

Ashville looking to spread things out offensively

The Ashville Bulldogs enter the 2019 football season under second-year head coach Barry Simmons looking to spread things out offensively.

Simmons said towards the end of last season, they were much better offensively when they started spreading it out.

"We worked very hard in the offseason installing a

new offensive system," he said. "And if you watch our spring game, we had 32 plays that averaged over 10 yards per play. So, yes, we are going to spread it out this upcoming season. It's going to be exciting, up-tempo type of football. Fans will definitely see the football in







the air more."

Simmons said they want to go fast on offense, but they also want to control the tempo of the game.

Region 6

The Bulldogs are in Class 4A, Region 6 along with Anniston, Cherokee County, Cleburne County, Hokes Bluff, Jacksonville, Oneonta and White Plains. Simmons said the region, top to bottom, is very tough.

"In my personal opinion, I think Ashville is the team to beat," he said. "I think Anniston may be the surprise team in the region."





Making the state playoffs last year from this region were Oneonta, Hokes Bluff, Jacksonville and Anniston.

After beating Ragland 15-6 in the season opener, the Bulldogs lost eight games in a row before beating Vincent 56-12 in the finale to finish the season 2-8. The 56 points scored in a single game were the most since the Bulldogs defeated White Plains 59-0 to open the 2015 season. They were 0-7 in region play last year.

What to expect

Simmons said they have a young quarterback in sophomore Dylan Harris who can really throw the ball.

"We want to put the football in Dylan's hands so he can get it to the receivers and let them make some big plays," he said.

Defensively, Simmons said they are making a transition from a three-man front multiple to a four-man front multiple.

"It will be a little bit different style of play," he said. "We will be going from three linebackers in the middle to two linebackers, which will put more pressure on the two inside linebackers."

Simmons said Hunter Hirsh has really blossomed this spring from his inside linebacker role.

"He has turned into one of our best linebackers and I am excited about what he brings to every game," Simmons said. "He brings a physical style of play with him and he also has increased his speed and agility."

Key players returning

Simmons said key players returning include senior running back/linebacker Ty Armstrong; senior wide receiver/safety Nathan Phillips; senior wide receiver/ corner Derek Walker; senior guard/defensive end Cam Tillman; junior safety/running back Luke Harris; junior wide receiver/safety Adrianne Hernandez; and

sophomore quarterback/safety Dylan Harris.

Goal

Simmons said the goal is just like every season - make the state playoffs.

"Ashville has not made the playoffs in several years, so that is our number one goal this year," he said. "We are going to continue to grind. We are not backing down from anyone, and we will continue to raise the bar. We are definitely in a tough region, but I think this Ashville team is very capable."

Keys to a success

Simmons said they must stay injury-free and keeping players healthy.

"We do have more depth now than in times past,"



Jerry Hood looking to get Leeds back in the playoffs



The Leeds Green Wave will open the 2019 season under new head coach Jerry Hood, who was hired less than three months ago.

Hood is no stranger to being on the sidelines of high school football in Alabama, and no stranger to winning a state title.

Hood previously was head coach at Oak Mountain and Clay Chalkville. His overall record is 103-52 in 13 years. He led Clay-Chalkville to the 2014 Class 6A state title as the Cougars went 15-0.

"I am very excited about being at Leeds High School," he said. "It's going to be a tremendous opportunity, and the guys have worked hard the first three weeks I have been there. We are still getting to know each other. I am totally pleased with the city of Leeds and the Leeds



schools."

When Hood went to Clay-Chalkville in 2009, the Cougars were coming off back-to-back losing seasons, the first in school history. Leeds went 3-7 last year.

"I know Leeds is coming off a tough season," Hood said, "but I also know Leeds is a place where football is important. There is a lot of good tradition here. It's just a matter of getting back on track, and encouraging the kids to be reinterested in football."

Hood said he wanted to focus on his players.

"If they appreciate and like what we and the

coaches are doing there, Leeds will be successful," he said. "The character and work ethic of these kids is unbelievable. They allowed us to come in and practice them a different way. We are doing some different things with them that we think will enhance our chances of having a winning season. They embraced that right away and have done everything we've asked them to do. We hit the ground running,

Region play

Leeds is in Class 4A, Region 4 with Childersburg, Elmore County, Handley, Holtville, Lincoln and Talladega.

When asked who the team has to beat in the region, Hood said he had no idea.

"But I do know that Handley, Lincoln and Elmore County can beat you at any time," he said. "Childersburg and Talladega have some great athletes."

Hood said he thinks it will be a competitive region all season.

"With hard work, I think we can think about slipping in under the radar when it comes to the state playoffs," he said. "I tell the kids every day that the wins are going to come. It may be this year or next year, whatever. But just work right, and try to be better today than you were yesterday. I will love them for that, and we will move on down the road."





would be the key to a successful season, Hood said for players to be there, get better, and learn a little bit more about football.

"Every day before practice, I will meet with all the coaches," he said. "I tell them exactly how it is going to go on the field because we do not want to waste a second. We want to get our work done and make the kids better at whatever skill we are working on. When you get it down to that level, eventually all the wins and fun are going to come."

Championship caliber

Hood knows Leeds has won four state championships since 2008. When asked what it would take to get Leeds back to the state title picture, he said the same thing Leeds had before.

"You need really great

players that care about each other, that do the little things right," he said. "There are a lot of great players that are on some great teams, but they don't do the little things right, and they end up just being playoff guys all the time. The teams that do the little things right will exceed

their own expectations."

Hood said he believes the parents are excited about having a program where their kids are loved and taught well to be successful on the field.

Leeds will open the season Friday, Aug. 23, at home against Sylacauga.



weights, run and do the things we ask them to do. That will transfer over into better success in the football season."


Wallace said they encourage student-athletes at Moody to be multi-sport athletes.



Center Point, Central Clay County, Mortimer Jordan, Munford, Springville, St. Clair County and Sylacauga. The lone win for Moody last year was a 41-20 region win over St. Clair County High.

The Class 5A champion came from this region as Central Clay County overcame a 3-3 start after six games, and went on to win nine in a row, including a 43-42 victory over Vigor in the state title game at Auburn.

Wallace knows the team to beat in the region is Central Clay County.

"They are unreal," he said. "We have two or three teams in our region that are strong. Clay had to beat Mortimer Jordan to get to the state finals last year. Center Point has so much talent. Sylacauga is always right there in the mix. Our region is loaded from top to bottom. In order for us to compete in this region, we have to do everything better than we did before."

1 percent better

Wallace has challenged his players to get 1 percent better each day.

"The group of guys we have are willing to take that challenge, and will not back down from it," he said. "What we do right now in the summer will determine the results in the fall. All of the work we put in during the off-season and now in the summer will determine whether we win or not this season. Right now, I am pleased where we are and what we have accomplished. I would say that we are ready."

Wallace said last year's team was young, so he is depending on last year's junior class to be leaders this year. "Many will be asked to play both ways. I believe we are in shape and strong enough to hold up for four quarters," he said. "I do believe the injury bug caught up with us some last year. Hopefully, we can stay injury-free this upcoming season."







Pell City High School's football team got its first taste of action in a talent-packed Class 6A, Region 6 in 2018.

Panthers head coach Wayne Lee said his team is looking to build on a season where it bookended two pairs of victories around a six-game losing streak, with five of those games against region opponents.

The Panthers finished fifth in the region last season.

"I think the big difference this year is everybody

quarterback is coming back.

"Defensively, the back seven have all got experience, but we've got to get better up front. On special teams, our kicker and punter are back, so we've got some guys in place. We've got some young kids who we got some good film on in the spring game."

Lee said his team needs to become more consistent this season.

"Last year, our first game and our last game were probably our two best games," he said. "Now we've got to get 2 through 9 going in (that direction)." Freeman said he sees the improvement in mentality among his teammates going into the season.



team instead of being an individual player," he said.

Staples added that the team has emphasized giving maximum effort during offseason workouts.

"We've been working really hard during the summer and doing a lot of conditioning," he said.

Lee said he didn't want to discuss the specifics of the looming Week 3 matchup between Pell City and Oxford, which hired former Panthers head coach Keith Etheredge in May, but Lee acknowledged those developments give the rivalry a bit more juice. He did touch on the challenges that come with facing his region opponents.

"There's no question you had the two best teams in 6A in that region with Clay-Chalkville and Pinson Valley, and Oxford, who very well could have been the third-best team ... We're one game out of a playoff spot. This year, we've got to find a way to get that playoff spot. We know a little more about it and what we've got to do."

As daunting a task as it may be to carve through a tough schedule, Lee reiterated making the playoffs is part of the goals for this season.

"Every year, you want to get to the playoffs," he said. "Once you get to the playoffs, you never know and you see what can happen from there. For us, we want to beat Oxford. Bottom line, we want to beat Oxford."



Ragland looking to get back to state playoffs

Derrick Sewell is starting his second season as head football coach of the Ragland Purple Devils. After an inaugural season of 4-6 and missing the state playoffs, Sewell said he is excited about having seven returning starters on the offensive side of the football. And those returning starters could help get Ragland back to the state playoffs.

Offensively

This year, Sewell said the offense could operate more out of a shotgun look this year.

"But, we will try to move the ball down the field by running," he said. "If we have to throw it, we will. I feel like we are very good up front with our offensive line. Some of our newcomers are explosive. We may not spread it out offensively as much as people would like to see it, but we will pound the rock and see what happens."

Last year was a season of streaks for Ragland. They started the season 0-4, won the next four games and lost the final two. They finished 2-4 in region play.

Sewell said key players returning include senior quarterback/linebacker Elijah Ball; senior running back/linebacker Brody Bice; senior wide receiver/cornerback Nathaniel Kelley; senior linebacker David Sanders; senior tight end Kaeden Cotton; senior defensive tackle Matthew Turbville; senior offensive lineman Kaden Bice; junior offensive lineman/defensive tackle Jakolbe Brewster; junior offensive lineman Ryan Bearden; and junior defensive end Josh Phillips.

Class 1A, Region 5

The Purple Devils are in the same region with Appalachian, Donoho, Spring Garden, Talladega County Central, Victory Christian and Winterboro.

Sewell said the region is tough with three of the four teams advancing to the state playoffs last year, winning in round one.

"I believe the team to beat is the defending region champs in Spring Garden," he said. "They finished 11-2 last year and went 2-1 in the state playoffs. We lost to them late, losing a close one, 29-26. Week in and week out in our region, everyone is tough. You can't have an off night, and it is a grind every Friday. If you look over somebody, that's when it is going to slip up and get you."

Getting kids interested in playing

Being in a small 1A school, it can be a challenge getting enough kids interested in playing football.

"I spend a lot of time recruiting the hallways," Sewell said. "Recruit the weight room for those guys who play other sports. You have to at our level. We're going to always average anywhere from 25 up to about 33 players. I rely heavily on our seniors because they are

our leaders. But I rely on the entire team letting them know they all have friends who may want to come out and play football."

Sewell knows he has to get off to a faster start this year than last year.

"We broke in a lot of younger guys last year," he said. "They may have been juniors, but the three years prior, we had so many senior-loaded classes who carried the load. It took a few games for our guys to adjust last year. It's never easy when you're asking new guys to start out with 4A Ashville and 2A Westbrook. But, by the time we

got to midseason, things were rolling."

"I feel like we have the right guys back at the right spots," he said.

Second season

Sewell said the one thing he will change headed into his second season — he will enjoy it more. "Slow down and enjoy the process," he said. "Enjoy

Sewell said the goal is to go 10-0 during the regular season.

"Then, from there, we start the second season in the state playoffs," he said. "Our fans have high expectations

of our kids going out in each game and being prepared mentally and physically. Fans know we have a hard work ethic, so they can expect a lot of aggression and a lot of physicality. That is something we are always going to bring because those are things we can control. Fans need to expect that we will be as prepared as we can be, come that first week of the season."



Michael Graben set for second season at Springville

Michael Graben starts his second year as head football coach at Springville. He understands his Tigers are in one of the toughest regions in Class 5A. Region 5 has the current state champion in Central Clay County, and Mortimer Jordan, which lost to Central Clay County in the semifinals last year.

The other two region teams making the state playoffs last year were Center Point and Sylacauga. Rounding out the region schedule includes Munford, Moody and St. Clair County High.

To improve on the 3-7 record from last year, Graben knows he has to improve on the 1-6 region record.

"If you look at all the guys sports, Central Clay County won the football state crown, Center Point was the basketball state runner-up, Moody won the wrestling state crown, Springville's soccer team finished state runner-up and Springville won the state baseball crown," Graben said. "We understand how tough this region is."

Springville defeated Ashville and Moody last year, but lost to St. Clair County.

"We are excited to have the opportunity to play these county

rival games," he said. "I think Ashville and Moody will be much improved this year, and we haven't beaten St. Clair in about eight or nine years. I think the guys get up for these county rivals and play a little harder."

Keys to a successful season

The first key to success, Graben said, is staying healthy.

"We have about 80 players who showed up to play football, so we should have a little depth," he said. "We also need to get off to a fast start and work hard."

Graben mentioned that last year's season-opener was his first game as a head coach. They took Hayden to overtime. The Wildcats got the football first, scored a touchdown but missed the extra point.

"On our first play in overtime, we mishandled the snap from center, fumbled, and the game was over," he said. "We didn't get another opportunity to run anymore plays. So getting off to a good start this season is definitely a key to a successful season."

Graben said though Springville has not been as successful as they would like to be on the field the past few years, the guys are



First of all, Dampeer said, they have the opportunity to slip up on a team or two that, maybe on paper, they are not supposed to beat.



RECLAIMING THE MAGIC

Victory Christian hoping to find success of three years ago

Victory Christian veers toward the 2019 campaign trying to find the magic from three seasons ago when they were contenders in Class 1A.

The Lions enter the upcoming season with a new head coach, Bruce Breland.

Breland previously served as offensive coordinator

under recently-resigned head coach Mike Holliday.

Breland has held head coaching jobs at Coosa Valley Academy, Bessemer Academy, Fultondale, Shelby County, Woodlawn and Alma Bryant. He has compiled an 88-109 record in his 19 years leading football programs.


includes the quarterback position, but Breland said he'll roll with freshman quarterback Dalton Lewellyn to replace last season's starter Abe Sargent.



to shoulder (the) load, and they do it with the leadership they bring."

Breland said he considers running back, the offensive line, defensive ends and linebackers as positions of strength going into the season.

"Offensively, we'll continue what we do because I've been offensive coordinator," he said. "Defensively, we went to the 4-2-5 last year, which is what we'll be running this year. We will try to make it a little more unpredictable, be a defense that forces the action a little more and not allow the offense to dictate to us what it wants to do."

Yeager said he's excited about the upcoming season.

"I love the guys I play with," he said. "There's no other line I'd rather be running behind and no other players I'd rather be on the field with."

Victory Christian put together one of its best seasons in 2015 and won its first home playoff game in school history (a 33-19 victory over Woodville in the first round of the 1A playoffs).

For the past three seasons, the Lions have been on the cusp of a playoff berth, but a 5-13 record in region play during that span has kept an otherwise competitive program on the fringe.

"The players are working hard, and they want it,"
Breland said. "They want the very best for Victory
Christian and themselves, and they are striving very

hard to be an elite team and be one of those playoff teams."

Breland said the late-season scramble to claim one of four region playoff spots can be challenging.

"The region is a tough region for sure, and depth towards the end of the year is critical," he said. "So is staying injury-free ... Some injuries are unavoidable, and you just try to stay above that, and hopefully this year, we will because we don't have a lot of depth. We do have a lot of passion, and these boys are working hard getting ready to play."

He added his goal is to build a true program where year-in and year-out, the team is more competitive


