

## Special Youth Waterfowl Hunting Days will be February 7-8

The regular waterfowl season shooting hours, bag limits and legal arms and ammunitions apply to the special days. Individuals must follow the listed rules to participate in the scheduled youth waterfowl hunts:

- (1) Up to two youth participants must be accompanied by an adult supervisor. The adult supervisor, who may not hunt, is to remain within arm's length of the youth at all times.
- (2) A youth is defined as those individuals who have not reached their 16th birthday.
- (3) An adult is defined as those individuals 25 years old or older or the parent of the youth who are in possession of all state hunting licenses and state and federal waterfowl stamps required to hunt waterfowl. Possession of the required hunting licenses and stamps are required.
- (4) Only one firearm will be allowed per youth. Only the youth hunters will be permitted to utilize the firearm for hunting. The adult is expected to review with each youth the rules of firearm safety and hunter ethics and to ensure they are followed.









# WHAT WILL YOU GIVE HER THIS VALENTINE'S DAY?

he Gateway to Logan Martin Lake is one of the 10 best cities in the state for businesses, according to a non-profit research organization. Pell City was listed 10th in the Alabama Policy

Institute's research paper, "Building Business in Alabama: How Business-Friendly Are Alabama's 50 Largest Cities?"

Dr. John Hill, the institute's senior research analyst, visited Pell City last month at the invitation of Lisa Gaither,

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The Alabama Policy Institute, which named the 50 Best Business Cities in Alabama, is a non-partisan, non-profit research organization "dedicated to the preservation of free markets, limited government and strong families," senior research analyst Dr. John Hill told Pell City chamber members last month.

executive director of the city's chamber of commerce, to explain what the designation means.

"When people see the title of the study, they often say something like, 'There aren't 50 cities in Alabama,'" he said. "Actually there are 400 different cities, towns and incorporated areas in the state. Our list started with

the largest city, Birmingham, and ended with Pell City, which is 50th in population."

Ahead of Pell City in the ranking for best business cities were, in order, Millbrook, Prattville, Foley, Daphne, Cullman, Helena, Troy, Montgomery and Fairhope. Selma was ranked last, slightly behind Mobile,

Birmingham and Bessemer.

"Why did Pell City score so well?" Hill asked. "The answer lies in how the study was conducted. API looked at four different categories that we believe both attract businesses and help them succeed: economic viability, business tax burden, community allure and transportation infrastructure. Instead of making each piece of the pie the same size, they were weighted based on what we considered most important.

"Economic viability counted 35 percent, and one of the things Pell City has going for it is that its short-term job growth went down by six-tenths of one percent, which for this study was a plus. It was not quite as bad as the state's number. Pell City's short-term and longterm population growth both beat the state averages. In fact, it grew by 30.02 percent during the past 10 years. Pell City even came out ahead in median per capita income – at \$26,329 – which was a hair above the state average."

Business tax burden counted for 30 percent of a city's

total score, measuring property tax rates and local sales taxes. Pell City's property tax rate of 46.5 and 5 percent sales tax rate were close to the state average, with the highest scoring cities having millage rates of 40 or less and a general sales tax of no more than 3.5 percent.

Hill said that Pell City scored well in community allure, which counted for 20 percent of its total score, measuring cost of living, crime rate and academic achievement.

"Your cost of living is only 85.7, which is 15 percent less than the national average. Your violent crime rate is 12 percent lower than the rest of the state. The city's high school graduation rate of 85.6 percent is almost exactly the same as the state average. Taken together, these data suggest that Pell City is a safe community for well-educated families looking for good value."

Transportation infrastructure counted for 15 percent. "As a whole, Pell City was in the middle of the pack," Hill said. "Because of its access to the interstate and

rail lines, Pell City did fairly well. Unfortunately, the

of time, commute and convenience to the airport than many of the cities ranked higher than we were. For example, Pell City received a score of 42.88 while Alabaster was 62.93, and both take an equal amount of time to reach the airport."

Hill acknowledged that the API's findings "are not perfect" and said the best advice he could offer toward improving Pell City's score "would be one word: grow. In 2013, Pell City wasn't on our list because it wasn't big enough. Now it is.

"There are several smaller municipalities that are growing rapidly that are only slightly behind you in population: Calera, Moody, Chelsea and Gulf Shores. At the same time, there are some communities that will likely fall off in the next couple of years: Gardendale, Jasper and Ozark. Don't be one of those communities. Keep on doing what you are doing. If you keep growing, who knows what your ranking will be in 2015 or 2016?" <a>I</a>

distance from Pell City to the nearest commercial service airport serving at least 10,000 passengers per year, which is in Birmingham, is about 31 miles, which is farther than the state average of 24 miles."

Gaither said that "from my perspective as chamber spokesperson, I am pleased with our overall ranking, but I would like to see our transportation infrastructure score higher than it is. Although we do not have a commercial airport, because of I-20 we have easier access in terms

## Winter on the Water

#### Top high school anglers offer tips for February fishing

hen Curtis Gossett put Pell City High School's bass fishing team together three years ago, it was, by his own admission, a struggle.

"The kids were young and inexperienced," he said.
"Now they've been tested, and we're starting to see the results of their hard work."


The team is now the defending Alabama Student Angler Bass Fishing Association champion, and its

members finished at the top of the Alabama BASS Nation High School Classic in November, reeling in a total of 14 fish weighing 32.22 pounds, almost 3 pounds more than the runner-up team's catch.

Up next for the Panthers is the BASS High School Southern Open at Lake Martin on Feb. 14. In anticipation of the tournament, each of the team's 10 members offered some advice about overcoming the challenges of late-winter fishing.

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




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


Age: 18.

Grade: Senior.

Parents: Mitch and Rene Bartee.

"It's really cold this time of year, obviously. The water temperature is cold, so the bass, being cold-blooded, are the same temperature as the water. The colder they are, the more sluggish and lethargic they are. But the water temperature is warmer in a creek than it is out on the river, so what I try to do is go to the long points and clay banks where the creeks meet the river and where the bait fish get stacked. The bass are going to be there because they're pre-spawn right now, feeding up and getting fat to get ready for the long haul of spring. This can be a fun time of year to fish, and you can catch a lot of big fish with jerk, crank and spinner baits."



**Zeke Gossett** 

Age: 17.

Grade: Senior.

Parents: Curtis and Laura Gossett.

"Staying warm. It sounds silly, but it's just as important as using the right bait. When you're warm, it keeps your mental focus straight on what's important, which is catching fish. When you're cold, you're head's not in the right place when the big one bites, and it can keep you from getting him in the boat. Dress right, and wear layers. There are so many good clothes out there – face layers and things like that – that can help you stay warm."




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Joseph Lacy

Age: 18.

Grade: Senior.

Parents: Sharon Lacy and Robert Lacy.

"My biggest challenge this time of year is probably slowing myself down. I like fishing fast. I want to be moving and covering water, but fish are not as active this time of year as they are in summer, so I have to slow myself down. One way to do that is use a slower ratio reel, like a 5:1, when I'd usually use a 6:1 or 7:1. Instead of hopping a lure across the bottom, in winter you want to drag it along slowly."



Bre Wyatt Age: 17.

Grade: Senior.

Parents: Lucretia and Rob Wyatt.

"The biggest challenge this time of year is trying to find the schools of bait, because fish are going to follow the schools. The bait fish stay in pods, and in the winter they look for riprap banks – rocks that tend to drop off from 2 to 10 feet deep – and go toward them, because the rocks hold heat. The bass hold off the banks to ambush the bait fish. So you have to pull up on the bank and use your depth finder to find the pods, because that's where the fish are going to be waiting. It's all about using technology and knowledge."

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Ean Davis
Age: 16.
Grade: Junior.

"The fish are harder to get to bite this time of year because they're so deep and the water is so cold that they don't want to move around that much. They can be down 20 feet or more, as opposed to being at around 8 feet, if not shallower, in warm weather. Shad Rap is a good bait to get them to react and make them move."

**Hunter Shell** 

Age: 17.

Grade: Junior.

Parents: Jimmy Shell and Cathy Shell.

"I find fishing this time of year to be more of a mental challenge. I fish really fast in the fall, but the fish slow down in winter, so I have to slow down. I like going to Logan Martin Dam when the current is on and using an ounce hair jig over the rock piles. I let it hit bottom and slow roll it back to the boat."

















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**Chris Masters** 

Age: 17.

Grade: Junior.

Parents: Chris Masters and Diane Masters.

"It does get cold this time of year, and it can get cold quick. When that happens, it gets really foggy. I was out on the water the other day, and I couldn't see the other side of the lake. That's why it's good to use electronics. If you don't, you won't know who's around you or how deep the water is, and you could end up getting turned around and not even know where you are."



**Ryan Parks** 

Age: 17.

Grade: Junior.

Parents: Danny Parks and Jane Parks.

"Really and truly, the key to winter fishing is keeping warm. One tournament we went to not long ago, it was 26 degrees that morning with ice on the rods. Going out in weather like that, you have to bundle up and try to stay as warm as you can. It's also good to go ahead and set a game plan up the night before so you'll already be in the right mindset when you get up in the morning to go out in the cold. That way when you're in the boat out on the water, you'll know what time it is and be ready to do what you're out there for."



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

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## Lincoln artist loves her little house by the water

t was shortly after 1 p.m., and an impressionistic canvas painting of six brightly colored birds sat almost completed on an easel in Karla Conway's art studio that separates her living and dining rooms.

"I started that this morning," the lakeside artist said, as if it required no more skill or talent than making a peanut butter sandwich.


Conway began painting five years ago when she accompanied her husband, who "had painted most of

his life," to a class at Artscape Gallery in Pell City. "He just wanted to try to get back into it. It looked like fun, so I went with him. After that class, I bought a bargain pack of canvases and painted straight through them."

Now she decorates her Lincoln home – "it's an A-frame built in the early 70s, perfect for the lake" -- with her art, her late husband's, and friends she's made in the local arts community.

"About everything decorative in here was made by someone local, a friend or a family member," she said, peeling red paint from her right hand even as her left was streaked with purple and white. "Sometimes that overlaps. It's nice to be able to have things that are one of a kind, handmade, and had loving care go into their making."

Conway creates her art at the two unfinished wooden tables covered with easels, tubes of acrylic paint and containers of brushes that comprise her studio.

"You can see why I wanted to do my painting in here," she said gesturing toward the full-length windows affording a view of her wooded back yard and the water. "The lighting is so much better in here. Plus, I'll do it if it's out right here in the middle of everything."

That isn't to say there's no distinction between art space and living space.

"Mail doesn't get placed on the art table," she said. "Paint and brushes don't get placed on the dining room table, for obvious reasons. A little bit of organization works well."

The director of resource development for Presbyterian Home for Children in Taaladega, Conway describes her artistic style as "impressionistic, and I think the word is 'paintedly,' which means that you see the brush strokes. The artist doesn't try to hide them." She has incorporated






Above: The décor of Conway's home perfectly complements its lakeside location.

elements of Russian Impressionism into her works, particularly the style's vivid colors and strong lighting.

Birds tend to be her favorite subject. "I don't know why. Maybe it's because birds lend themselves to bright colors. They have personalities. Their faces can be very quizzical and expressive. I paint mostly from photos — I'd love to learn to paint from real life — and when I look for photos to paint from, I like finding ones with birds looking at the camera."

While Conway said she enjoys being able to observe the lakeside fauna from the vantage point of her living room and art studio, sometimes it gets too close for comfort. Birds sometimes gain access to her screened deck and can't get back out, and a squirrel once climbed down the chimney, leading to a half-hour



around-the-house chase. "I've almost decided to give up, open the doors, and put up a sign that says 'wildlife refuge."

Still, there's not much for which she'd trade life in her little house on the lake.

"It's actually getting hard to find a small house on the lake," she said. "At least that was our experience when we were shopping nine years ago. We had the big house, and I don't want to do that again, but if you want to retire on the lake, finding a smaller place may not be as easy as you think."





# Meet Me by the

#### **Elizabeth McGrady**

A sixth-grade English teacher at Charles R. Drew Middle School in Lincoln, McGrady published her first book, "We Share the Same Sky," last year, blogs at www.wesharethesamesky. com (which she says is comprised of "a little of everything") and has just completed a young adult novel.

While spending a recent afternoon lakeside, she explained why she finds solace there and how the setting inspires her.

The lake as her hideaway: "I grew up on Dunaway Mountain in Rainbow City. Our home was nestled between the mountain and the Coosa River. We had no close neighbors, and my brother and I spent all of our time during the winter months on the mountain and the summer months along the river. They are still the places that call to me when I am out-of-sorts, when I just need time away to unwind. Being on the lake reminds me of who I really am."

At the lake early in the year: "I actually prefer the lake during the winter months. It carries a lonesome feel that I connect with. There are fewer people out and about, the trees are but stark silhouettes, and the gray heaviness is so welcoming. It feels almost as if it belongs to me, alone."

"We Share the Same Sky": "When I first realized I wanted to write a book, I knew immediately that I wanted it to be about New York City, the enclaves and the people who resided there and the cultural identity maintained within its boundaries. Instead of writing a book that fringed on being a

'history book,' I would take a trip to Manhattan, explore the surrounding boroughs and write about how I experienced it. I made the trip the summer of my 40th birthday, June 2007. It was a gift to myself. I was there for a week and stayed in Central Park Hostel, which is small, cozy and inexpensive."

Putting it on paper: "The entire thing morphed into something completely unexpected, something very personal. In Chapter 13, also titled "We Share the Same Sky," I reflect on visiting my Polish grandfather when I was very young, and my fast love for his family. Before leaving, he had rumpled my hair and reassured me that everything would be OK because 'we share the same sky.' So while the book takes place in New York City, it is in fact also about culture, my Southern culture, and how growing up in America's South influenced who I am."

#### Alabama Power partnering with residents to address dilapidated structures on Logan Martin

aving lived by the lake all her life, Connie Cook says she has become increasingly concerned about what she describes as "a major eyesore and embarrassment" for Logan Martin.

"We're seeing numerous piers and boat houses that are falling into the lake," she said. "Some have been there for many years. One is so bad that the roof is sticking out of the water. We also see a lot of foam and wood floating from piers that have come apart."

That's why Cook was pleased when Alabama Power announced plans last month to restore what company officials have called "a well-kept shoreline." The electricity provider manages the state's waterways and 4,000 miles of shoreline, including Logan Martin Lake.

"I think it's great," Cook said. "These things are not only an eyesore, they can be a safety hazard for boaters and jet skiers. It's not a good reflection on our lake."

To encourage property owners to improve their piers, boathouses and other structures that may have fallen into disrepair, Alabama Power plans to waive permit fees to repair or replace "decayed, neglected or dysfunctional structures with new structures" and provide trash removal sites for discarding disassembled structures during the annual Renew Our Rivers cleanups.

"We know lake residents take pride in their homes and weekend retreats and hope these incentives will help make decisions about upgrades or repairs that much easier," said Billy Edge, the company's shoreline supervisor.

"As we increase our focus on aging shoreline structures and those in disrepair, Alabama Power will continue to reach out to lake residents to help them find ways to voluntarily repair or remove structures during 2015."

Rob Coyne, shoreline manager for Logan Martin Lake and Neely Henry Lake, encouraged property owners seeking to take advantage of the initiative to call 205-472-0481 for more information before beginning any repairs or demolitions of existing structures.


"Logan Martin is a wonderful asset to this community, and a well-kept shoreline adds to the enjoyment and aesthetic value of the lake," he said.

Jacki Thacker, a spokesperson for Alabama Power's Anniston office, said addressing the issue of dilapidated structures has been "on our radar" for a while, and officials decided the 2015 off-season would be a good time to partner with lakeside residents in making shoreline improvements.

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
