A different approach

Contrary to Belichick and Pats, Sox manager embracing the past

There are different ways to win a championship — emphasizing offense versus defense, maybe, or setting rigid team rules compared to hav-

ing that "loose" clubhouse where everybody has a good time.

But repeat winners, at least in modern sports, have a few common characteristics. There's a military-style leader and coach, a top-down team structure that promotes discipline, and maybe a superstar or two who are in the mix, willing to do anything to win.

New Englanders are used to seeing that model at work in Foxborough. Think Bill Belichick, the New England Patriots, six Super Bowl championships.

Then there's Alex Cora.

Unlike Belichick, who is entering his 44th year as a coach, Cora, who turned 43 in October, has spent two seasons as a coach and manager. Both of those ended in World Series championships — with the Houston Astros in 2017, and of course the Red Sox last year.

The question is, can the coaching neophyte do it again, and with a style that's about as different from Belichick's as the game of football is from baseball?

Cora is nothing if not easy going. He doesn't yell much. Players get some say in when and where they play. He's got a positive relationship with most of the Boston media.

And he literally sees the world, time and space differently.

New chapter

Belichick's most trusted strategy as coach is to compartmentalize. Once the upcoming ring ceremony to commemorate February's Super Bowl win over the L.A. Rams is finished, last year's Patriots season will be locked away in



Belichick's past.

Should someone ask about those 2018 Patriots, and maybe how they held one of the best offenses in the NFL to just three points in the Super Bowl, he'll mutter something about "different team ... we're on to 2019."

End of discussion.

Cora, on the other hand, hasn't stopped managing the team that beat the L.A. Dodgers in five games last October. What happens for the Red Sox now is an extension of what happened then.


"Loved it, we're going to build on it," Cora says of last year. "2019 is a different chapter to the same See **CORA**, Page S6

He doesn't shy from questions about last season.

"You turn the page," he says, "but do we really want to turn the page? It's a book, and we wrote a chapter last year, and let's write a new chapter this year. But we can always go back and see what happened and learn from that.

"Sometimes turning the page is so negative," he adds. "I'm like, 'No, in this case, it was very positive last year, and we can learn a lot from what we did.'

"Is it going to be the same way? Hopefully. I don't mind that. We know it's going to be a little different, but we can learn a lot from what we did last year and put it into play this year."

Same Sox

Personality and style have a lot to do with the differences between Cora and Belichick. The different methods also make sense because of the way their teams are put together.

Between the NFL draft and free agency, the Patriots have turnover in the double-digits every year, on a far larger roster.

The Red Sox, on the other hand, will bring back virtually the same team that won last October's World Series.

Craig Kimbrel and Joe Kelly are gone, but there's a good chance they'll still have 23 of 25 guys. All of them know what it takes to win, all having heeded Cora's message last year.

The young core has been together for a few years now.

It may not match the Patriots' run of nine straight AFC Championship appearances, but Cora believes there' something to be said for the continuity of three straight AL East titles.

"I do think the organization does an outstanding job as far as like keeping us in check and humble and what we want to do," he said. "I wasn't part of the first two division titles but there's something good happening here.

"This team has put themselves and this organization in a spot to win the World Series the last three years. That's what it's all about — give yourselves a chance throughout the season to make the playoffs," he said. "You make

it, and you win 11 or 12, and you win the World Series.

"But if we can put ourselves in successful situations and give ourselves a chance to compete in October, that's what it's all about."

Sounds straightforward enough, but the task is a tall one.

The last time a baseball team won back-to-back titles — the Yankees won three from 1998 through 2000 — Belichick was scuffling through a 5-11 first season in Foxborough, and Tom Brady was a scrawny rookie riding the bench.

If Cora wants to repeat, he'll do it on his terms, his way.

It's gotten him this far — and there's more than one way to build a winner.





ONCE AGAIN, it's time for this storyteller to turn fortune teller.

Though Red Sox fans will be sad to leave 2018 in the rearview mirror, the new season is upon us. Somehow, Opening Day is already here.

So what might 2019 bring? Here are seven predictions for the Sox this

THE EARLY HANGOVER **IS REAL**

Don't be surprised if the Red Sox start slow.

For whatever reason, championship hangovers seem to be universal across the sporting landscape. (Did you see how the Philadelphia Eagles began their title defense?)

On top of that, the Sox open the season on an 11-game West Coast trip – that's really more like 13 because they finish spring training with two games against the Cubs in Arizona — and Alex Cora has made it clear that after an all-in postseason, he's not pushing the envelope early.

The championship hangover isn't just mental.

The Los Angeles Dodgers are the only other team in baseball that had an October as taxing as Boston's, so themselves.

LUCKY

Predictions for the Sox season

Cora has taken it slow with his horses. Very slow.

He gave his top four starters a light spring and hopes to have Chris Sale, David Price, Rick Porcello and Nate Eovaldi ready for six innings or 90 pitches on the first trip of the season. That means a lot of stress will be put on a shaky bullpen, and the two best arms back there, Matt Barnes and Ryan Brasier, also won't be asked to overexert

Add it all up, and it's a recipe for .500 out the chute.

SOX STILL WIN 100 GAMES AND THE AL EAST

As the season wears on, they'll catch themselves.

Their roster is loaded with talent, the American League has only gotten worse (see: Mariners, Seattle), and the Sox have proven they know how to elevate their game when the time comes.

They'll make the playoffs with ease, and win the division in September.

Boston's strength lies in its rotation, which is light years ahead of New York's. To complicate that, the one ace in the Yankees' deck, Luis Severino, has some

wonky rotator cuff issues. New York has a supe-

rior 'pen, but Boston can bolster its, and ultimately relievers won't matter given the disparity in starters.

DEVERS GOES DEEP 30 TIMES

Perhaps the boldest prediction on the list, and Rafael Devers has the swing to do it.

As a 21-year-old adjusting to life in the majors, Devers hit 21 in 121 games last season. With an offseason devoted to getting in better shape and another year learning from J.D.

Devers hit everything this spring, too, batting .390 in his first 15 Grapefruit League games.

BOGAERTS BECOMES AN ALL-STAR AGAIN

A compelling All-Star case could have been made last season, but with a major payday looming at next season's end, Xander Bogaerts will be even better in

Couple his contract year with a thinning herd of elite American League shortstops and Bogaerts should be a shoo-in for the Midsummer Classic.

Didi Gregorious will begin the year on the disabled list, Carlos Correa has regressed, Jean Segura was dealt to the National League, and Manny Machado signed out there, too.

If you're planning a road trip to the festivities at Progressive Field this July, expect to see Bogaerts at short.

BARNES GROWS INTO THE BEST RELIEVER ROLE

It'd be a surprise if Dave Dombrowski doesn't add another arm via trade, but by season's end,

look for Matt Barnes to be Boston's best reliever regardless. The former first-round pick has shown steady improvement every year,

and that ascent will continue.

Most prospects don't improve at a linear 45-degree angle. Barnes has. He was as good as (if not better than) Craig Kimbrel last

Now a favorite for the closer's role, Barnes finds another level with ninth-inning adrenaline.

IT'S ALL GOOD WITH NATE

For all of the concern about Eovaldi's arm — surely you've heard he's never thrown 200 innings! — the flamethrower will stay off the disabled list in 2019.

He still won't throw 200 innings. Nobody on the Sox staff will. A New Age manager cognizant of third-time-through-the-order numbers (as well as wear and tear), Cora will continue taking guys out relatively early.

But the Texan who opened the season pumping 100 mph in Grapefruit League play will still be lighting up the radar gun come September.

MOOKIE DOESN'T SIGN AN EXTENSION



Bullpen blues

Not replacing Kimbrel or Kelly a huge gamble

An All-Star closer, the best reliever in the postseason, and 128 regular season innings. That's what the Red Sox lost in Craig Kimbrel and Joe Kelly, and have been very laissez faire about replacing.

Throughout the offseason, Dave Dombrowski asserted that he was comfortable filling the holes with internal options. The plan was to promote late-inning relievers from within.

So as David Robertson, Andrew Miller and Kelvin Herrera signed relatively modest multi-year deals, Boston watched idly.

While the Yankees landed Zack Britton and Adam Ottavino, the Red Sox went diving into the bargain bin. They dealt for Colten Brewer, an intriguing project that was going to be an odd-man out on San Diego's 40-man roster, and signed Jenrry Mejia, a thrice-busted PED user who hasn't pitched in the big leagues since 2015.

"As far as signings are concerned I would say we're through at this point," Dombrowski said at the end of February.

They're crossing their fingers and hoping for the



strategy for a World Series contender built to win now.

Matt Barnes will likely be asked to close, something he's never done before. Ryan Brasier will be asked to replicate his where'd-thisguy-come-from success of a year ago. Tyler Thornburg will be asked to be an elite late-inning arm, something he was in 2016 but hasn't been since.

Beyond that?

They've got Brandon Workman, whose velocity has been down this spring, Heath Hembree, who had an incredibly uneven 2018, and Brian Johnson and Hector Velazquez, admirable long relievers but neither blessed with high-octane stuff.

Prospects Travis Lakins, Durbin Feltman and Darwinzon Hernandez have potential, but as prospects, that's all it is at this point. None has tossed a big league inning, and all three are expected to start the season in the minors.

Now, consider last October for a moment.

With Barnes, Brasier and Kelly on the absolute top of their game, and Kimbrel navigating shaky-but-successful ninth innings, the bullpen still needed help from the rotation throughout the World Series run. And that was with everything going right.

It wasn't just out of ingenuity, it was out of necessity. are built differently. Bos nuity, it was out of necessity.

"We talked about our bullpen and maybe there was a gap there. One inning," bench coach Ron Roenicke told me after Game 5 in Los Angeles. "Who do we fill it with?"

Fortunately, the starters were able to do their best Spartacus impression to fill the void, but that's of little help for this coming 162-game season.

With Kelly and Kimbrel on the roster, the eighth inning was still a major hole. Rather than adding arms that would be up for the task, the Sox have merely subtracted two more.

New York will likely feature the best bullpen in

baseball, with Aroldis Chapman, Dellin Betances, Chad Green, Jonathan Holder, Britton and Ottavino. Those are four guys with the stuff to close and two more pretty legit arms -- a far cry from hoping for the best at Fenway.

It's obvious the two rivals are built differently. Boston's strength lies in its rotation and starting lineup, but that doesn't mean the bullpen should be an afterthought.

What's the philosophy here? Hope you're leading 5-2 in the seventh and cross your fingers that the bullpen holds?

For a team with dreams of repeating as World Series champions, that's an awfully big gamble. A little more spending this offseason could have had the bullpen feeling far less leaky.



They say leopards can't change their spots, nor can tigers change their stripes.

But can a muddy chicken keep its feathers clean?

We're talking about Dustin Pedroia — who was given that hilariously apt nickname by Josh Beckett back in the day — and that question will have a major impact on the 2019 Red Sox

Can Pedroia tone it down on a surgically-repaired knee to keep his career alive?

Going a million miles a minute is hardwired into his DNA. The mentality endeared him to Sox fans. won him an MVP award. and cost him a knee. Literally. He's got a cadaver in there now.

But now the 35-year-old veteran knows he's going to need to play differently if he wants to play at all.

"If we're up by 10 runs and a guy hits a ball that I don't know if I can make the play, I'm sure our pitcher will understand if I don't dive for it and it goes through," Pedroia said. "I've never done that before. I don't look at the scoreboard until like the eighth inning, but you know, I just have to get

and bang my knee in a certain way and can't walk," Pedroia paused, "probably don't want to do that."

It was somewhat jarring to hear Pedroia say it, but that acknowledgement was a good sign for the Red Sox.

Pacticing what he's preaching will be the difficult part.

It's been 20 months since Pedroia opted to pioneer a cartilage restoration surgery, in hopes of reviving a torn-up knee. He and Steven Wright were the first two baseball players to great deal. They are also undrgo the procedure.

The uncharted waters Pedroia entered were littered with icebergs, and in hindsight, he'd have stayed off the operating table.

"I wouldn't have done it," Pedroia said. "I don't regret doing it, but looking back and knowing what I know now, I wouldn't have done it. You know what I mean?'

But this is the reality of Pedroia's situation now. After being sidelined for all but three games last season, he knows how many view his return.

"He's in the Tom Brady mode: Me against the world," Alex Cora said.

From a playing-time perspective, the Sox aren't going to push him. An

optimistic outlook from "Because, I mean, if I dive Dave Dombrowski still has Pedroia sitting out and resting for almost 40

> "We're still not looking at a 150-game player," Dombrowski said. "We're hopeful that he's a 125game player at this point. We do feel we have some people who are solid and can fill in. To fill in if (Pedroia) plays 120, guys like (Brock) Holt, a guy like (Eduardo) Nuñez coming over there. Even some depth with Tzu-Wei Lin in our organization we like a capable of playing more games, that combination. But we're hopeful that Pedey will be the guy. The main guy."

> To be that guy, Pedroia is going to need to play it safe. If he's able to — a big if, to be sure — his teammates believe the sky is the limit.

"He's one of those guys you can never rule out," Chris Sale said. "I dare you to rule him out, actually, because he's out to prove a point this year. That's a scary thought. You take a perennial All-Star, threetime world champion, former MVP. If he wants more now, I think we're in for some pretty awesome stuff with him this year."



Chavis, Hernandez and Lakins could crack major leagues in 2019

In 2016, there was Andrew Benintendi. In 2017, there was Rafael Devers. In 2018, there was ... nobody, really.

Somewhat remarkably, the Red Sox won it all without any reinforcements from their own system. Of course, Dave Dombrowski dealt for World Series MVP Steve Pearce and Game 3 folk hero Nathan Eovaldi in July, but as far as their own farm goes, the Sox didn't get anything.

That's the cost of trading for a Chris Sale — flamethrowing prospect Michael Kopech made his debut in a White Sox uniform — but it shouldn't be the case this season

There are three top prospects that could make big league debuts this season, albeit none touted as highly as Benintendi or Devers.


Michael Chavis flashed his power in Grapefruit League play, homering four times in just 22 at-bats. The 23-year-old corner infielder homered 31 times as a minor-leaguer in 2017, but was popped with an 80-game PED suspension last spring. Chavis kept raking when he returned and finished the season in Triple-A Pawtucket.

"He can hit. I think everybody knew that except for me," Alex Cora said. "I didn't see him last year, he was hurt (in spring training), so you see the numbers and videos, whatever. But you see a game, and yeah he can swing the bat."

With first and third base pretty solidified in 2019, Chavis is going to work out in the middle of the infield as well, in an attempt to expedite his arrival.

"He didn't play too much second, but (in one game) he made two routine plays and he looked very relaxed, turned a double play," Cora said. "That's something he'll do wherever he goes. We'll move him around and make sure he gets his reps at second base, too."

The manger tabbed 22-year-old lefty Darwinzon Hernandez as a player that will be in Boston at some point this summer.

The 6-foot-2, 245-pound Venezuelan has a mid-90s fastball and a nasty curveball. Hernandez took the Arizona Fall League by storm, striking out almost half the batters he faced and registering a spin rate that was off the charts.

"Stuff-wise you can see it," Cora said. "The fastball, the breaking ball, his body, it looks like he belongs. He's a guy that is going to contribute. I'm not saying March 28 or in September. It's in between that, he's going to be part of this and make an impact."

To give Hernandez a taste of the big league life, Cora gave him a cool assignment early in camp: Spend a day following Chris Sale and David Price around JetBlue Park.

"It was something that honestly excited me, because I look up to, I actually follow those guys," Hernandez said, via translator Daveson Perez. "To see how they prepare to throw their side (sessions), how they went about their sides, and

everything about their work was something that's very exciting to me."

Travis Lakins is another arm coming soon to a Red Sox bullpen near you.

After an injury-plagued beginning as a starter, Lakins, now 24, was tossed into a relief role in 2018 and impressed. In 36 appearances between Portland and Pawtucket, Lakins amassed a 2.32 ERA and was in the conversation as a late season call-up.


"It takes more than 25 guys to win a World Series," Cora said. "It takes a whole organizational effort and at one point in the season, I'm not saying Opening Day or the last day of the season, at one point (Lakins and Hernandez) will contribute."

Durbin Feltman is another reliever to watch, but he may need a bit more seasoning before entering the bigleague conversation. Third baseman Bobby Dalbec has the highest ceiling of any player in the Sox system, but his arrival date probably won't come until 2020.




