quality farm land does produce food, golf courses do not.

Big accomplishment for BCHC

The Bandon community should be very proud of what has been accomplished here in our town. While Bandon Community Health Center is really a product of community action, there are a number of people who have been especially significant resources.

The friends and fans of Dr. Gail McClave are certainly happy for her and thankful that they were able to convince her that the medical mission she was planning to pursue overseas should take place right here. Her contribution of time, skill, money and passion were seminal to the creation of a Federally Qualified Health Center here and soon. The Steering Committee that preceded the Board of Directors was composed initially of her patients who were unwilling to change their doctor, but grew by the addition of other community members who could see the need for this vital extension to the health care safety net.

FQHC may be a new term to many, but it is a very significant tool that the national health care system has used for a number of years to provide affordable health care in very challenging circumstances. We should emphasize that this tool has been adopted as an integral part of the Affordable Care Act (so called Obamacare) which is much more that the famous "botched roll-out of the web site." The ACA has been "rolling out" for a number of years and the epic expansion of the FQHC program is an important but underreported feature. The management at BCHC has been working toward this coup for years. Even the inclusion of "Community Health Center" in the name is significant, as that is the common name applied in FQHC outreach for this kind of facility.

The fact that there were only four of these grants awarded to future FQHCs in Oregon points to the level of competition nationwide for them. The fact that 75 percent of the Oregon grants were awarded to clinics in southwest Oregon points to the significance of the contribution of the Ford Family Foundation to the vitality of rural communities in this region.

I wish I dared to mention some of the names, but fear that my memory would fail to mention the most important ones.

Keys to wilderness survival

I don't about you, but I just love a good survival story. When I read of someone who has been given an opportunity to lose a battle against

nature, but then comes out on top, I want to find out how he did it. What did he do? What did he have with him that was useful in his battle against the elements? What little tidbit can I learn that I may be able to use if I'm ever in that situation?

More than a month ago, on Oct. 14, most of the major news networks carried the story of 72-year-old Gene Penaflor who had gone deer hunting in Northern California. Nineteen days earlier, Penaflor and his hunting partner split up to try to flush out a deer. A search was

launched after Penaflor failed to meet up with his companion a few hours later. Unknown to his hunting partner, Penaflor had fallen and was knocked unconscious for several hours. When he woke, it was foggy and he was disoriented. According to news reports, he kept his wits about him and managed to get a small fire going and find shelter. Among the items he carried were a rifle and some ammo, two garbage bags, a knife, a lighter and a water bottle. The knife and water bottle were lost in the fall.

Although the temperature at times fell to 25 degrees, he built a small fire and sought shelter from rain and snow under a fallen tree. He also stuffed dry leaves and grass under his clothing for insulation and used the garbage bags as makeshift rain gear. His Gore-Tex boots were another key item credited with his survival.

Penaflor reported he survived by eating three squirrels, one snake, two frogs and two lizards. He simply threw them on the embers of his fire and made sure they were thoroughly cooked before he ate them.

He was rescued 19 days later by a group of hunters who heard him yelling for help. After a short stay in the

hospital for observation, he was released and is reportedly doing fine. So let's take a look at what he did

that helped keep him alive. First, although he was injured and disoriented, he did not panic. He simply took stock of his situation and calmly did all the right things.

Secondly he had some things with him that were of value. A cigarette lighter probably contributed greatly in that it was a great fire starter. Not only was the fire used for warmth and companionship, but he now had a means by which to cook his food. And speaking of food, you and I might think it odd (or downright icky) to eat squirrel, snake or lizard, but we only say that because we aren't real hungry

at the moment! Never look down your well-fed nose and say you wouldn't eat something like that just because at the moment it seems gross! Your opinion may change if you haven't eaten for a few days.

Lastly, we get a hint of the value he places on quality equipment when we learn he was wearing Gore-Tex boots. Some life-saving decisions are made before you

ever leave home. So the next time you prepare to venture out, pause for a moment to consider what you may want to add to your pockets that just may increase your chances if

period, with plenty of bees to pollinate, but it was a little cold in July, which slowed things down and led to a lower yield," Kloft said. "The plants think it's fall, so they start maturing earli-

Kloft said an additional piece in the pricing puzzle is increased production in Canada, particularly Quebec, where the government several years ago encouraged farmers to plant cranberry bogs. Those approximately 5,400 bogs, run by independent growers, are now fully producing, which has led to an abundance of berries flooding the market, driving the price down.

Demand is consistently growing, but not as quickly as it was three or four years ago, Kloft added. Ocean Spray also is continually developing international markets.

A significant amount of Ocean Spray cranberries are used for juice products and Craisins. sweetened, dried cranberries that are highly popular, Kloft said.

The Ocean Spray receiving plant employs 30 workers seasonally, this year from Sept. 23 to

Nov. 26. Kloft's dual role as receiving plant manager and agricultural scientist keeps him busy. He is available year-round for Ocean Spray growers, helping them enhance their production, answering questions and keeping pesticide records. Crops are approved or disapproved based on those records, though Ocean Spray's standards are more stringent than the government's.

While his dual role is challenging, Kloft said he enjoys his position.

"Bandon is a great town," he said. "I've met wonderful people and my growers are great. They are some of the best in the company."

Most growers are done harvest Thanksgiving, though a few in the fresh fruit or organic market will harvest up to December for the Christmas holiday.

Ty Vincent, a member of the Oregon Cranberry Growers Co-op, said the yield on his family's 30 acres has remained about the same for the last three

"It was a pretty average year," he said.

But he agreed that price is down for independent growers.

more cranberries on the market," he said. "Plus, there's a large supply of last year's crop in freezers,

> so we're up against that." But Vincent isn't complaining. He said most cranberry growers he knows also work at another job. Vincent is employed at Bandon Dunes Golf Resort.

"The cranberry business is what it is," he said. "It's farming and it has its ups and downs."

Dave Haueter, also a member of the Oregon Cranberry Growers Coop, owns 14 acres off Randolph Road and leases another 14. He has been in the business since 1998 and said he enjoys it much more than his former career in logging, which he did for 20 years.

Haueter said his crop wasn't quite what he had hoped for this year and co-op members won't know the price until next year.

"Is seemed like a really good growing season, but my crop wasn't that great," he said. "Still, it was a decent year."

CHILLED CRANBERRY SOUP

By Kathleen Stadelman 2013 Cranberry Food Fair Queen of the Kitchen Cranberry Base

1 cup dry white wine

julienned zest and juice of one lemon

3 cups of whole cranberries, fresh or frozen 1 cup of sugar

For the Cranberry Base

Bring the wine to a boil in a small saucepan. Add the lemon zest and juice. Simmer until the liquid reduces by half. Strain the reduced liquid into a medium saucepan. Stir in the cranberries and cook over medium low heat until the berries burst. Add the sugar and simmer gently for 15 minutes. Pour about ¹/₃ of mixture into a blender and puree (use caution as the mixture is hot)

Once mixture is smooth strain into a metal bowl and cool in an Ice-water bath and chill thoroughly.

Crème Anglaise

1 vanilla bean, split 1 cup heavy cream

¹∕₂ cup sugar

5 large egg yolks 1 cup milk

To make the Crème Anglaise

Scrape the seeds from the vanilla bean into a medium heavy bottom sauce pan; add the pod, cream, and half the sugar. Bring to a simmer, stirring to dissolve the sugar.

Meanwhile, in a medium bowl, whisk the egg yolks with the remaining sugar until they have thickened and lightened to a pale yellow. Whisk one third of the hot (not boiling) cream mixture into the yolks to temper them (letting the cream cool a little and adding it slowly will help prevent curdling) Slowly add this mixture to the saucepan. Stir with a wooden spoon over low heat until it coats the back of a wooden spoon. Pour into a metal bowl set in an ice water bath to cool. When cool, strain it, and place in the refrigerator to chill.

Mixing the Cranberry Soup

Mix ½ the Crème Anglaise into the Cranberry Base. Continue adding the Crème Anglaise until the flavor is right for you. (I had about 1/3 of the Crème Anglaise left). If the soup is too sweet, add a little lemon juice.

This soup looks beautiful garnished with a few flower petals or fresh mint.



CRANBERRY BREAD

Preheat oven to 325 degrees

8 cups flour 4 cups sugar

1 cup butter

3 cups orange juice 4 eggs, well beaten

6 tsp. baking powder

2 tsp. baking soda 4 tsp. salt

8 cups sliced cranberries, fresh or frozen.

Combine dry ingredients. Cut in butter. Combine juice and eggs. Poor wet ingredients into dry ingredients. Fold in with spatula. Fold in berries. Spoon into greased bread pan. Bake at 325 degrees for 1 hour. Makes four loaves

state buy a 10-acre parcel known as Whale Cove in Lincoln County and part of the 6,300-acre Grouse Mountain Ranch in Grant County that will be turned into a state park.

According to state rules, when an outside party initiates a land exchange, the proposal as a whole must provide "overwhelming benefit" to Oregon's state park system.

Chris Havel of OPRD said the commission agreed the exchange provides an overwhelming benefit to the public, but said that additional information must be gathered regarding the properties.

"While they approved these two proposals in principle, the commission has asked for additional information from staff and will not issue its final decision on either project until staff return at a future meeting with proposed final orders on both proposals," Havel wrote in a press release.

"For the coastal properties, the commission has directed staff to provide more information about a recent change in the exchange parcel boundary, potential impacts on endangered western snowy plover and natural resource conditions on all the involved properties," Havel wrote. "For both sites the commission has directed staff to produce more documentation, such as appraisals and environmental reports."

The information will be presented to the commission at its Feb. 5 meeting in Salem, when the land swap can gain final approval.

Meanwhile, OPRD will accept additional written testimony until Dec. 6 regarding the proposed exchange or the proposed Grouse Mountain Ranch acquisition to consider in preparing the proposed final orders, Havel said.

During its meeting in Corvallis, the commission received a letter from Gov. John Kitzhaber saying that the governor approves the swap, but he directed OPRD to continue a "good faith" effort to address local community concerns.

Capital Press The reported that the land exchange is opposed by the Oregon Farm Bureau and other groups.

According to the Capital Press, Jeff Thomas, the president of the Grant County Farm Bureau, said tourism and park activities created through the trade will not replace the value of cattle, hay and timber operations on the Grouse Mountain property.

In the past, Keiser has described Bandon Links as a golf facility that would be reasonably priced for South Coast residents strongly support junior golf. People from outside the area would pay prices similar to the rates charged at Bandon Dunes.

The architect Keiser picked for the project, Gil Hanse, currently is completing the golf course in Brazil that will be used for the 2016 Olympics.

If the land swap receives ultimate approval in February, the project still needs to go through the local permitting process before the course can be built.

CCEC members to receive allocation

PORT ORFORD — The Coos-Curry Electric Cooperative, Inc. board of directors recently announced the retirement of capital credits in the amount of approximately \$1.8 million. Electric cooperatives aren't like other utilities. Members are more than just electric consumers; they own a portion of the business. That membership involves the allocation of excess revenue, called margins, in the form of capital credits, according to a CCEC press release. This year's retirement marks the sixth time the cooperative has retired capital credits since 2007 and brings the total retirement to almost \$10 million.

According to the press release, electric coops operate at cost, which means they collect enough revenue to run and expand the business, but don't add more on top to generate profits for distant shareholders. When cooperatives like CCEC have money left over, it's allocated back to the members based on their participation or use of the cooperative's services for that period of time.

At the end of each year, capital credits are allocated to each member based on their participation. Then, when the co-op's financial condition is strong enough to allow for returning a portion of prior years' capital credits, they are paid to members.

"Allocating and retiring excess revenue to members helps distinguish cooperatives," said Roger Meader, general manager/CEO of CCEC. "We're proud to support our communities by putting money back into the local economy and into the pockets of those we serve. It makes our business model special."

This year's capital credits retirement of nearly approximately \$1.8 million to CCEC members represents the balance of capital credits on the books for operating year 1983, 1984 and a portion of 1985. The board of directors elected to mail checks to members and prior members who have a valid address on file with the cooperative the first week in December.

CCEC was founded in 1939. Today, the nonprofit cooperative has approximately 14,000 members in Coos, Curry and Douglas Counties.




