House Unit Studies Regents' Proposals

Lawmakers Set Fast Early Pace

PHOENIX — The Arizona Legislature set another record Tuesday by holding two public hearings on the second day of the session.

First it opened three days of hearings on a package planning for the state's three universities.

Second, it heard recommendations from the state planning and building commission, which called for the opening of 1967-68 in the next fiscal year to buy properties in the state.

The House Education Committee heard proposals from the board of regents, which primarily concerned a half-hour move, and future plans at Northern Arizona University Flagstaff.

Arizona State University will tell its story Wednesday at the University of Arizona. Tuesday the hearing was open to the public.

With particular interest to the entire legislature and the public, Pima County was well represented by its legislators.

Red Guards 6 Per Cent Hike On July 1 Urged To Slow Down

Teenagers Told To Temper Attacks

By RAY TATSUMI TOKYO (AP) — In a surprise move, Communist China's premier was reported Tuesday to have urged Red Guards to temper their attacks on President Liu Shao-chi and party General Secretary Teng Hsiao-ping.

Reminding the Red Guards that both men still belonged to the Politburo, Premier Chen En-lai said he was giving the militant teenagers the advice on instructions from party Chairman Mao Tse-tung.

Despite the admonition, 100,000 Red Guards rallied in Peking Tuesday and made their "barricade attack" on Liu and Teng, accused by Mao of following a bourgeois line, said the Japan Broadcasting Corp.

As Chou en-lai said in a moderating statement in the past that has Red China in turmoil, there were these other developments:

Red posters attacking Mao appeared Tuesday on the big screen of China City of Canton, said travelers returning in Hong Kong.

They reported that several were killed and that many were injured in clashes between Red Guards and workers last week-end. The Chinese woman said young workers attacked Red Guards who were picketing a factory that was sick of Red Guards' and lack of Mao's thought.

The official New China News Agency accused "reactionary" Communist leaders in Shanghai of encouraging workers to resort to economic warfare to disrupt Red China's production.

Red Guards in Peking are being urged to temper their attacks on Liu and Teng, said a Red Guard spokesman.

Income Tax Boost Sought By Johnson

Budget Deficit Also Expected

By FRANK CORMIER WASHINGTON (AP) — President Johnson asked Congress Tuesday night to increase the federal income tax bills of 1967 individuals and business by 6 per cent.

He said this is needed to hold our budget deficit within present limits and to give our country and our fighting men the help they need in this hour of crisis.

Johnson's call for higher taxes six months before the end of the fiscal year is the highest of a State of the Union message to Congress—and it came as a surprise to many.

The President's tax proposal would mean that anyone now paying income taxes of \$1,000 a year would pay \$1,060 if Congress accepts his plan.

The proposed new surtax is expected to become effective July 1.

House Denies Seat To Powell

Representatives Reject Udall's Motion; Approve Ouster By 364-64 Vote

By JOHN BECKLER WASHINGTON (AP) — Rep. Adam Clayton Powell was denied the seat in Congress Tuesday night in a special committee passage on his qualifications and the House approved them.

The harsh punishment for Harlem's pre-occupation was moved out by his colleagues in the opening day of the 90th Congress by a vote of 364-64.

While hundreds of Negroes milled around outside the Capitol shouting, "We want Powell! We want Powell!" the House rejected a leadership motion that would end Powell's 10-year congressional career.

Principal Portions Of Speech

WASHINGTON (AP) — Following, by topic, are the principal recommendations in President Johnson's State of the Union message Tuesday night.

Recognition — Establish a new department of business and labor, combining the Commerce and Labor Departments and other Federal agencies to "create a more economical, efficient and modern instrument to serve a growing nation."

Social Security — Raise payments on an over-all average of 20 per cent, with at least 10 per cent increase for all receiving payments. Raise the amounts retired workers can earn without losing Social Security income.

Employment — Eliminate the most discriminatory barriers to job opportunities for Negroes.

Health — "Find a solution to our health care problem, a more equitable, more efficient, more economical way to meet our health care needs."

Foreign — "We will continue to support the United Nations and the Organization for Economic Co-operation and Development."

Environment — "We will continue to support the National Environmental Policy Act and the National Air Quality Act."

Education — "We will continue to support the Elementary and Secondary Education Act and the Higher Education Act."

Transportation — "We will continue to support the Interstate Commerce Act and the Federal Aviation Act."

Energy — "We will continue to support the Energy Research and Development Act and the Atomic Energy Act."

Science — "We will continue to support the National Science Foundation Act and the National Aeronautics and Space Act."
