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Hard living

Danger constantly stalks Bay Area's homeless

COOS BAY — Two homicides and a disappearance in the past year have raised concerns that threats to homeless and mentally ill people may be increasing. But local activists say the incidents only emphasize the everyday dangers of homelessness.

The body of 34-year-old Jesse Nathan Hayes was discovered near Coos Bay's Hemlock Avenue on Sunday morning, and David Barker was killed at North Bend's Itty Bitty Inn in July. Holly Berry, 34, went missing from her Norman

Street apartment in January.

According to Jennifer Palmer, director of Coos Bay's South Coast Gospel Mission, danger is a fact of life on the streets.

"I've even had guys run in here without shoes on their feet, because they were running from somebody," she said. Palmer said many homeless people the mission serves are victims of domestic violence.

Repeated victimization traps some people in a cycle of homelessness. Palmer's father was the previous director of the mission.

"Some of these guys my dad has known for 10 plus years, and

they're still homeless," she said.

Mental illness often complicates matters. Bittin Duggan, a homeless advocate with Neighbors in Need, said traumatic brain injury is common among the homeless. Duggan also has seen people develop mental health problems after they become homeless.

At the Nancy Devereux Center, Director Barbara Anderson and her staff address mental health directly. The center, which provides drop-in counseling and transitional housing, is run entirely by

Budget battle winners: illegal immigrants

■ Homeland planned to release nearly 5,000 immigrants by April

WASHINGTON — The Homeland Security Department released from its jails more than 2,000 illegal immigrants facing deportation in recent weeks due to looming budget cuts and planned to release 3,000 more during March, The Associated Press has learned.

The newly disclosed figures, cited in internal budget documents reviewed by the AP, are significantly higher than the "few hundred" illegal immigrants the Obama administration acknowledged this week had been released under the budget-savings process.

The government documents show that Immigration and Customs Enforcement released roughly 1,000 illegal immigrants from its jails around the U.S. each week

since at least Feb. 15. The agency's field offices have reported more than 2,000 immigrants released before intense criticism this week led to a temporary shutdown of the plan, according to the documents.

The states where immigrants were released include Arizona, California, Georgia and Texas.

The White House has said it was not consulted about the releases, and Homeland Security Secretary Janet Napolitano has acknowledged they occurred in a manner she regrets. White House spokesman Jay Carney on Wednesday said the government had released "a few hundred" of the roughly 30,000 illegal immigrants held in federal detention pending deportation proceedings. Carney

said the immigrants released were "low-risk, noncriminal detainees," and the decision was made by career ICE officials.

"We're doing our very best to minimize the impact of sequester, but there's only so much I can do."

As of last week, the agency held an average daily population of 30,733 in its jails. The internal budget documents reviewed by the AP show the Obama administration had intended to reduce those figures to 25,748 by March 31.

The White House did not comment immediately Friday on the higher number of immigrants released.

ICE spokesman Brian Hale said Friday the numbers of immigration detainees fluctuate daily, but he reiterated only several hundred illegal immigrants had been

Data is hazy on coal dust danger

PORTLAND — Industry data is too scant to gauge the health effects of coal dust blowing off of trains headed from the Great Plains to export terminals along the West Coast, according to a review by Multnomah County's health department.

County Chairman Jeff Cogen, a coal export opponent, requested the report on health effects, The Oregonian newspaper reported.

Local governments can't stop the export projects, he said, but "the burden should be on the coal companies and the train companies to prove that this is not going to damage the health of our residents."

One in nine Multnomah County residents lives within a third of a mile of potential coal-train routes, the report said.

Local teen tells America's story

She'll talk about Constitution at national VFW competition

NORTH BEND — Haley DeAndrea is not your typical 16-year-old. How many can say they have lent a helping hand to people in need in Sierra Leone?

More than anything else, that visit to the war-torn and impoverished African nation inspired her winning speech in the Voice of Democracy Speech Contest.

It's a contest she has entered five times, starting in junior high. Last year, she finished in Oregon's top five, before claiming the state title this year.

Her summer 2011 visit to Sierra Leone, a trip encouraged by her parents, gave her special perspective on this year's topic, "Is the Constitution still relevant?" She described the experience to a reporter at her home, just days before heading out to Washington, D.C., to represent Oregon at the national event.

"I was in Africa for a month, and the poverty there is just horrifying and devastating," DeAndrea said.

"It's really made me see that America is such a blessed country, and it is because of the foundations that we have in the Constitution that we've been able to be so successful," she said. "In Sierra Leone, they don't have a stable government. I'm not saying America's perfect, but it is incredible just how different both countries are.

"Taking that trip became a part of me, so it's going to come out in the things that I write and the things that I do."

Voice of Democracy, sponsored by the Veterans of Foreign Wars, calls for recording a three- to five-minute speech on the assigned topic. District winners gathered at a VFW conference in Newport in

It's time for the president to lead

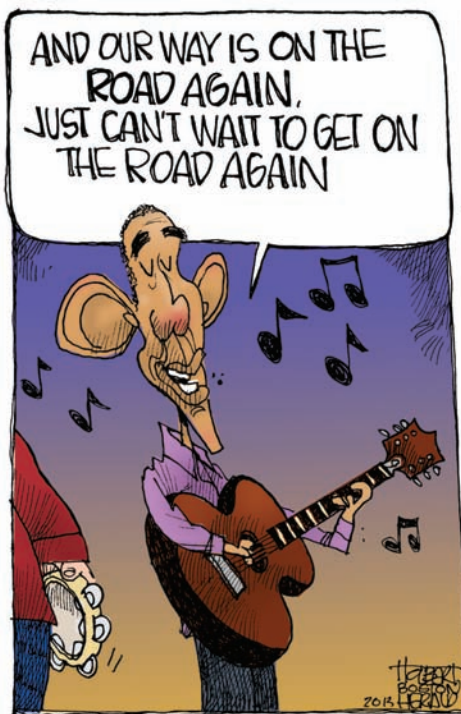
President Obama keeps traveling the country to promote the highlights of his legislative agenda — tighter controls on weapons, clearer pathways for illegal immigrants, higher taxes on the wealthy. And Republicans keep getting more frustrated.

"This is not time for a road-show president," fulminated Rep. Kevin McCarthy of California, the House Republican whip. Added Louisiana Gov. Bobby Jindal, "I think he's trying to scare the American people."

They're so upset because Obama's strategy is so effective. When USA Today asked voters whom they would blame for the "sequester," \$85 billion in automatic budget cuts that are about to start biting, 49 percent said congressional Republicans and 31 percent said the president. The larger picture is even grimmer for the GOP. The Pew Research Center reports that only one in three Americans has a favorable view of the Republican Party, one of the lowest ratings in nearly two decades.

There's nothing new about the president's strategy. During the Clinton years, political scientist Charles O. Jones coined the phrase "campaigning to govern," which described a president using campaign tactics to push legislative goals. By traveling the country, a president could generate public support for his agenda and apply heat to lawmakers back on Capitol Hill.

During the early 1980s, Ronald Reagan took a similar approach. Back then, the Washington power balance was a mirror image of what it is today: a popular Republican president facing a Democratic House. We were covering Congress, and Democratic Speaker Tip O'Neill often told us that he could not

stand up to Reagan's persuasive-ness and popularity. As Reagan proved then, and as Obama is trying to emulate today, the power to shape public opinion is probably a president's single biggest asset.

The president's "intrinsic advantages" were on display this week when he visited the ship-building center of Newport News, Va., to warn Americans that impending budget cuts are "a self-inflicted wound" that would impair military readiness

and cost jobs. Last week, he surrounded himself with steely-eyed first responders and delivered a similar message: You might not like Washington or bureaucrats or red tape, but government still does good things that keep you and your family safe. If those services are degraded, blame the Republicans.

But a president's influence with the public does not guarantee success. After the 1982 election, when Republicans lost 26 House seats, Reagan was forced to compromise more often. Today, Obama faces a House dominated by conservative Republicans who come from safe districts and are largely immune from the kind of pressure the president is trying to stimulate.

Moreover, Obama is president; it's his watch. If the fiscal standoff continues, if the budget cuts derail the economy, if the markets sputter, if unemployment

ment rises and growth slows, then it's his legacy that is jeopardized. Having the biggest megaphone in your hand also means having the biggest target on your back.

That's why the president has to get serious about advancing entitlement reforms that could entice Republicans into a larger bargain on spending and tax policy. He talked in The New Republic about his willingness "to buck the more absolutist-wing elements in our party to get stuff done," but all he's done so far is make vague references to "modest" changes in Social Security and Medicare.

He has to do more than that. He has to lead. The president has proved that he's really good at the campaigning part of "campaigning to govern." Now that he's won re-election, it's time for the governing part.

Hold Pacific Power accountable for outage

Bottom line: There is no time nor date that regional residents can be assured of consistent electricity supply.

I know, I know, locals don't care if they have continuous power, perhaps even power at all. We have been through all that in the Public Forum previously. But someday when outage damage and/or injury is extensive, or when people die, don't complain then. You had your chance and you blew it.

Unless there is public demand for regulation that mandates compensatory and punitive damage awards to ratepayers for the inconveniences they suffer, Pacific Power will continue to maintain its fragile system and repair crews instead of investing in

upgraded infrastructure to minimize our outages in the first place. If that is unaffordable, let an independent auditor promulgate confirmation. DEAR ABBY: I am a 14-year-old female from the West Coast. I am home-schooled and don't have many friends because I score high in tests, meaning I retain more information than the average person.

'One Day At a Time' star Bonnie Franklin dies

NEW YORK (AP) — Bonnie Franklin, the pert, redheaded actress whom millions came to identify with for her role as divorced mom Ann Romano on the long-running sitcom "One Day at a Time," has died.

She died Friday at her home in Los Angeles due to complications from pancreatic cancer, family members said. She was 69. Her family had announced she was diagnosed with pancreatic cancer in September.

Franklin was a veteran stage and television performer before "One Day At a Time" made her a star.

Developed by Norman Lear and co-created by Whitney Blake — herself a former sitcom star and single mother raising future actress Meredith Baxter — the series was groundbreaking for its focus on a young divorced mother seeking independence from a suffocating marriage.

It premiered on CBS in December 1975, just five years after the network had balked at having Mary Tyler Moore play a divorced woman on her own comedy series, insisting that newly single Mary Richards be portrayed as having ended her engagement instead.

Beam me up, Yoda: Obama flubs 'Star Trek' term

WASHINGTON (AP) — He's not a dictator and won't entertain the idea of a "Jedi mind-meld" with opponents. There's no "secret formula or special sauce" he can slip foes to make them see things his way. And not to worry, he says, the situation may look dire but won't be an "apocalypse."

So who was the guy in a suit and tie who showed up Friday in the White House briefing room, mixing metaphors and references to "Star Wars" and "Star Trek?"

"I am not a dictator. I'm the president," Barack Obama declared as he rejected the idea of using Secret

Service agents to keep lawmakers from leaving until everyone agreed on a budget. He answered reporters' questions shortly after an inconclusive, 52-minute meeting with the Democratic and Republican leaders of the House and Senate.

"So ultimately, if (Senate Minority leader) Mitch McConnell or (House Speaker) John Boehner say, 'We need to go to catch a plane,' I can't have Secret Service block the doorway. Right?"

Even if he did bar his office — the oval one — Obama said he wouldn't do a "Jedi mind-meld" with

Congress' top two Republicans to persuade them "to do what's right."

Yoda-quoting nerds, Beltway insiders and even Hollywood heroes were instantly abuzz. The presidential mishmash of sci-fi references went viral, turning off geeks who had con-

sidered Obama one of their own after a slip of the tongue that was almost as bad as confusing Klingons and Ewoks, or even Democrats and Republicans.

Jedi are from "Star Wars," while mind melds happened on "Star Trek."

Mister Spock of "Star Trek" weighed in.

"Only a Vulcan mind-meld would be effective on this Congress. LLAP," Leonard Nimoy emailed after The Associated Press sought his reaction. Nimoy signed off with the abbreviation for his "Live long and prosper."

Maybe it was the power of the Force or some kind of

Starfleet prime directive, but the White House couldn't ignore comments like that, flashing in and out of time and space and mixed metaphors like a Tardis traveling at warp speed in social media. It later tweeted: "We must bring balance to the force," with a link to an Obama photo inside a border designed to look like outer space.

As for the situation that led Obama to the briefing room in the first place, he could have quoted Bobby McFerrin and just said: "Don't worry. Be happy."

Instead, the president went with: "This is not going to be a apocalypse."

Florida man is swallowed by sinkhole

SEFFNER, Fla. (AP) — In a matter of seconds, the earth opened under Jeff Bush's bedroom and swallowed him up like something out of a horror movie. About the only thing left was the TV cable running down into the hole.

Bush, 37, was presumed dead Friday, the victim of a sinkhole — a hazard so common in Florida that state law requires home insurers to provide coverage against the danger.

The sinkhole, estimated at 20 feet across and 20 feet deep, caused the home's concrete floor to cave in around 11 p.m. Thursday as everyone in the Tampa-area house was turning in for the night. It gave way with a loud

crash that sounded like a car hitting the house and brought Bush's brother running.

Jeremy Bush said he jumped into the hole but couldn't see his brother and had to be rescued himself by a sheriff's deputy who reached out and pulled him to safety as the ground crumbled around him.

"The floor was still giving in and the dirt was still going down, but I didn't care. I wanted to save my brother," Jeremy Bush said through tears Friday in a neighbor's yard. "But I just couldn't do nothing."

He added: "I could swear I heard him hollering my name to help him."

Officials lowered equipment into the sinkhole and saw no signs of life, said Hillsborough County Fire Rescue spokeswoman Jessica Damico.

A dresser and the TV set had vanished down the hole, along with most of Bush's bed.

"All I could see was the cable wire running from the TV going down into the hole. I saw a corner of the bed and

a corner of the box spring and the frame of the bed," Jeremy Bush said.

At a news conference Friday night, county administrator Mike Merrill described the home as "seriously unstable." He said no one can go in the home because officials were afraid of another collapse and losing more lives. The soil around the home was very soft and the sinkhole was expected to grow.

SpaceX fixes Dragon problem

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) — A commercial craft carrying a ton of supplies for the International Space Station ran into thruster trouble shortly after liftoff Friday. Flight controllers managed to gain control, but were forced to delay its arrival at the orbiting lab.

The earliest the Dragon capsule could show up is Sunday, a full day late, said top officials for NASA and the private company SpaceX.

"We're definitely not going to rush it," said SpaceX's billionaire founder Elon Musk. "We want to make sure first and foremost that things are safe before proceeding."

The Dragon, owned and operated by SpaceX, holds considerable science experiments for the space station as well as food and spare parts.

Musk said six hours into

the flight that all four sets of thrusters finally were working. "All systems green," he reported via Twitter.

The problem may have been caused by a stuck valve or a line blockage. The thrusters are small rockets used for maneuvering the capsule.

An hour later, the Dragon was raised with the thrusters to a safe altitude. "Dragon back on track," he said in a tweet.

It was the first serious trouble to strike a Dragon in orbit. None of the four previous unmanned flights had any thruster issues, Musk told reporters by phone.

SpaceX has a \$1.6 billion contract with NASA to make a dozen deliveries to restock the space station. This is the third trip by a Dragon capsule to the station.

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Manning leaked secrets to spark debate

FORT MEADE, Md. (AP) — An Army soldier has admitted his role in the biggest leak of classified material in U.S. history. He says he did it because he wanted the world to know how the American military was fighting wars in Iraq and Afghanistan with little regard for human life.

Pfc. Bradley Manning entered guilty pleas Thursday to 10 charges of possessing and distributing classified materials.

He could face 20 years in

prison on those charges alone and prosecutors plan to pursue more serious charges.

The Oklahoma native read a 35-page statement explaining why he leaked battlefield reports, State Department diplomatic

cables and other classified records while working as an intelligence analyst in Iraq.

He says he hoped releasing the files to the secret-sharing website WikiLeaks would spark a debate about U.S. military and foreign policy.

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Video shows 2 cars during Vegas attack

LAS VEGAS (AP) — Police say a video camera on a taxi dashboard captured a black Range Rover and a Maserati weaving around each other during a shooting that left an aspiring rapper and two other people dead in a spectacular crash on the Las Vegas Strip.

An arrest report released after Thursday's arrest of suspect Ammar Harris in Los Angeles doesn't say exactly what sparked the car-to-car shooting before dawn on Feb. 21.

Maserati driver Kenneth Wayne Cherry Jr. was mortally wounded before the sports car slammed into the taxi, killing its driver and passenger.

Las Vegas police obtained video, audio and witness accounts before Harris was apprehended at an apartment in Studio City.

South Africa: Police charged with murder

JOHANNESBURG — Eight South African police officers were charged with murder Friday for the death of a taxi driver dragged by a police vehicle, a videotaped incident which became a worldwide symbol of police brutality in this country.

Earlier on Friday, friends and relatives of Mido Macia gathered around a simple table adorned with a few flowers in the poor township of Daveyton, to mourn the death the slender 27-year-old who died shortly after the dragging incident Tuesday.

South Africa's police chief Gen. Riah Phiyega said she shared "the extreme shock and outrage" over the video evidence of abuse of Macia by police officers and said his rights were "violated in the most extreme form."

Phiyega said she stands by the integrity of her police force and insisted she will do her

utmost to bring to justice those guilty of the death of Macia.

Hours later, Moses Dlamini of the police investigation unit said eight policemen from Daveyton were charged with murder.

The restraining and dragging of the man, a taxi driver who had allegedly parked in the wrong spot, was videotaped by members of a horrified crowd of onlookers who beseeched the police to stop their abuse and questioned their motives in dragging the taxi driver away with their police car, as he was struggling for his life.

He was found dead in prison a few hours later, suffering from head and upper abdomen injuries, including internal bleeding. The injuries could be from the dragging and he could also have been beaten later in police custody.

The scandal is the latest to undermine confidence in South Africa's police force, which has expanded from 120,000 to nearly 200,000 over a decade.

Taco Bell, Icelandic pies mixed into meat scandal

LONDON (AP) — Taco Bell is the latest restaurant chain to acknowledge that its food has been adulterated with horse meat, yanking a variety of ground beef products from its three British outlets and issuing an apology Friday.

Meanwhile, in Iceland, a food official said his team had found a beef product from a local producer that contained no meat at all.

Chief meat inspector Kjartan Hreinsson said a brand of beef pie found at a Reykjavik store had "no mammalian DNA."

Syrian rebel chief pleads for weapons

BEIRUT (AP) — The chief of Syrian rebel forces said Friday that his fighters are in "desperate" need of weapons and ammunition rather than the food supplies and bandages that the U.S. now plans to provide.

The Obama administration Thursday announced it was giving an additional \$60 million in assistance to the country's political opposition and said that it would, for the first time, provide non-lethal aid directly to rebels battling to oust Syrian President Bashar Assad.

The move was announced by U.S. Secretary of State John Kerry at an international con-

ference on Syria in Rome, and several European nations are expected in the coming days to take similar steps in working with the military wing of the opposition in order to ramp up pressure on Assad to step down and pave the way for a democratic transition.

A number of Syrian opposition figures and fighters on the ground, however, expressed disappointment with the limited assistance.

Gen. Salim Idris, chief of staff of the Syrian opposition's Supreme Military Council, said the modest package of aid to rebels — consisting of an undetermined amount of food

rations and medical supplies — will not help them win against Assad's forces who have superior air power.

"We don't want food and drink and we don't want bandages. When we're wounded, we want to die. The only thing we want is weapons," he told The Associated Press in a telephone interview.

"We need anti-tank and anti-aircraft missiles to stop Bashar Assad's criminal, murderous regime from annihilating the Syrian people," he said. "The whole world knows what we need and yet they watch as the Syrian people are slaughtered."

Palestinian prime minister evacuated from protest

RAMALLAH, West Bank (AP) — Palestinian Prime Minister Salam Fayyad was evacuated after inhaling tear gas Friday during a demonstration in the West Bank against Israel's security barrier, and protesters clashed with Israeli troops at other rallies held to support Palestinian prisoners on hunger strikes.

Fayyad was participating in a demonstration in the West Bank village of Bilin when Israeli soldiers fired tear gas at protesters who were marking eight years of protests against the barrier, snaking through the West

Bank, that Israel said it built to keep out Palestinian suicide bombers. Palestinians call the barrier a land grab as it juts into the West Bank and cuts them off from their land in some places.

Fayyad inhaled the tear gas while speaking in support of the villagers' weekly protests. His aides removed him from the area. He was treated at the scene.

Elsewhere across the West Bank, Palestinians continued several days of protests in support of Palestinian prisoners on hunger strikes in Israeli jails. Palestinians have warned of a backlash if any of them die.

volunteers. Anderson said it once had nine employees, but then the federal government changed how it distributes mental health funds. The volunteers have found themselves increasingly busy as the weak economy has driven more and more people into homelessness. "At Christmas we had over 200 people," staff member Linda Johnson said. Johnson said the center sees few incidents of violence. When they do occur, staff members immediately call police. "We don't handle it ourselves," she said.

According to Anderson, recent problems can be attributed to a specific crowd. "We're getting a lot of the really hard-core alcoholics and druggies," Anderson said. She's been forced to ban some people from the center. Despite the painful realities of life on the street, South Coast Gospel Mission's Palmer said homeless and displaced people are able to find a measure of comfort within the shelter's walls. "We've had many say people say, 'Once I'm here, I feel safe.'"

Three of the five terminals being considered for coal exports could send trains through Portland — one in Coos Bay and two along the Columbia River in Longview, Wash., and at a Port of St. Helens industrial park near Clatskanie. The analysis looked at the impact if all three projects succeed, bringing up to 90 million tons of coal through the county on 16 to 19 trains each day. But some of the traffic might be on the Washington side of the river, and two of the terminals haven't applied for permits. "The bottom line is a lot of the information on coal dust

dispersal is proprietary, and it's not well validated," said Gary Oxman, who recently retired as county health officer and oversaw the report. "It doesn't mean there's a terrible risk from train transport, but it needs to be illuminated more." The report says the federal government should do a regional study of export proposals, a call similar to one made by Oregon Gov. John Kitzhaber. The dust contains harmful metals, including cadmium. But little is known about how it's dispersed or the size of the particles. Smaller particles are more likely to lodge in the lungs. BNSF Railway has estimated that up to a ton blows off of a single car. But terminal and rail officials say most of the dust is lost near mines in Montana and Wyoming's Powder River Basin.

Coal shipments have been going through Washington to export ports in British Columbia for decades with no complaints made to regulators there, say advocates such the Alliance for Northwest Jobs and Exports, a trade group that includes railroads and coal companies. "Coal dust is one issue where people involved in the alliance feel very, very comfortable that it's not a concern," said spokeswoman Lauri Hennessey. "I really feel it's a red herring." The report concludes the trains a mile long would generate relatively small increases in diesel pollution and noise, but they would go through areas already heavily affected by pollution. The trains could create cumulative delays of up to two hours per day at at-grade rail crossings, the report said.

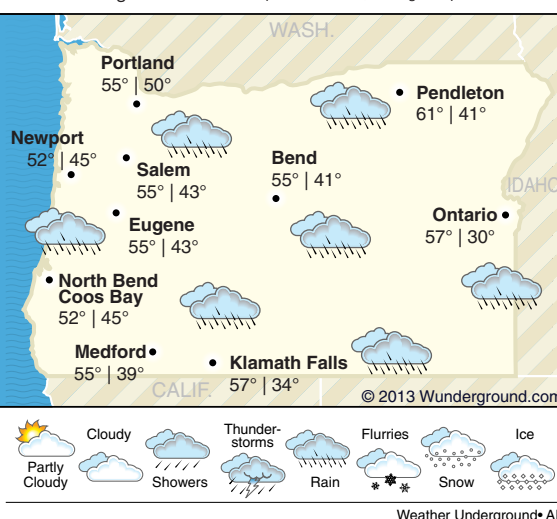
released. "Beyond that normal movement, and as fiscal uncertainty remains over the continuing resolution and possible sequestration, ICE reviewed its detained population to ensure detention levels stay within ICE's current budget and placed several hundred individuals on methods of supervision less costly than detention," Hale said in a statement. "At this point, we don't anticipate additional releases, but that could change." The immigrants who were released still eventually face deportation and are required to appear for upcoming court

hearings. But they are no longer confined in immigration jails, where advocacy experts say they cost about \$164 per day per person. Immigrants who are granted supervised release — with conditions that can include mandatory check-ins, home visits and GPS devices — cost the government from 30 cents to \$14 a day, according to the National Immigration Forum, a group that advocates on behalf of immigrants. The release of thousands from immigration jails is consistent with Napolitano's early warnings Monday — hours before anyone knew publicly that any illegal immigrants had been released — that the pending,

automatic budget cuts known as the sequester would limit the government's ability to maintain enough detention center beds for at least 34,000 immigrants. "We're doing our very best to minimize the impacts of sequester, but there's only so much I can do," Napolitano said Monday. "You know, I'm supposed to have 34,000 detention beds for immigration. How do I pay for those?" Late Thursday, after intense criticism over what the administration acknowledged was the release this week of several hundred immigrants, Napolitano told ABC News that she had been surprised to learn about the action.

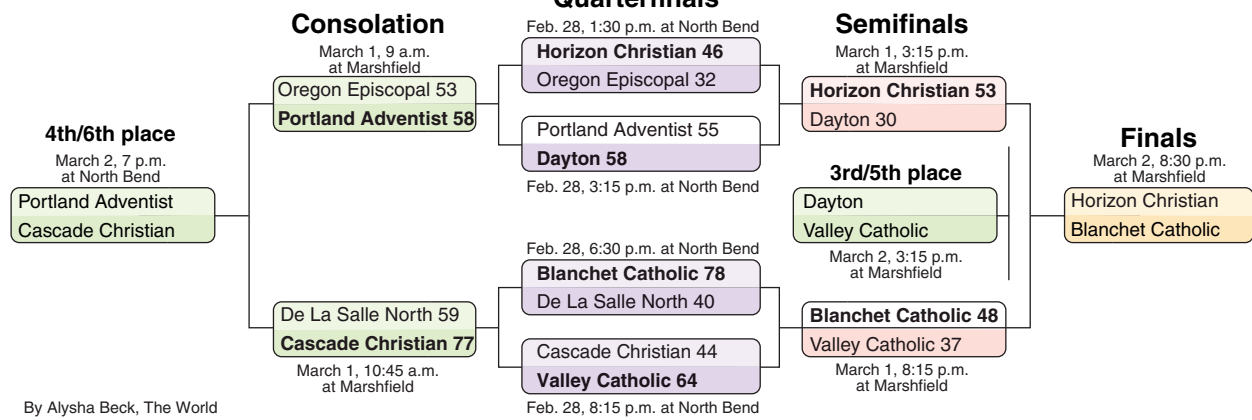

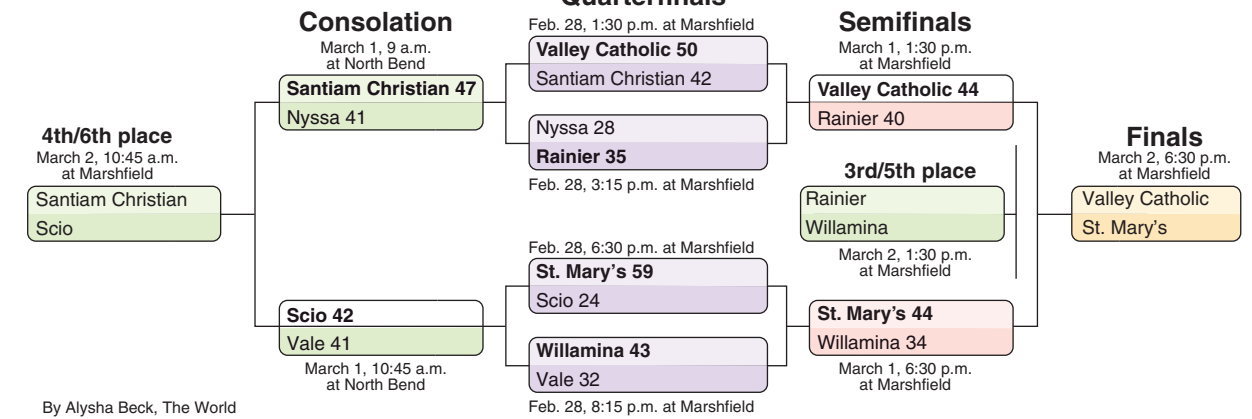

Cascade goes big for win

NORTH BEND — The North Bend boys basketball team is headed to the state tournament after withstanding a second-half surge from Newport.

The Cubs cut a 16-point half-time deficit down to six at one point, but North Bend was able to withstand a 16-4 run to win 66-53.

The win qualified the Bulldogs for the state tournament in Corvallis for the third year in a row. The team will look to improve on its quick stays at the last two tournaments, where the Bulldogs were eliminated after losing their first two games, when they take on Philomath at 3:15 p.m. Tuesday.

North Bend showed they could take a punch and keep swinging Friday night in front of their home crowd. When it looked like Newport had the 20-2 Bulldogs on the ropes, the Far West League champions came right back and executed on both ends of the floor.

"I thought we came out and played pretty well in the first half of the game," North Bend coach Tom Nicholls said. "Second half we took some quick shots early and our defensive intensity wasn't there. When you play a team that is battle tested, they are not going to go away for you."

Now that the veteran Bulldogs squad has secured their place among the top eight teams across the state in Class 4A, they will look to take the next step as a program and win a game at the tournament.

"Last year when we lost we were bummed," Roane said. "But we all talked about it and promised everyone that we would be back this year. We are going to do our thing and hopefully get further than we have ever before."

Family told to keep IndyCar, speedway

The Hulman-George family should retain ownership of the IndyCar Series and Indianapolis Motor Speedway, according to a report from a consulting group it hired to evaluate business operations, including running the Indianapolis 500.

The Boston Consulting Group offered a wide array of suggestions on how to better position the troubled open-wheel series and historic speedway in a 115-page report, a copy of which was obtained by The Associated Press.

Among the ideas: a 15-race IndyCar schedule in major American cities held over 19 weeks; a three-race playoff with a season finale on the road course at Indy; a new marketing strategy promoting IndyCar's "daredevil drivers"; using just one U.S. television partner instead of both ABC/ESPN and NBC Sports Network; overhauling the ticket pricing at IMS in tiers that would raise the cost of the most expensive Indy 500 ticket

from \$150 to \$200 and lower almost every ticket for the Brickyard 400 and Red Bull Grand Prix.

Hulman & Co. is under no obligation to follow the suggestions, but Hulman & Co. CEO Mark Miles said in a statement late Friday night the company is taking the report under advisement.

"The work BCG has done provides conversation points around several important areas of our business as we shape our thinking about the future, but our strategy has not yet been finalized," Miles said in his statement.

"As part of finalizing our strategy, we will be sharing information with our stakeholders and listening to their feedback and ideas before we come to any final conclusions. We are in the early stages of this process and will be communicating to our stakeholders and fans as we define our strategy for the future."

Miles also indicated in his statement that the version of the report the AP reviewed was one of many documents that was continuously updated during a lengthy process.

"BCG has produced many docu-

ments, including an early version of a document that is the subject of several news reports today, that include suggested elements for the plan," Miles said.

"BCG examined many important questions throughout this process, including how to define our overall brand, how our motorsports properties can attract more fans, how we can make our races more appealing to television viewers and live audiences, and how we can help our teams, partners and other stakeholders be more financially successful because of our relationship."

The consulting firm was hired at the end of last season, which many considered to be one of the best in terms of on-track competition. But boardroom politics and IndyCar's history of dysfunction overshadowed the racing and American driver Ryan Hunter-Reay's championship.

Randy Bernard was ousted as CEO in late October in what many fans viewed as a coup by power-hungry team owners and IndyCar founder Tony George, who made a

late-season play to buy back the open-wheel series.

Since then, Miles, who most recently led Indianapolis' successful Super Bowl effort, has been brought in as CEO of Hulman & Co. and is charged with hiring Bernard's replacement. Jeff Belskus, the former CEO, is filling in for Bernard in the interim.

With the March 24 season opener approaching and the series still lacking stability, auto racing observers were awaiting the report. However, it offered no quick fixes.

BCG said IndyCar was "the best pure racing motorsports league in the U.S. ... but the series suffers from lack of awareness."

Part of its problem is that a significant amount of the 14 million fans who watch the Indianapolis 500 don't watch another race during the season.

Focus groups suggested that marketing strategies should be geared to "positioning IndyCar as having the most skilled, daredevil drivers and not theatrical off-track personalities."

They indicated they valued fast

cars over science and engineering; winning over points challenges; suspense through lead changes over entertainment through crashes; and the diversity of track types rather than ovals.

The report also suggested:

- IndyCar should split the schedule into two seasons — a 15-race U.S. calendar from April to August and an international series during the offseason. The championship would be decided during the U.S. season, and the hypothetical schedule proposed by BCG included seven cities not currently visited by IndyCar. It opened at Houston, then Phoenix, the Indy 500, Miami, Atlanta, Boston, Chicago, Pocono, Toronto, Seattle, Sonoma and Fontana. The "playoffs" portion included Texas, Long Beach and the Indy road course.
- One television partner, preferably ABC/ESPN, or placing as many races as possible on ABC. The report also suggested the NBC Sports Network may be in violation of its contract with IndyCar if it promotes any other motorsports series more than IndyCar.

Martin captures pole at Phoenix

AVONDALE, Ariz. (AP) — Mark Martin will be on the pole at Phoenix International Raceway for the second straight year after becoming the second-oldest pole-sitter in NASCAR history.

Martin went around PIR's mile oval at a speed of 138.075 mph Friday to earn his 56th career pole a week after finishing third in the Daytona 500.

Martin turned 54 in January, leaving him a few months short of beating Harry Gant as the oldest driver to win a Sprint Cup pole. Gant was 54 when he won his last pole at Bristol in 1994.

Kasey Kahne will start on the front row with Martin for Sunday's 312-mile race. Daytona 500 winner Jimmie Johnson will take the green flag in third next to Kyle Busch.

Martin started on the pole at PIR last year before finishing ninth and won from the pole in 2009. He had a solid Daytona 500 last Sunday, starting 14th and working his way to the front to make a big move on the final lap to finish behind Johnson and Dale Earnhardt Jr.

Martin hasn't won since Loudon in 2009.

Kahne had a disappointing Daytona 500, collected in the race's first wreck on his way to finishing 36th after starting sixth. He's had some success at Phoenix, though, winning the fall race in 2011 and put together a good qualifying run early in the session.

Danica Patrick struggled with her car in practice and didn't get it fixed for qualifying, bobbling around turns 3 and 4. She will start 40th after becoming the first woman win the pole and lead green-flag laps in a Sprint Cup race last week at the Daytona 500.

McIlroy leaves and Woods struggles at Honda Classic

PALM BEACH GARDENS, Fla. (AP) — Rory McIlroy left before his round was even over. Tiger Woods had to rally just to stick around.

And with all that drama Friday in the Honda Classic, hardly anyone noticed that Luke Guthrie showed off his potential in a big way with a 7-under 63 to take a one-shot lead going into the weekend at PGA National.

Guthrie, pegged by many of his peers as a rookie worth watching going into the year, played bogey-free on another cool, cloudy day.

Of his seven birdies, perhaps the most impressive for the Big Ten champion from Illinois came on the sixth hole when he had mud on the side of his ball and was able to work the shot in from the right to about 10 feet.

After finishing his round, he walked into an interview room when someone mentioned that McIlroy walked off the course after being 7-over par through eight holes.

"I had no clue," Guthrie said. "I was just kind of going about my business out there."

He was at 9-under 131 and had a one-shot lead over Michael Thompson.

McIlroy, who missed the cut in Abu Dhabi and lost in the first round of the Match Play Championship in his previous two starts, made a double bogey on his second hole and rinsed two balls in the water on the 16th hole on his way to a

triple bogey.

He hit his approach to the 18th in the water and never finished the hole.

He shook hands with Ernie Els and Mark Wilson and was on his way, but not before conflicting messages.

McIlroy told three reporters who followed him to his car that it was nothing physical but that he was "not in a good place mentally."

An hour later, he released a statement through his management company that he couldn't concentrate because of a sore wisdom tooth.

Woods looked as if he might join him. After mixing birdies with bogeys, Woods went bunker-to-bunker, over the green, short of the green and wound up with a double bogey on the 13th hole that put him one shot under the cut line with five holes to play.

Instead of the second straight week when No. 1 and No. 2 were gone early, Woods answered with a shot into 5 feet for birdie, a 6-foot par putt on the 16th hole, a par save from the back bunker on the 17th that was easier than it looked, and a par save from near the grandstand by the 18th green that was harder than it looked.

He wound up with another 70 to make the cut on the number.

"I didn't quite have my game like I did yesterday," Woods said. "I hit it much better yesterday, but I putted better today, so it all evened out."

Ex-Montana QB acquitted of rape charge

MISSOULA, Mont. — Jurors deliberated for more than two hours Friday before acquitting a former University of Montana quarterback in a rape trial that has played out amid NCAA and federal investigations into how the city and school respond to rape allegations on campus.

Jordan Johnson and his attorney David Paoli both cried after the verdict was announced, and cheers erupted from the area where the defendant's family was sitting in the packed courtroom.

The accusations against Johnson, 20, have drawn much attention in Montana, where UM football is the top sports attraction. Johnson led the school to a successful 2011 season as starting quarterback before being accused of assaulting a woman while watching a movie with her at her home last year.

His case has unfolded against a backdrop of NCAA and federal investigations of the university's athletic department and the manner in which rape allegations are handled on campus, investigated by police and prosecuted by the Missoula County attorney's office.

The situation left some worried that the highly successful football team was out of control off the field.

In closing statements

Friday, Assistant Attorney General Joel Thompson told jurors that the accuser "has had to crawl through a proverbial tunnel of sewage" to see the case through to trial because she wanted accountability, the Missoulian reported. He alleged Johnson maliciously assaulted his client, resulting in psychological damage.

The female student testified that she and Johnson were kissing at her home last February when his demeanor changed and he held her down and raped her, despite her protests.

Witnesses testified that she was pale and shaking, and that she cried uncontrollably after driving Johnson back to his house.

But Johnson told jurors the sex was consensual and that the woman enjoyed it. He testified that she asked him if he had a condom and when he said he didn't, she told him that was OK. He said she never said "no," and he would have stopped if she had.

The defense argued the woman became upset and sought vengeance after Johnson got up without any cuddling and didn't talk to her other than to say, "Well, thanks," when she dropped him off at his house.

After the verdict was read, Johnson hugged his attorneys and then his large group of supporters in the courtroom.

Asked for comment, Paoli said: "Feel wonderful. Very happy."

Cal signs new coach to \$9.7M, 5-year deal

BERKELEY, Calif. (AP) — California has announced the details of new coach Sonny Dykes' contract: a \$9.7 million, five-year deal that lasts through the 2017 season.

The terms released by the university Friday contain several performance and academic bonuses. Dykes also received a \$594,000 signing bonus, which is approximately the buyout from his contract at Louisiana Tech.

The coach's average annual salary is \$1.94 million.

"Sonny Dykes is the right person to lead our football program, and I'm pleased to say that we have concluded this process, so we can focus on 'winning everywhere' in our football program," Cal athletic director Sandy Barbour said in a statement.

Cal hired Dykes on Dec. 5 to replace Jeff Tedford, the school's career wins leader with an 82-57 record. Tedford was fired in November after going 3-9 last season. Tedford and the university agreed to a \$5.55 million buyout for the final three seasons of his contract Feb. 4.

The 43-year-old Dykes had a 22-15 record with the Bulldogs, improving their win

total each year. At Berkeley, he will receive a raise each year as the Golden Bears hope each season brings more wins — and more ticket sales — at remodeled Memorial Stadium.

Dykes' annual base salary is \$250,000, plus additional talent fees, which are customary. In all, his annual salary before bonuses will be \$1.8 million this season and in 2014, \$2 million in 2015 and 2016, and \$2.1 million in 2017.

Among his performance bonuses for his first three seasons: \$25,000 for seven regular-season wins, \$30,000 for eight, \$35,000 for nine, \$40,000 for 10, and \$45,000 for 11.

Those numbers decline in the last three years of his deal to \$10,000 for seven-regular season wins, \$20,000 for eight and \$30,000 for nine. He would still earn \$40,000 for 10 regular-season wins and \$45,000 for 11.

If Cal makes the Rose Bowl, Dykes earns a \$60,000 bonus. He gets \$50,000 for taking the Bears to any other BCS bowl. Dykes also would receive a \$40,000 bonus for making the Alamo Bowl and \$30,000 for the Holiday Bowl.

Flacco agrees to deal with Ravens

Joe Flacco and the Baltimore Ravens reached a tentative agreement Friday on a new contract that would make the Super Bowl MVP the highest-paid player in NFL history.

If the deal is finalized, the veteran quarterback would receive in excess of \$120 million over six years, according to a person close to the negotiations who spoke on condition of anonymity because the contract has not yet been signed.

Flacco would earn more than the \$20 million average salary Drew Brees receives with the New Orleans Saints.

Flacco played out his rookie contract last season for \$6.76 million and led Baltimore to

the NFL championship.

Ravens general manager Ozzie Newsome said the sides have settled on the parameters of the deal, but still have some language and details to work out.

Fox Sports first reported the new deal.

Reaching agreement with Flacco before Monday's 4 p.m. franchise deadline means the Ravens are assured of retaining their starting quarterback and don't have to take a salary cap hit of approximately \$19.5 million.

On Feb. 7, Newsome said, "If we are able to get a deal done, it will allow us to participate more in the (free agent) market, if we so choose."

With Flacco's contract essentially settled, Newsome can turn his attention toward

The Denver Broncos placed their franchise tag on All-Pro left tackle Ryan Clady on Friday, ensuring the three-time Pro Bowler

a salary of \$9.828 million in 2013.

That's almost triple the \$3.5 million Clady made last season when he allowed just one sack in more than 1,100 snaps during Manning's bounce-back season in Denver.

Before the Super Bowl, Ravens owner Steve Bisciotti expressed confidence that Flacco would be the Ravens' quarterback of the future.

"We've never lost a great, great franchise player from the beginning," Bisciotti said. "I'm just very comfortable that it will get done."

“I just take what comes,” Ortiz said. “If I’m needed to score, I’ll do that. If I’m needed to dish the ball back out, that’s what I’ll do.”

Ortiz is the lone post player for Scio, often battling a wave of opposing post players.

Scio coach Justin Duke said the 6-foot senior battles, game in and game out.

The meeting will be at the Edgewater Inn at 275 E. Johnson Ave. in Coos Bay from 6 to 8 p.m. Petrone asks you to RSVP by Wednesday, but I have a feeling he'd welcome your attendance even if you don't RSVP.

world in a positive way," she said. "We have a health crisis. If I can help people learn how to live a longer, better life, that's a change."

About three years ago, when she was 29, Thomas pursued certification as a personal trainer through the National Sports and Conditioning Association. "There are three or four organizations you can get certified through," she said. "It's studying a bunch of course material, taking a test and paying several hundred dollars. For some of them, you have to send in videos of yourself demonstrating exer-

cises. This was like an anatomy and physiology thing, a big textbook you had to read through."

Getting personal training clients let her set up her hours around her preschoolers' schedule, but it was hard to make "a professional wage" training one person at a time. Last year, she started a fitness boot camp program. "I wanted to reach more people and make it affordable," she said.

She publicized the boot camps by hanging fliers and putting up a Facebook page, and word of mouth rapidly filled the camps. "It's been people telling other people, 'I love this, it's fantastic, you should do it too!'" In January, she opened The Shipyard, hiring two other trainers to assist her.

"I love my job, hands down," Thomas said. "I work quite a bit, but on the days my body's dragging, when people show up, their energy inspires me."

Entrepreneurs, meet investors

Q: I heard about an online fundraising website called Kickstarter. Would that work for funding for my small business?

A: The website www.kickstarter.com is an online "funding platform for creative projects." It was launched in April 2009, and according to the Kickstarter site, more than \$450 million in funding has been raised for more than 35,000 projects. Kickstarter allows creative projects in art, comics, dance, design, fashion, film, food, games, music, photography, publishing, technology and theater to seek project funding. There are several types of projects that cannot be funded on Kickstarter, and starting a business is one of those. Allowable projects have a clear goal with something being produced as a result. So, a small business that is launching a new product might find Kickstarter funding to be an option in financing that new product development.

Thousands of creative projects are seeking money on Kickstarter at any time. The model for funding is "all or nothing." That means the creator of a project must develop a compelling request and help find backers to reach their funding goal. The Kickstarter team reviews projects prior to launch to make sure they meet project guidelines. Each project has a funding timeline, and if full funding is not achieved during the time the project is open, no funding will be given to the

creator of the project.

It's a good idea to research projects that have achieved funding to see if your idea is a good fit. Even though creators do not repay backers, this is not "free" money. To be successful, most project developers spend a lot of time preparing to launch the project, developing a video, identifying a reasonable reward for backers and marketing their idea to friends, family or on Facebook.

Project backers do not take an ownership interest in the idea; the creator maintains 100 percent control. Backers also do not get paid back the cash they contribute to a project. Creators do, however, have an obligation to fulfill all rewards of their project or work out a solution with any backer whose reward cannot be fulfilled. Communication with backers is crucial.

Kickstarter was created as a new way for innovative ideas to find necessary backing. It has been a successful method of raising early-stage funds for many concepts. If your small business has a project that seems like a good fit for this type of funding, the next step is to thoroughly research Kickstarter project guidelines and review successful projects then build a project request and see what happens.

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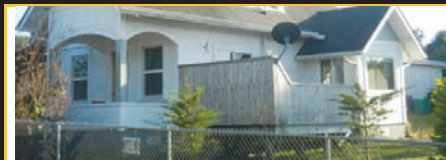

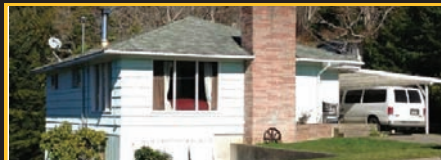

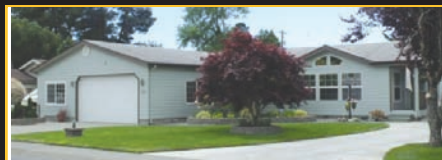

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Bring your personality into your workspace

We focus so much energy turning a house into a home, we sometimes forget to aim our decorating genius in another notable direction: the office cubicle.

Home often expresses who we are, filled as it is with accumulated treasures and trinkets. But skip on over to the office cubicle — or, for that matter, an office with actual walls — and it can be a different story.

Some offices “are so dated. It’s wallpaper from the ’70s, falling-apart furniture and stacks of files — generally, an overall mess,” says Sayeh Pezeshki, a designer who blogs about decor at The Office Stylist.

Considering how much time many people spend at work, “Your work space should be cheery and it should be fun, and it should be personal to you,” says Sabrina Soto, designer host of HGTV’s “The High/Low Project.”

A soothing environment cuts down on work stress, designers believe.

“It really does affect the way that you work and the way that you feel,” says Pezeshki.

And, she says, “You don’t have to spend a lot of money” doing it.

Bob Richter, an interior

designer and cast member of PBS’ treasure-hunting series “Market Warriors,” visits flea markets wherever he travels, returning home with one-of-a-kind mementos.

“I feel like a cubicle or a small office should feel like a small apartment,” says Richter, who lives in a small New York City apartment. “Things have to be tidy but there also has to be an opportunity to store things easily.”

Richter suggests combing flea markets for unusual boxes and baskets for storing supplies on an office desk. He uses old metal coffee tins and vintage ceramic planters for holding pens and other supplies.

“There’s a nostalgic vibe to these items,” Richter says.

Soto suggests using lacquered boxes or stylish fiberboard boxes, like those sold at The Container Store.

Good lighting, an attractive memo board, and at least one living plant or cut flowers are also essential for cultivating good cubicle ambiance.

Bring a desk lamp from home for task lighting; it’ll cheer up the space.

Bring in low-water, low-light plants — at least one. Two plants that are good at surviving indoor light are pothos and heartleaf philodendron. Peace lilies also crave low light and are excellent at cleaning indoor air.

“Keep one on your desk,”

says Richter. “It feels like there’s life there.”

For the memo board, Richter suggests framing a section of cork, dry-erase board or good-quality plywood painted with chalkboard paint. Frame it in a vintage frame — it’s a tenth the price of a new frame, he says — or float the memo board inside the cubicle wall’s frame.

Soto likes to paint her frames in bright colors, as does Pezeshki, who’s all in for the bling. Her own office — not a cubicle — is painted black, purple and metallic silver. Its silver accents include a gallery wall of ornate frames and a large floor lamp.

“It’s very glam, because I’m very glam,” says Pezeshki. “I like shiny things and blingy things.”

That’s the important thing: to decorate your cubicle according to your own personality, the three designers say.

If you like sports, use memorabilia. If you’re a movie fan, go that route.

“For me, a place I want to be is a place surrounded by the things I love,” says Richter. “I think (the office cubicle) is an area where you can let your personality do the talking.”

More tips:

■ Keep it tasteful, says Richter, and check with your human resources manager

before turning a cubicle into a fully furnished room. “There’s a fine line between personalizing your desk and going overboard,” he says.

■ Ditch the sticky notes and the hanging calendar, which add clutter, Soto says. Lean a small dry-erase board against one wall and jot down notes there. Use an electronic calendar.

■ Hang an attractive fabric along the cubicle walls,

attaching it with decorative push-pins. Hang framed artwork. “Anything to make the cubicle walls look like normal walls,” Soto says.

■ Cover bookshelves and cabinets with printed contact paper. “It instantly pulls together the look,” Pezeshki says. Pick five or six things currently sitting on your desk and replace them - pencil holder, frames, tape dispenser - with the look you want.

■ Add silver accents. And paint whatever you can, Pezeshki advises, including the metal “in/out” box for papers.

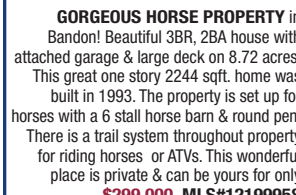

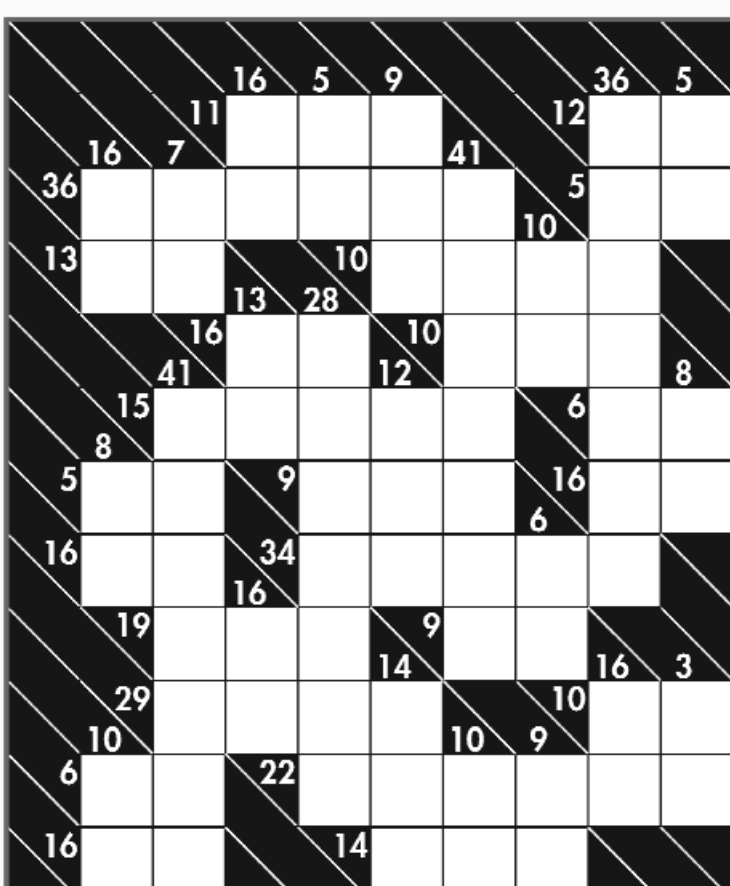
