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



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You Ain't Seen Nothin' Yet

One of the most significant stories to come out of Pell City – the Gateway to Logan Martin Lake – this year has been the Center for Education and Performing Arts (CEPA).

Jeff Thompson, the center's executive director, arrived at CEPA in May with an energy and vision that have raised its profile in the community and beyond and taken steps toward upgrading its facilities and operations while producing a well-received (and that's understating it) fall season.

Thompson scored a major coup during the summer by arranging for something locals had long requested: an appearance on the CEPA stage by the Alabama Symphony Orchestra. That performance was the second event on the fall season calendar, following *A Magical Evening* (which featured the Magic City Magic Club and local magician Brian Reaves) and preceding a Confederate Railroad concert.

But it was the season's concluding event, *Voices of St. Clair* (a tribute to local talent and the heritage of a county and its people), that most underscores CEPA's place in the lakeside community.

"We might be as excited about that final event as we were about the first three combined," Thompson said. "*Voices of St. Clair* was an opportunity to showcase our connection to residents beyond the borders of Pell City. It is our mission to grow this event into a county-wide celebration of local history, story, songs and art year over year."

It's a big first step toward one of the goals he set upon taking the helm of CEPA, a theater-sports area combination under one roof on the campus of Pell City High School.

"We want the story of CEPA to be connected to the story of Pell City and St. Clair County," he said. "We have a tremendous asset here, and we want people to see it as more than just a gym and performance hall. We want everyone to see the potential that Pell City, the County Commission, the city of Riverside and a lot of other people from across St. Clair County saw when they put money into this center more than a decade ago: a showpiece for the entire area."

Modestly, Thompson recognizes he's not making it happen alone.

"If you had fun at *A Magical Evening*, Alabama Symphony Orchestra or Confederate Railroad, you should know that the credit goes to the collective, the people of St. Clair County and Pell City," he said. "What I mean is, if you enjoyed the shows, you should know this is a team of brilliant people who put it together, people who stepped up to help because they see the value in what we're trying to do with the fall season and beyond. If there is a perfect recipe, it's pretty simple. Add investment, effort and talent. Then mix. Mix thoroughly."




Local waters offer many sport fish

Fishing is most effective when a specific species is targeted. Bream, bass and catfish are among the common sport fish found in local waters.

Bream (or "brim") is a term used for both bluegill and other members of the sunfish family. Bream are deep bodied fish that feed primarily on insects, often feeding all day. Anglers can keep up to 50 bream in most public waters.

In the same family as bream, largemouth bass is the state freshwater fish. Also in this popular group are smallmouth bass, spotted bass, redeye bass and shoal bass. Bass are mostly a shade of green or brown and are found in all but the smallest creeks. They hide and feed near obstructions and structure. Bass see well in low light conditions, so fishing is best at dawn and dusk.

Catfish are easily identified by their "whiskers". They feed on insects when small and switch to fish as they grow larger, feeding well after a rain or at night. A good location for catching them is below a dam. Except in state lakes, there are no legal limits for numbers of catfish.

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'Will Buy Old Fishing Lures'

Lincoln angler owns vintage tackle collection


David Houston of Lincoln is an avid fisherman with an interesting hobby. He collects and sells old fishing lures. Over the years, he has gained considerable knowledge of the collectible items, which has even reeled in some extra cash for him.

While certain vintage and antique fishing lures can sell for hundreds of dollars, Lincoln describes the feeling of nostalgia that comes with holding one in your hand as priceless.

"I go to a few collectors' shows, and almost every guy I talk to has fished his whole life," he said. "Part of it is remembering the lures your dad had or your granddad had, and wanting to have a piece of that memory."

Houston collects Arbo-Gasters and is especially interested in the Hawaiian Wiggler. "Those are the ones I remember growing up with," he said.

The value of a fishing lure depends largely on its rarity and overall

condition.

“Some of them can be very high-dollar. I had two that were very rare. One of them was a Jitterbug that was a special order color. There were only two others known in the collecting world. I got it from an elderly uncle when he gave me his a tackle box before he passed away.”

At that time, Houston didn’t know what he had.

“I started making lure stands out of balsa wood to display some of that tackle,” he said. “I wanted to sell the stands on eBay because I didn’t see anything like that on there. So I put this Jitterbug on the stand, and the starting bidding price was \$1.99. Within two days, the bidding price went up to \$402. I knew I had something, so I withdrew the auction. I wound up selling it to a friend in

Illinois who needed that one for his collection.”

When Houston started his own collection, he quickly learned a thing or two about the market.

“Lures are like anything else, the market goes up and down. I found one in a chicken house in Bowden, Georgia. I had an offer of \$1,200 for it. I wound up selling it to someone for \$800. When I got the first offer, I wasn’t ready to sell. Then, when I was ready, the market price had gone down.”

And he learned what buyers want. “Most buyers want it original, the way you found it. They don’t even want you to clean it, because you could really mess it up by trying to clean it.”

Even a small touch-up could be a big mistake.

“If you have a spot where the paint has flaked off and you touch it up, it completely kills the value of the lure. Condition is everything. Just like anything you collect, for it to have value, it has to almost be flawless. You go from ‘good’ to ‘very good’ to ‘excellent’ to ‘mint,’ and mint condition would be in the box. As far as rarity, the scale goes from one to 10, with 10 being really rare. Most of these I have are an eight or a nine.”

Some time ago, Houston put signs out along some popular roads around Logan Martin Lake to advertise that he would buy old lures.

“I’m surprised those signs are still up, but I still get calls,” he said. “I


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have a lot of people call with whole tackle boxes full of stuff, and I'll buy it if I can afford it. I buy a lot of lures that I don't collect to hopefully sell and make money to buy lures that I do collect."

Sometimes people call him to fish for information about a lure they have found or inherited. "I have a lot of people who call me to come look and see what they have. I enjoy looking at old lures. I'm not an expert, but I have contacts."

Houston sells his lures on eBay and Joe's Old Lures, a website for antique fishing lure collectors. "At joesoldlures.com, there is a message board, and you can post pictures of lures you have and get feedback from



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the community almost immediately.”

According to Houston, some of his lures will be included in an upcoming book about Arbo-Gasters and Hula Poppers. He owns one lure that was never produced for the mass market. “The blue Arbo-Gaster was a field test model. The guy I bought it from had four, so there were only three left, and I know where one of them is. So that leaves two out there. It’s really rare.”

Houston is also a talented wood carver, and he created a personal collection of novelty fishing lures just for the fun of it. “I don’t make them to fish with. I just have a weird sense of humor. It’s a fun hobby.”

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
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Student angler loves fishing on Logan Martin

Teems seeks bass scholarship, helps form scholastic fishing team

Handler Teems doesn't mind getting up early if it means spending the morning on the lake.

"You're out there in the morning, and it's all about the fishing," the senior student athlete at Leeds High School said. "It's quiet, you're out there by yourself

watching the sun come up and being a part of nature. Fishing takes my stress away, and there's nothing better than that."

But that's when he's fishing for fun.

"Competitive fishing is different. Don't get me wrong – it's still fun, but things get intense during a tournament. If I come in and haven't had a good day, I'm not too happy."


Whether it's on the lake, on the gridiron or on the wrestling mat, Teems has competition in his blood. Having started fishing at age 4 ("ever since I was old enough to throw it out and reel it back in"), he's

spent many recent Tuesday and Thursday evenings in tournaments on Logan Martin, and he's helping organize the first-ever bass fishing team at Leeds High, where he plays receiver, safety "and a little bit of outside linebacker" for the defending state champion Green Wave.

"Fishing is hard this time of year, since it's football season," he said. "I'm football all the way, totally committed to it, but I still get the fishing in. Sometimes I'll have all my stuff ready on Thursday night, go to sleep as soon as I get home after the game Friday night, wake up at a ridiculous hour – 2:45 or 3 a.m. – and go fishing."

According to Lee Gibson, the Green Wave's new head

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football coach, principal Brent Shaw proposed the idea of putting together a bass fishing team. “A lot of colleges have them now, so it’s an opportunity for kids to get some scholarships,” the coach said. “We have a lot of interest in it here, the kids are excited about it, and we’ll be putting the team together once football season is over so we can make the spring tournaments.”

Gibson said Teems wasted no time in getting involved with the team. “He’s a great kid. He has committed to being a leader on the football team, and he lives up to that. Fishing is important to him too, so we’re going to make that work.”

In between football season and spring fishing, Teems hopes to return to the state wrestling finals. He was Class 4A runner-up in the 138-pound weight class last year, helping Leeds win the state team title, and “it’d be really awesome if I could go all the way my senior year.”

Nor would he mind returning with his Green Wave teammates to the state football championship. He was a member

of Leeds’ championship teams in 2014 and 2015 and its state runner-up team in 2013. Before that, he served as a ball boy during Leeds’ 2008 and 2010 championship seasons.

Despite his love for competition and winning, Teems said he still enjoys fishing just for fun. “I always have enjoyed just being out on the water, and I learn something new every time I go. I like fishing at Clear Creek Harbor and Lakeside Landing. Logan Martin is one of the best lakes I know – maybe the best. I’ve been fishing on it since I was little, so I know it pretty well. The only way anybody beats me there is if I just have a bad day.”

Looking ahead, the teen angler is seeking a scholarship toward the goal of competitive fishing at

college and beyond. “I’ve been recruited for football too, so I would do both if I could. I don’t know if any schools are interested in that, though.”

Given his choice, he’d prefer to be a member of the Auburn University Bass Fishing Team. “They’re number three in the country right now, and I’m a big fan of Jordan Lee and Matt Lee. They’re brothers, they’re from Alabama, they went to Auburn and they both won national championships. They’re pretty raw.”

Hoping to follow the Lees’ example, Teems hasn’t given up on the “dream you have when you’re a little kid of being a professional fisherman one day. I hope I’m on the right road to becoming one. Who knows what can happen?” 

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
Remember the history, enjoy the food

Delicious and healthy recipes make for a happy holiday

Thanksgiving is an important day. As we gather by the lake with family and friends to eat our turkey and give thanks for the many incredible blessings we have received, I hope we all will remember the history of the observance as we share the stories we know while not hiding from our past.

In addition to its historical significance, it's a time for being with those we love and enjoying good food. Here are some recipes that are sure to make this year's holiday table memorable, from a savory way to start Thanksgiving morning to tasty side dishes that will pair well with the turkey to a comforting dessert, and even a seasonally-appropriate cocktail.



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MORNING SAUSAGE BREAD

As a little girl, I remember waking up at my grandmother's home at the holidays to the smell of this amazing morning sausage bread. It's simple to make and sure to please even the pickiest of eaters. I don't cook with wheat very often, but this childhood recipe is absolutely perfect the way my grandmother makes it.

- 1 loaf frozen white bread dough
(Rhodes is the brand my grandmother uses.)
- 1/2 lb. pork breakfast sausage
- 1 1/2 cup whole fat shredded mozzarella cheese

Allow frozen bread dough to rise according to package directions. Using a rolling pin, roll out the dough onto a flat and floured surface.

Cook sausage according to package directions. Sprinkle the cooked sausage onto one edge of the dough. Sprinkle mozzarella cheese on top of the cooked sausage. Roll the bread dough tightly around the meat and cheese, forming it into a log shape.

Place onto a baking sheet lined with parchment paper and lightly floured. Bake in a 350° oven for 25-30 minutes or until the crust becomes golden brown.

THREE SISTERS

This is a traditional recipe of Native American tribes that lived in what is now central and east Alabama. Three Sisters has a beautiful culinary history. Its ingredients were planted in such a way that they were all interdependent on one another. Beans were planted next to corn, growing up the stalks and adding nutrients. Squash was planted in between to keep weeds out. How amazing that these foods grew in a way that supported one another, and you can use these ingredients in a simple

and delicious way to add to your Thanksgiving dinner.

- 1 small butternut squash, peeled and diced
- 1 cup fresh green beans
- 1 can whole kernel corn ("I prefer organic.")
- 1 sprinkle sage
- 1 sprinkle salt
- 1 sprinkle pepper
- 1 tbsp. extra virgin olive oil



Mix diced butternut squash and green beans. Toss them in the olive oil until fully coated. Place them onto a cookie sheet and sprinkle with salt, pepper and sage.

Bake at 350 degrees for 20 minutes. Remove the beans and squash from the oven and sprinkle the corn on top. Bake an additional 5 minutes.

SPICY MUSTARD GREENS CHIPS

This is the time of year when mustard greens are thriving in the garden. This recipe is a simple way to prepare them in a different way than the usual braised greens you may be used to.

- 1 full bunch mustard greens
- 2 tbsp. extra virgin olive oil
- 1 pinch salt
- 1 pinch red pepper
- 1 pinch turmeric powder
- 1 pinch black pepper





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Gather the greens. Be sure they are washed and thoroughly dried. Toss in the olive oil until they are fully coated. Sprinkle salt, cayenne, pepper, and turmeric.

Place on a baking sheet that is lined with parchment paper. Cook at 300 degrees for 15 minutes or until crispy.



FIRE CIDER

When I was a little girl, my mom and I would go shopping at the holidays. I distinctly remember the smell of cinnamon being in each store. Sometimes the stores would have hot apple cider to sip as you shopped. Those were my favorite. The taste and smell of spicy cider brings me back to those amazing times.

I first tried this drink at a friend's wedding and completely fell in love with it. The crisp taste of apples and the hint of cinnamon will have you in a festive mood right away.

1 1/2 oz. Fireball cinnamon whiskey

1/2 bottle hard cider

1 cinnamon stick (to garnish and add spice)

Add ingredients in a glass and taste the good cheer!

GRANDMA'S BUTTERMILK PIE

Holidays are a time for family, friends and pies.

In my childhood home, the smell of pie in the oven was a sign that fall was here and winter was coming soon, and it's always a terrific way to conclude a Thanksgiving feast.

Especially when it's my Great-Great-Grandmother Todd's Buttermilk Pie.

When I was a little girl, my mom won a blue ribbon at the county fair for this pie. It's that good! Making it myself, I decided to clean it up a bit by choosing whole fat grass-fed buttermilk, grass-fed butter and coconut sugar. The results were amazing.

This pie is a mix between pie and custard. The rich flavor of buttermilk combined with the sweetness of the coconut sugar make for a warm and welcoming Thanksgiving dessert that everyone will love.



1 1/4 cup coconut sugar

(use up to 1 1/2 cups for a sweeter pie)

3 pastured eggs

1 pinch salt (preferably pink salt)

1 tbsp. vanilla extract

6 tbsp. grass-fed buttermilk

6 tbsp. melted grass-fed butter

1 uncooked pie shell

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Whisk eggs, butter, vanilla, sugar and salt until completely combined. Slowly add buttermilk 1 tablespoon at a time.

Pour all ingredients into an uncooked pie shell. Bake at 350 for 45 minutes. Allow to cool at least 20 minutes.

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

Pell City couple enjoys the tranquility of Logan Martin lake life

Bob and Dianne DeShazer's home on Cove Drive in Mays Bend is a marvelous mix of natural elements and vibrant, contemporary artwork.

The exterior of the light brown lakefront house features natural wood shutters on each side of the front windows. The shutters coordinate with the front door, and the home is

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surrounded by plenty of hardwood trees, sturdy stone pathways and greenery.

Inside the living area, a collection of striking glass artwork,



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pottery, metal sculptures and other posh pieces are displayed with great panache. A custom metal sculpture in primary colors hangs high on one wall, and painted fabric is displayed on another. Glass shelving holds a shiny ensemble of glazed pottery and fused glass pieces. The display reflects light from overhead cable lights installed on the exposed beams of a vaulted ceiling. "Primarily, we get our pieces from local



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art shows like the Magic City Art Connection in Linn Park, and we have bought a few pieces at galleries, but not many," Bob said.

Artwork created by Nettie Bean, Tom Black and Steve Smith adds verve and vivacity to the home. Bean creates mosaics, fused glass and stained glass pieces. Black is a painter from the Gadsden area

and Smith is best known for recycling wine bottles. One of his eye-catching red-and-orange designs hangs in the DeShazers' front hallway.

Throughout the home and its fully-furnished basement, playful pieces are mixed with practical pieces, and it all works together in a dynamic way. "We had no particular plan, we just got started because we had a house, and we needed to fill in the empty spots. I don't have any expertise. I just know what I like," Bob said.

"One of us will see something somewhere that attracts our attention, and we will bring the other in to look at it," Dianne added. "Gerald Ensley at Southern Manor Interiors really helps us to keep everything cohesive. He helps us put these pieces together in a way that works."

The house is less than 35,000 square feet. It was

built in 1986 and was remodeled in the mid-1990s. A new kitchen was built where the original deck was. The brushed steel top of the kitchen island is a work of art in itself. "It was just a plain laminate top, and we took it to a fabricator," Diane said. "They put a layer of steel on top of it and did the brush work." The swirly brush pattern is illuminated by cobalt blue drop lights.

They also added a sunroom that spans the length of the living room. It is a perfect place to view and appreciate nature's artwork. The room offers a gorgeous view of the water and surrounding trees.

"Winter is a whole different view," Bob said. "I don't think people appreciate the changing of the seasons as much when it's changing to winter, but I love it. The trees have dropped their leaves, and you can see the branching

and the different textures. There isn't any traffic on the water. It's nice and quiet. Fall is great, but winter gives you a whole new perspective."

The DeShazers also enjoy sitting on their back porch and drinking coffee. "The back porch is a special place. It's kind of like a tree house," Dianne said. The porch is home to Bob's tropical plants. He has had some of them for 50 years, and he enjoys tending to them.

Their basement has changed over the years to suit the needs of the family. At one time, it was a bedroom for their daughter, Claire Leverton, who recently joined Bob in his dental practice, DeShazer Leverton Family and

Cosmetic Dentistry. Today, Dianne claims it as her work area.

"I'm not crafty, but I do scrapbooks, and that's my work area. That's where I go when Bob goes to bed early. I may watch TV or read a book. It also gave us a place to put Bob's parents' furniture. There were several pieces that were sentimental to him, so we brought them here and incorporated them into the space," she said.

"We enjoy it here," Bob said. "The view is gorgeous. It's tranquil. We like the overall quality of life here and in Pell City, in general."

Q&A with Pell City's new chamber of commerce director

When visitors enter Pell City's municipal complex and look to their right, they're likely to see Kelsey Bain smiling back at them through the window from her desk in the Greater Pell City Chamber of Commerce's offices.

Having served as the chamber's executive assistant since earlier this year, Bain was appointed last month as its new executive director, following former director Lisa Gaither's acceptance of a new position in Florida.

"I'm really glad I already had several months of experience here. It's helped me a lot during the transition, and I know it will continue to help going forward," the 24-year-old Auburn alumna said, answering some questions about upcoming chamber events, goals and developments.

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degree from Auburn University and professional marketing experience. How will your education and training be an asset to the chamber?

The chamber is here to promote our community and our city and its businesses. That's marketing. So our goal is to market the city in ways that will make businesses want to come here. Each one has to be marketed in a different way, because we want all kinds of businesses here – small businesses, large industries and everything in between. I love the creative challenge of marketing. My mom says I was always making up my own commercials when I was little, so it's something I've been doing for a long time.

Is there untapped potential in Pell City?

Absolutely. Chambers in surrounding areas are flourishing, and with Pell City growing like it is, our potential here is so, so great. That's one of the things I'm most excited about: what's to come for the chamber

and what we'll be able to do.

This year, it was announced that a Buffalo Wild Wings restaurant and a bowling center and movie theater are in Pell City's future. How significant are those developments?

It's huge. What people don't realize is that it's more than just one restaurant and something to do coming to town. Once they open, it's going to attract other businesses and restaurants. In fact, we've already had representatives of new businesses come in and talk to developers. Pell City is in a great location with prime Atlanta-Birmingham traffic, and we're going to do as much as we can to get it off the interstate and get it in here.

How does Logan Martin Lake contribute to Pell City's potential?

I think it's one of the best things this city has to offer. It puts us a step above other cities. I've gotten spoiled



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
over the years by having it here. I can't imagine not living on the lake. When my friends from Auburn visit, they always say, "This is the coolest thing. You get to go to the lake any time you want." The lake brings all kinds of people together. You can drive up to Pirate Island and tie up next to people who are totally opposite from you, but you become friends. When you talk about it that way, who wouldn't want to move to this town?

Does the chamber have any specific plans involving the lake?

Well, there is something I've been thinking about. If you don't have a boat or a way to get a boat, it's hard to get out on the lake if you don't know someone who does. And if you go to other lakes, they have paddleboard, kayak and canoe rentals. I think that's something that could be tapped into. It would really be awesome to get someone in here to offer that.

What are your vision and goals for the chamber?

Well, I've only been on the job a short time, so I haven't been able to really sit down and



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map things out, but I'm looking forward to working with president-elect Larry Daugherty to get that done. I believe there are two of Larry, because he's everywhere, which is great for the chamber. I think we're going to be a great team, and I'm excited about moving forward.

It will soon be time for the annual Christmas parade. How are plans shaping up?

Great. You know, this is one of the chamber's biggest events of the year, and we're excited about it. It will be December 8 at 7 p.m. on Cogswell Avenue. This year's theme is Sailing Into Christmas, so we're encouraging trucks pulling boats and things like that. We also want some of the marinas to get involved.

The parade will be taking a different route this year. It will still start at the high school, but it will go straight down Highway 78 and end at the fire station

across from Avondale Park, so we won't have to close 231 down, plus it's the exact same length. Another thing that's different is there will be no horses this year. That's a decision the parade committee has made. The deadline for parade entries is December 1, so there's still time to be part of it. You can call me at 205-338-3377 for all the information.

Why do you love Pell City?

A lot of people don't get to experience a hometown family environment, and Pell City is definitely a place where you can find that. I didn't grow up here, but my mom did. She has deep roots in the community. With that in my background, I love the thought of being in a position to help make this city better. Having started my own family, my roots are planted here, and I can't wait to shake the hands of new people and show them why they should plant their families here. ✍

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

One of my favorite parts of the lake is the smells that come from people grilling out lakeside and stopping, visiting with friends, and sampling what they have.”

How she describes herself: “Outgoing and caring. I’m also very ambitious. I work extremely hard at everything in my life. Sometimes it means I stretch myself too thin. And I love animals and children.”

On being an educator: “There is no other job where you can have as much impact on the course of someone’s life. If you don’t love kids, you have no business becoming a teacher. There is a huge responsibility that comes with the work, and most educators view teaching as a calling. It’s in their blood.”

If she were stranded on the hypothetical desert island with one book, one meal and one piece of music: “My book choice would be very hard because I absolutely love to read. It would without a doubt be a piece of Southern literature, *Their Eyes Were Watching God* or *To Kill a Mockingbird*. One meal would be my mom’s ham, broccoli, cheese and macaroni casserole, which she will only make occasionally because she says it’s so much trouble. The music would be my go-to playlist on Spotify, which is a mixture of old school rap and Nineties hits.” 📌
