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

The stands are almost full, and people are still pouring in the gate.

Another half-hour, and the place will be rocking.

There's been something in the air all day, a kind of atmosphere and excitement that exists only one day each week for only a few weeks each year.

It first erupts by mid-afternoon during the tribal rite of a pep rally. The players are in their game jerseys, the cheerleaders are dancing on the gymnasium floor and a crowd of youngsters and teenagers demonstrate their school spirit – not to mention their appreciation for a chance to get out of class – with a deafening series of shrieks and screams.

Then the countdown begins.

As kickoff nears, there's just enough time to grab a quick bite on the run, at the risk of being late for the opening festivities.

And here we are, 6:30, Friday night, sitting on the 50-yard line looking at the field, the long green carpet that's seen its share of flags and whistles, touchdowns and injuries, and celebrations and consolations. Coaches, officials, managers, trainers, statisticians and photographers are already pacing it, making their final preparations.

Finally, it's time.

Cheerleaders hoist a huge paper sign depicting their team's mascot bludgeoning, pummeling, throttling, incinerating or perpetrating other bodily harm on the opposing team's mascot. The band lays down the opening notes of the fight song, and the music slices through the spectators like a stiletto.

The fans are on their feet. The anticipation is rising. Adrenaline is pumping, and everything explodes as the home team rips through the thin paper wall and takes the field. Within five minutes, summer unofficially ends with the opening kickoff, and the stadium is witness to at least two hours of the kind of guts and glory associated only with a community football game.

High school football. You can't beat it with a stick.

SOMETHING TO PROVE

Mason-Dixon champs ASD hope to improve on last year's success

The Alabama School for the Deaf enjoyed a winning season in 2018 after rebounding from a 1-3 start.

By the end of the season, the Silent Warriors were 5-4 and Mason-Dixon Champions after a 42-8 victory over rival Florida School for the Deaf.

Cedric Tyson, offensive coordinator and linebackers coach at ASD, filled in for head coach Paul Kulick at the Talladega County Coaches Association Football Media Day and addressed the media about the upcoming season. Kulick missed the event due to an illness.

"We do want to continue to build on (last season)," Tyson said. "We lost (eight) seniors, so we have a lot of young men on the team. I think the most important thing for us is to build character as a team. I think it's very important for these young boys to know how to develop those leadership skills and become role models."

Tyson said the team is searching for replacements for its players in the trenches from a season ago, Angelo Simon and Zachary Beaver.

"Zachary Beaver, our best center that we've had, did a great job last year," he said. "Both of them (did great) on the line together ... Jacob Johnson, one of our guards, he was good at pulling."

Tyler said ASD will have "a lot of good running backs and receivers, so hopefully, we'll be able to move the ball a lot this fall."

The Silent Warriors incorporated several players from the Alabama School for the Blind onto their roster a season ago, most notably quarterback Tanner Wood, who will again be under center in his senior season providing the skills that helped ASD finish 4-1 in its last five games in 2018.

"(Tanner) has very good leadership skills," Tyson said. "The first few games, we struggled. Then, Tanner started playing quarterback for us. Everything changed overnight really. The boys have a lot of respect for him. He just kept everyone together, and he kept them playing hard as a team."

Tyson said he saw leadership in his quarterback as he helped other players understand the plays and where the weaknesses were in the defense.

"It was a very big thing for us," he said.

Tyson said ASD's double wing offense meshes well with Wood's abilities after he initially struggled with the snap in the shotgun formation.

"It worked out great for him," he said. "We had better ball control and he was able to communicate with the center. Our center this year is totally deaf, so it will be a lot easier to communicate with him that way, too."

Woods played wide receiver before

transitioning into the quarterback role and guiding the team to the Mason-Dixon Championship. He said it was a great experience to face both deaf schools and public schools.

"The fact of the matter is that sometimes we don't get respect from public schools until we have to play them," Wood said. "That's how the saying is — you don't get respect. Respect is earned. This year, we're going to have to earn a lot more respect from the football community because I know we're a little 1A school, but I think if we just put our hearts, our minds and our power into it, I think we can all accomplish something good."

Wood said it was humbling and encouraging to win the Mason-Dixon Championship.


"... just because I have a disability doesn't mean I'm not a champion," he said. "It means I just have to work harder."

In the backfield, Wood will be joined by senior running back Cory McKinnie and junior running back Michael Paige. Tyson said those two would be the focal point of the running game.

"I'm sure there's more (who may carry the ball), but we'll find out this fall," he said.


On defense, junior middle linebacker Cullen Crook will lead a defensive that lost four linebackers from a year ago.

"At linebacker, he puts a lot of pressure on the offense and he does a great job leading, especially in the different game situations,"



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Tyson said. "He can stop the running plays. He's just fast all-around and can get through the offensive linemen to the quarterback."

Heading into the season, Wood said he hopes to see more motivation, leadership, heart and drive and that he'd like to "go out with a bang."

"With the older kids and the veterans who have stayed, I think we need to teach the younger kids who are moving up that it's about the team," he said. "I think the linemen, they need to know that the play doesn't happen unless they do their jobs. It all starts with them. It all starts on the snap. We all need to buckle up and get ready because we're going to have something to prove this year."



TANNER WOOD

Who's your favorite football player (college or professional), and why?

He's not in the league anymore, but it's Tim Tebow. All-around, he's just a good guy. He carries himself with great morals and beliefs, and he's been through a lot. People have judged him for what he believes in, and I don't think people should do that. I think he's a great leader to me and I look up to him.

What is your greatest football moment, at any level?

When I came over to ASD, I hadn't played football in a few years, and I wasn't a starter. But when I came over here, I started and I just felt welcomed to the team. I felt loved and cared for. It felt like I was at another home basically.

What motivates you to work hard? My family and friends. Just because

I've been told "No" a lot, like I can't do nothing because of my disability. I go out and prove people wrong because I don't think they should judge a book by its cover.

What are you looking forward to the most this season?

I'm looking forward most to the season for the brotherhood to come back, to be one big football family, have fun out there and win.

What are some of your interests outside of your sport?

I wrestle at (Alabama School for the Blind). I'm a two-time state qualifier there. I like to hang out with my friends. I've been looking at colleges and going all over the world.

How does playing multiple sports help you in football?

I learned this from my dad football sets you up for life. It has helped me be mentally strong, and if I'm playing another sport like wrestling, when I'm down by a couple points, I can't let that get into my head, because if I do, I'm already beat. I try to figure out what I can do to be on top, to win.

What's the best and worst part of fall camp?

The heat is the worst part, and the best part is just getting back with all your buddies and having a good time.

What's your favorite school subject?

This is going to sound crazy — it's math. I like math and science.

What are three things that you can't live without?

I can't live without my phone. I can't live without my family and friends. I can't live without my brotherhood.



FOR THE LONG HAUL

BB Comer taking next step in building program

Adam Fossett and the B.B. Comer High School football team will look to take the next step in building a program. In his first season, Fossett changed the culture and made the weight room a priority. This season, Fossett hopes to see those changes reflected in the win column.

"There are such big steps," he said. "The first step last year was let's get numbers. We have to have guys, we have to have kids to play. The first step is getting numbers and getting the expectations in line. Year two, you are still building; you are still processing the build. We want to be competitive. We want to go out there and compete."

Fossett has been impressed with the work ethic and dedication he's seen in the 50 players in the program from seventh through 12th grade. He believes if all goes according to plan, the future is bright for Comer athletics.

"We are trying to build for the long haul," he said. "I always try to have a three-, four-, five-year plan. I have a vision of what Comer football should look like in five years. As I pace my vision, I see we are pretty well on track. If we stay on track where we need to be, year three, four and five look pretty good."

Competing will be a tough task for the Tigers in Class 3A, Region 3. Comer will face defending champs Piedmont, Saks, Randolph County, Weaver and Wellborn. The top three teams: Piedmont, Saks and Randolph County combine for a 34-7 record. The top three teams made it to the third round or better.

"No matter how you slice it, dice it or look at it, our region is what it is," Fossett said. "You have to appreciate that and prepare for that mentality. I will never lie to my guys; I'll never sugarcoat it. I am upfront and honest with them. They know the region will be tough."

Even with a fuller roster, many of Fossett's players are younger, which means he'll have to play more players both ways. Saks and Piedmont won't have that problem.

"It is a numbers game," he said. "When you get to that situation, you run out of gas no matter what condition you are in. When you run out of gas, it is off to the races ... It is a matter of depth and getting those young guys where they can play."

If Fossett can get his underclassmen ready, it will give Comer a luxury it hasn't had in several seasons — depth.

"We have some ninth- and 10th-graders on the cusp of being able to start for us," he said. "I tell them all the time, guys show me that you can play. If you come in and play, we can start platooning guys. We can start changing some things up where the starters can get a break for a couple of plays."

The team comradery is strong. Fossett said this group gives him a different feeling than the ones he's had at previous schools.

"I have done this at a lot of different levels," he said. "I've had success at Winterboro and Childersburg. We had good Store Hours: Mon.-Thurs. 9 to 6. Fri. & Sat. 9 to 8

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
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teams there. I'm not claiming stake of winning 10 or 15 games this season, but it is a different feeling with our guys. It is a different mentality. On these guys' worst day, they are still fun to be around and it is not always like that in coaching."


One of the improvements Comer will have to make is on the offensive side of the ball. Last season, the Tigers averaged 11 points per game, which was helped greatly by two high-scoring games — 40 points against Glencoe and 30 against TC Central.

This season, Fossett hopes explosive junior running back Raphael Johnson can be the spark the offense so desperately needs.

"He knows that there will be a lot of weight on his shoulders coming into the season," Fossett said. "He will be our tailback and there will be a lot of workload for him. He has done a great job for us as far as the new role, learning the offense and getting us through spring. He rushed for a little less than 300 yards in the spring game. We have a lot of good things going for us as far as that goes. That's a testament of him buying into the program and buying into the weight program."



'CHIP ON YOUR SHOULDER'

Childersburg looking for redemption after disappointing 2018 finish

Childersburg High School's football team will look to rebound from a 2018 campaign that saw the team lose five straight games after starting the season 3-2 in Class 4A, Region 4.

Tigers head coach Jonathan Beverly said the team's struggles down the stretch last season helped fuel the returning players during the offseason.

"The way last season ended was not what we wanted, but the positive in that is I saw us work harder this offseason, starting in January, than I have in any of the years I've been here," he said. "I couldn't be more pleased, not only with how our kids handled this offseason, but also how our coaching staff has come together and how we attack each day with intensity and focus."

Beverly hopes that intensity bleeds over into fall camp and translates into a successful season that leads to the playoff.

"We want to get back to the postseason," he said. "That's our on-the-field goal for sure is to get back to the postseason and find ourselves

playing football in November."


Beverly said one of the offseason goals was to build a family atmosphere inside the fieldhouse and he cited examples of how his players have succeeded at accomplishing the task.

"That's the first thing that pops into my mind when I think about our football team is the fact that I see a lot of guys who love each other and care about the guy next to them," he said. "I see that in the locker room. I see it in the weight room. I see it when we're conditioning ... We'll see guys who are maybe struggling to finish a sprint, and we'll see guys run out there, tag along beside them and help them finish."

The Tigers didn't have as much turnover entering 2019 camp as they did a season ago. Childersburg had to replace 21 seniors from the 2017 squad compared to just 10 from 2018.

"We're really fortunate in that we didn't lose a ton of starters," Beverly said. "We didn't lose a lot in productivity on either side of the ball ... it's a positive for us, because a lot of these guys are going to be in a position to be able to play."

While departed senior Austin Douglas won't be there to throw





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passes this season, one of his primary targets will take the reins on offense.

"Cameron Thrash is going to transition into the role of quarterback for us this year," Beverly said. "He's done a great job all offseason. He had a really good spring for us. He was actually voted as our offensive MVP last year at receiver, so we're really excited to be able to have him transition into the quarterback spot because now the ball has to

touch his hands every play."

Thrash will take the snaps from senior center Kishon Reynolds, a four-year starter at the position.

"I couldn't be more proud of the progress (Reynolds) has made from the time he was a freshman until now entering his senior year," Beverly said. "I used to tell him all the time as a freshman that he was going to be the best center in 4A football. I truly believed it then,

and I believe it now."

The Tigers return what Beverly described as a "nasty" defense.

"We're going to be athletic on that side of the ball again," he said. "We've got a lot of returning starters on that side of the ball. We feel really good about it. It's a strong unit for us."

Childersburg faced Helena in its spring game and lost 48-20 against a team with nearly double the roster size and as explosive on offense as some of its region opponents. Beverly said he believes that game will help them prepare for the challenges that come within the region.

"I took a page out of what I felt like was our basketball coaches' playbook," he said. "Coach (Johnny) Johnson and Coach (Gavin) King, our two basketball coaches at school, they've always stressed just playing great competition in not only the regular season, but in their summer practices and things like that. We went out and we wanted to find the toughest team we could find to play a spring football game against, and it turned out Helena, a 6A school in the Birmingham area, had an opening.



"I thought it was great for our kids to see that level of competition because with our schedule, there's no off weeks. Not only is there no off week, we play a lot of offenses and a lot of quarterbacks that can throw the football well. I thought it was really good for our guys to see that."

Beverly said he expects to see more of an edge out of his team this season.


"I hate to use the term 'chip on your shoulder,' but I'd be lying if I didn't say you kind of feel that in the air," he said. "When you walk into the locker room or when you walk in the fieldhouse, there's just a sense of unfinished business. I don't know how that will quantify itself in wins and losses, but I do believe, honestly, that we will have a much more appealing product that's on the field on Friday nights."

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

CVA to compete in 8-man football this season

The 2019 football season seemed to be in jeopardy for Coosa Valley Academy up just a couple of weeks before the first game.

The Rebels only have 11 players on the roster, which made it impossible for them to compete in the AISA this season.

On Aug. 9, Coosa Valley Academy's board of trustees decided to play 8-man football this fall.

Coosa Valley Academy Athletic Director Shawn Baker said this decision was best for the kids.


"What we decided due to the number of players that we had on the team, we decided that we are going to drop out a year and try to rebuild a little bit," he said. "Playing 8-man

gives us a chance to still have football. The school is excited about it. Everybody is on board with it. The guys are all behind it, and the coaches think that it will be best. It will give us a chance to rebuild, and we will eventually move back to 11-man football.

With the typical threat of injuries, this option gives the team the opportunity to keep the season going. "It gives the guys something that they can compete in and be proud of," he said.

The Rebels will play in the Alabama Christian school league, which features Evangel Christian, Ezekiel Academy and Lyman Ward Military Academy.

"We are still a member of AISA in basketball, baseball, volleyball and all of our other sports," Baker said.





Interim head coach Jared Watson will lead the Rebels into 8-man football. He's has been an assistant at CVA for five years, and was named the interim coach on Aug. 5 after former coach Jeff Edwards decided to leave the program. Edwards, himself, was taking over for Jamie Scruggs, who finished 4-8 last season. Scruggs left CVA to become the offensive coordinator at Brookwood High School.

"Jared Watson is going to stay with us," Baker said. "He committed to stay with the boys. Travis Fields is going to be working with him. They have been working with the boys for a while now. They are going to get things going in a positive direction."

Watson played at Coosa Valley in 1984, when they won the state championship.

"He played at the University of Alabama," Baker said. "The guys have respect for him, and they really like him."

Baker hopes having success in 8-man football will help CVA get more football players to enroll into the school. He said this decision gives the school's three seniors a chance to enjoy their final season at CVA.

"We are glad to give our seniors something to look forward to this season," he said. "We are proud for them."

Family, football and phone.



Fayetteville vows to play hard in tough region

Fayetteville head coach John Limbaugh had quite the summer. He was involved in an accident in which he was hit in the head by a 1,400-pound cow ... multiple times.

The veteran coach/pastor had to have plastic surgery after the swelling went down in his face. Limbaugh said the accident made him take his own advice.

"It taught me something that I have always known, I talked to these kids about and preached about for 33 years," he said. "It taught me not to take one moment of any day for granted. Every second that I have with these young men are great times. It's fun teaching these guys the game of football, but teaching them about life is a whole different thing. That's what it's all about. Winning championships is one thing; winning in life is a totally different thing. That's what we want to teach at Fayetteville."

Limbaugh said he has two great jobs. He said his two professions complement each other.

"Being a pastor and coach really goes hand-in-glove," he said. "Being a pastor, we get to teach Christ. On the football field we can do the same thing, because he is a champion. Christ is a true champion. We can teach about him in all walks of life. That communication never stops whether you are at the church or the football field. He is what's important."

Last season, the Wolves finished with a 3-7 record and missed the postseason losing to Horseshoe Bend, 34-13. Limbaugh said defeating Horseshoe Bend to make the playoff is something the team should have accomplished

"We should've got it done," he said. "We played a bad game against Horseshoe Bend. We didn't play well, we didn't tackle well. We played pretty good ball at the end of the season. I don't know why it took so long but we are going to rectify the situation."

Saying Fayetteville's region schedule is tough is an understatement. The Wolves will take on defending 2A, Region 4 champions Reeltown, Thorsby and LaFayette. Even though it will



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be a tough task for the Wolves to win their second region crown since 2015, Limbaugh expects his players to compete every time they step on the field.

"I think we play in the hardest region in the state of Alabama," he said. "That's no excuse. You are going to see a Fayetteville team that plays hard. We have always played to the final second; this is a fighting team ... We learned a lot about ourselves towards the end of last year, in the spring and through the summer. One thing that I have learned is being an overcomer. Maybe some of that will come off on our team, too. Overcoming whatever life throws at you, whether it is a tough team you are playing or a tough deal. You just have to be able to overcome it."

Falling short of making the postseason is something that has motivated the Wolves during the offseason.

"Mainly make it to the playoffs," Brady Ritchey said. "I think that is our main goal. "Since I have

been here, I don't think we have made it to the playoffs yet. I think the main goal is for us to push each other, scratch, claw and do what we can to get there."

One thing that the Wolves will have to improve on from last season is their offense. In 2018, Fayetteville averaged 10 points per game. The Wolves are a run-first team, but Limbaugh expects quarterback Blake Machen to get the job done when he's

forced to put the ball in the air.

"One thing I like about Blake at the QB position is his toughness," Limbaugh said. "He is a competitor. He won't brag on himself because that is not how he was brought up. He is going to do a great job. We have a lot of kids that are going to step up — some new kids, new names that are going to step up and do great things for us. I am very excited about it."


Limbaugh wants his team to have the same approach regardless of how they are playing. The veteran coach said his team should just worry about the opponent they facing each game.

"Learn that every game matters," he said. "It could be a nonregion opponent that might help you get into the playoffs the way things shake out sometimes. It is cliché, I know, but to take it one game at a time. Don't look ahead. Our next focus right now is Woodland, we will move on after that. We have to take things one game at a time.

Limbaugh said the team is going to play to God's glory.

"We are going to give this year to him," he said. "We are going to do things the right way all the way through this year. We are going to hold each other accountable and be disciplined. If we are accountable and disciplined, I think the wins will take care of themselves."

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



Lincoln hopes to fix 2018's fourth-quarter woes

The final play of the 2018 season has haunted Lincoln High School's football team the entire offseason. The Golden Bears were about to go from worst to first in the region in 2018, but fell in the first round of the Class 4A playoffs to Alabama Christian on the final play off the game. Lincoln head coach Matt Zedaker said his team will

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have to find a way to close out the fourth quarter.

"That's been our calling card this offseason," Zedaker said. "Knowing that we want to take that next step. We want to defend the region title. Trying to win the region title

again is going to be very difficult. There are a lot of very good teams in that region. They've got to come through us first, and then take that next step. When you are a one seed playing a four seed in the playoffs, you need to try to win























that game. That's what we have been talking about and what we have been working towards."

One of the main factors in their early postseason exit was the quarterback play for the Golden Bears. Lincoln played without standout signal caller Javion Surles who tore his ACL in the regular season finale.

Zedaker refers to his quarterback as Cyborg after he recovered from his injury in just three months. The third-year coach said he expects big things from Surles this season.

"He is an unbelievable athlete, unbelievable genetically obviously with the way he recovers," Zedaker said. "He is back full speed. I held him out of contact in the spring game. Javion has had an excellent summer for us in 7-on-7 and just in our regular camp. I have a lot of expectations for him... (I expect him to) double his numbers from last year. Continue to improve on his accolades, be the leader on offense and be the captain, leader in the locker, lead by example and go do what he does."

Lincoln also returns several key playmakers on the defensive side of the ball. All-State safety Cam Reynolds and Division I prospects Steven White and Tre Garrett return to lead what Zedaker describes as a "nasty" defense. Lincoln held its opponents to 18 points or fewer in six games in 2018.

"We get to the ball," Zedaker said. "Coach (Skylar) Mansfield, our defensive coordinator, does a tremendous job with effort, with pursuit, with just the nastiness we want to bring. We want to be known as one of the hardest hitting teams in the county, and Coach Mansfield preaches that all the time. We are a very fast defense. We are going to put our athletes out there on the field. We are



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

SETTING A HIGH STANDARD

First-year coach Easley 'blessed' to be at Munford

The Michael Easley era is officially under way at Munford. Easley takes over for Bill Smith who left the Lions after four seasons to take over at Fayette County.

Easley takes over a Munford program that has been successful over the past six years before having an adversity-filled season in 2018. Easley didn't have a second thought about taking the Munford job and said he thought it was the perfect fit.

"Before last year, they have been to the semifinals twice in the six years previous to that," he said. "We played them in high school and played them in my earlier years at Saks. It is just a good program. I am very fortunate and very blessed for my first head job to be as good as Munford. There are some really good coaches that have to take really bad jobs as their first head job. I am very fortunate and very blessed."

Going into the season Easley doesn't have any hard set goals when it comes to the number of wins. The first-year coach said his goal is for his players to be able to leave his program and be successful members of society.

"At the end of the day, our sole focus is not winning games," he said. "I talked to them on day one. We are going to set a standard on how we expect our young men to act in the hallways, grades in the classroom. We set a pretty high standard. I told them from day one that I am not going to apologize for setting a high standard. We want to set the culture. We want young men to meet that standard every day. I told them I am a lot more about what kind of

husband, father, and employee you are going to be one day than football player. To me that's where success comes from."

Easley brings his high-powered offensive attack from Saks to Munford. Last season, Saks scored 451 points in 13 games. The Wildcats scored more than 450 points in six of the seven seasons Easley was the offensive coordinator, including a 511-point season in 2014 and 595-point season in 2013.

Easley would be elated if the success that he had at Saks translated into the same results at Munford, but he said he knows there are several factors that will determine those results.

"... every year is different, every school is different, every schedule is different," he said. "If we averaged 40 a game, I wouldn't complain, but, like I said, every team is different."

The Lions will depend on second-year quarterback Jay Tuck to have a huge season. Tuck had a solid season in 2018, but with the offense that Easley brings to Munford, look for Tuck's production to increase.

"Jay Tuck is one of those guys that you could fit in any offense that we had any year at Saks because of his skill set," Easley said. "At the quarterback position, he will run the ball some."

Munford will also depend on three-star prospect Justin Sistrunk on both sides of the ball. Sistrunk is the leader of the Lions defense at the linebacker position. Easley will have to manage Sistrunk's snaps so he can be productive late in games.

"The thing about Justin, he is athletic enough to get

out of the box, get outside and on the perimeter," Easley said. He is going to be on the field for us offensively, but he is going to be one of our better defensive players. He is big enough and strong enough to run in between the tackles; he is athletic enough to catch the ball on the perimeter. To be honest with you, you may see him all over the field from sideline to sideline."

Sistrunk will split carries with several backs, including TJ Johnson. Easley said Johnson, who has never played on offense, is Munford's best pure athlete.

"He has never played running back before; he is still learning," Easley said. "He played defense the first three years. I don't think he knew how to take a handoff on the first day of spring practice."

Nothing will be given to the Lions this season. Munford has non-region games against Oxford, Lincoln and Talladega, which will help them prepare for a grueling region schedule that includes Mortimer Jordan, who lost in the semifinals last season, and defending 5A champion Central Clay County.

"I joked with people that I moved out of what everyone would agree the toughest region in 3A to the toughest region in 5A," Easley said. "Clay Central, who won the state championship, had three or four losses last year. They beat Mortimer Jordan for only their second loss (in the semifinals). Up to that point, they won 10 straight. They get knocked out the semis after beating Clay Central in the regular season. The region is brutal."

Pointing to perennial powerhouse Center Point, Sylacauga and St. Clair County, Easley said: "It is a very tough region."





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

Pell City coach just wants to 'beat Oxford'

Pell City High School's football team got its first taste of action in a talent-packed Class 6A, Region 6 in 2018.

Panthers head coach Wayne Lee said his team is looking to build on a season where it bookended two pairs of victories around a six-game losing streak, with five of those games against region opponents. The Panthers finished fifth in the region last season.

"I think the big difference this year is everybody — me included, the players included — we kind of know more about what we're stepping into," he said. "We knew the region last







year and what it was about, but now after being in it a year, you really understand what it's about.

"Working towards that, I think we'll be a lot better off this year than we were last year."

The Panthers lost 12 seniors from the 2018 squad, but they will have continuity at the quarterback position with senior Mitch Gossett.

"(Gossett) has a year under his belt and should feel more relaxed," Lee said. "We're expecting good things out of him this year."

Joining him in leadership roles on the team will be offensive lineman John David Freeman and linebacker Brett Staples.

"Both of them (Freeman and Staples) will be three-year starters this year, and a three-year starter in 6A, it takes a pretty special kid to do that," Lee said. "Brett being a linebacker, he's kind of the quarterback on the defensive side of the ball and has been since he's been playing."

Freeman returns at a position group Lee said is a definite strength for the Panthers.

"We've got five guys returning on the offensive line," he said. "That ought to be a strength for us. We've got receivers coming back. Our quarterback is coming back.

"Defensively, the back seven have all got experience, but we've got to get better up front. On special teams, our kicker and punter are back, so we've got some guys in place. We've got some young kids who we got some good film on in the spring game."

Lee said his team needs to become more consistent this season.

"Last year, our first game and our last game were probably our two best games," he said. "Now we've got to get 2 through 9 going in (that direction)."

Freeman said he sees the improvement in mentality among his teammates going into the season.

"I think everybody's starting to work together as a team instead of being an individual player," he said.


Staples added that the team has emphasized giving maximum effort during offseason workouts.

"We've been working really hard during the summer and doing a lot of conditioning," he said. "I think it's going to be a lot better this year than last year."


Lee said he didn't want to discuss the specifics of the looming Week 3 matchup between Pell City and Oxford, which hired former Panthers head coach Keith Etheredge in May, but Lee acknowledged those developments give the rivalry a bit more juice.

He did touch on the challenges that come with facing his region opponents.

"There's no question you had the two best teams in 6A in that region with Clay-Chalkville and Pinson Valley, and







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Oxford, who very well could have been the third-best team ... We're one game out of a playoff spot. This year, we've got to find a way to get that playoff spot. We know a little more about it and what we've got to do."

As daunting a task as it may be to carve through a tough schedule, Lee reiterated making the playoffs is part of the

goals for this season.

"Every year, you want to get to the playoffs," he said. "Once you get to the playoffs, you never know and you see what can happen from there. For us, we want to beat Oxford. Bottom line, we want to beat Oxford."

Derrick Sewell is starting his second season as head football coach of the Ragland Purple Devils. After an inaugural season of 4-6 and missing the state playoffs, Sewell said he is excited about having seven returning starters on the offensive side of the football. And those returning starters could help get Ragland back to postseason play.

Offensively

This year, Sewell said the offense could operate more out of a shotgun look.

"But, we will try to move the ball down the field by running," he said. "If we have to throw it, we will. I feel like we are very good up front with our offensive line. Some of our newcomers are explosive. We may not spread it out offensively as much as people would like to see it, but we will pound the rock and see what happens."

Last year was a season of streaks for Ragland. They started the

season 0-4, won the next four games and lost the final two. They finished 2-4 in region play.


Key players returning

Sewell said key players returning include senior quarterback/ linebacker Elijah Ball; senior running back/linebacker Brody Bice; senior wide receiver/cornerback Nathaniel Kelley; senior linebacker David Sanders; senior tight end Kaeden Cotton; senior defensive tackle Matthew Turbville; senior offensive lineman Kaden Bice; junior offensive lineman/defensive tackle Jakolbe Brewster; junior offensive lineman Ryan Bearden; and junior defensive end Josh Phillips.

The Purple Devils are in the same region with Appalachian, Donoho, Spring Garden, Talladega County Central, Victory Christian and Winterboro.

Sewell said the region is tough, with three of the four teams





advancing to the state playoffs last year and winning in round one.

"I believe the team to beat is the defending region champs in Spring Garden," he said. They finished 11-2 last year and went 2-1 in the state playoffs. We lost to them late, losing a close one, 29-26. Week in and week out in our region, everyone is tough. You can't have an off night, and it is a grind every Friday. If you look over somebody, that's when it is going to slip up and get you."

Gaining interest

Being in a small 1A school, it can be a challenge getting enough kids interested in playing football.



Keys to success

Sewell knows he has to get off to a faster start than last year's 0-4 start.

"We broke in a lot of younger guys last year," he said. "They may have been juniors, but the three years prior, we had so many senior-loaded classes who carried the load. It took a few games for our guys to adjust last year. It's never easy when you're asking new guys to start out with 4A Ashville and 2A Westbrook. But, by the time we got to midseason, things were rolling."

Sewell said he just wants to make sure they are ahead of the game

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
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when the season starts.

Ragland will open the season on the road at Ashville.

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

Sylacauga leaving disappointing season-enders in the past


For Sylacauga High School's football program going into the 2019 season, the focus will be maintaining its spot as the most consistent football program in The Daily Home's coverage area.

The Aggies have finished with seven or more wins in the past 11 seasons, but two of the past three seasons have ended in heartbreaking first-round losses in Class 5A. In 2016, Sylacauga's potential game-winning 45-yard field goal attempt was ruled "no good" by officials in a 35-34 loss to Calera,

and a season ago, some down and distance confusion in the waning minutes against Jasper killed what would have been a game-tying touchdown drive for Sylacauga in the red zone. The Vikings added another touchdown to defeat the Aggies, 34-20.

Sylacauga head coach Matt Griffith said his team needs to let go of the past in order to move forward this season.

"Those (games) are tough, but we don't dwell on those things," he said. "Once those games are over, you move on to the next season. We understand that certain things happen, and you just kind of learn from your mistakes ...



"We've got a good football team coming back this year. Most of our kids are back, and they realize we have just been so close for so many years in those tight, first-round games. Every once in a while, a third or fourth (seed) gets out of the first round, but most of the time, you need to be your one or two (seed) in the region so you can make a run."

Griffith said he believes Region 5 is one of the toughest regions in 5A and that all four playoff seeds in the region are capable of advancing to the second round because each team has been battle-tested.

"You're facing Clay Central, a good football team and primarily a good football school," he said. "They don't make any bones about it. They don't really worry about winning in basketball or baseball or anything else. Mortimer Jordan is always in the third or fourth round of the playoffs. They're a very good school.

"Then, you've got Center Point that moved down from 6A that may be the most athletic team in the entire region, and they







just had a D1 quarterback move in from Fultondale. Here's the thing — to be good, you've got to play great competition. We're looking forward to it. We think we've got a team that matches up in our region really well."

The Aggies will have a different quarterback open the season for the fourth consecutive year. Senior JD DeLoach will fill the role previously held by Daylon Keith, one of Sylacauga's 15 seniors from a season ago.

"(JD) is a program player," Griffith said. "He's been with us since the seventh grade running the same system. He has very good feet and made tremendous improvements throwing the football ... We've (gone) to Spain Park. We've (gone) to Clay-Chalkville. We've (gone) to 7-on-

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

7s and faced 6As and 7As all summer long to show what competition is going to be.

"We're very excited. JD brings a lot to the table because he knows the offense so well. He's very intelligent and he's had a great summer."

DeLoach said he's looking forward to the opportunity to keep Sylacauga's streak of seven or more wins in a season going.


"I think that's really what I'm looking forward to the most and playing with all these guys beside me, our two running backs and all our receivers," he said. "You keep on winning, get out of the first round, play one game at a time and make some noise."

The first-year starter at quarterback will have plenty of help in the backfield. Sylacauga returns running backs Jordan Ridgeway, Journey Stockdale and Malik

Pope. Pope, a sophomore who played mostly on defense until late in 2018, showed immense talent on the offensive side of the ball.

"We brought Malik on really slowly, and I did that on the advice of two or three coaches that had tremendous players in the past," Griffith said. "Golinsky Smith was one of the greatest running backs to ever come out of Sylacauga. John Blackmon coached him. (Blackmon) said, 'Hey, bring that guy (Pope) along slowly. Golinsky wasn't ready as a ninth-grader. You might ruin him."

Griffith said he followed that advice and played Pope at strong safety, but a





tough late-season game forced him to pull the trigger on playing Pope at running back.

"We got in a Munford game that was a dogfight," he said. "It was a very close game. We're walking off at halftime, and I remember telling the staff. I said, 'I want him in. It's time ...' It made a tremendous difference. Then, he just ran wild against Jasper. On a dry field, he would have had 300 yards rushing. I think he had 250 that night, and with Ridgeway already being as good as he is, we're looking forward to these two running backs."

Griffith added that he is aware of the strengths and weaknesses when it comes to depth and some of that may sort itself out in fall camp.

"We've got some linemen who are very big up front and we've got some depth there," he said. "We think our depth at running back is very good with the two that I mentioned, plus Journey Stockdale got a lot of reps there ... We're a little thin in the secondary, a little thin at tight end and a little thin at wide receiver, but kids have to step up, and instead of getting all worked up that they're not the starter, they've got to realize that they're going to get some playing time because these guys are going to get tired."

Felder hopes to build on what Darby started at Talladega

Since taking the job last month, head coach Shannon Felder has consistently said it is all about results and not excuses.

Felder has the tough task of taking over a Talladega team that doesn't want to go back to losing. He knows it's vital for the team to have success early in the 2019 season.

"It is important that we get off to a good start for the players, coaches and community," he said. "If we get off to that good start, it is only going to build the confidence in the guys to buy into what we are doing, continue to work hard and stay focused on taking that next step."

Former coach Ted Darby changed the culture at Talladega in his two seasons at the helm.

Darby led the Tigers to the playoffs in consecutive seasons, a feat that hadn't happened since 1994-95.

Darby's motto was "Losing is not an option." Even though

Darby is no longer with the team, the mentality remains.

"You still have to have the same mindset," senior D'Corian Wilson said. "It doesn't matter what is going on on the outside. We are still going to be the only ones playing on Friday nights. It doesn't matter what is going on with the coaching staff, we have to focus on what we have to do so we can get it done."



The players appreciate what Darby was able to do for them during his tenure, but now they are ready to move on and focus on playing for Felder.

"I feel like the situation with Coach Darby has to be in our rearview," Scales said. "We have to keep going with Coach Felder. Our determination level has gone up to another level. Everybody is hungry in the weight room. We are working very well in the weight room. We are working very well on the practice field. We are ready for this thing to get going. We are going to be alright."

Even though Felder only took the job in July, he is adamant about putting his offensive and defensive system in place.

"We are putting our system in," he said. "We are translating their terminology to our terminology. It is going to be a process but it is necessary to put our system in because trying to learn their system at some point is going to end up hurting us. We are teaching those things to the guys and we are going to move at a pace at whatever they allow. We will probably be putting in stuff as the season goes on."

Wilson said it is going to be vital for the team to pay attention to what the coaches are teaching because they have a short time to learn the new system.

"We just need to lock in and focus every day that we go to practice," he said. "Every day, we need to focus on learning the new system so that we will be ready for the first game."

Scales had a stellar sophomore season for the Tigers as he threw for 1,685 yards and 20 touchdowns. He believes the offense has the potential of being good in Felder's spread attack.

"I think the offensive scheme that we have right now is going to be great," he said. "As far as for me, my receiving core: (D'Corian), Michael (Mcgregor), Isaiah Cunningham and John Ellis. We have a lot of talent on the outside and a lot of take as far as backs, so we are going to be great. The o-line is coming together so we should be really hard to stop this year."


Felder didn't go as far as Scales when speaking on the offense, but he has been impressed with what he has seen so far.


"We have some good skill players coming back," he said. "We have a line that's inexperienced. That's an area where we have to make some improvements. I love this team. TC Fighting Tigers have big expectations for small roster

TC Central head coach Chris Mahand hopes that quality over quantity will be the case for his football team this upcoming season. The Fighting Tigers will have low numbers this fall as Mahand expects to only dress 22-23 players. Even though they have low depth, the Fighting Tigers head coach expects his team to compete.

"They're going to be low, but we never had big numbers at TC," he said. "We are not going to use that as an excuse. You can only put eleven out there. As a coaching staff, we have to make sure that our kids are in shape and ready to compete. Like I tell them all the time, we are not the Fighting Kitty Cats, we are the Fighting Tigers."

TC lost nine players from last season's team that finished with a 4-6 record and fell in the first round of the AHSAA Class 1A playoffs to Falkville. TC will be young at several skill positions this season.

Senior running back Blesstin Gamble will carry the load offensively.

"Blesstin Gamble ran the ball well for us last year," Mahand said. "He is going to be our primary running back this year. I expect a lot out of him. He should be able to stay fresh. At TC with 22 players, I still have three or four skill guys that won't be playing both ways. We are still going to have some talent. This is TC; we keep some talent. We just have to get it developed and ready to play. Some of the talent is going to be

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young and some of the younger kids that we weren't expecting to play will have to step up and play."

One of the positions of need for TC will be at quarterback. Last season's signal-caller, JD Davis, transferred to Lincoln during the off-season. Going into fall camp, Mahand said he had several different players vying for the spot.

"I have a couple of guys that's trying to step up and get it done," Mahand said. "I have a couple of guys that have the athleticism that JD Davis had. For me to sit here and tell you to lose your starting quarterback and one of the best athletes on the team (doesn't hurt), that won't be truthful."

But Mahand emphasized that football is a team sport.

"Even though he left and he was one of our better athletes,

he wasn't our only athlete and he wasn't the team," Mahand said. "I am not the team; these guys are not the team. That's the point of having a team."

Even though TC will have several new faces on the field, the expectations remain the same.

"Our goals are always to win the region, first of all, have a successful season, and definitely try to win the state championship," Mahand said. "I am not going to tell my kids what they can't do. I need to get out of the game, or any coach needs to get out of the game if you are going to tell your kids that. I am coaching my kids to win the state championship, and that's what they are playing for."

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

Victory Christian hoping to find success of three years ago

Victory Christian veers toward the 2019 campaign trying to find the magic from three seasons ago when they were contenders in Class 1A.

The Lions enter the upcoming season with a new head coach, Bruce Breland.

Breland previously served as offensive coordinator under recently-resigned head coach Mike Holliday.

Breland has held head coaching jobs at Coosa Valley Academy, Bessemer Academy, Fultondale, Shelby County, Woodlawn and Alma Bryant. He has compiled an 88-109 record in his 19 years leading football programs.

"I think it's great," Breland said. "My last stop, I had 105

players. Now, I have 25 players.

"The thing that I'm excited about with them is they are all great young men character-wise at a great school. They support us very well, and I couldn't be any happier where I am ... Being able to come back and coach again is just a blessing to me."

Victory Christian will open the season at home against Fayetteville on Aug. 30 at 7 p.m. Breland said it would be great to open the season with a victory.

"I think it would be a huge feather (in our cap) with Fayetteville being a 2A school," he said. "When we go into that game, we're not looking at them as being anything above where we are. We're ready to play at that level ... I think it would show our guys their hard work is worthy."

The Lions lost just seven seniors from the 2018 squad. One of



those vacancies includes the quarterback position, but Breland said he'll roll with freshman quarterback Dalton Lewellyn to replace last season's starter Abe Sargent.

"(Lewellyn) is an outstanding ballplayer," he said. "We have complete confidence in him. He's a great athlete. He's got a good arm, really good feet and a great head on his shoulders. We're not expecting to miss a beat with him in there."

Running back/safety Lee Yeager and offensive/defensive lineman PJ Holman return as two key leaders for the Lions.

"Whether we're in the weight room, whether we're in school or we're at Shop 'N' Snack, these two guys right here is what Victory Christian is all about," Breland said. "We expect them to shoulder (the) load, and they do it with the leadership they bring."

Breland said he considers running back, the offensive line, defensive ends and linebackers as positions of strength going into the season.

"Offensively, we'll continue what we do


because I've been offensive coordinator," he said. "Defensively, we went to the 4-2-5 last year, which is what we'll be running this year. We will try to make it a little more unpredictable, be a defense that forces the action a little more and not allow the offense to dictate to us what it wants to do."

Victory Christian put together one of its best seasons in 2015 and won its first home playoff game in school history (a 33-19 victory over Woodville in the first round of the 1A playoffs).

have been on the cusp of a playoff berth, but a 5-13 record in region play during that span has kept an otherwise competitive program on the fringe.

"The players are working hard, and they want it," Breland said. "They want the very best for Victory Christian and themselves, and they are striving very hard to be an elite team and be one of those playoff teams."

Breland said the late-season scramble to claim one of four region playoff spots can be challenging.

"The region is a tough region for sure, and depth towards the end of the year is critical," he said. "So is staying injury-free ... Some injuries are unavoidable, and you just try to stay above that, and hopefully this year, we will because we don't have a lot of depth. We do have a lot of passion, and these boys are working hard getting ready to play."

He added his goal is to build a true program where year-in and year-out, the team is more competitive and not having to rely on "the good group" of players to rise through the system.

"That's what we're striving for is to be able to build that program, starting with the younger guys," he said. "I think it starts in the weight room and it starts at the junior high level.

"We're going to get there ... Everyone wants it now, but that's unrealistic. We want it as fast as possible."

Winterboro hoping for fast start to 2019 season

Winterboro High School's football team experienced its most successful campaign under head coach Alan Beckett in 2018 and continued the program's upward trend.

The Bulldogs will look to build off a season that saw them finish third in Class 1A, Region 5 and pick up a first-round playoff win over R.A. Hubbard before falling to South Lamar in the second round.

While the region is a challenge, Beckett said his team must focus inward in order to move further in 2019.

"I think all our battles are within us," he said. "We try to win on the daily, not finger-point and just be together from a leadership end of things ... I don't want us to be our own worst enemy is kind of what I'm getting at because we do have talent. We just have to stay healthy, bring it on the daily, handle adversity and all those good old coaching sayings. They all definitely apply to us."

The Bulldogs lost 12 seniors from a 2018 class that included starting quarterback Shaun Vincent, who also started at

linebacker with senior Luke Wheeler.

"That was a good senior class — a good, close-knit, positive group," Beckett said. "Jake Travis will come in and work where Luke Wheeler was at linebacker. Luke played a lot of snaps for

"Our backfield will look a little different. We'll be able to get into more of a heavy set and we'll be able to spread it out. Cam Pointer is out (here for us). He's a really good basketball player we've seen for the past several years. We've been trying to get him out and all his buddies have wanted him to play. He's had a great summer for us. Whether that translates, we'll see."

Winterboro will have a somewhat new signal-caller in senior Isaiah Holland. Last season, Holland served as a quarterback in goal-line packages and contributed on defense for the Bulldogs.

"(Holland's) our guy at quarterback," Beckett said. "He's a runner as well as a thrower. He plays defensively and is one of our leaders. We're working a lot on the leadership end, and we're looking for big things ... We're trying to get him to be 'Mr. Even Steven' because he is a competitor, and I want his body language to stay really good."

Running back/linebacker Marquez Curry also returns for the Bulldogs after missing his junior year due to two injuries to the same knee.

Beckett said Curry displayed leadership by remaining with the team on the sideline and in practice except for when he had to work on his rehabilitation, but now that he's healthy, he's itching to get on the field.

"(Curry's) a real physical, hard-nosed, inside-the-box kind of player," Beckett said. "We've done a lot of 7-on-7, which is kind of tough on him because he's ready to get out of the cage and play some real football. We look forward to what he does."

On the offensive line, senior center Cade Sanders returns to anchor a position group that lost just one starter, Demondre Robinson, from the 2018 team.

"We had an injury to center a couple years ago, and (Cade), as a ninth- and 10th-grader, kind of got thrown into the fire," Beckett said. "It's been a trial by fire, but he's gotten better every year. Obviously, when you get that high a volume of snaps, you're going to get better.

"Last year was Cade's best year, and he's gotten stronger. He's gotten really serious about it and has spent a lot of extra time on his own in the weight room."



Beckett said he'd like to see his team start faster this season. The Bulldogs went 3-3 through the first six games of 2018 before mounting a four-game winning streak that ended in the playoffs.

"Part of it, we were trying to figure out

who was what because it was an entirely different skilled team from the year before," he said. "You kind of start over, and we were still learning who we were. We changed some things offensively as the year went on, and I thought that was beneficial to us."


