The stands are almost full, and people are still pouring in the gate.

Another half-hour, and the place will be rocking.

There's been something in the air all day, a kind of atmosphere and excitement that exists only one day each week for only a few weeks each year.

It first erupts by mid-afternoon during the tribal rite of a pep rally. The players are in their game jerseys, the cheerleaders are dancing on the gymnasium floor and a crowd of youngsters and teenagers demonstrate their school spirit – not to mention their appreciation for a chance to get out of class – with a deafening series of shrieks and screams.

Then the countdown begins.

As kickoff nears, there's just enough time to grab a quick bite on the run, at the risk of being late for the opening festivities.

And here we are, 6:30, Friday night, sitting on the 50-yard line looking at the field, the long green carpet that's seen its share of flags and whistles, touchdowns and injuries, and celebrations and consolations. Coaches, officials, managers, trainers, statisticians and photographers are already pacing it, making their final preparations.

Finally, it's time.

Cheerleaders hoist a huge paper sign depicting their team's mascot bludgeoning, pummeling, throttling, incinerating or perpetrating other bodily harm on the opposing team's mascot. The band lays down the opening notes of the fight song, and the music slices through the spectators like a stiletto.

The fans are on their feet. The anticipation is rising. Adrenaline is pumping, and everything explodes as the home team rips through the thin paper wall and takes the field. Within five minutes, summer unofficially ends with the opening kickoff, and the stadium is witness to at least two hours of the kind of guts and glory associated only with a community football game.

High school football. You can't beat it with a stick.

Young Silent Warriors team focuses on building character

With only two seniors returning in 2016, the Alabama School for the Deaf (ASD) football team has plenty of room to grow in Herminio Gonzalez's second season as head coach.

The Silent Warriors finished 3-5 last year, but Gonzalez said the youth movement has brought in players hungry for success.

"We have a very young team, but they've really impressed me this past spring," he said. "They've come to work out, and from last September all the way to the spring, they've shown a lot of motivation."

Junior quarterback Ke'Trez Holman leads ASD's shotgun double wing offense with six starters returning for the Silent Warriors, but Gonzalez said the starters the team lost -- running backs Eddie Thomas and Anthony

Scott and fullback Uriah Stallworth -- will be a challenge to replace.

"Those are very big shoes for our players to fill, but the work ethic this new team has shown is very impressive. They're very motivated, so I believe that we're going to really improve even though we're a young team. I've noticed the ability they have and the potential they've shown is amazing. They're faster this year than last year, but they're not going to be the size of an Anthony Scott. We've got a lot of freshman and sophomores. We're just going to have to build them up, and as they get older, I'm sure they'll get as big as he was in the future."

Holman also will play in ASD's 4-4 defense as part of a group returning seven starters.

"We have a very good linebacker coming back, Gabe Bridges," said Chris Moon, the team's defensive coordinator. "He's a very good player. E.J. Wilkins, we're looking forward to having him back, and Payton Stults. They're young, but they have a wonderful future."

Gonzalez added that he is excited about one of the team's eight sophomores, Angelo Simons – a lineman who will man the trenches on both sides of the ball.

"He's grown so much," Gonzalez said. "He was 255 pounds last year. Now, he's 299 pounds. We look forward to him being very productive on the defensive line and also at tackle. He's got great footwork."

The Silent Warriors' schedule features a mix of 11-on-11 and 8-on-8 matchups against deaf schools as well as matchups against hearing schools. Gonzalez said ASD won an 8-on-8 national championship in 2015.

"We expect it to be a tough schedule," he said. "Victory Christian is one of the

top schools we play. We're one of the smallest teams playing football, but we do have the ability to compete with teams like that. We have four deaf schools that we play against, and that really helps our kids and keeps our kids motivated. If we didn't have those, we'd lose motivation playing against the other schools."

Gonzalez, who coached at Florida School for the Deaf prior to taking the job with ASD, said he's looking forward to Oct. 22 when the Silent Warriors play host to the Dragons.

The coach added that he's not focused so much on the expectations for the team this season as he is on building the character of his young team.

"That'll take care of the wins," Gonzalez said. "I hope we win them all, but I'm focused on the character that's on the team and the teamwork so that they become leaders. Becoming a better team is more important, but I think we'll get four or more wins."



Tigers expect to do more in 2016 with smaller team

If B.B. Comer Memorial High School's football team expects to build on its 4-6 effort in 2015 -- its first year under head coach Mike Battles -- the Tigers will do so with a very condensed roster for the 2016 season.

Battles said his team would only have 20 players heading into its Week Zero jamboree with Autaugaville.

"The pluses and the minuses of that is that everybody that comes on our field knows they're going to get to play," he said. "They're going to play, and they're going to have to play. All my guys are ironmen. They play both sides of the football.

"We don't have a second team. We have next man up. If someone goes down, you're the next man. Get on out there. That's the way we do it."

He added his team had a good summer leading into fall camp.

"We're not really into 7-on-7," Battles said. "We're more into 11-on-11. So we've been around. We've had a bunch of 11-on-11 camps. We went to a lot of places, we got in there and we got better because our practices -- with the small number we have – we don't have much to scrimmage with. All our work has to be done individually.

"I know the number seems small, but if we had every boy in that school seventh through 12th grade at B.B. Comer, the same 20 would still be playing. That's the way it is. They're committed, and they're going to be there. We worked out, and we've worked hard this summer. I'm proud of them. They've done a good job."

When assessing his offense, Battles said his skill players have more experience than the offensive linemen.

"Last year, we only lost six seniors, but five of them were on the offensive line," Battles said. "We (also) lost Tyre McKinney, who I think in my opinion, he might've been the best tight end in the state of Alabama. He might not have been the best at receiving, but he's probably the best blocker you're ever going to see in a high school tight end."

Quarterback Alvin Burton returns to lead the offense alongside bruising fullback Corey Strickland as well as wide receiver Houston Ford, who competed with Burton for the quarterback spot during the offseason.

"We don't want to be a throwing football team," Battles said. "We want to be a passing football team. There's a lot of difference. Just throwing the ball doesn't make you a passer. To be a passer, you have to know where you're throwing the ball.

"The more you know, the easier it is to throw the football. I think Alvin is smart enough, and he's a good enough athlete. He's done a good job getting better at that position out there, 2017

because we ask him to do stuff pre-snap and post-snap. He's quite capable of doing it."

On the defensive side of the ball, Battles said his defense should be improved after a rough outing in 2015.

"We're going to be better than we were last year," he said. "Last year, we gave up 300 points. It would be hard to do worse. We expect the defense to be a little bit better. We're going to dedicate ourselves to stopping the run and controlling the passing. That's what you have to do to be successful."

A season removed from narrowly missing a chance to make the Class 3A playoffs as a fourth-seed in Region 3, Battles said he realizes how tough the front end of his schedule is in 2016.

"Our biggest challenge is going to be when we have to go down to Autaugaville, I can tell you that right now," he said. "We've got to go down there, get with the program and come out of the blocks. Weaver has one of the best football teams (it has) had in a while.

"The next week, we go to Pike County, and Pike County has always been tough. After that, we've got Montevallo, and



then we've got Montgomery Academy. We could be 0-5, and we'll still have a decent football team."

He added his team can still be competitive despite its small numbers.

"Our skill level, I like it," Battles said. "What we've got to do is stay healthy. We have to, and our ninth-graders are going to have to play like seniors. That's all there is to it."

Tigers to begin final season at John Cox Stadium

Childersburg High School football team looks to put together a memorial season their last season in John Cox Stadium. Next season, the Tigers will open their new on campus stadium.

First-year head coach Jonathan Beverly is elated about the changes that are being made, and he plans to give the Childersburg community a team that they will be proud of this season.

"Everybody is excited about the new stadium," he said. "Obviously there is so much history in John Cox Stadium where we are now. We have a t-shirt with a picture of the stadium on the back saying it is our final season there. A lot of people around town are sentimental about it, but overall, people are excited about the changes that are coming. There is a lot of history that in the stadium that we are in now. The community is great, the community shows us so much support. We know that the final season there is

going to be exciting. We know the community is going to come out and support us. We have a home schedule that pretty challenging, but it also should provide some exciting atmospheres on Friday nights when we are at home."

Beverly and the Tigers enter the season with lofty goals. Last season, Childersburg went 2-8 and missed the postseason for the first time in three years. Beverly believes if his team performs up to its capability, it will have a good chance of getting back into the playoffs.

"Maximize our potential," Beverly said. "I think we have the potential to have a really competitive football team. We expect to be playing football in November. We want to be a playoff contender, and we want to be a playoff qualifier behind that. We will see what happens. There's a lot that has to happen from now until then, but I believe if we maximize our potential and do the things I think we can do, we will be playoffs the first week of November."

The Tigers are once again are in what's considered the SEC West of Class 4A. Childersburg is in a region with two-

time defending champion Leeds, Munford (who made it to the semifinals last season), Dadeville and Handley. In his few months on campus, Beverly believes his team and coaches embrace the challenges in front of them.

"From top to bottom, we have a very competitive region," he said. "It is probably the most talented region in 4A and the best coached region in 4A. We are excited about it, our kids love to compete. Our coaches love to compete, and that is why I love getting out of the bed in the morning and coming to work. These guys are crazy competitive, and with our schedule they are going to get competition every week. There are no off weeks with our schedule, for sure."

Junior Jalen Kidd will be under center for the Tigers. Beverly has confidence in his ability to lead the football team and make the right plays on the field.

"Jalen is a phenomenal leader," he said. "He is a phenomenal athlete, he does a lot of things well. We are a team that's going to look to run the football first. Everything kind of starts with him. We do have a lot of different quarterback runs for him. He makes a lot of things happen with his legs. He has progressed so much in the spring and in the summer. He can throw the football, and we're confident that when he has to throw the football he will be able to do it. He takes command of the huddle. The other 10 guys look up to them. He looks them in the eyes and tells them where they need to be. He does a great job, and we are excited to have him under center."

One of the positives that Kidd has going for him this season is the offensive line. Last season, the Tigers' line struggled at times, but Beverly feels that the offensive line is going to be the strength of the team this season.

"Everybody on the team I treat like a son, but those five guys get more personal attention because I coach them each and every day," he said. "They work hard. Cory (Dates) is one of the leaders up front for us, and he works hard each and every day. I think they are going to be a strength of our team. I think we are going to be able to get behind those five guys and really lean on them when we need to. Cory as well as Elijah Slaughter and the others are dependable, they are there every day, and they are consistent. Some of the best teams that I have ever coached, the one constant was having a good offensive line. I honestly believe that this group this year has the opportunity to be the best offensive line that I have ever coached. They have that potential."












CVA Rebels hope to secure an early victory this season

Steve McCord enters his second season at the helm of Coosa Valley Academy's Rebels with some optimism. Last season, the team went winless, and McCord believes it is vital for his team to end its losing streak early in the season.

"Our goal is to be a lot more competitive than we

were last year and, of course, win," McCord said. "We need to win early and build some confidence. If we do that, maybe we can build on that as the season goes on."

One of the positives that the Rebels have going for them this season is their schedule. Last season, CVA played three of the top programs in Class AAA, but McCord believes his team will be able to compete



against every team it lines up against.

"Our schedule is better because we don't have to play Bessemer, Edgewood and Northside out of Dothan," McCord said. "It has to be more competitive, because we weren't competitive at all against Edgewood and Bessemer. From a competition standpoint, it should be a lot better for us."

Staying healthy is going to be a major key for CVA, since the Rebels lack depth. McCord's squad only has 21 players, but he said the young men work hard to improve day in and day out.

"All of our kids work really good, we don't have any complaints with that," McCord said. "We don't have a lot of them. They have worked really good this summer, and they did pretty good when we went to camp. We went to a 7-on-7 camp, and they held their own. We have been pleased with them and their effort."

One of the points of emphasis the Rebels have worked during the offseason is putting more points on the board. Last season, CVA scored a dismal 134

points in 10 games.

"We have seven starters returning on offense," he said. "We have four offensive linemen back, a running back, two receivers back and our quarterback. If you had to pick a side of the ball as our strength, I guess it would be offense, because we didn't do too much on defense last year. We gave up a lot of points and scored a few against some people. We have more work to do (on defense) than we do anywhere."

Defensively, the Rebels struggled stopping teams from scoring points early and often. CVA gave up 469 points last season. McCord hopes a change at defensive coordinator and the work that his players put in the offseason will pay off.

"We have a new defensive coordinator in Coach Carter. Our guys are better because they worked in the offseason and this summer. We haven't got a whole lot bigger, but we have put on some strength. Their attitudes have been good, and their work has been good. If we are better, it is going to be because of that not because of a specific player."



Wolves anticipate building on a historical season

Fayetteville High School's football team put together a historic season in 2015, winning the Class 2A Region 4 championship and winning a home playoff game – both firsts for the school – en route to a 9-3 finish.

But the Wolves lost some key pieces of their roster and must now reload and contend in Region 5.

"We've got some new guys coming in this year," said head coach John Limbaugh. "They're going to be working very hard. We've been working through the summer. They're going to be doing a lot more work. We're going to shore things up in the secondary.

"Our defense was just outstanding last year. We had a couple of shutout games, and we just played lights out on the defensive side of the ball."

Fayetteville's top two running backs, Dustin Ingram and Darious Cook, were among the crop of seniors who've departed, but Limbaugh said he's confident in Payton McKee and Houston Goins – a pair of players coming off knee injuries who will shoulder the load for the ground game.

"Every year, you lose seniors and people will bring their hands together and talk about what we're going to do," the coach said. "We're going to be just fine. Our guys are ready, and they're looking forward to the opportunity to show what they can do.

"Both these guys are coming off some injuries, but they're healthy now and ready to go. Both of these guys are hungry, and we expect great things out of them." One unexpected loss came prior to fall camp opening. Limbaugh said senior left tackle Luke Murphy approached him and informed him that he would not be back in 2016 so he could focus on baseball.

"He hasn't been with us for any of the summer," Limbaugh said. "I thought maybe he'd change his mind and come on back and play. Sometimes, kids make rash decisions, so I wanted to give him some more time.

"But really and truly, he's just got his heart set on playing college baseball. I'm a guy that feels like you can do both or play both. We love Luke to death. I might not agree with his decision, but I'm going to support him in his decision."

Limbaugh said he has five players competing for Murphy's spot, with



senior Blake Morris currently pacing the pack.

The good news is fleet-footed quarterback Bailey Deloach, a senior, will be back to lead the Wolves' offense.

"I hold my breath a lot when Bailey's back there," Limbaugh said. "He's a great young player, but what I appreciate about Bailey is he's a great young man. He has fun out there on the football field. I can't wait to see what he does this year."

Deloach said he's been putting in a strong effort to improve his skills during the summer.

"I've worked on more passing and getting my accuracy (better) because my stats (as far as) completions weren't good," he said. "So I'm trying to get better (there)."

Not only have the Wolves been working hard on the field, according to Limbaugh, his team also has been participating in various community service projects.

"As a part of our approach to working our kids and getting them to be where they need to be mentally and spiritually, we believe in giving back to our community," he said. "We had our kids involved in a work program where our team did 300 hours of community service.

"That included a trip to Jimmie Hale Mission to give food to the needy and (working) at FarmLinks to help support them for all the help they give us. We cleaned up the yards, parking lots and windows of the local businesses who support us. We just believe in giving back, and that's a part of the makeup of our players as they grow into adulthood and manhood. You don't get something for nothing, and that very jersey they wear is earned. For them to play sports is a privilege."

Fayetteville faces both Winterboro and B.B. Comer in 2016, the only two teams to defeat the Wolves in the 2015 regular season.

"I was looking at the Winterboro game, and Coach (Alan) Beckett is a fantastic individual who is doing a fantastic job," Limbaugh said. "He's got some great players, and it's unfair to them to say it was a trap game, to quote that Star Wars thing, 'It's a trap.'

"We were looking forward to the game against Ariton and hosting our first playoff game ever. That's my fault we lost that Winterboro game. I leave that totally on my shoulders.

"The Comer game, we jumped out 14-0, but it got to a point where I looked over at my assistant coach (Mark) Reed, and I said, 'Coach, they've done all they can.' When kids go to a funeral the same day as a football game, that's a tough deal, but I think our kids grew from that experience far more than anything I could ever do as a football coach."



Despite the move to a new region in 2016, Limbaugh said he feels like his team doesn't have to prove anything because they know they belong.

"We already belong in that region," he said. "We were region champions last year and went 6-0. When you beat a Thorsby at their place in overtime and beat a Pickens County at their place, you've shown that you deserve to be where you're at.

"I think (Region 5) is the hardest region in 2A football. That can be debated, but if you'll look at it from top to bottom, it's a very tough region. Teams are going to have to play to beat us."



Lincoln hopes better leadership leads to better results in 2016

Last season, Lincoln High School's football team learned that talent alone is not enough to be successful in Class 5A.

Lack of leadership and team chemistry plagued the Golden Bears early in the season as they dropped their first five games and derailed their goals of repeating as region champions. Fourth-year head coach Brad Wallace said 2015 was wake-up call for his returning players and coaching staff.

"It was something that we learned as players and as coaches


that leadership has to be there at the beginning of the season," Wallace said. "It has to roll through practices during the hot days when things aren't going their way, and it has to go through the first part of the season, that way we can get rolling.

"The thing about this team that I am so proud of is when we came in (for winter workouts in) January, they all had goals and objectives of what they were going to do in the weight room. That was just the beginning.

"We went into spring practice, and I think we had the best spring practice since I have been here. We got a lot accomplished in the spring. Coming off last year, I think our kids want to strive to be better. This was their first time not being in the playoffs in four or five years, and that kind of hit them in the heart a little bit."

Besides leadership, the other pressing topic for the Golden Bears during the offseason and entering preseason camp was who will be under center. Lincoln is looking to replace Zay Caldwell, who combined to pass and rush for over 2,000 yards of total offense last season.

There is a four-way battle for the



quarterback position with Earl Wells, PJ Gaddis, Donta Rivers and Garrett Vick.

Wallace said he would like a clear favorite before the season opener against Leeds on Aug. 26.

"We are dwindling reps on some and some are still getting a majority," he said. "It's one of those things where we are trying to figure out who is going to be the game manager and not make silly mistakes that will get us in a bind, especially in the fourth quarter. That is what we are looking for in a guy, and we are looking for a guy that's calm, cool, collective and that doesn't let adversity affect him.

"Earl Wells has worked hard throughout the spring and the summer. He was actually in the field when I left (for Talladega County media day) throwing balls. He is a worker and he is going to work every day and try to get better." With the quarterback job still up for grabs, it is a safe bet the Golden Bears will lean on the running back tandem of LJ Carmichael and Montrell Johnson. The duo played a major role in the Golden Bears turning the season around in the second half last season. (Lincoln won four of its last five games.)

"I expect to lay a lot of the load on them this season," Wallace said. "They came on at the end of the year last year, and they really got close to each other last year – began pushing each other more and more. I expect to see a lot of them, especially at the beginning of the season with our quarterback being so young.

"We are going to be going to them a lot more than we have in the past and we are going to see where we can go from there."

What won't be an easy task for the Golden Bears is accomplishing their goals this season. Lincoln will




compete in Region 4, which features Sylacauga, Cleburne County, Valley, Beauregard and Central Clay County. That's in addition to opening the season against two-time defending 4A champion Leeds.

"All of those games are playoff atmosphere type of games because all of those teams have been in the

playoffs over the last few years," Wallace said. "One of the big keys for us is to keep from being injured. We are playing a tough schedule, so we are going to have to learn how to practice and get the most out of it without banging on each other every day. That is going to be one of our keys this year."

Last season, Munford lost to the eventual state champion Leeds in a semifinal. Since the loss, the Lions' players and coaches have been working hard to get back into that position this season, but with, hopefully, a different outcome.

"Part of me wants to poor mouth and just say that we are going to win a couple of games, but our goals are to win the region and win a state championship," second-year Lions coach Bill Smith said. "That is what we have talked about and that is what our players have talked about. That is what we have worked towards.

"Everybody is 0-0 right now. Everything that these young men did last year really doesn't matter because everybody is 0-0. The season will be what these guys and their teammates make of it."

they are ranked fourth in the Alabama Sports Writers Association's 4A preseason poll.

"We were under the radar last year in what supposedly was going to be a rebuilding year, and these guys just stepped it up, especially from Week 5 and Week 6 on," Smith said. "We were 2-3 at the midway point last year, and we went on an eight-game winning streak.

"These young men did everything that I asked them to do. It was a great job by our assistant coaches and coordinators. It was one of the most fun years of my coaching career.

"We will have more of a target on our backs this year. It is always flattering when it is hard to find nonregion games. I think our schedule is probably the toughest 4A schedule in the state. We will have to be ready and, hopefully, we will be battle tested come playoff time."

The Lions will definitely be a seasoned group if they are able to make it back to the playoffs. Munford is still in what's considered to the SEC West of the 4A with Leeds, Dadeville, Tallassee and Handley. In addition to those region games, the Lions will play host to Central Clay County to

open the season, and they close the campaign with a showdown against 2015 4A runner-up and third-ranked Cordova.

"I had a mutiny on my hands with my assistant coaches when I told them that we were playing Cordova in Week 10," Smith said. "That will be a huge game for us at our place.

"Our schedule ended being odd with a Week 0 game with Central Clay County. That is a heated rivalry, so I felt like I needed to keep that game. They are a very good 5A team. Our other 5A game is going to be Lincoln, and they are going to be very formidable, very athletic and very well coached, and it will be at their place. Our other nonregion game is Cordova. I think our region was the toughest in 4A and I think it will be again."

The Lions return all-state quarterback Avery Harris. In his first season as a signal caller, Harris threw for 2,998 yards and 28 touchdowns, while also rushing for 913 yards and 18 scores. He also had a receiving touchdown against Leeds in the semifinal. Smith considers Harris one of the best quarterbacks that he has ever coached.

"From the first day that I was on



campus 15 months ago, I have seen him develop physically and I have seen him develop into a leadership role," Smith said. "It didn't take me long when I got to Munford to realize that he was going to be special. He is one of the better quarterbacks that I have been blessed to coach.

"One of the things that sets him apart is that I can chew him out and his blood pressure stays pretty normal and calm. He is a calm and cool customer in the pocket. He is an outstanding dual threat quarterback and outstanding leader."

This season, the Lions will have the tough task of replacing their top three receivers and a running back that rushed for 1,500 yards in 2015. Smith will depend on several young players to fill their roles.

"We are going to be youthful. I only have 14 seniors," Smith said. "We are

going to start at least one freshman and four or five sophomores. They are going to be good. How fast they become good will depend on them and our coaching staff."

Junior TaCorrie Russell will look to impact the game on both sides of the ball. Russell became a reliable bigplay threat for the Lions last season as well as disruptive force as a defensive end. The three star prospect, according to 247sports, moved to defensive end at the midway point last season, and the Lions defense drastically changed. Munford had a three-game stretch during which it allowed 48, 43 and 50 points before changing defenses and moving Russell to end. The next seven games, the Lions held their opponents to nine points per game.

"TaCorrie is going to be a defensive player that plays offense," Smith said. "Coach Darrell LeBeaux and I have told him early on how good of shape he is in will determine how much offense that he gets to play this year. He is a defensive player that is going to play offense when he gets in shape. We would have played him earlier last year on defense, but it took him a few games to get in the kind of shape where he can play both ways. He is there now. "



Pell City Panthers: New coach, new mindset

Keith Etheredge is in a new place, but his goals and expectations have stayed the same. Etheredge won four state championships during the past decade while at Leeds, and he expects to have the same level of success at Pell City.

"My goals never change. I want to go 15-0 and win the state championship," he said. "Of course, we want to win the region, and we have some good teams in our region. We talk about being realistic and setting goals. You want to set your goals high, but if you falter and you drop a game, the goals change to going 14-1 and win a state championship. We just have to take it a game at a time and get better every single day."

One of the things that Etheredge had to change at Pell City is the mindset of his players. The coach believes his team is loaded with more talent than he had at Leeds when he took over in 2006.

"We are as good up front as we ever were at Leeds, and that's pretty good," he said. "We have some things that we need to work on, but I think most of it is confidence with the kids. At Leeds, those kids had swag, but the thing is it wasn't like that when I got there. When I got there, they'd won seven games in three or four years. We had

to change the mentality, and I think there are more tools here than I had at Leeds."

Last season, Etheredge led the Green Wave to a 14-1 record and the Class 4A state championship. Leeds had an explosive offense that averaged 46 points per game thanks to a dominant ground game and a stifling defense that only allowed an average of 8.5 points per game.

Etheredge is confident that he can bring the same style of play to Pell City and have success.

"It is going to be fun to see how our style works in 6A," he said. "A lot of people say that won't work in 6A. I keep reverting back that kids are kids. If you have players that are going to buy into your system, they can do whatever they decide to do. If I have a guy like Kent Foster, we are going to run behind him. Our offensive line should be all right, our defensive line should be real good, at linebacker we should be good. We don't have a lot of depth there, and we have to stay healthy. Secondary-wise, we have some guys out right now. We lost an outside linebacker at the last passing camp -- he tore his ACL -- so that hurt. He was a senior, he hadn't played in the last couple of years, but he was coming back out. He did a great job in the spring and summer."

Going into the season, Etheredge believes the offensive line, the defensive front and the tailback positions are the team's strengths.

The Panthers will depend on senior Chris Lynch to carry the load. Lynch had a productive junior season dispite missing games. He finished the season with 800 yards. Etheredge believes that if Lynch's work ethic matches his mindset, he will be one of the best running backs in the state.

"When he steps on the field, he thinks that he is the best player out there," Etheridge said. "That's the attitude that every kid has to take. I have to get him to get where he is working every single day to be the best, because he thinks he is the best every time that he steps on the field. He is great football player. This may be a mouthful, but as far as ability he may be the best running back that I ever coached. He (Lynch) has all the tools to be the best that I ever coached. It is one thing that he's got that the other ones haven't had. Tre Nation is the total package, he rushed for over 7,500 yards and over 120 touchdowns in his career, so it is hard to compare a kid to him. They are different types of kids. Chris Lynch is more compact kid, but he is a 4.53 every time you take him out there to run the 40 (yard

dash). He could be a 4.4 if he worked on his start. He has the breakaway speed, he can catch the ball out of the backfield. Lynch has the wiggle, he has the power, he has the speed."

Etheredge believes the Panthers will be up for any challenge they face on the field once they find a leader.

This season, Pell City will compete in Region 7 with Southside-Gadsden, Brewer, Albertville and Fort Payne, and Etheridge won't be content with just making the first round of the playoffs.

"It is an exciting time to be here," he said. "You are not just going to be able to roll the ball out there and get into the playoffs. If you do that, you are just trying to get to the playoffs and get the fourth seed and have to go play Muscle Shoals at Muscle Shoals You better bust your rear end to try to get that one or two seed where you have a home playoff game and have the opportunity to make a run in the playoffs. Eventually you have to play Muscle Shoals, Clay-Chalkville or one of those dominant teams like Opelika. You want to play them in the second or third round, so it is a big game you can get your kids up for."





Brian Alred takes the helm of Ragland football program

Ragland High School has a new head football coach going into the 2016 season, but Brian Alred is no stranger to the Purple Devil Nation.

Alred was the defensive coordinator for two years in 2013-14 when Jonathan Nix was head coach.

"This is my first head coaching job, and I am very excited about it," he said. "I think it's a great opportunity to be back in Ragland. I feel like I have an advantage because I know these kids and their work ethic, and they know me."

He has coached at Fayetteville, Springville, St. Clair County and Ragland. He has spent eight years in the St. Clair County school system.

Alred said his No. 1 goal is to develop studentathletes and make them better young men.

"We obviously want to win ballgames, but everything has to start in the classroom," he said. "We want to prepare them for life, and, hopefully, along the way, we will win some football games. If we start in the classroom and make them better young men, football will take care of itself."

Alred has some key players returning, including running back and free safety Jadon Killings.

"I expect a lot out of Jadon, and we are going to depend on him a lot from a player's standpoint and



from a leader standpoint," Alred said. "Another key player would be starting quarterback Stoney Merritt. He's a super kid and a leader offensively who can get us in the right situations to be successful on Friday nights. He stepped up and took on a leadership role this summer."

Alred also named running back and outside

linebacker Braxton Thomas as a key player he is expecting great things from.

Alred said there are six returning starters offensively and five defensively.

"Ninety percent of our kids do play both ways," he said. "That is why our players have to get in better shape than they are in right now. We got a late start with me being hired late, but they have hit the ground running in the weight room. We've got to get stronger and more conditioned to be able to play both ways."

Ragland is in Class 1A, Region 4 with Appalachian, Donoho, Talladega County Central, Victory Christian, Wadley and Winterboro.

Alred said he believes there are three teams leading the pack right now: Wadley, Talladega County-Central and Victory Christian. He said that is based on their records from last year.

"Victory Christian had a great season last year, and Coach Mark Sanders is doing a great job with those kids there," Alred said. "He came in, and they have gotten better each year under him.

"It's a tough region to be in."

Alred said one advantage for his team this year is that Ragland plays six home games.

"Our first five games are at home," he said. "That

works out to our favor."

When talking about the keys to a successful season, Alred said it has to be being able to play together as a team and getting better every week.

"My emphasis is that we must get better every week," he said. "With me coming in late, we are behind already. We play a one-game season each week. We want to make the state playoffs. We have to get Ragland football back to where it used to be.

"This community and this school have a rich tradition in football. These kids understand that. I've set high expectations for our kids, and I believe they can reach those expectations. If we continue to get better each day and each week, we can achieve the goal of making the playoffs."



It's an exciting time for Sylacauga's Aggies

There is a lot of excitement in the Sylacauga community about the upcoming football season, and rightfully so. The Aggies have a talented and senior laden team that has the potential to be one of the best teams in school history. There is also excitement about the newly renovated Legion Stadium.

"To talk about the excitement, it is something that we thought that we would never see," head coach Matt Griffith said. "We have a very historical stadium that was built in 1947 and absolutely hardly nothing has been done to it since, and it was really starting to get dangerous. 





In order for the Aggies to accomplish their first goal, they will have to get through a tough area. 





Talladega TIGERS

Despite limited numbers, Talladega takes aim at playoff spot

Since Talladega High School's last football playoff appearance in 1995, the program has become a model for mediocrity with 164 losses in 20 seasons.

But fourth-year Tigers head coach Robert Herring gave his squad of 23 players a vote of confidence heading into the 2016 season – the team's first in Class 5A, Region 4.

"We don't try to sugarcoat stuff to these kids or lie to them," he said. "We told them we would love to be 5-5 this year and be the fourth seed in the playoffs. You've got Beauregard, who anybody will tell you hands down, they're supposed to be our region champs without question.

"Then you've got Sylacauga and Clay Central who is next. That's your (Nos.) 1, 2 and 3, and then you've got us, Lincoln and Cleburne County. We're all fighting for that fourth spot."

Defensive line coach Carlos Battle said he also can see a difference in the



Tigers.

"This football program and these kids will show y'all and our fans that we've been working," he said. "These kids get up at 6 o'clock every morning. When other kids are asleep, they're up working ...

"I believe in these kids. I believe we'll have a great season this year. As a matter of fact, I believe it'll be a historymaking season. These kids will show y'all what Talladega is about."

Herring said his players took the first step away from trending downward by performing well and winning a spring scrimmage against B.B. Comer, 16-6.

"We've come a long way," he said. "That was a good scrimmage for us, and we needed to (win). We match up well against B.B. Comer. We're a 5A

school, and we've got 23 kids. They're a 3A school, and they've got 20 kids."

Talladega returns five seniors, including a pair of defenders in Jamonte Twymon and Jae-lyn Russ. Herring said he has high hopes for the duo.

"Jamonte and (Jae-lyn) both have been three-year starters for us," he said. "(Jamonte) starts on the offensive and defensive lines, and so will Jae-lyn. He'll be a right tackle and a defensive end. Our other three seniors also (play) both ways.

"We've got five kids who are seniors, and all five of them (play) both ways. That makes it tough (to win games) if you're in 5A football, but these kids have worked hard all summer since that B.B. Comer game.

"This summer, we've had it

consistently -- 23 players showing up for workouts. They're 23 kids who want to be there, and 23 kids that'll pay the price. These kids have done that, and we hope it pays off for them, not just in wins and losses, but as far as life lessons."

Twymon, who Herring touted as one of the strongest players on the team, said he knows the Tigers must give maximum effort in order to achieve success.

"We're going to have to go hard and compete to keep winning," he said.

Talladega opens its season with a trip up Alabama 21 to face Oxford, a 6A team coached by Herring's brother, fourth-year head coach Ryan Herring.

The matchup with the Yellow Jackets kicks off a grueling schedule for the Tigers, with equally tough showdowns against region foes as well as Talladega


County Central, Walter Wellborn and Winterboro.

"We don't have a game we look at and say, 'Well, this is going to be a gimme for us," Robert Herring said. "Our kids, most of them (play) both ways, and this year, for us to win, we're going to have to have something go on our side, whether it's an onside kick or trick plays."

What the Tigers may lack in numbers, they may be able to make up for in athleticism, with several players who are multi-sport athletes, including junior quarterback Ashton Duncan.



TC Central wants more than appearance in 1st round of playoffs

For the past three high school football seasons, the Talladega County Central Fighting Tigers have made the first round of the playoffs, but head coach Christopher Mahand is not satisfied with just making a brief appearance in the postseason.

Mahand enters his third year back (six years overall) at Howell's Cove with the expectation of the Fighting Tigers being contenders late into November.

"We want to make the playoffs and have success," Mahand said. "We want to get past the first round. The last couple of years, we have been to the first round ... and now it is time for us to move on. ...

"I think we have the opportunity to have a pretty good team if the Lord blesses us to stay healthy. The experience factor was real big last year, even though a lot of my guys were freshmen and sophomores. For them to get that experience coming into this year is going to really be effective for us this year. We are excited about this year to see what we can get done."

TC Central will start the campaign with its toughest games of the season. The Fighting Tigers open the season against rival Talladega and then will travel to Ragland before playing host to Wadley and Victory Christian. Last season, TC Central lost to Wadley and Victory.

Mahand said his team will be prepared to take everybody's best shot this time around.

"That pretty much is going to iron out the region for us," Mahand said. "We play Winterboro later on in the year, and that is always big for the kids. To have the Big 3 early in the year is big.

"Ragland is a meat grinder for us. They were very well coached and a very good team last year. I think (new coach Brian Alred) is going to bring the energy back that Ragland had in the past. Victory shocked a lot of teams last year, including us. I don't think we were prepared like should have been, and that is my fault as the head coach. We won't make that same mistake this year. ...

"We are going to have to play good football if we are going to have success. We are not going to be able to sneak up on anyone. Everybody expects us to be a good team, so we usually gets everybody's best game. If we are going to have the success we want to have this year, we are going to have to prepare for success."

TC Central will depend on Kylen Cross to have another big season. Last fall, Cross rushed for 1,300 yards. This summer, the junior running back impressed college scouts. Cross received his first offer from Mississippi Valley State.

"I have been real pleased with Kylen this summer," Mahand said. "I think he has taken on the role as leader. I tell the kids all the time that you have to be a senior to be a leader on the team, and I think he has taken to that. He has been there every day this summer, riding the younger kids when it is time to work out. He is the first one to finish running and the first one to finish his sets.

"I think Kylen is finally starting to realize his potential that God blessed him with to have the opportunity to play on the next level if he continues to work hard. We are expecting a lot out of Kylen, and that's no secret."

The Fighting Tigers have several returning this players season that transferred or sat out due to disciplinary reasons. One of the players that Mahand is elated to have back is linebacker/running back Chris Embry.

"We had some guys for transfer and (some) disciplinary actions," Mahand said. "Chris is one of the guys back from transferring. It is definitely a blessing to have him back. I think if I had him last year, we could've won a couple of those close games that



we lost. When he played for me as a freshman and a sophomore, he was an anchor of the defense at middle linebacker. He lines people up and he is a run stopper in the tackle box.

"With (Class) 1A, if you can stop the run nine out of 10 times, you are going to win the game. I am glad to have him back to anchor the middle for us."

Scrappy Lions team has sights set on another playoff berth





Sometimes the best things in life come unexpected.

The statement rings true for Victory Christian's football program after the Lions put together a 5-0 start that launched an impressive run to the 2015 playoffs as the runner-up in Class 1A, Region 5.

"This is the first time we've done that, so that's pretty awesome," said head coach Mark Sanders. "We're trying to keep the momentum going. It basically all boils down to just a couple things – being in the weight room, doing offseason training, doing camps, keeping the guys together as much as possible and keeping that team fellowship.

"(We have) the mentality that we can do whatever we put our minds to do. We have the capability of achieving things

we could only dream of, but only if you put in the work, believe in yourself and bring your brothers along with you, just having that family atmosphere. I've got a good coaching staff that supports me, and I couldn't do anything without them."

Though the Lions officially moved to Region 4 during the Alabama High School Athletic Association's offseason reclassification, their region opponents and their mission remain the same.

"We're happy to be in the region we are," Sanders said. "We understand it's one of the toughest regions in 1A football. There are a lot of tough programs in our region, and they pose a challenge every week. But that's something we'll never back down from because the kind of mentality I want my team to have is just a scrappy, 'we'll face anybody, anywhere' mentality.

"We've developed a good friendship

with a lot of the coaches in our region, and I'm pleased we're still in the same region. We're definitely looking forward to playing all those guys again this season."

One of the biggest wins of 2015 came against Ragland on the Purple Devils' home field. The Lions fell behind 20-8 in the second quarter before scoring 28 unanswered points for a 36-20 victory that clinched the team's first playoff berth in school history.

"Games like that just show you how competitive our region is," Sanders said. "That game against Ragland is one that I'll never forget because I love to see the character of a team evolve during a game. That's one of the greatest things, and one of the greatest gifts a coach can receive is for them to be down and find a way to climb back and to claim victory.

"Just how they did it and how we

pulled it off as a squad, it meant the world to me, my coaching staff, the whole school and the community. We've been searching for a win against Ragland for years, and we finally pulled it out and did it in a great way. I'm thinking about all the things that went on in that game, and it was just awesome. It was just a great comeback and a great night."

Sanders said his team graduated 12 seniors, including key leaders Shawn Traywick and Kyle Roberson, but the team should be able to sustain the success with a solid core of junior and senior players.


"I can't wait to see what this season holds for our team," he said. "We have a lot of potential, but we also have a lot of work to do. Every year, you have to keep rebuilding and filling in holes that you lose. But I think we're going to be OK. I really do.

"I could start talking about Harrison Cheatwood, (and how) he's definitely created a buzz for himself as far as being athletic and a multi-sport athlete. His ability to be athletic on the field really stems down to his level of competition. I mean, he hates to lose. That drives him to be as great as he can be.

"Other guys like Garret Dorroh, he's definitely been a key player for us on defense the last couple years, but we're transitioning him more into an offensive role at wideout. He'll be a big help for us on both sides of the ball."



Winterboro feels optimistic about season

After putting together his first winning season at Winterboro High School in 2015, head football coach Alan Beckett should be optimistic heading into his fourth year at helm.

But his Bulldogs will face a tough road in 2016 with all four Class 1A, Region 5 playoff teams from a year ago – Talladega County Central, Ragland, Wadley and Victory Christian -- scheduled consecutively. Beckett's Bulldogs will battle those four squads, now in Region 4, for playoff spots again.

"Wadley's strong," Beckett said. "They return a lot, and they were in the quarterfinals. They were probably an injury away from playing in the state championship.

"TC (Central) is always really good, and Coach (Chris) Mahand's really running a group through that's really strong ..."

"Victory Christian, they were second in our region, won a playoff game and had a historic year for them. Coach (Mark) Sanders is doing a great job there. It is a good region."

Beckett's teams each season have steadily improved in total points per game on offense, total points allowed on defense and overall win total. "We're a time-of-possession team," he said. "We're a field position team. So all those statistics matter – where the ball is and how many first downs you get. The numbers are going to matter for one thing.

"We've just got to continue to find ways to win the games within the games, and win some of those close ones. ... We may not be in the driver's seat, but we're in the car. We want to continue to work our way toward being the driver."

Beckett hopes the hard work his team put in during the spring and summer months will go a long way toward Winterboro taking the wheel in Region 4.

"We've had a big summer," Beckett said. "We've had a lot of guys go to camp. Clay (Twymon) has just gotten back from Florida State ... Khalil Keith is getting a lot of attention from colleges, so he's been to several as well ... We've been really busy in the weight room."

Beckett added his team has been active with volunteering, taking some time during the summer to assist at a soup kitchen in Anniston.

"We were really proud of that just (for them) getting out and doing good deeds," he said.

Offensive weapons Marquel Bryant and Marquez Bryant were among the key departures for the Bulldogs, but Twymon continues to grow into a leadership role as he

enters his fourth year as the Bulldogs' starting quarterback.

"He was an all-region quarterback last year, and we went through the tough years, the freshman years," Beckett said. "He's gotten better as the years have gone on. He really had a solid year last year, and he's one of our team leaders."

Twymon said he learned plenty from his early struggles "I feel like I was 120 pounds soaking wet starting off in ninth grade," he said. "I'm not much bigger now, but I wasn't physically mature enough to, like, really take the

hits. It really made me a stronger person having to battle through adversity and stuff like that.

"I feel like my teammates were young, too. There were four of us in the ninth grade that started the whole year. I feel like we just grew together, and I think this year, if we just take care of our responsibilities, we'll do what we need to do to win."

R.J. Burns will move to left tackle to fill a void created during Winterboro's spring game against Linden. Beckett said starting left tackle Jason Geise suffered a neck injury during the game that could be season-ending, so the injury forced a re-shuffling on the line.

"(R.J. is) getting bigger and improving," Beckett said.

"He had a really good year last year and he's going to play more defensively as well. He loves the sport and he's a really good student as well."

Burns said he's looking forward to logging starts at left tackle.

"I feel like it was a good transition for me because I feel like I can protect my quarterback coming from the blind side and not have to work very hard to get my (footwork) right," he said. "We have a couple plays where we pull a lot, and I feel like I work pretty hard."

Beckett said his team has come a long way in terms of attitude, morale and doing the right things on and off the field, but more improvements need to be made.

"I think we're really close," he said. "We've got a couple guys who are just trying to get there on a daily basis and try to understand the importance (of it), which carries on into life that you've got to be there ...

"It's smaller problems to be honest. It doesn't mean I still sleep a full night this time of year, but it's smaller problems, motivational ... I've got a big concern going in of who's that leader going to be when we hit adversity."




