County denies claim filed by man who shot at deputy

Inmate wants \$5 million for medical damages

YORK — The York County Commissioners have denied a multi-million dollar tort claim filed by a York man who was injured after shooting at a York County sheriff's deputy.

Max McCall, 27, is currently serving a 2-4-year prison sentence for attempted assault of an officer and felony flight to avoid arrest and a consecutive sentence of five years for using a firearm to commit a felony.

McCall was pursued by a sheriff's deputy who had been dispatched to rural

York County home after it was reported McCall was threatening to kill someone. Eventually, the high speed pursuit ended when McCall lost control of his vehicle. At that point, McCall exited his vehicle and pulled out a rifle. According to court documents, he was ordered to drop his weapon, "but instead he aimed it at the deputy and fired at him. The deputy returned fire and hit the defendant. McCall then crawled partially under his vehicle and attempted to turn the gun on himself. The deputy wres-

Preserving a family home in Exeter

EXETER — Tucked away a block off Exeter's main street sits a beautiful Victorian home that has been lovingly preserved by three generations of the same family.

John and Jeretta Tauriella live at 208 South Burlington Avenue in Exeter, but they don't just reside there, they are the third generation to preserve this masterpiece.

The house, a beautiful example of Victorian architecture, was built in 1907 by Dr. A. B. Stratton, one of the pioneer doctors in the village of Exeter. He practiced medicine in Exeter from 1890 until

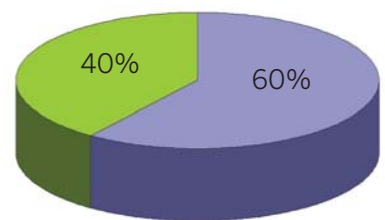
