Bass fishing in January

Bass fishing is usually considered a warm-weather activity. Fall makes its way into winter, and the boats get winterized and packed away with the rods and reels until spring. There's no way the fish will have any interest in feeding on anything an angler has to offer while the mercury is low.

While there's a little bit of truth to this, there are still bass to be caught in the winter. Cold weather does affect the fish, but not to the extremes that most people assume. Fish are cold-blooded, which allows their body temperature to be regulated by the water temperature. Once it reaches the upper 40s, bass metabolize food more slowly, lessening their need to feed.

In rivers, bass will migrate to a sheltered bay to avoid moving water that tends to be colder; in lakes, they will move to deeper areas where, at times, large groups will congregate in the same pockets. Some will be inactive, but some will be engaged in feeding behavior, although they're not as willing to chase fast-moving baits. So the slower you fish, the better the chances that fish in your area that might not otherwise be interested in eating will come looking for an easy meal.

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Meet Wally the Great Blue Heron

t is unusual to spend any time at all along the Coosa River and not come across a great blue heron." – Dr. George Cline, ecologist and professor of biology at Jacksonville State University.

If not for that verity, Jonica Thompson might not be a children's book author.

A daily encounter with the majestic lakeside bird

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prompted her to write and publish *I am Wally*, the story of a great blue heron. The book was published in October to positive reviews and sold out of its first printing within three weeks.

"I'm amazed by how well it has been received," said Thompson. An Odenville native and former Pell City resident ("I grew up on Logan Martin Lake"), she relocated to Lake Guntersville with her family in 2014, which is when she met the bird behind the book.

"The idea started about three years ago when I was driving my son to school. Every morning, we would see the same great blue heron. Shawn named him Wally, and we started making up stories about him. Those stories have now turned into a book series starring Wally and his friends. I've always wanted to write, but I just didn't realize my first book would be a children's book."

The debut entry is "basically a day with Wally - what he does, how he eats, where he's from - and it introduces the reader

to great blue herons as a species. I wrote it for ages 3-8, so I wanted to be fun and educational. Book 2 will be a little more fun and silly."

As with most writers, Thompson said the biggest challenge to finishing the book was simply sitting down and writing it. "Once I did, the words came together in about 45 minutes. After that, meeting all of the publishing requirements was a big learning curve. That took longer than putting the book together."

Shawn, who is now 9, is credited as the book's creative editor for his input to the illustrations, Thompson said. "He made some very good suggestions during the process. I sketched out what I wanted the illustrations to look like, but I am by no means a children's artist, so I hired a professional artist to cartoon it up a bit. I'm very happy with the illustrations, and there is a photo of the real Wally in the book."

The text of the second book in the Wally series has been written, and the art is still in progress, with the book sched-

uled to publish later this year. Thompson is already at work on its sequel.

In the meantime, she visits elementary schools to read from *I am Wally* and discuss writing and publishing with students. She has visited Odenville Elementary School and has plans for readings in Pell City schools this month. Schools may request visits – for which Thompson does not charge – through her website, www.wallytheheron.com, and she donates a copy of the book (which is 1.5-level Accelerated Reader certified) to school libraries.

Copies of the book may be ordered through the website, including a combination package that includes a plush Wally stuffed animal.

"We have partnered with Conservation Critters on this project," Thompson said. "Great blue herons are protected. They're not endangered, but they are protected. Aeration system installed in Logan Martin aims to improve water quality

Iabama Power has installed a new aeration system in Logan Martin Lake to improve water quality by adding dissolved oxygen into the water.

"This new system consists of seven long sections of pipe that will be anchored just off the bottom of the lake in front of Logan Martin Dam and some distance upstream," said Jim Crew, Southern Company Services Hydro Services manager. The aeration system adds oxygen into the water around the dam, increasing the dissolved oxygen levels in the water discharged from the dam's generating units. That will improve the water quality for fish and other aquatic species.

"Each pipe is basically like a big soaker hose that adds oxygen into the water that will ultimately be released downstream of the dam," Crew added.

The process of installing the aeration system be-

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gan a few weeks ago with assembling the lines along the shoreline to deploy in the lake, along with building the infrastructure needed to store and transport the oxygen to the seven lines.

Crew said the seven lines were deployed last month. "Five boats (were) utilized to sink the lines according to precise coordinates."

The Alabama Marine Police helped with the deployment process to ensure safety of the workers and others who were on the lake while the lines were being sunk.

ishi" is the Japanese word for "delicious," and Oishi Asian Restaurant in Pell City lives up to its name.

Sushi lovers will be delighted with a wide variety of tasty rolls, either cooked or raw, and friendly, knowledgeable severs who make placing an order less intimidating for firsttimers. The relaxed atmosphere is perfect for a lunch break with co-workers or a family night out.

One of the most popular items on the menu is the Yummy Roll. It is made with tuna, salmon, crab stick, cream cheese and avocado. These ingredients are rolled in specially prepared, short-grain Japanese rice and deep fried. The roll is sliced and served with a special sauce drizzled on top. The Yummy Roll is beautifully presented on a plate with a flower or flower petals.

When served with soup and salad, sushi rolls are a filling meal. Hot, savory miso soup is a familiar favorite. It is a soybean paste broth with tofu, seaweed and scallions. Other delicious soups include onion, egg drop and hot and sour. Salads are typically served with ginger dressing, and the choices include seaweed salad, kani salad, avocado salad and a house variety. A spicy tuna salad is also available.

The most popular dessert on the menu is fried cheesecake. The slightly crunchy outside holds soft, melted













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cheesecake filling inside. It is served with confetti sprinkles and a side of whipped cream with a cherry on top. Other desserts are available and include chocolate mousse, ice cream and Key lime pie.

Oishi Asian Restaurant serves soft drinks, tea and adult



beverages. Hot or cold saké is a popular choice among adults. Saké is a Japanese rice wine. Hot saké is dry, and cold saké can range from dry to very sweet. The alcohol content in saké is more than that of beer, wine or cider, but less than that of spirits like vodka and rum.

Owner Rita Shi said the restaurant's menu is made up of "the best of the best" items from Asian cuisine. "I went from restaurant to restaurant trying different things, and I picked the ones I liked best for my menu."

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Fried cheesecake is a perfect way to end a meal and is one of several dessert choices on the menu.

Shi is a native of Pinson, and she learned the restaurant business by working in her parents' Chinese restaurant there. She opened Oishi Asian Restaurant about three months ago and enjoys seeing her customers return again and again.

"I just want more people to know that I'm here in this location," she said.

St. Clair County couple enjoys life on the main channel

hen Randy and Rhonda Gann began talking about relocating from Birmingham to a waterfront property, they considered a coastal area. But considering the impact hurricanes can have on a coastline, they decided against it.

So they began looking at the lake. After searching for exactly the right spot on the water, they found it, atop the crest of a rise overlooking Logan Martin's main channel.

A drive into their property passes raised beds of flowering shrubs and plants before the house's angled design provides entry to one of its two spacious garages.

Massive carved wood doors greet guests at the main entry, inset with beveled glass panels that allow the natural light that Rhonda loves into the house.

An earth-toned palette of colors is used throughout their home, the entry a soothing taupe with lightly antiqued furnishings that welcome with elegance and a graceful style.

The entry provides a view across to the sprawling great room, where floor-to-ceiling windows and French doors are just the right touch for showcasing the full waterfront view the Ganns fell in love with.

"This is one of the things I loved immediately when we saw this lot," Rhonda said. "It has a full panoramic view of the water.

Their great room and its air of relaxation provide a centerpiece for the home where warm wood floors, framed windows and arches meet rich sunsettoned walls that adjoin a tiered ceiling.

Built-in book shelves surround the fireplace, which is set in black marble and topped with an expansive carved wood mantel.

The great room opens to the view the Ganns treasure with a fully screened porch room accessed through double glass doors.

The front hall leads to two bedrooms on the main level. The master suite overlooks the lake, and a tiered ceiling adds to its spacious appeal.

At the opposite end of the main level is a guest room and bath, situated to take in the lake view on the rear of the house as well.

From this area, there is interior access to the

upper garage, where Randy has room to enjoy his "muscle car" (as Rhonda calls it) and the glistening Harley Davidson he enjoys taking on cross country treks with friends.

Downstairs, there is a nearly mirrored floor plan design, with two additional bedrooms and baths, plus a kitchen and large dining area.

The lower level dining area opens to a covered patio, with walkways that circle to the gardens and the front of the house.

Just up a stairway from the main hall is Rhonda's athome yoga, pilates and personal training studio, where she conducts group classes and individual sessions for her clients.

She started what has become Evolve Fitness while

living in Hoover, working in marketing for Alabama Power Company and attending aerobics classes at nearby Hunter Street Baptist Church. She was eventually asked to fill in as an instructor.

"That started it all," she said. Rhonda became certified in pilates and yoga, "and here we are now."

Adding the personal training element to her repertoire meant earning professional certification in this area as well, through the American Council on Exercise in 2008.

"This is probably the single most important thing I have done in this career," she said.

Her clients come from all walks of life, she said, at present, the eldest being 86 years old.

Yoga is a pursuit she encourages for all, with adapta-



tions as each client develops their individual strength and flexibility.

"This is why there are no mirrors in the studio," she said. "This is a no-judgment zone, where we work hard, but laugh

a lot, too."

Rhonda also organizes seasonal Yoga By the Lake events, open to all from beginners to experienced clients. These sessions are held on the grounds of her home,

facing the lakefront she loves and offering the natural setting of earth and sky.

Yoga By the Lake is announced through the Evolve Fitness Facebook page, as well as by word of mouth from her clients.

Altogether, the Ganns say their move to Logan Martin Lake has been one of fulfillment and many happy hours.

When their endeavors for the day are completed, they enjoy the feeling of enchantment Logan Martin delivers, just by taking a moment to admire a view from a window or an up close view from outside.

"When I'm not working, we love to be out on the boat or the patio, taking in the sunsets," Rhonda said. "It's one of our favorite things to do."





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Are there alligators in the lake and river? Jacksonville State professor has the answer

r. George Cline was discussing with his audience the various species of wildlife that live in and around the Coosa River, but once he removed Scooter from his pet carrier, all anybody wanted to talk about was alligators. Scooter is an American alligator, one of the thousands

of animals that call Alabama -- and specifically the Coosa River Basin, which includes Logan Martin Lake -- home.

"As far back as around 75 years ago, there have been reports of American alligators cruising the Coosa River, as far north as Gadsden," said Cline, a herpetologist, environmentalist and professor of biology at Jacksonville State University. "Imagine an animal that gets 19 feet long. Even an 8-footer is taller than any of us. What a great animal, and here they are in the Coosa."

That doesn't mean, however, that boaters and anglers should worry about having a dangerous encounter with one of Scooter's bigger relatives while out on the lake or river.

"Alligators are not in the Coosa River per se, but they are out there in low numbers. You're just not going to see them," Cline told the audience at the 2017 Coosa River Basin State of the Watershed Conference, which Logan Martin Lake hosted. "They will not be out in the deeper

waters of the river or out in the lake. They'll be in the back bayous, the shallow water and muddy embankments where the river backs up. As far away from people as they can get. Alligators are shy. You're not going to find them swimming around in the lake or attacking boats."

Biologists have been unable to accurately assess the alligator population in central Alabama, according to Cline, but the reptiles are apparently "scattered about in small numbers. We just don't know enough about them yet. We need to, because they are a part of the whole system. Without gators, the whole thing crashes."

The professor sees alligators not as a dangerous threat to public safety but as a part of the state's diverse ecosystem.

"Alabama is the top state east of the Mississippi in species diversity," the Pennsylvania native said. "People

come to Alabama just to see the stuff we have. This is a great, highly diverse place with fascinating biology. No state has more organisms than we do, and it's vital we protect them."

The Coosa River and its banks are home to a significant portion of Alabama's wildlife. "Sixty percent of the known species of mollusks in the world -- not just Alabama, the world -- live in the Coosa River," Cline said.

One of his favorite residents of the Coosa River area is the bald eagle.

"With its 9-foot wingspan, is there anything more spectacular than that bird in flight? It makes my day every time I see one. Once you see your first bald eagle, you're hooked for life."

Other residents of local waters include the spiny softshell turtle ("You might never see one if you're not actually looking for them."), the Coosa crayfish ("Alabama is the land of the crayfish, and this one is endemic to the Coosa River. You can't find it anyplace else."), the chestnut lampray, whirligig beetles, the Coosa River darter (which Cline considers to be one of the most beautiful fish on Earth) and the Coosa moccasinshell mussel.

"All of these creatures are in the Coosa River, from very big animals all the way down to things you can't see," Cline said. "By square miles, we have more animals than anyone else, and our job is to protect their habitats."

Disappearing habitats concern the professor, as a biologist and lover of wildlife.

"Take frogs, for example," he said. "There are 6,000 species of frogs. Forty-three percent are endangered. We are at serious risk of losing about half of the species of frogs in the world within 10 to 15 years. It sickens me that half the animals I study will disappear during my children's lifetime.

"Diversity of life is important. Even if the only value is to ooh and aah over it, it's worth it. Without it, the world becomes a whole lot more bland."

est friends and business partners Drake Carroll and Bryton Nixon typically don't need much of an excuse to spend time on Logan Martin Lake.

"You tell us, 'Meet me by the lake,' and we'll be there," Carroll said.

But on a chilly, overcast late autumn morning, talking about the lake was a better option than being out on it. So Carroll and Nixon discussed their business, their roots in Pell City – the Gateway to Logan Martin Lake – and how the body of water has contributed to their hometown's growth.

Their business: Carroll and Nixon own Cogswell Trading Company and Signature Laser Engraving, an operation that combines Carroll's background in the clothing industry with Nixon's experience as an engraver.

"My family owns Forever Monument Company, so I started out with my laser engraving business as a way of cutting the middle man out," he said.

Carroll started working in retail at age 15 while a student at Pell City High School, and "for the past seven years, I was manufacturing clothing and helping with sales for a company in Tuscaloosa. That was when I realized there wasn't anywhere in 50 miles of Pell City that provides the kind of men's wear we have here now – high quality men's casual clothing."

So it didn't take much encouragement when his old friend suggested a partnership.

"We've been best friends since we were knee-high to a grasshopper," Nixon said. "Pretty much brothers. I was tired

of driving to Tuscaloosa to hang out with him, so we started this business and got him back in town."

When they're not working: "Since we started this business, we don't have time to do much anymore," Carroll said. "But we'll go play golf when we can or do something outdoors."

Fishing used to take up much of Nixon's spare time, "but I'm engaged and planning a wedding, so I've been spending time with my fiancé on that. But I still like man stuff – working on boats and cars, and we take full advantage of the lake during the summer. It's nice to get out on the water and blow off steam."

Growing up in Pell City: "Both born and raised here," Carroll said. According to Nixon, "we had the full Pell City experience. If you ask us something about Pell City and we don't know it, we've got somebody who does."

About their hometown: "Pell City is Mayberry with a touch of Birmingham," Nixon said.

According to Carroll, the town hasn't lost its small town charm as it has grown. "You still can't go anywhere without seeing somebody you know, and the politeness of the people is still here. It's definitely growing compared to what it used to be – and it's growing fast – but that's a great thing.

"Living in Tuscaloosa for the past 10 years, I watched it grow with the success of the football team, and I see something similar happening in Pell City with the lake and the interstate.
