

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

A solid business plan was presented to our corporate board to reformat Lakeside into a magazine in order to provide a better reader experience and improve the quality of the presentation of the advertisements. In April 2007, Lakeside Living magazine was launched.

Flashing forward to present, this edition represents the 10th anniversary of Lakeside as a slick magazine. The number of copies we print ranges from 8,000 in the lake's low pool months to 10,000 during the spring and summer months. Our distribution area has grown westward to provide readership opportunities to St. Clair County residents in Leeds, Moody and Odenville.

And the changes don't stop there. You may notice the magazine has undergone an aesthetic facelift under the direction of our talented art director Jennifer Mashburn. Editor Buddy Roberts is responsible for tweaking the format to continue to include features of the magazine our readers have grown to love as well manage a gradual shift to a more thematic approach to better highlight the people, businesses, communities and activities in and around Logan Martin Lake. Bob Crisp's photos of life on the lake as it is lived provide visual elements that bring the lake experience into your homes each month. "Ever seen one of these before?" Jerry Woods asked as he reached into his desk drawer and handed me what he'd extracted from it.

had not, and I told him so. Sure, I'd known such a thing had existed but, not unlike a bibliophile unexpectedly presented with a copy of Shakespeare's First Folio, never expected to see one.

So there I was, sitting in the office at Jerry's marina on a bench seat that had once furnished a pontoon boat, holding a copy of Lakeside Living on quarterfold newsprint.

The cover also identified Lakeside Living as A Daily Home Guide to Celebrating Life on Logan Martin Lake. By 2006, the publication (a five-times a year seasonal product) had already served as such for 12 years, since its launch in 1994.

It wouldn't last as such another year. That's because the following April – 10 years ago – Lakeside Living abandoned its newsprint format and became a full-blown, year-round glossy magazine. It is the milestone of that transition that we celebrate in this issue. Thank you for celebrating with us, because without you, we'd not have a milestone to celebrate.

It is your loyal and regular readership that has allowed Lakeside Living to exist for almost a quarter of a century and to become a magazine. At a time when

Up first is chief photographer Bob Crisp. Chances are, when you see a copy of Lakeside Living, it's Bob's

A photo-journalist and portrait photographer for 31 years, Bob has earned so many awards from the Alabama Press Association and Alabama Associated Press that he's lost count (but he believes it's well "north of 100").

I enjoyed getting to talk with Bob about his role at Lakeside Living, and his comments offer a unique insight into how each issue of the magazine is illustrated.

Magazine photography: "Shooting Lakeside Living is something a little different than shooting straight news like I do for The Daily Home. The assignments are a lot of fun. Hopping in a boat and photographing people wakeboarding or skiing or riding an inner tube – that's a pretty good afternoon. And as a photographer, seeing your photos on glossy stock is very gratifying. They look exactly how they were shot, and the format allows them to have a great impact."

His commitment to Lakeside Living: "I have always felt that this magazine is an art-driven product, and I feel a strong responsibility to produce the best photographs I possibly can to make it look top-notch."

His photographic art has appeared in every issue of Lakeside Living, and Bob's sense of responsibility has taken him to the lake at all hours to get the perfect photograph.


"In summer of 2015, I made contact with some kids who like to hit the lake at 6 a.m. to wakeboard. The main channel can get mighty choppy later in the morning, so they get up before the lake traffic starts and the water is still smooth. I spent a couple of hours with them and made some beautiful photos that morning."

Reflections about the 10-year milestone: "When we first started Lakeside Living, it was a seasonal publication. Then we decided to take it to 12 months as a glossy magazine, and it was such an upgrade for the product. I can't believe it's been 10 years. That's a lot of magazine pages we've produced, and I'm really proud of the quality of our magazine."

beginning. She has a strong love for the community lakeside where she has lived since 1974, and she has played a pivotal role in the growth and popularity of our magazine.

"I was one of the first sales people to sell the newsprint product, and I loved it," she recalled. "The concept

was unique, and it was exactly right for this area. When we made the conversion to a magazine, we took the publication to a higher level."

Pam's primary responsibility is overseeing and supporting our advertising sales staff, but beyond that, she's one of the many people who have taken a personal interest in being a part of, organizing and supporting some of the lake's biggest festivals and events.

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




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
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
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
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Editor's Note: For many years, one of Logan Martin Lake's most anticipated annual events was the Float Yer Boat Regatta. The cardboard boat race showcased the imagination and ingenuity of local sailors, and it raised thousands of dollars to benefit the Pell City community. Although it's been more than three years since the regatta has been held, the potential exists for it to once again be a staple of Logan Martin summers. Will 2017 be the year it returns?

he participants floated with paddles poised above the water awaiting the signal, lifejacket on just in case their hopefully lakeworthy vessel wasn't up to the task.

The whistle sounded, the crowd cheered, and the 5th Annual Float Yer Boat Regatta was underway. Most of the 18 entries floated their way out across the waters of Logan Martin Lake, but a few floundered and sank into its depths.

Held at Lakeside Park in Pell City, the event drew hundreds of spectators. "We had a great turnout," said Pell City Civitan Club President Blair Fields. The Civitan Club sponsored the event to raise funds for the Pell City Toys for Children Program.

Fields said the annual regatta raises money to help provide toys, clothes, shoes and diapers for children at Christmas. The Toys for Children Program helped more than 800 children last year. "We were glad to continue the regatta tradition when we took over the Program," he said. "It went better than we ex-

pected."

Float Yer Boat Regatta participants were required to paddle their crafts out from the Lakeside Park boat launch, around a buoy, and back to the boat launch. The heats were timed, with the fastest

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


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

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Shrimp Lovers



ot many folks I run into don't have a bit of a taste for those good things we favor from the Gulf, and this time, it's all shrimp (and a few other things Gulf) for our food adventure this month.

I started thinking about a great "shrimp fest," and wanted to combine that with a little grilling. Most southerners I know all love outdoor cooking, and some of us even like to brag about our prowess!

I know I don't mind a bit when I turn out something people love when I cook, and I enjoy hearing their comments, and even welcome the empty dishes when it's all over.

That's the biggest compliment ever for a cook who takes pride in their cooking. When people clean their plates, you know you've "done good!"

So I took the liberty of inventing a little recipe of my own, a variation on a kabob I thought would be interesting (and it was). It's a shrimp appetizer you can adapt to your own preference of serving, along with a shrimp "side" that might add a new twist to your shrimping.





My "This and That Kabobs" What you need:

One pound extra large shrimp

One bunch fresh asparagus

About two cups sliced mushrooms (the larger the better)

About two dozen grape tomatoes

A quarter pound of sea scallops or bay scallops (your choice – if you don't already know, the sea scallops are larger)

About 12 pearl onions (fresh is better than the jar)

McCormick's California Style Garlic Powder

Worcestershire sauce

Two sticks of margarine

Cracked black pepper

Optional: Two bags of minute brown rice Fresh lemon juice-one lemon will work.



What you do:

OK, let's go the easy route and make the marinade, put the kabobs together, then grill or broil.

Marinade: Mix Two cups Worcestershire, about a teaspoon of the garlic powder, some cracked black pepper to taste and set aside.

Wash and break asparagus into tips, set aside. Do the same with the mushrooms.

Take your skewers (this makes four) and assemble alternating pieces of shrimp, scallops, onions, asparagus and tomato alternating them for color and appearance. Place them into gallon sized freezer bags with the marinade and put in the refrigerator for at least an hour. When ready to cook, remove from bags and place on grill or under broiler, basting them with melted margarine and squeezing lemon juice on them as they cook. Adding leftover marinade as they cook helps keep them from getting too dry.

Whether you grill or broil, they should be done in about 20 minutes. You can tell when the shrimp turn a nice pink and the veggies are crispy tender.

I served mine on a huge platter, rice underneath, kabobs on top, and let everyone serve themselves. But, you can also plate them individually. Serve with lemon wedges and pots of melted butter or margarine for dipping.

Side note: Even though it is another starch, wouldn't grilled corn on the cob go great with this! Or sliced grilled (buttered and seasoned) eggplant, or maybe a spicy Caesar salad...I'll stop now!

Barbecued Shrimp Appetizer What you need:

One fourth cup butter or margarine

One half cup Italian salad dressing, use your own favorite

Two tablespoons Worcestershire sauce

Two tablespoons of your favorite barbecue sauce

One tablespoon lemon pepper

Two bay leaves (this is really crucial – I used four)

Two lemons, sliced

One large onion, sliced (need I suggest Vidalia?)

Four cloves garlic, pressed (if you're pressed for time, a few shakes of the McCormick's California Style powder is almost as good)

Three pounds medium size fresh shrimp (but it's OK to use frozen thawed if you need to – just remember they're already cooked)

What you do:

Melt butter in a roasting pan or small Dutch oven. Add salad dressing and remaining ingredients and stir to coat the shrimp. Pour into glass baking dish and bake at 400 for 20 minutes or until shrimp (if uncooked and fresh) turn pink and stir to coat occasionally. Remove bay leaves and serve.

Note: I chose to serve these in individual cocktail glasses, but they can also be put out "en masse" in chafing dishes for people to serve themselves for large groups. This recipe should provide about 10 appetizer servings. Garnish with fresh lemon slices and fresh rosemary.

Shrimp and Potato Salad Side

What you need:

Two medium potatoes, unpeeled Six cups water

Two pounds medium sized fresh shrimp

One half cup finely chopped green onions

Four stalks celery, finely chopped

Four large hard boiled eggs

One half cup mayonnaise

Two tablespoons prepared mustard

One fourth teaspoon salt

One half tablespoon pepper

One half teaspoon hot sauce

Lettuce leaves



What you do:

Cube potatoes, place in a sauce pan and add enough water to cover, bring to a boil over medium high heat. Cook six to seven minutes or until tender. Drain, place in a large bowl to cool. Bring six cups of water to a boil in a saucepan, add shrimp, and cook three to eight minutes or until shrimp turn pink. Drain shrimp, and rinse with cold water. Peel shrimp and devein. If necessary, you can use thawed frozen shrimp instead. Add shrimp, green onions and celery to the drained potatoes. Chop egg whites and add to shrimp mixture. Mash egg yolks. Stir in mayonnaise and mustard. Add mayonnaise, salt, pepper and hot sauce to shrimp mixture, tossing gently to coat. Cover and chill. Serve on lettuce leaves. You can add fresh fruit and or tomato wedges.

Serves six to eight.



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Finding Inspiration in Art

henever she has a free moment or whenever inspiration strikes, it's a safe bet 15-year-old Pell City native Hayden Tumlin can be found putting a pencil to paper in her sketchbook, using her artistic skills to bring drawings of ballerinas, flowers, birds and faces to life on the page.


Tumlin, a sophomore at Pell City High School, began drawing at an early age with one of her best friends, but as she grew older she decided to build upon this talent when she reached high school.

"I've drawn my whole life," Tumlin said.
"But seriously, like really trying to draw serious pictures, I've been doing this for about a year or so since I started Art I in ninth grade."

One of her more recent drawings of a soldier and American flag won second place in a state-level Beta Club competition.

Tumlin executed the portrait-style drawing in black-and-white, a medium she said she prefers unless the color palette adds flavor to the drawing. An example of Tumlin using flavor in her work is shown in her drawing featuring a girl with half her face covered in words combined to create a mask effect.

"It's easier to get the values





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than it is using color," Tumlin said. "The portrait I did with half the face, I felt it would better show the mask part of it if it were in better. It varies on the picture itself, but I mainly work with black-and-white."

Combined with her daily schoolwork and homework, as well as her hobbies of playing guitar, piano and singing, Tumlin admits it's hard to find time in the schedule for art outside of her art class.

"I do my schoolwork first of all," Tumlin said. "I try to get it done without interruptions so I can have time. In the summer, I don't really do anything but this. But during the school week, I normally find time for art on the weekends and as I'm getting ready to go to bed as sort of a way to wind down."

Michelle Tumlin, mother of Hayden and owner of Monkey Bizniss in Pell City, made it clear those weren't always the only times her daughter works on a piece of art.

"Sometimes inspiration will hit her at around 1 a.m.," she said.

The younger Tumlin agreed and said sometimes she's been up until 3 a.m. finishing a particular art project.

While she doesn't currently have anything on display at the Artscape Gallery in Pell City, Tumlin, a member of the Southern Cultural Arts Foundation, does have one of her clay pottery pieces she made in her art class currently on tour.

"In art, we had to go through different parts," Tumlin said. "I've had to do a sculpture and work with clay. We try to learn all different types of art, but once I get into AP Art, I'm able to do the type of art that's best for me."





A key factor in Tumlin's success, aside from her drive and passion for nearly anything she touches, is her ability to find the humor and positives in her failures, something that comes few and far between.

"I've had to make clay bowls and pots for art class," Tumlin said. "I think I made an owl once, but it didn't turn out right. It looked like a ball with a head."

Tumlin's mother disagreed with her daughter's assessment.

"I have it in my living room," she said. "I think it's fabulous. It's on display there for everyone to see. I thought he was a snowman."

Even if there's no true way to discern whether it's an owl, penguin or open to interpretation, Tumlin noted she was a better artist for having attempted it.

"It helps me figure out that I'm not the best at making animals, but it helped with shaping stuff and making sure there was even thickness. That helped me when it came to making bowls. Drawing is the best art form for me, and it's hard for me to transfer that into something that's three-dimensional."

Tumlin credited art teacher Kelly Whittington for being a positive mentor and helping her build on her artistic prowess.

"She's taught me how to do stuff more realistically and actually make it look more accurate based on looking at a picture and doing it," Tumlin said. "For one of my homework assignments, I did a drawing of Jensen Ackles,







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a character from Supernatural. I drew it from a picture and it looked pretty accurate to the actual picture. I learned this from her during that assignment and a couple other projects where we had to draw it from looking at a picture and making it look as realistic as possible. She's good for teaching skills and strategies. She's awesome."

Other influences in her art outside of her family include her taste in music.

"My portrait of birds and flowers was inspired by listening to the song "Resistance" by Muse," Tumlin said. "It helps me block out all the distractions. The song makes me think of a sci-fi movie and when I first started that picture, I wanted things in it to look a little less realistic. I wanted the roses to be brighter and I wanted the birds to look different from birds that I have seen before."

Even with a busy schedule, Tumlin finds time to help out at her mother's store by designing crosses and choosing scriptures for Christian-themed T-shirts.

"I wanted to buy the scripture tees, you know, like the ones you see in different boutiques that are really cutesy," her mother said. "With her being able to draw, I thought, 'Hayden, why don't you sit down, come up with your ideas

and use your favorite scriptures?' It just kind of happened that way. She drew them, and Teen Challenge prints them. I'm helping Teen Challenge and it's getting her work out."

One of the first shirt designs Tumlin drew, she said, was inspired by her grandmother who had recently had an aneurysm.

"I made this for her," Tumlin said, holding up the t-shirt.

"The scripture basically said to be strong and that God would be with her."

Tumlin hopes to apply the talents she's been learning to her future career goals after high school.

"For my career, I'm planning on being a graphic designer or a sound designer who will score music for movies," she said. "I've not yet decided which one it's going to be. Either way, I'll get to have a creative career, and I'll have time on the side to do whichever one I don't choose as a career."

Mother Tumlin praised her daughter for her well-rounded approach to everything in her life.

"She's a very deep child — an old soul," she said. "She's very busy and very talented. She's one cool kid."

Editor's Note: For a while, a regular feature in Lakeside Living was David Atchison's travelogue, Traveling the Coosa. An avid kayaker, David wrote of his experiences and the people he met during his expeditions on Logan Martin Lake and the Coosa River. Here is one of our favorite entries from the series, published in January, 2014.

I was so surprised when I paddled around the island and headed back up Rabbit Branch. When I first took my kayak into Rabbit Branch, I knew it was big. I just didn't realize how big.

I could not even imagine the paddling adventure that was ahead of me as I worked my way up the Rabbit Branch slough towards Lake Shore Drive. "Beautiful" and "peaceful" are a couple of words that came to my mind as I eased up the slough.

I began my latest winter adventure from River's Edge Marina. It was a cold and overcast day, but there was no freezing rain or wind to contend with while I was on the lake. During the wintertime, you really have to plan your trips around the weather. Of course it's going to be a little chilly, some days more so than others.

The seven-day forecast indicated rain was approaching for the following weekend, so I figured it was best to get my trip behind me on this particular Sunday afternoon.

I brought along the camera with the big telephoto lens on this trip, and I'm glad I did. As I pushed off from shore, I spotted this great big blue heron perched on a towering pole at the entrance to River's Edge Marina. Usually herons are a little skittish and fly off before I can get close enough for a good picture. This bird appeared to be standing guard at the entrance to the marina. It didn't budge.

Perhaps the heron was a "neighborhood" bird and was used to seeing people and boats passing back and forth, in and out of the marina. I was

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able to get close for a picture before it decided I was too nosey and flew away gawking.

I headed my kayak toward an island that was about a quarter-mile away. The water level on the lake was really low, which I like. The low winter water levels provide many camping opportunities, and I can get into really shallow water with my kayak.

This day, the water was glassy smooth as I made my way down Rabbit Branch. It was actually a good day to paddle on the lake, very restful. I went on around the island and headed northwest toward the back of a large slough.

Through my entire trip, I did not see another person on the lake. There are only a few people who brave the winter weather on Logan Martin Lake, mostly devoted fishermen.

The area of the lake I was paddling is much different than my more recent trips down Logan Martin Lake, part of



the Alabama Scenic River Trail. I was surrounded by rural farm land on this trip. The houses were fewer in number along the way, and I could hear cows mooing in the distance.

I noticed a road at the back of the slough, and I saw cars passing along the road every now and then. I tried to determine if the road was U.S. 231 or another road. I wasn't really sure. I found out later the street was actually Lake Shore Drive, which is off U.S. 231.

When I reached the back of the slough, I noticed a big metal tunnel running underneath the road. Just like the chicken, I was going to find out what was on the other side of the road, but instead of crossing it, I just paddled underneath the road.

The water inside the tunnel was really shallow. I scraped rocks as I went through. It would have been impossible for a boat to go through it. That's another good thing about kayaks. You can access areas that are impossible to get to by boat.

On the other side of the tunnel, I was surprised to see horses. Lots of horses. That was the last thing I thought I would see when I started this trip.

Despite looking around from my kayak, I still did not know where I was, so when I got back to the marina, I loaded up the kayak and turned south on U.S. 231. It wasn't long before I saw Lake Shore Drive and realized that was the road I had traveled underneath.

I remembered Martin Bryant, who I taught to roll a whitewater kayak, said something about living on a farm on or around Lake Shore Drive, so I called his mother, Christa. Funny, I had passed right by their lake home, but like I am always saying, you never know who or what you are going to see on the lake.

"You don't see a lot of farm land on the lake. We have the best of both worlds," she said, adding that she can look out their front door and see a big, beautiful farm. From their back





porch deck, they enjoy a beautiful view of the lake. How neat is that?

I worked with both of Christa's children, Martin and Meredith, teaching them how to roll a whitewater kayak. They were both excellent students, and Martin actually made his first whitewater kayaking trip down the Coosa River near Wetumpka with me. He successfully paddled his first Class 3 rapid, which is named Moccasin Gap.

The Bryants have a true working farm, and I know Martin is really interested in farming. He talked quite a bit about his love for farming when we kayaked together. The family has 50 head of cattle, 15 pigs, and they raise chickens during the spring and summer on their 100 acre farm. "We have goats too," Christa said.

Well, I guess I got a little taste of the country on my paddle trip, and I can't wait to find out what other adventures lie ahead as I travel on down Logan Martin Lake. So until then, have a safe and wonderful time on the lake.



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


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

Conspiration Abounds



She finds the setting conducive to creativity.





"Perfect for the Lake"

Lincoln artist loves her little house by the Water

t was shortly after 1 p.m., and an impressionistic canvas painting of six brightly colored birds sat almost completed on an easel in Karla Conway's art studio that separates her living and dining rooms.

"I started that this morning," the lakeside artist said, as if it required no more skill or talent than making a peanut butter sandwich.

Conway began painting five years ago when she accompanied her husband, who "had painted most of his life," to a class at Artscape Gallery in Pell City. "He just wanted to try to get back into it. It looked like fun, so I went with him. After that class, I bought a bargain pack of canvases and painted straight through them."

Now she decorates her Lincoln home – "it's an A-frame built in the early 70s, perfect for the lake" -- with her art, her late husband's, and friends she's made in the local arts community.

"About everything decorative in here was made by someone local, a friend or a family member," she said, peeling red paint from her right hand even as her left was streaked with purple and white. "Sometimes that overlaps. It's nice to be able to have things that are one of a kind, handmade, and had loving care go into their making."

Conway creates her art at the two unfinished wooden tables covered with easels, tubes of acrylic paint and containers of brushes that comprise her



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studio.

"You can see why I wanted to do my painting in here," she said gesturing toward the full-length windows affording a view of her wooded back yard and the water. "The lighting is so much better in here. Plus, I'll do it if it's out right here in the middle of everything."


That isn't to say there's no distinction between art space and living space.

"Mail doesn't get placed on the art table," she said. "Paint and brushes don't get placed on the dining room table, for obvious reasons. A little bit of organization works well."

The director of resource development for Presbyterian Home for Children in Talladega, Conway describes her artistic style as "impressionistic, and I think the word is 'paintedly,' which means that you see the brush strokes. The artist doesn't try to hide them." She has incorporated elements of Russian Impressionism into her works, particularly the style's vivid colors and strong lighting.

subject. "I don't know why. Maybe it's because birds lend themselves to bright colors. They have personalities. Their faces can be very quizzical and expressive. I paint mostly from photos

- I'd love to learn to paint from real life

- and when I look for photos to paint from, I like finding ones

with birds looking at the camera."

While Conway said she enjoys being able to observe the lakeside fauna from the vantage point of her living room and art studio, sometimes it gets too close for comfort. Birds sometimes gain access to her screened deck and can't get back out, and a squir-

rel once climbed down the chimney, leading to a half-hour around-the-house chase. "I've almost decided to give up, open the doors, and put up a sign that says 'wildlife refuge.'"

Still, there's not much for which

she'd trade life in her little house on the lake.

"It's actu-

ally getting hard to find a small house on the lake," she said. "At least that was our experience when we were shopping nine years ago. We had the big house, and I don't want to do that again, but if you want to retire on the lake, finding a smaller place may not be as easy as you think."

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
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great social elements as well.
