Two Brothers Perish In Tucson House Fire

Uncle Burned Trying To Rescue Children

Two brothers, 6 and 14, died yesterday of burns suffered when a fire destroyed their mobile home at 400 W. 360 St. Aguilino Lopez, 6-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Luz Lopez, perished in his bed before firemen could reach him.

Francisco Escobedo, 14, died of burns about 14 hours later — at 3:45 p.m. — in Pima County Hospital.

An uncle, Dolores Garcia, 44, suffered facial burns and shock when he entered the burning kitchen as an attempt to rescue the youngsters.

A boy for the two children was rescued tonight at 8 o'clock in the home of another uncle, Juan Alvarez, 47 W. 360 St., across the street from the gutted mobile home they had lived with their parents and their uncle's son, Dolores and Mattie E. Garcia, listed as owners of the property.

Burial will be in Holy Hope Cemetery tomorrow immediately following funeral services arranged by St. Joseph's hospital here.

The specialist, who asked that his name not be used, revealed his contract, which he said he will take effect July 1.

The doctor observed other burned areas with patches of Dignan's skin. This grew in place permanently.

The specialist said complete recovery now seems likely, barring complications in the legs and kidneys caused by the long series of operations.

Dignan, who has a wife and two daughters, says he expects to leave the hospital in three weeks and return to work in a few months.
