












Making our predictions

Find out where your favorite team stands heading into the 2024 season

High school football is rolling into the local picture by the power and energy of a steam engine.

We'll have a wide range of teams in the area, with some that can go deep in the state playoffs to ones that are aiming to get off the deck after a rough 2023. But, at this point of the year, everybody is undefeated and full of optimism.

As usual, we've got a special section to help you readers preview the season.

In these pages, we've got a couple of concepts for you to enjoy. First, each team is represented by a team leader. We hear a lot from the coaches before, during and after the year, but this year, we tried to give a team leader the platform to talk about hopes and goals for this season, individually and for the team.

We hope you appreciate what they have to say.

Second, we're using this lead story to provide basic predictions for how each team should finish. It's very general, divided into four categories:

- 1, Make some noise: playoff-bound and will make a deep run;
- **2, Darkhorse:** playoff-bound and are darkhorse to advance;
- **3, Underdogs:** might need something unexpected to happen to make the playoffs;
 - 4, Aiming to improve: the sea-

son will be a success if they can win some games.

Make some noise

—**Oxford:** The Yellow Jackets have an ace quarterback in Louisville commit Mason Mims. Not only is he a quality passer, he's a solid team leader.

Sam Adams' group is ranked sixth in the Class 6A preseason poll, and his team should advance far in the playoffs. Then again, the Yellow Jackets are accustomed to doing good things in the postseason.

—Anniston: Ranked ninth in the Class 4A preseason poll, the Bulldogs will be strong up front on the offensive and defensive lines. We've known Anniston to have great skill players, they have good linemen, too.

A year ago, the Bulldogs finished the regular-season strong with four wins in five games, but they got stuck traveling all the way to Brewton in the opening round of the Class 4A state playoffs. They fell 20-16 to T.R. Miller.

—**Piedmont:** The Bulldogs have long been a state power in Class 3A, but injuries made life tough for head coach Jonathon Miller and his team a year ago. They finished the regular

season 4-6 but managed to win a first-round playoff game before falling in the second round.

Heading into Miller's second year as head coach, Piedmont is ranked seventh in the Class 3A preseason poll, and we're betting that the Bulldogs come back strong this year with another deep playoff run. Cole Wilson is back at quarterback, and he's got an exciting group of receivers to throw to.

—**Spring Garden:** Ranked ninth in the Class 1A preseason poll, the Panthers might be a tad underrated. They won five straight region titles before finishing second last year to a powerful Wadley squad.

This year's team has 12 seniors, and it's a quality group of 12th-graders. This school is accustomed to football success, and it's hard to imagine Spring Garden not winning a couple of playoff rounds — or more.

—Jacksonville Christian: The JCA kids are playing eight-man football these days, and they're really good at it. Last year, they averaged 47.1 points a game and went 8-0. There's enough talent returning to do it again.

Darkhorse

—**Pleasant Valley:** The Raiders started strong last year with four straight wins and made the playoffs for the first time since 2010. But, they struggled in the second half of the year and finished 5-6 with a first-round playoff loss.

Head coach Jonathan Nix and his team should take another step forward this year in Class 2A, Region 7. This region isn't a pushover by any stretch of the imagination, but there's a path to a better record.

—Wellborn: Jeff Smith led his Panthers to a region title last year, but a first-round playoff loss threw some water on the fun. They're playing in Class 3A, Region 6, which isn't going to be easy to win. Wellborn will make the playoffs, but the goal is always to win some games — not just make the field.

—Alexandria: The Valley Cubs went 1-9 last year, but that was an aberration. After moving from Class 5A to 4A, expect them to return to the playoffs. We'll have to see whether they can move past the first round.

—**Jacksonville:** A year ago, the Golden Eagles advanced to the Class 4A quarterfinals, but they lost star quarterback Jim Ogle from that squad. In addition, they're moving up to 5A.

We're picking Jacksonville to make the playoffs again, because the program that head coach Clint Smith has built has made us think you can't have the playoffs without his team involved.

Underdogs

—White Plains: The Wildcats struggled a lot last year in Blake Jennings' first season as head coach. But, give them credit as they showed a lot of fight down the stretch. An overtime loss to Munford was all that separated them from the playoffs.

We're not ready to predict they're going to make the playoffs this year, but if they keep showing that kind of intestinal fortitude, we won't be surprised if they make the postseason.

—**Ohatchee:** The Indians won three straight to start last season but wound up going 5-5 and missing the playoffs for the first time since 2015.

They should be better this year, but they're playing in Class 3A, Region 6, which is tough and has nine teams. They could be a better team and still not make the playoffs.

—Weaver: The Bearcats are receiving plenty of deserved praise for improving to 4-6 last year. Now, the next step is making the playoffs.

As with Ohatchee, they're in Class 3A,

Region 6, and while they should be better, that may not be enough to make the playoffs.

Aiming to improve


—**Donoho:** The Falcons didn't win a game last year, and they have a new coach in Bill Smith, who has plenty of experience rebuilding programs.

The big plus is that they're playing in Class 1A, Region 6, which has only six teams. A playoff spot is possible. So is a winning season. Even so, we believe Donoho will improve, but we're uncertain how much.

—**Saks:** The Wildcats won only one game last year, and while they'll be better, they're in that tough Class 3A, Region 6 field. It's hard to predict a playoff berth.

—Cleburne County: The Tigers made the playoffs last year for the first time since 2015, but they also lost six of their last seven games, including a 44-7 first-round loss to Jackson. They've lost 20 seniors from that team.

—Ranburne: Class 2A, Region 4 will be a tough road for Ranburne, which also has a strong non-region schedule. Stephen Bailey does a great job with this program, so we aren't counting out the Bulldogs from the playoffs, but we're not predicting a sure-fire appearance.



Alexandria's Cleat Forrest

Whether it's on the football field, the basketball court or the golf course, Alexandria's Cleat Forrest always gives it everything he's got.

Forrest, entering his sixth year as a member of Alexandria's football team, has been a household name in Calhoun County for quite some time thanks to his big leg.

He's put in countless hours perfecting his craft, and it shows on Friday nights inside Lou Scales Stadium. He's made a 48-yard field goal in a game, but his range extends far beyond that, as he's nailed a 63-yarder in practice.

College coaches have taken notice with Forrest receiving full scholarship offers from UAB and Murray State over the summer.

Alexandria, coached by Todd Ginn, struggled last season, finishing 1-9 and missing the playoffs for the first time since 2016. Forrest said last season left the Valley Cubs with "a bad taste in our mouth." They'll look to rebound in 2024.

Forrest took time recently to talk about his team and what it means to be an Alexandria Valley Cub.

Question: What does it mean to you to be able to go out on that field on Friday nights with that Alexandria jersey on?

Answer: That means everything to me. I've grown up there my whole life. My family is from there. I've got people like Coach Ginn — all the coaches there — that taught us the right way. The Alexandria way is what I love.

Q: The stands are always packed at Alexandria home games. What's it like having that kind of support?

A: It really meant a lot last year because we didn't have the best season, but our fans still showed up every single week. It doesn't matter how we're doing, they're going to support us, and that makes you feel good.

Q: What are the goals for this season? A: To improve. You know we didn't have the season we wanted last year. That wasn't Alexandria football. We know we can do a lot better, and that's the main thing for us. **Q:** You said that wasn't Alexandria football. What did you guys learn last year during that rough stretch?

A: We learned that we just weren't prepared last year. I mean, we were young, so one good thing that I take away is that we got a lot of experience. I hope we can use that this year.

Q: What do you feel like the strength of this year's team is?

A: How close we are. We're all like brothers, and I mean that too, it's not just cliché. We're all really close, and we're going to fight for each other.

Q: What's it like playing for Coach Ginn?

A: It's good. It's a good feeling playing for somebody that's been places like state championships, not only in football, in basketball. He knows how to win, and he knows how to make us win.

Q: Alexandria has a rich history in football. Is there a former player that you look up to?

A: It's hard to pick one. There's a lot. I'd say both Coach Ginns (Todd and Will) have been the biggest influence to me. They've coached me since I was little. I've known them my whole life, and they've had a great influence on me.

Q: Is there a game on the schedule that you guys are looking forward to the most?

A: I wouldn't say there's one single game that we're looking forward to. They're all important to us. I'd say that, right now, the one we're looking to is the first one. I think that's Jacksonville. That's who we're looking forward to, because that's the first game.

Q: You guys are dropping from 5A to 4A. Are you looking forward to playing some new teams this year?

A: Not just looking forward to playing some new teams, looking forward to playing some local teams. I feel like that's better for the community and I feel like that's better just overall, because we played some pretty far-away teams last year, and it's just hard to travel. That's going to bring more fans in, I feel like, playing these local teams. And some old rivalries are going to be brought back, too.

Senior spotlight on ...

Anniston's Andrew Nelson

The Anniston Bulldogs are typically known for their skill players, but that didn't stop second-year head coach Rico Jackson from bringing three trench players to Calhoun County Media Day.

Senior defensive end Khamar Holder and senior center Andrew Nelson represented the Bulldogs at this year's event, but Jackson also brought along Sharontae Bailey, who he called "his sensational sophomore."

Nelson suffered an injury during the spring but will be ready to go for Week 1, according to Jackson. He'll be looking for redemption this season after Anniston fell to T.R. Miller 20-16 in the first round of the Class 4A state playoffs a year ago.

Nelson, who is an undersized offensive lineman, makes up for it with his work ethic. Jackson said he "hasn't missed a day" during the summer months and described him as "the ultimate worker."

Nelson took time recently to talk about what it means to wear that Anniston uniform, the Bulldogs' strengths and their goals headed into the 2024 season.

Question: What did it mean to you to have Coach Jackson select you to represent Anniston at Calhoun County Media Day?

Answer: I was so grateful, because I've always been an underdog in my own eyes, because I've been a smaller O-lineman all my life. Each year, I've been, like, a younger guy and smaller, so I was just grateful to him.

Q: What does it mean to you to wear that Anniston uniform?

A: It's surreal, like, just seeing all the players — I've always went to Anniston games, because that's where my dad has went, he's always went to Anniston, so I've always went to Anniston — just seeing them playing, and now I'm playing like them, it's just surreal.

Q: What's the goal for you guys this season?

A: Win region and state.

Q: What do you feel like the strength of this team is?

A: I think the strength is always our skill guys, but I think we have a great O-line and D-line coming in. Our skill guys have alway been just fast and great."

Q: What's it like playing for Coach Jackson?

A: It feels great. I feel like he cares about us, not just in football, but on a personal level. Like when I hurt my knee, I was worried that he might make me come back in or do stuff just cause he's a football coach, but he didn't. He understood, and he's been checking on me the whole time. I feel like he cares about me personally.

Q: What's the difference between year one and year two with Coach Jackson?

A: I feel like all the guys are more unified and together. We've been grinding a lot more this year, and we already know what the expectations are with him.

Q: Y'all had a close loss in the first round of the playoffs last year. How much have y'all used that as motivation this offseason?

A: Me, personally, I've used it a lot, because I feel like I had a bad game that game. I kept messing up the snaps, because it was raining. I've just been keeping that in the front of my mind, just working, grinding, because I don't want that to ever happen again.

Q: Anniston has new turf at Lott-Mosby Memorial Stadium. Are you excited about that?

A: Yes sir. I love the look. I'm happy, like, used to, not necessarily with Coach Jackson but before that, we used to have to paint the field, the players did. I did not like painting the field. You'd get paint all over you.

Donoho's Kai Cleckler

Local high school sports fans know the name of Donoho senior Kai Cleckler well.

He's a standout baseball player for the Falcons and has made all-Calhoun County as a freshman, sophomore and junior. Don't be surprised if he makes it four-for-four next spring.

As for football, it's been a little tougher road. He played his first season of football last fall and was too good of an athlete to leave on the sideline, despite his inexperience. Donoho went 0-9, but Cleckler showed improvement as the year went along.

This year, he's working under a new coach. Bill Smith has moved from Talladega High to Donoho, and his hiring offers hope to Cleckler and Donoho's five other seniors. Smith is entering his 16th season as a head coach with a 77-85 record.

Cleckler is back at quarterback, and he's looking forward to showing the improvement he's made since last season.

He recently took time to talk about his time as a Donoho football player and the effect Smith will have on the 2024 team.

Question: What does it mean to you to be a senior leader for your team?

Answer: It really hit me on the first day of spring practice when Coach (Smith) said, "Seniors, you got anything to say?" I looked around for our old seniors, and I was like, "Oh, that's us now." So, it really put it in the big picture for me right there. So, I was like, "I've got to step up now."

Last year, I had to step up, too, since it was my first year playing football. So I had to lead and be led at the same time, but it was a big learning curve for me and we've got the hang of it now.

Q: What do you feel like you

learned from that first year last season that can help you this year?

A: Decision-making is a big one. Not forcing throws, not trying to do too much. Just if the 3-yard out is there, throw it.

Q: What brought you out for football last year?

A: I was going to play my 10th-grade year because I transferred in winter of the ninth-grade year. Then I got hurt, had to get surgery and missed the whole season. So, I told the coach, "Mark my words right now: I'll be back better, bigger, better, stronger and faster for you."

Q: You've been a name that we've known about for a long time for baseball. Is there anything in baseball that you picked up that you can apply to football?

A: Baseball is a sport of failure. Football can be the same thing. If you're having a bad day and drop a pass, so what? Go out there and get the next one.

Q: Seems like you've got an excellent relationship with your coach even though he's only been here for four months. Why is that?

A: Just the energy he brings. He brings good energy to the locker room. Fun guy, good assistant coaches. Just having fun.

Q: You've got a group of six seniors, and it looks like you're pretty tight. How would you describe the friendship and bond that you guys have?

A: We hang out almost every weekend also, all six of us. It's a pretty good time.

Q: What would you like to do once school is over? Do you have plans?

A: Just try to work hard and see what (scholarship offers) I can get for all sports.

Jacksonville's Braden Ball

Jacksonville's Braden Ball is headed into his senior year, and his fourth year suiting up for the Golden Eagles. After reaching the Class 4A state quarterfinals last season, they're moving up to 5A, Region 6.

Ball earned All-Calhoun County Class 4A-6A first team honors last year, and joining him on the offense are fellow firstteam performers Ben Prigden (offensive line), Zae English (running back) and Jackson Bonner (fullback/tight end).

Ball is one of five returners on Jacksonville's offensive line, a big reason the Golden Eagles believe they can repeat the success they've had in the past. The majority of the returning starters are seniors, including Ball, Drake Lee, Jackson Wade and Gehrig Strain.

This year's offensive line will be tasked to block for a new quarterback, something that hasn't happened for the last four years, as Jim Ogle has graduated and is suiting up for Murray State, where his father, Jimmy Ogle, is co-offensive coordinator. Ball believes no matter who is taking the snaps for the Eagles, the guys up front will do what they have to do to allow their guy to make plays.

Ball has experience on both offense and defense, playing tackle on both sides of the ball.

Last year as a starter for the Golden Eagles, Ball and the rest of his team made a run in the 4A playoffs. Unfortunately, they fell to eventual 4A champion, Montgomery Catholic, in the quarter-finals.

Ball took a few minutes during the Calhoun County High School Football Media Day to discuss his team and the goals for the season.

Question: What are the expectations for the upcoming season?

Answer: I have really high expectations. All five of us up

front are coming back. We have our running back coming back. We have some really good young guys stepping up and filling some spots. I've got high expectations.

Q: What does it mean for the team to have returning starters like yourself and the O-line, along with players like Zae English running the ball?

A: It's amazing. The bond is

there. We've been playing together since little league. It's just amazing to have all of those guys coming back.

Q: What can you say about the younger guys you mentioned who will be stepping up and filling spots?

A: The young guys that are stepping up are really good, really hard workers. I only have

great things to say about them. They participate in the weight room, participate in practice. I've got really high hopes for them. They're going to be solid.

Q: It'll be the first time in four years that a new quarterback will be taking snaps in Jacksonville. What can you say about Jackson Bonner and Matthew Salmon's progression over the summer?

Where do the expectations for them sit?

Jacksonville Christian's Jesse Gannaway

The eight-man football team commonly referred to as Jacksonville Christian was an offensive juggernaut in 2023.

Coach Tommy Miller's Thunder raced to an 8-0 regular season record, including a 48-32 win over Tuscaloosa Christian of Cottondale, before losing to Tuscaloosa Christian 56-48 in the first round of their conference's four-team playoff.

For nine games, the Thunder averaged 47.1 points per game. Senior running back Travis Barnhill rushed for 845 yards and 13 touchdowns on 108 carries and caught 31 passes for 608 yards and 11 touchdowns. Sophomore quarterback Noah Lee was 114 of 167 passing for 2,032 yards and 31 touchdowns with two interceptions. Lee also ran the ball 35 times for 162 yards and six touchdowns. Junior wide receiver Jesse Gannaway had 54 receptions for 1,065 yards and 16 touchdowns. Barnhill was also a leader on defense for the Thunder with 99 tackles, six for lost yards, and two interceptions from his linebacker position.

Gannaway transferred to Jacksonville Christian as a junior. He started as a receiver on offense and a cornerback on defense for the 2023 team. Gannaway has grown an inch and gained 15 pounds of muscle during the offseason. Before a recent practice, he discussed the 2023 and 2024 seasons.

Question: What were the best things about the 2023 season for your team?

Answer: I think going undefeated in the regular season. That was a really good accomplishment. I think all of us bonding with each other because last year was my first year and it didn't feel like I was a stranger to any of them. They treated me like one of

Caleb Stallings, who was our fullback last year, I think he'll step up a lot. It's going to be hard replacing them but I think we can do it, especially with the kids we have coming up, too. I think we're going to have a really good season.

Q: How much better do you think everybody who is coming back is this year?

A: Instead of sitting inside and playing video games all day, we were outside almost every day this summer either working, lifting weights or up here with the coaches working, getting better with our feet, quickness and just getting used to the heat so it doesn't come as a surprise to us for our first game.

Q: What do you see as the strengths of the team in the 2024 season?

A: I think our passing is going to be really good. A bunch of teams we play, I know they think that we only have a passing game. I guarantee it since Travis is gone. We have everything in my opin-

We have a running game. I think running is going to be a really big factor for us this year, just going along with the passing. It's going to be really hard to stop us offensively. Then on the defensive side, even though we lost Deon and Travis, we're filling those spots. I think our secondary is going to be really tough to pass against. Even coming up to block us on runs. I think our DBs are going to be really hard to pass against and even to come up and try to stop us from making a tackle.

Q: Do you and your teammates have any pre-game rituals, something you always do before you leave the locker room?

A: I think one of our main things is we get in and pray. You don't know when your last game is going to be. We always

give thanks to the Man Above. Without Him, we wouldn't be here and be able to do anything we want to do. I think just giving praise, thanks and honor to Him really helps in our eyes. Eating as a team, whether that be here for home games or somewhere else for away games, I think that really bonds us together, especially for the games.

Q: Are there any superstitions? A: Moses Averette, he's always wearing his dirty socks. Me, I'm not superstitious, but I like to have everything organized. Whatever I wore that past Friday, if we won, I want to wear that again. Even if we're away, I want to wear



Grey Knight got hurt and Wesley Wheeler came in and he did a great job at learning from Grey and filling in his role. Braxton Salster got a concussion and then Jaden (Sparks) come in and he stepped up and Bryce Freeman. They ran quarterback and they did a great job at it, too.

Q: How much progress has

the team made over the last six months?

A: A ton. On average, every player has gone up 100 pounds on their top five lifts. We're all getting stronger, faster and that's going to help us on the field. I think the buy-in in the weight room is helping so much. People have gained 30 pounds in a couple of months and it's just going to help so much in football.

Q: What will be the strengths of the 2024 team?

A: I think the pursuit of perfection. I think all of us want it so bad

and we all want to win a playoff game, make it to the playoffs, and host in the playoffs. All of us want it so bad and we're willing to do anything to get there.

Q: How much will getting into the playoffs last year help you get to that next step of being at home in the playoffs and winning in the playoffs?

A: I think it shows us that we can do it. I feel like for the longest time at Pleasant Valley people were just content with losing. That's what you did at Pleasant Valley. Now that we're winning

and making the playoffs, I feel like now we know we can do it. We can go all the way and we can win those games.

Q: Does your team have any pre-game rituals?

A: Before every game, we turn the lights off and we all sit in our lockers and we pray. We pray for protection and pray that God will use us. Before every game, we do that. Calm before the storm I describe it as. I love doing it. I think it helps us a lot.

Q: Are there any superstitions?
A: For me, I put on my pants
and my shoulder pads in the
same order because I feel like if
I do it any differently it will mess
me up. I have the same prayer
before the game. I feel like that
helps a lot.

Q: What do you and your teammates do to celebrate a win after the game?

A: Last year, after every win we would play a song (always Play that Funky Music) and Coach (Darren) Hamby would get in the middle of the room and start break dancing. We'd all go crazy. We'd start singing along and dancing with him. Moments like that help you realize how great high school football is.

Q: How do you recognize that Coach Nix has stopped joking around and is serious about something?

A: You can see it in his face. You know right then when you see that face to cut it out, stop doing whatever you're doing, pay attention and focus. I feel like there's time for games and there's time to be serious and he lets you know what time that is.

You can definitely see it building up and I can tell before most people can. If people are still goofing off, I'm like, "Guys, he's getting mad. It's time to stop."

Senior spotlight on ...

Saks' Jacori Avery

Saks football coach Alphonso Freeney is beginning his second season as head coach of the Wildcats. Freeney's first season could hardly have been what he was hoping to achieve. A combination of defections, injuries and inexperience led to a 1-9 season.

The Wildcats were 0-8, and hadn't finished closer than 14 points in any loss, when they faced eventual Class 3A, Region 4 champion Wellborn for their ninth game of the season. Saks trailed just 30-27 at halftime.

Then, a 24-7 advantage in the third quarter carried Wellborn to a 62-34 victory. Buoyed by their play against Wellborn in the first half, Freeney's team avoided a winless record with a 29-17 win over Talladega in its final game.

Jacori Avery, now a senior, was one of the Wildcats injured in 2023. Avery started at cornerback as a sophomore but was injured in practice ahead of the second game of the season last year and never recovered.

Freeney expects Avery "to be a big piece for us offensively and defensively" in 2024 as a defensive back and a wide receiver. At the media day on July 26, hosted by the Quarterback Club of Calhoun County, Avery discussed the 2023 season and his hopes for the 2024 season.

Question: What were the best things about the 2023 season?

Answer: Handling adversity, really. When Coach Freeney got here, we really didn't know what to expect. There were a lot of new standards he set that we weren't used to, a new playbook of course. The team, it felt like we weren't all together. It was more of an individual-type thing.

The whole team this year, we went through last year's season together, all the ups and downs, adversity. I feel like Coach Free-

ney, this being his second year, and we've really got all starters back on both sides of the ball so we know what to expect and he knows what to expect from us this year.

Q: Which 2023 seniors will be the most difficult to replace and why?

A: Probably our linebacker Mykese Gaffney. He loved the game. He came down and made tackles. He had a lot of passion. He was our vocal guy last year. We have a lot of skill players that play both sides of the ball. We've got a lot of depth at the skill positions. Losing a linebacker kind of hurt more than losing a receiver.

Q: How much progress has this team made since last season?

A: A lot, a lot of progress. Last year we had a lot of bad habits. That was the biggest problem. We always have athletes at Saks. Last year, it was a lot of bad habits we had as a team.

Throughout the summer,

we've stayed on top of all our bad habits and kept moving forward, thinking of our fundamentals, being coachable and working out. We've definitely gotten stronger and faster, too. We've been working every day.

Q: What do you think are going to be the strengths of the 2024 team?

A: Really, us having a lot of athletes that can make plays. We have a lot of people that can make plays. We don't have to just try to

force the ball to one guy. We can open up.

We can spread the field out and then we've got good running backs that came back (Nick Mixson, Juelz McClellan and Jahmaad Crook). Two are in the 11th grade and one is in the 10th but they all started last year. This year, everybody's got experience. Last year, we had no experience.

Q: Who will be your leaders on offense, not necessarily statistical leaders but who is going to see people do what they're supposed to do?

A: I'm very coachable, first off. I always know my assignments and know what to do. Our quarterback, Gage Brown, he's also another coachable person. That's why he's at quarterback. Our linemen, Mason Stevens and Quay Judkins, they always know what they're supposed to do.

Q: How can you tell when the cutting up needs to stop and the getting down to business needs to start with Coach Freeney?

A: Before practice starts, we're supposed to stand on a line. One time at the beginning of the summer we weren't all lined up right. He was just staring at us. We already knew we had to get it together right there before we had to get punished. With Coach Freeney, it's obvious. It's always obvious. ... He always lets us know what we did wrong so we can fix it.

Q: Do you feel the team is receptive to his discipline?

A: Of course. We see the progress. Last year we were in trouble every day. It was just bad. ... This year, we all listen. We get along. We listen to the coaches and everything is going smoothly. We've been winning 7-on-7s. Last year, we didn't win a single 7-on-7. We've been winning 7-on-7 games, competing at OTAs. We've been doing great so it's definitely working.

We didn't finish the rest of the game. That's why the outcome was like it was. Once we figure out how to finish and just finish it, then we'll be good.

Q: How do you think this team is better than you were a year ago?

A: The discipline. People are striving to make sure they want to win, they want to make it to the playoffs.

Q: This is Coach Cofer's second year. How has he made a difference for you?

A: Coach Cofer, he wants us to be a team. He actually wants the team to bond. He actually strives to make sure we have a good time with the team. He's like a father.

Q: What do your teammates mean to you, because it looks like you guys are pretty close?

A: We all hang out on the weekends, and then during the summer, we all hang out. We go play basketball or go to our coach's house at the lake house and go tubing and stuff.

Q: It's your senior year. Does it feel special that it's your senior year?

A: It's special, but it hasn't hit me yet. It will, but it hasn't yet because it feels like yesterday it was eighth and ninth grade. I was just starting varsity and stuff.

Q: What are your plans to do beyond high school with it? Have you thought about that?

A: Yes, sir. My plan is always going to college for football. And then what I want to do academically is sports medicine. I want to do something around that.

Q: Your family is from Welborn, and it must be pretty exciting to start for Wel-

A: It means a lot to me. My cousin, Walker Hayes, he played. My other cousin, Mason Yates, played. My brother (Dalton Hayes), too. He played. I got pulled up (to varsity) my ninth-grade year because it was his senior year. I got to play with him a little bit. And it just means a lot to me, just just to live up to them.

Q: Did you always want to be a lineman?

A: Well, in pee-wee, my dream was to be a fullback. I finally made weight that year. You can't weigh over 100 pounds, and I weighed 99.9 pounds. I made it.

Q: It seems like a position you take real pride in.

A: Oh, yes, sir. Center to me is the most important player because if you don't have the right snap, the play is over. I have to take a lot of pride in it, because if I don't ... it's going to mean something bad. It's the most important spot on the field.

Q: Coach Smith has talked often about how much he appreciates the relationships he has with you guys on the team. Can you talk about what it means to have the relationship with him that you guys have?

A: At practice, some days, yes, we got to get after it. But others, we can joke around. The best part of our relationship with him is he knows when we're in a silly mood and he knows we've got to straighten up. And we get that, and the whole team gets it.

Q: Have you thought about what you'd like to do after school is finished?

A: I'm going to be a plumber. I'm going to work for Major League Plumbing. My dad and my mom own Major League Plumbing.

A: This is my second, really. So last year, me and Chapel (Pope) split the snaps.

Q: What do you think you learned last year that's going to help you going forward?

A: If this would have been my first year coming into quarterback, it would've not been very pretty. So it helped me a lot. I had a lot of struggles again. I could barely take a snap on the center last year. I could barely hand the ball off. I could throw a little bit.

But just getting that experience really helped me, just knowing how the game is like. I played junior high quarterback, but those varsity minutes really helped me a lot.

Q: What made you decide back then that you wanted to be a quarterback?

A: I really didn't have a choice. I played peewee football when I was real little and I never played quarterback. I played running back and linebacker. I played a little bit of quarterback, maybe, but then when I got here, Coach Ward was the junior high coach. Kevin Ward — and he just told me to try quarterback. So I did seventh-grade year, and then from then on, I played quarterback.

Q: The quarterback is always considered a leader. How do you handle that role of being considered a leader?

A: Well, I try not to think I'm better than anybody else just because I'm a quarterback. I mean, I'm on the same level of all these guys. We're all seniors, so we should be able to lead the same way. Let's handle it like if I was playing running back or receiver, I would handle it the same way, because I'm no different than anybody else.

Q: Does it feel different being a senior?

A: A little bit. You got one last chance to get it done. That's about it. Really, it's going by pretty fast. But, yeah, you got one more chance.

Q: What do you think your head coach, Barrett Ragsdale brings to the table?

A: A lot of experience. He's been coaching here for I know, I think he said 15 years. So he's got a lot of experience. He knows what's going on. He knows what we want as a team. He knows our standard. He's been at the very bottom, you know, and we've worked our way up to where we are now. We want to continue keeping that same standard that we have and win.

Q: What does the winning tradition here mean?

A: Well, it means a lot. When we go on the field, we think we're going to win, no matter what, no matter who we're going against. No matter if we're playing the best team in 1A or we're playing the worst team in 1A.

We expect the same no matter what. This is not trying to sound cocky, but you should think you're the best when you go on the field. If you don't have the attitude, you're probably not bringing your best to the table. MONTHS


