'll keep the intro short and sweet. High school football is back, and we're here to separate the contenders, pretenders, and those straddling the fence of punching their ticket to the postseason.

Where does your favorite team lie?

ALEXANDRIA

The Valley Cubs bounced back in a big way last season. After going 1-9 in 2023, Alexandria improved to 8-4. The Valley Cubs shocked Class 4A, Region 8 champion North Jackson in the first round of the playoffs before falling to Brooks in the second round.

Alexandria should be even better this year. Junior Cole Wheeler enters his third season as the Valley Cubs' starting quarterback, and he'll have plenty of weapons around him. Sophomore MJ Morris and junior Evan White give Wheeler a pair of dynamic wide receivers, and junior JJ Beason can do a little bit of everything.

Alexandria no longer has a young team, and the Valley Cubs will prove it under the lights at Lou Scales Stadium.

VERDICT: CONTENDER

ANNISTON

After starting the 2024 season 2-4, the Bulldogs righted the ship during the second half and did some damage in the Class 4A state playoffs, blowing out Randolph and Good Hope before falling to West Morgan in the quarterfinals.

Anniston finished with a 7-6 record, but head coach Rico Jackson expects more consistency from the Bulldogs this season. They should have an explosive offense with quarterback Damon Pope, running back Jabari Williams and wide receiver Jakorie Carr leading the way. On defense, Anniston returns all-state performers Charles Thomas and Elijah

The Bulldogs are loaded with talent on both sides of the ball, and they'll be looking to make a deep postseason run.

VERDICT: CONTENDER

CLEBURNE COUNTY

The Tigers struggled in their first season under head coach Vaughn Lee, who was tasked with replacing 20 seniors from Cleburne County's 2023 squad. With a roster consisting of only two seniors, an

inexperienced group stumbled to a 1-9 record.

Those kids are now a year older, and they're bigger and stronger. After gaining valuable experience during a difficult season, Cleburne County should be better, but it will still be an uphill battle to qualify for postseason play.

VERDICT: PRETENDER

DONOHO

The Falcons struggled out of the gate a year ago under first-year head coach

Bill Smith. Donoho lost five of its first six games but turned the corner after a four-game gauntlet against Pleasant Valley, Wadley, Winterboro and Ohatchee. The Falcons won their last four games to make the Class 1A state playoffs.

Donoho must replace some quality seniors from that team, including Alabama Sports Writers Association Class 1A lineman of the year Hayes Farrell. The Falcons will need sophomore

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quarterback Luke Farrell, who started on the offensive line a year ago, to step up if they want to make the playoffs again.

VERDICT: ON THE FENCE

HOPE CHRISTIAN

In its first year to field a football team, Hope Christian will be led by head coach Chris Stone. The Saints will play in the Alabama Independent School Association and have eight regular season games scheduled for 2025. Stone says Hope Christian has 26 players on the varsity roster, and some of the names may sound familiar. Quarterback Kainen Bozeman transferred from Oxford, running back Nick Morrow from Wellborn and offensive tackle Caden Marturello from Piedmont. They'll be counted on to set the foundation for the Saints' program.

Hope Christian will attempt to make some noise in 2025, but some first-year growing pains should be expected.

VERDICT: PRETENDER

JACKSONVILLE

A lot has changed in Jacksonville since the last time the Golden Eagles took the field. After longtime head coach Clint Smith took the White Plains job, Jacksonville hired former Jacksonville State offensive lineman Jeremy Sullivan to lead the program. Sullivan spent the previous eight seasons as the head coach at Boaz, where his teams went 44-45.

The Golden Eagles moved up to Class 5A a year ago and snuck into the playoffs as the No. 4 seed out of Region 6, which includes powerhouses Moody and Leeds. Jacksonville has made the playoffs 12 straight seasons, and how the Golden Eagles adjust to Sullivan's coaching will likely determine whether they can extend that streak to 13.

VERDICT: ON THE FENCE

JACKSONVILLE CHRISTIAN

The Thunder won the Alabama
Christian Football Association 8-man
championship a year ago. That team
lost a decent amount of talent, including
wide receiver Jesse Gannaway, but
JCA still has senior quarterback Noah
Lee, a three-star prospect who recently
committed to Jacksonville State. With a
talent like Lee under center, the Thunder
has a chance to repeat.

VERDICT: CONTENDER

OHATCHEE

With quarterback Jake Roberson, wide receivers Colby Hester and Brayden Collins and running back Jayden Heard leading the way, the Indians averaged just under 43 points a game last year. All of those guys are now gone, and Ohatchee is expected to go back to a ground-and-pound approach under new head coach Blake Jennings.

The Indians won their final three regular-season games last year to sneak into the playoffs as the No. 4 seed out of a stacked Class 3A, Region 6. Ohatchee has to replace a lot of star power, but if things break the right way, the Indians should have a shot to sneak into the playoffs again.

VERDICT: ON THE FENCE

OXFORD

The Yellow Jackets have plenty of star power returning in linebacker Keenan Britt, wide receiver Jaylin Taylor and running back Caleb Wynn. Those three helped Oxford win its first 13 games a year ago before the Yellow Jackets ran into eventual Class 6A state champion Parker in the semifinals.

Oxford will have to rely on some inexperienced players this year, including sophomore Maddox Mims, who takes over at quarterback for his older brother, Mason Mims, who is now playing for Louisville. Expect the Yellow Jackets to get better as the season progresses and be playing their best ball headed into the playoffs.

VERDICT: CONTENDER

PIEDMONT

The Bulldogs looked like themselves again last season, winning their first 13 games of the season before falling to Mars Hill in the semifinals of the Class 3A playoffs. Wide receiver Rollie Pinto, who committed to Jacksonville State this summer, returns after setting the AHSAA single-season record with 1,826 receiving yards. He'll be catching passes from new quarterback Cole Austin, who looked capable during limited action last season.

Austin, a sophomore, is more of a dual-threat than former quarterback Cole Wilson. He'll pair with Saks

transfer Nick Mixson to improve Piedmont's run game.

The Bulldogs look poised for another deep postseason run.

VERDICT: CONTENDER

PLEASANT VALLEY

The Raiders made history last season when they finished second in Class 2A, Region 7 and hosted a playoff game for the first time in 40 years. Pleasant Valley finished with an 8-3 record, which matched the 1984 team for best record in school history, despite having to deal with the adversity of having to change quarterbacks early in the season after Braxton Salster injured his hand. Salster soldiered on, helping out in any way he could, while Jaden Sparks took over behind center.

With Salster back at quarterback and Sparks returning to what he knows best, the Raiders are filled with optimism. They've set a goal of going 10-0 during the regular season, and it's not an unrealistic one. It's also not unrealistic to expect this group to win its first playoff game in school history.

VERDICT: CONTENDER

RANBURNE

Ranburne managed two Class 2A, Region 4 wins a year ago, which was good enough to finish in fifth place, but the Bulldogs missed the playoffs for the third straight season. Ranburne started strong, winning three of its first five games, but the Bulldogs ran out of steam. They allowed 220 points to close out the season on a five-game losing streak. The 363 points they allowed were the most in school history.

The Bulldogs will need to shore up their defense if they want to return to postseason play.

VERDICT: PRETENDER

SAKS

The Wildcats have fallen on hard times since the departure of Jonathan Miller, managing just three wins over the last two seasons. Veteran head coach Shannon Felder has taken over the football program, but numbers are down significantly, with Felder reporting that Saks had just 18 varsity players on the roster at the end of July. That's something that Felder has dealt with in the past when he led Class 1A Donoho to a 67-54 record during his 11 seasons there

The Wildcats have the right man to build the program back up, but it might take some time.

VERDICT: PRETENDER

SPRING GARDEN

Normally, when a 1A team loses 12 impactful seniors, the cupboard is left barren. That shouldn't be the case for Spring Garden under third-year head

coach Barrett Ragsdale. The Panthers have developed a winning culture under Ragsdale and former head coach Jason Howard, having claimed region titles in six of the last seven seasons.

After losing five all-state performers from a year ago, another region title may be a longshot, but Spring Garden should find itself back in the playoffs for the 12th straight season.

VERDICT: CONTENDER

WEAVER

Weaver must replace track stars Kaden Gooden and KeShawn Allen, but the Bearcats turned a corner last year under head coach Ken Cofer. After starting 0-5, Weaver was a different team down the stretch, closing out the regular season by winning four of its last five games to make the playoffs for the first time since 2018. The most impressive result during that stretch may have been a 26-21 loss to eventual Class 3A semifinalist Piedmont.

Cofer won't be working with the same level of talent, but if the culture he created carries over, Weaver will be a dangerous team to face week in and week out.

VERDICT: ON THE FENCE

WELLBORN

When a proven veteran like Jeff Smith says something, ears tend to perk up. Smith, who is entering his 29th year as a head football coach and his 17th at Wellborn, said this Panthers' team reminds him of the 2018 squad that went 5-5. That was just the setup for a phenomenal 2019 run that saw Wellborn advance to the Class 3A state semifinals.

Wellborn may once again be one year away, but the Panthers' will still play the same hard-nosed football they always have under Smith.

VERDICT: ON THE FENCE

WHITE PLAINS

What do you do when you haven't made the playoffs since 1994? You bring in a proven winner who has built a career turning around struggling football programs. Clint Smith, who has

won 143 games during a 20-year career coaching at Saks and Jacksonville, is the right man for the job.

He knows how to build it, but expecting immediate success in a loaded Class 4A, Region 6, may be too much to ask.

lexandria head coach Todd Ginn calls junior quarterback Cole Wheeler "our kind of guy."

That means being physical, gritty and having a love for the Orange and Black.

Wheeler, whose dad was a threesport athlete at Alexandria, has proven he possesses all three of those characteristics during his first seasons as the Valley Cubs' starting QB.

Wheeler has been through the ups and downs. As a freshman, he quarterbacked a team that finished 1-9. But Alexandria bounced back a year ago, going 8-4 and advancing to the second round of the Class 4A state playoffs before losing to Brooks 41-35.

The Valley Cubs return a physical group up front and plenty of talent around Wheeler at the skill positions with athlete J.J. Beason and wide receivers MJ Morris and Evan White.

The expectations are high this season with Ginn saying, "I feel like we're back to being what Alexandria is all about.

Wheeler recently spoke to The Anniston Star about what it means to be a Valley Cub and what goals his team has for the upcoming season.

QUESTION: What does it mean to you to wear the Orange and Black on Friday nights?

ANSWER: My dad went here. He played all three sports. He was big into it. He just taught me, just loving Alexandria, and just Alexandria. Nobody is thinking about moving. Nobody wants to move. There ain't no better place to be. The coaches are great. I love all our coaches. They really just teach us

everything about being a man, about being a good football player.

: You mentioned the coaches. What's your favorite thing about playing for Coach Ginn?

: His intensity and his excitement and how he just pushes us to be better. We couldn't be anywhere near as good as we are without him.

: You guys got back in the playoffs last year. What do you need to do to keep that momentum going?

: Keep working hard and keep executing and just win games. Win the big games. Win the close games. Brooks was a heartbreaker last year. ... I threw a pick late in the game that really hurt us. It ain't going to happen again this year.

: Has that loss been motivation for you guys?

: Oh, definitely, big time. It's always on our mind in the weight room. It's all we're thinking about.

: What are the team's goals this year?

: Win state. We're shooting for the end. We think we can get there. We know we can get there. We're just working hard to get there.

: What would you say the strength of this team is?

: Up front and our tenacity and just our ferociousness. People are going to be scared of us.

abari Williams says he grew up watching highlights of former Detroit Lions running back Barry Sanders, so it's no surprise that he's set a goal of 2,000 rushing yards for his senior season at Anniston.

Williams, who transferred from Wellborn to Anniston ahead of his junior season, has quickly become a leader for the Bulldogs.

Head coach Rico Jackson's team entered last season with a young roster. The Bulldogs suffered through some early growing pains before closing strong, advancing all the way to the quarterfinals of the Class 4A state playoffs.

Anniston returns a lot of key pieces from that team, so confidence is high.

Williams recently spoke with The Anniston Star about the upcoming season and what he and his team hope to accomplish.

QUESTION: You guys started last season 2-4. I know you guys had a young team. What did you guys learn during those first few games?

: Y'all made it to the quarterfinals of the playoffs before losing to West Morgan. Has that loss motivated you guys in the offseason?

: It did. It did wonders. We were All pretty devastated after we lost. A lot of our seniors were upset. I'm not going to say any names, but some people were crying. Obviously so, it's their senior season, they lost in a big game that we could've won. In the offseason, we kind of looked back on that and had to learn from that, and we've been putting forth the effort and all the work into our practices and our workouts. It did a lot.

: What are the team's goals for this season?

: Win our region, you know, state Championship. But, the big thing, we've got to take it one step at a time. We want to win every game. Matter of fact, we know we're gonna win every game. We're winning every game that's in front of us if we just take it one step at a time.

: Individual goals. Coach Jackson Said 2,000 yards. Is that what

: That's always been my dream. I've always wanted to get 2,000 yards. My sophomore year, I was pretty close. I think I had 1,700 yards, but I'm going to break that. I'm going to get 2,000. I've got to.

: I know you played at Wellborn Selection of the Anniston. Do you feel more comfortable at Anniston this year than you did last year?

: Most definitely. When I first got there, it was a learning curve. It was a completely different offense, you know, different schemes, so I just had to adjust, had to acclimate and just learn. And coach made it easy on me. He gave



n his first season as Cleburne County's head coach, Vaughn Lee had his work cut out for him.

Lee, who previously served as Cleburne County's offensive coordinator for 20 years, took over a team gutted by graduation. The Tigers needed to replace 20 seniors from a playoff team that finished the 2023 season with a 4-7

obody can say Donoho football coach Bill Smith doesn't think outside the box. Or, in his case this season, outside the backfield.

With Kai Cleckler graduating, Smith needed a new starting quarterback, and instead of searching through the other skill position players for a new man behind center, Smith has picked offensive guard Luke Ferrell, a sophomore.

A: Actually, two days ago we did a drill for the lineman. Everybody



He recently spoke with The Anniston Star about his expectations for the upcoming season.

QUESTION: To me, you seem a lot bigger this year. Is that accurate?

: What are the goals your team has for the regular season?

I think we need to respect everybody going into it. No team is worse than the others. No team is better than the others. They're just another team on a Friday night that we've got to prepare for.






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


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
