

# Mon't you take me to Pumpkintown?



Historic downtown Athens and Friendly City Festivals are busy preparing for one of the area's biggest fall festivals -Pumpkintown: A festival of history, harvest and heritage on Saturday, Oct. 11.

Scheduled from 10 a.m. until 5 p.m., this is the 23rd annual event celebrating the cultural history of East Tennessee by highlighting Native American culture. local history and displaying elements of times past that are unique and interesting for all ages.

Pumpkintown is among the area's premiere fall festivals and is one of the largest annually-attended events with over 26,000 in attendance last year. The day-long celebration brings to life the rich cultural history and heritage of the county and is named for a former McMinn County settlement.

If a person were to try to locate Pumpkintown today, they'd find themselves somewhere on Mayfield Dairy Farms about two miles north of downtown Athens and still within city limits.

It's not certain when Pumpkintown began or who founded it. It is known that

around 1820, a postmaster was named. Hugh Kelso, one of the first postmasters of McMinn County, distributed mail arriving by stagecoach.

The county itself was a newborn formed in 1819 and named after Joseph McMinn, who governed Tennessee at the time.

Pumpkintown was once described as a "home for transients and ne'erdo-wells" and it is surmised the name came from the native crop grown on the premises.

Legend would have people believe that Pumpkintown was considered to be the actual site for what would become the City of Athens, but that didn't quite happen. After much discussion and dissent, the permanent location of the county seat was located midpoint in the county on donated land and the little pioneer settlement was eventually absorbed into Athens.

Friendly City Festival committee members expect the event will continue to provide a variety of events for all ages to enjoy.

Old favorites will be returning, including the Scott Crisp Memorial PowWow; the infamous McMinn Regional Humane

Society's Mutt Strutt and Pet Costume Contest; the 41st Annual McMinn County Living Heritage Museum Quilt Show; Mayfield Farm Park; Pumpkin Plinko; 300 arts, crafts, info and food booths and local shopping. There will be plenty of children's activities throughout the venue as well as a petting zoo, pony rides, inflatables, larger than life dinosaurs and lots of interactive vendors for all ages.

Pumpkintown officials will also welcome back the USS Ware Reunion to the Friendly City. Activities will include the Commemorative Brick Dedication Ceremony at Veterans Park along with a special exhibit at the Living Heritage Museum.

The festival will also feature live entertainment on three stages throughout the day.

Momentum is building as the Charles Hall Museum of History & Heritage prepares for its highly anticipated annual Cherohala Skyway Festival, set for Saturday, Oct. 25, from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. at the museum and its grounds in Tellico Plains. With free admission and a full day of activities, this event draws both locals and tourists for a celebration of history, music, and family fun.

Convenient parking will be available in the field behind the museum, with festival entry at 122 Bank Street near Tellicafe. Shuttles will also run throughout the day. Handicap parking is available between the Cherohala Skyway Visitor's Center and the Tellico Plains Public Library. Parking is free.

Admission to the festival is \$5 for ages 16 and older. Children ages 15 and under will be admitted for free. All profits support the Charles Hall Museum of History & Heritage.

"The Cherohala Skyway Festival is one of our most exciting events," said Pam Hall Mathews, president of the Charles Hall Museum Board and event coordinator. "It's like a community reunion where both locals and visitors come together to enjoy the festival and explore the museum's incredible collections."

The festival features the Josh Graves Music Tribute. The tribute will honor the late bluegrass legend with performances by Tim Graves, his band The Farm Hands, and the Graves brothers-Tim, Tedd, and Mike.

Additional performances will include Appalachian Smoke, the Mountain Music String Band, local Junior Appalachian Musicians (JAM), and Tim Decker and Tennessee River. Sixteen-year-old mandolin prodigy Wyatt Ellis will take the stage at 4 p.m. Backed by a powerhouse band of Appalachia's finest young musicians, Ellis is becoming one of the youngest regular performers in Grand Ole Opry history.

Albums from artists will be available for purchase. Attendees can also join Deb McCarter on the clogging stage or square dance to Jim Brooks Music.



Families can enjoy a variety of free activities in the Family Fun Zone, including inflatables, horse-drawn wagon rides, hayrides, a petting zoo, and more. The Tellico Plains Police Department's Little Train and craft stations by the Monroe Area Council for the Arts and Tender Heart Ministries will keep kids entertained, while the Sawdust Dig by Volunteer Federal Savings Bank gives children the chance to uncover treasures and cash prizes.

There's something for everyone with a face painting booth, Tellico Plains KOA's Game Zone, and the Tellico Plains High School student bake sale.

Artisans and crafters will showcase their work with over 90 vendors offering handmade goods, photography, jewelry, ceramics, and more. Festival-goers can also purchase delicious eats from food trucks and local vendors.

A highlight of the festival is the living history demonstrations, which offer a glimpse into early settler and Cherokee life in the 1800s. Guests can try Cherokee games, watch doll, pottery and quilting demonstrations, and taste 1800 dishes cooked over open fires. A special long hunter camp will display the tools and equipment used by early frontiersmen. There will be a reenactment of the DeSoto Expedition, offering a look at life in the 1500s.

Other demonstrations will include

blacksmithing, iron ore smelting, and corn grinding. Visitors can try their hand at cross-cut sawing at the Benton MacKaye Trail Association's booth or watch early settlers weaving, quilting, and grinding herbs. Smokey Bear will make an appearance with representatives from the Cherokee National Forest.

Antique tractor, lawn mower, and small engine enthusiasts are invited to display their machines in the Charles Hall Field with no entry fee required. For details, call James Blankenship at 423-519-6009.

As a fundraiser for the museum, a raffle will be held, offering a 50/50 split the pot cash prize with all proceeds going toward repairs for the museum. Tickets can be purchased at the museum, any Volunteer Federal Savings Bank location, or online at www.skywayfestival.com.

The Charles Hall Museum, a nonprofit institution offering free admission, will be open for self-guided tours during the festival. Visitors can explore the extensive collection of historical artifacts, photos, and documents that showcase the rich history of the area.



# Once Upon a Small Town

Throughout 2024, Sweetwater has been celebrating its 150th anniversary by hosting a series of events.

The celebration started in January with a candlelight ceremony, followed by a Decades Concert in February and Founder's Day in April. More festivities were held in July, including a Derby Box Car Race and the Fairest of the Fair pageant. In September, the city went back to its roots for a one-time return of the Sweetwater Fair.

In November, to honor the town's 150th anniversary, Sweetwater Main Street's annual musical is entitled, "Once Upon a Small Town."

"It is basically about Sweetwater," said Sweetwater Main Street Director Josh Isaac. "There will be true stories in it, and it is a comedy that I wrote so that it would reflect Sweetwater and all its charm, kind of like a Hallmark movie."

The musical will be a ticketed event with performances planned for Nov. 14 and 15 starting at 6 p.m. with another showing planned for Nov. 21, starting at 6 p.m. and one last show being on Nov. 22 at 1 p.m.

Tickets are \$15 and can be purchased at Sweetwater City Hall or by visiting sweetwatertn.gov

"Tickets will be available until they sell out," Isaac expressed. "If we sell out completely then we may add another date. Last year, we sold over 2.000 tickets."

This year's musical marks the third year of live entertainment hosted by the city.

"I'm excited for it," he said. "This is our third year doing the show and it seems that we have acquired a good following from Tellico Plains all the way to Knoxville. We are very excited about being able to do the arts and we have a lot of amazing singers and actors that are sure to get the audience on their feet."

According to Isaac, the musical is the biggest fundraiser held by Sweetwater Main Street and the proceeds gathered by the event are returned to the community.

"We are able to take this money and



do extra things at Christmas time when we rent the big globe where people can go in and play or do photo booths on Halloween," he said. "We do a live nativity where we have all of the animals around Christmas, so all of that money pours back into our downtown."

Isaac encouraged everyone to watch and support the musical.

"There is something for everyone and there is a character that they can relate to," he expressed. "There are just as many men as there are women that come to this show, and they really enjoy them because it is not your typical musical. The singers actually sing from side stage, so it feels like a concert or like you are watching a movie, so it is a cool concept for everyone to get involved."





Bald River Falls, a popular tourist attraction nestled in Monroe County, recently celebrated its grand reopening after being forced to close for a bridge replacement project.

The closure of the Bald River Falls Bridge was originally planned back in August of 2023 due to the natural deterioration of the bridge over the years.

According to Cherokee Forest Service officials, the bridge was constructed in 1933 and failed to meet the demands of pedestrian safety and modern vehicular traffic. Replacement of the bridge was expected to be completed by fall of 2024; however, damage to the surrounding area by severe weather halted the progress of the bridge.

Tellico Plains received significant water damage during a flash flood that caused many issues and damage to not only the bridge but to businesses and residences in the Tellico Plains area.

"Two main tourism assets that were affected were the Cherohala Skyway and Bald River Falls," said Monroe County Tourism Director Blaina Best at the time of the severe weather.

Following the flooding incident, several other weather events caused more

delays in the bridge project. Much of the project also included work on the roadways that connected to the bridge that had been damaged in the floods.

"Bald River Falls is one of the most iconic and cherished landmarks in our region," Best stated as work continued. "It's often the first stop for travelers coming up the Cherohala Skyway and a favorite photo op for thousands each year. Its accessibility makes it appealing to everyone from families to photographers to international visitors."

In May of this year, a ribbon cutting ceremony took place for the grand reopening of the Bald River Falls Bridge, featuring various guest speakers who further discussed the project.

According to Cherokee National Forest Tellico District Ranger Andrew Carrier, their engineering team worked with their recreation team to assess the needs of the site to create an "excellent project."

"The largest flood event that Tellico has ever seen on record occurred shortly after we started, so we had to adjust our plans and go after additional funding," Carrier stated during the grand reopening. "I say all of that to say that stuff doesn't happen by accident. I hope everybody realizes that it

takes a high quality, purpose-driven and dedicated team who is working on projects like this to accomplish something at this scale and I think that is exactly what you have here."

A few months following the reopening of the bridge, Monroe County witnessed an increase in tourism.


"The response has been incredible. The reopening of the bridge restored full access to one of Monroe County's most iconic destinations. Visitors returned almost immediately, and we've seen steady traffic through the area ever since," Best said recently. "It has been wonderful to see photographers, hikers, motorcyclists and families back enjoying the falls. We appreciate everyone being patient as so many people have been enjoying Bald River Falls since access reopened, and it has been overwhelming at times due to the traffic in that area."

The falls provide a space of natural beauty for residents and visitors alike to enjoy.

"Bald River Falls is a symbol of Monroe County's natural heritage. It's an anchor for both tourism and community pride. The beauty of the falls, combined with the surrounding protected wilderness areas, gives us something truly unique that sets our region apart. It's not just important, it is essential to our tourism identity," Best expressed.



# Scenic drives in the sky

The small town of Tellico Plains is a road enthusiast's paradise, thanks to the stunning Cherohala Skyway. This National Scenic Byway stretches over 40 miles, connecting Tellico Plains, Tennessee, to Robbinsville, North Carolina, and offering a breathtaking drive through the Cherokee and Nantahala National Forests. With elevations ranging from 900 to over 5,400 feet, the Cherohala Skyway is a must-visit destination for motorcyclists and car enthusiasts alike.

The Cherohala Skyway has garnered national recognition, attracting visitors from across the country who come to experience its scenic beauty-especially during the fall, when the mountains are ablaze with vibrant autumn colors.

The Skyway has deep roots in the town's history, with local legend Charles Hall playing a crucial role in its creation. Serving as Tellico Plains' mayor for 31 years and in various public offices for 45 years, Hall championed the development of a road connecting Tellico Plains to Robbinsville. His efforts, which included leading the iconic Wagon Train-a movement that drew thousands of supporters-eventually helped secure funding for the Skyway.

In 1996, the Wagon Train made its final journey across the newly completed Cherohala Skyway before it opened to the public, marking the occasion with a 150foot ribbon cutting ceremony that stretched across the Tennessee-North Carolina state line. In honor of Hall's dedication, the Tennessee State Legislature named the bridge over Laurel Branch on the Skyway the "Charles Hall Bridge" in 1997.

According to data from the Monroe County Department of Tourism, the Cherohala Skyway attracts around 3 million visitors annually. "Fall is our peak travel season," says Tourism Director Blaina Best, "but year-round, people from all over come to experience the beauty of the Skyway and explore the wonderful attractions in our four Monroe County cities."

Step back in time and escape the holiday rush with "An 18th Century Christmas" at Fort Loudoun State Historic Area in Vonore. This year's event, set for Saturday, Dec. 6, offers a unique and festive way to experience the season.

From 10 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., the fort will be brought to life by re-enactors portraying men, women, and children from the 18th century. The fort, decorated with rustic touches like leaves and berries, captures the atmosphere of Christmas during the French and Indian War. Throughout the day, visitors can enjoy demonstrations of historical cooking, laundering, blacksmithing, and artillery drills. Parson John will lead a traditional Christmas church service, and guests can indulge in a warm wassail tasting.

Don't miss the opportunity to explore the fort's buildings, including the infirmary, soldier barracks, and commander's quarters, or take a stroll through the nearby Cherokee encampment.


As night falls, the event concludes with a candlelight tour of the fort from 6 p.m. to 7 p.m. Visitors can walk the path, illuminated by luminaries, from the visitor's center to the fort. Once inside, the fort's buildings will be lit by candles, fireplaces, and torches. The evening will also feature a rare night firing of the cannon-a breathtaking sight against the night sky.

# About Fort Loudoun

Fort Loudoun State Historic Park spans 1.200 acres and is one of the earliest British fortifications on the western frontier, built in 1756. It was reconstructed during the Great Depression and was designated a National Historic Landmark in 1965.

During the French and Indian War, Fort Loudoun played a crucial role in forging alliances between the British Colony of South Carolina and the Overhill Cherokee Nation, helping to secure trade and military support. However, after relations deteriorated, the Cherokee captured the fort in 1760, and it was never used for military purposes again.

The site was largely forgotten until





1917, when the Colonial Dames of America placed a commemorative marker at the fort. In 1933, the Tennessee General Assembly purchased the land and created the Fort Loudoun Association to manage it. In 1977, Fort Loudoun became a Tennessee State Park.

Today, visitors can explore the reconstructed fort and the ruins of the 1794 Tellico Blockhouse, overlooking the scenic Tellico Reservoir and Appalachian Mountains. The park's interpretative center offers insights into the area's history and showcases artifacts excavated from the site. Guests can also watch a 15-minute

film, Fort Loudoun: Forsaken by God and Man, to learn more about the fort's storied past.

In addition to its living history programs, Fort Loudoun State Park hosts several popular events throughout the year, including garrison weekends like the Colonial Trades Garrison in March, which highlights the fort's history through interactive demonstrations.


