### UA's Pac-12 South title shows dreary days are long gone

Arizona's 42-35 win over Arizona State was just seconds old when Arizona Stadium's video board flashed four words that will change a once-struggling program forever.

Pac-12 South champs. Public-address announcer Jimmy Zasa bellowed the good news to the frenzied, sold-out crowd: With UCLA's loss to Stanford, the Arizona Wildcats — three years removed from

a coaching change, two years removed from a near-loss in the New Mexico Bowl and one year removed from a humbling loss to ASU in Tempe — were division champions. A minute later, for good measure, he announced it again.

The UA did more than just beat its in-state rival Friday afternoon, it captured more than just the 115-year-old Territorial Cup trophy. The win clinched a spot in Friday's Pac-12 Championship game against Oregon,

the same team the UA shocked on the road nearly two months ago. It preserved a slim chance of advancing to the first-ever college football playoffs. It all but made Rich Rodriguez the Pac-12 coach of the year, linebacker Scooby Wright an All-American and running back Nick Wilson a future Heisman Trophy contender.

### AZ targets 'invincibles' in health-coverage push

Although last year's open enrollment period connected more than 120,000 Arizonans with health insurance, the state also had the country's third-lowest enrollment for young adults ages 18 to 34.

Last year, more than 2 million young adults across the country enrolled in health insurance through federal and state marketplaces, making up 28 percent of the 8 million people who enrolled.

In Arizona, only 21 percent of people who purchased coverage were between the ages of 18 and

34, ranking Arizona in the bottom three states for enrollment of young adults. Only Hawaii and West Virginia had lower percentages of young adult enrollment, at 20 and 19 percent, respectively.

This year, state and local outreach groups are making a targeted effort to get more of Arizona's "young invincibles" signed up for health insurance.

The term "young invincibles" is often used by the health-care industry to describe young adults, based on the assumption that young people think they're im-

### After more than a year of freedom, Louis Taylor struggles to adjust

His trial and conviction remain among the most controversial in Pima County's history.

Louis Taylor, just a teenager when he was convicted of starting a fire that caused 29 deaths at the Pioneer Hotel in 1970, was released in April 2013 after more than 42 years in prison.

Since then, he's shifted between apartments and hotels, and even spent some time on the streets. "Everything hasn't been easy, but I'm trying," Taylor said.

Some supporters have started a

gofundme.com page for Taylor, asking people to donate to help pay his expenses while he transitions to a life of freedom. There's also the potential for a civil case against the state seeking recompense for the years he lost to incarceration.

Taylor, 60, was convicted in 1972 in a trial fraught with difficulties — to the inclusion of fire-science evidence that wouldn't remotely meet modern standards to a prosecutor who ran roughshod over the proceedings, objecting some 2,000 times during

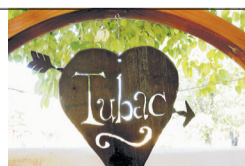
