John Deere resolves blizzard absences

HORICON — With a blizzard of epic proportions Wednesday, many companies were either running with a fraction of its employees or not at all.

John Deere Works Horicon held regular business hours for its first,

second and third shift employees. Initially, employees that couldn't make it to work due to the weather took a mark of absence on their attendance. Workers who hold perfect attendance for the year receive a \$400 bonus, according to employees that wish to remain anonymous.

According to IAM Local 873 President Brian Barth, the union, which represents wage employees at John Deere, has worked with the company to resolve the issue.

"We have worked together with the management of John Deere Horicon Works to reach a fair agreement on how to settle the no fault attendance policy issues that arose from the storm conditions on Wednesday, Feb. 2," Brath said

in a statement.

According to employees, a notice was posted by John Deere Works Horicon on Friday. It stated that employees would have the absence mark removed from their records, making them still eligible for the bonus.

we do not make public comment on any of the terms of our labor contract including the attendance policy at our factories," said Ken Golden, director of Global Public Reputation Strategy. "John Deere has blood facilities for

not historically closed facilities for inclement weather and did not close our offices or factories in the Midwest due to the storm on Wednesday. We always encourage employees to assess their specific situation and determine whether it is safe for them to travel to work. Many of our employees did come to work on Wednesday, including many at our Horicon facility."

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Vehicle crashes into river - again

Yet another vehicle has crashed into the Beaver Dam River at the Beaver Street Bridge, by yet another intoxicated driver.

It is the second such crash in a year, and the third in roughly a decade at the same location.

According to Beaver Dam Police Sergeant Scott Bahr, police were notified that a vehicle had entered the river at the corner of Madison Street and Ryan Cantafio Way. Police and fire department personnel responded.

The person who reported the incident and two police officers helped the driver out of the river. He was transported to Beaver Dam Community hospital by ambulance. A female passenger, age 29, had already made it out of the car and the river. She was also transported to the hospital by ambulance.

The male driver, age 34, was later arrested and cited for operating while intoxicated (causing

injury), operating without a license, inattentive driving and failure to have vehicle insurance. He was driving a Toyota Corolla north on Madison Street when he failed to make the slight curve on the road and crashed through a decorative fence along the river. The car floated down the river to about halfway between Madison Street and South Center Street.

The Beaver Dam Fire Department assisted as well, including the department's dive/rescue team.

Beaver Dam Department of Public Works personnel assisted and temporarily barricaded the damaged fence area on Madison Street. At this time approximately 16 feet of metal railing and fencing is displaced and/or broken.

The scene was cleared up by 4 a.m.

According to BDPD Sergeant Scott Barr, the individuals involved were "Lucky; very lucky" to have survived.



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
