Community Services

YOUTH SERVICES

Andover Youth Services located at the new Cormier Youth Center behind the Doherty Middle School on Bartlet Street, serves 6,000 middle school (grades six through nine) and high school kids annually through recreation, social, support and educational programs.

Many of the ideas for programs come from the kids themselves.

The youth organization runs both summer and after-school programs, including fun day-trips, such as white-water rafting and snowboarding excursions. AYS staffers coach athletic teams, including youth wrestling, flag football, lacrosse, ultimate Frisbee. A community skate park behind West Middle School has a concrete bowl and ramps. Bill Fahev directs the department, with assistant Glenn Wilson. Tony Lombardi, Kyle Lightner, and Neal Callahan are program coordinators.

Thomas Cochran, its founder, intended to enrich permanently the lives of the students of Phillips Academy, by helping to cultivate and foster in them a love for the beautiful.

The museum's purpose is to acquire, preserve, interpret, and exhibit works of art for the education and enjoyment of local, regional, national and international audiences, including the students, faculty, and community of Phillips Academy, and other students, teachers. scholars, and the general public.





Memorial Hall Library, located in Elm Square, offers popular materials in many formats, special programs for all ages, and resources for lifelong learning.



OCTOBER

BEWITCHED IN ANDOVER:

This series of eerie events. hosted by the Historical Society, takes place throughout the month of October offering a wide variety of spirited and Halloweenthemed events for all ages.

NOVEMBER

FEASTER FIVE ROAD RACE:

This extremely popular holiday tradition is held every Thanksgiving morning in Andover, and attracts close to 10,000. This year marks the 26th consecutive race. The town's fireworks display is usually set off the previous night,

SEPTEMBER

ANDOVER DAY: Quickly establishing itself as one of the most well-attended events on the annual calendar, Andover Day closes Main Street to allow scores of Andover clubs, businesses and organizations to set up tables to introduce themselves to people. Stages for performers are set up on each end of Main Street, and there is a mini-carnival, food and other entertainment available.

TOWN MEETING

Andover residents rule their government directly through a New England tradition known as Open Town Meeting. The Town Meeting form of government allows registered voters to vote at Town Meeting on how much money Andover will spend and on what it will spend this money.

Town Meeting convenes at least once every year, at the time and place designated by the selectmen, a five-member board elected by residents. Besides voting on a budget, Town Meeting decides other matters, such as zoning changes, construction projects, and town bylaw additions and amendments.

LEADERS

Andover's Town Charter calls for Andover to be run by an appointed town manager, and to have the following elected offices: a five-member Board of Selectmen, a fivemember School Committee, a moderator who runs Town Meeting and appoints a Finance Committee, and a five-member Housing Authority. Town elections are held at the end of March every year. The ninemember Finance Committee issues its opinions to voters on all projects with financial impact to taxpayers.

Andrew Flanagan is the new town manager. He was sworn in on Tuesday, Oct. 13.
