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

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## A TRIED-AND-TRUE METHOD FOR CATCHING GAME FISH IN AUGUST

The month of August is typically brutally hot in central Alabama. With temps soaring near or over 100 degrees, it's always wise to avoid the daytime heat. Fishing at night and using limb lines can quickly become your new favorite method for August fishing.

Using limb lines is a relatively old form of fishing. Known for its maintenance-free aspects, limb line fishing can be fun, easy, and great for catching several species of game fish. On the Coosa River, you can expect to predominately catch flathead and blue catfish. The occasional gar or bass could be tricked as well. This simplistic method of fishing has shown results for many years.

Picking a limb to hang the line on can also be quite simple. Try to pick limbs that have girth and can withstand a large thrashing fish. I always try to target banks

on the deepest side of the river in August. These banks will usually be the undercut banks where current hits the land.

Keep your gear simple. I like to use a small circle hook (sizes 1, 2, and 3) and heavy-duty trot line or braid. My favorite bait is

a live bream. Hook the bream in the back behind the dorsal fin and let the bream free swim on the line. This method is tried and proven. The sight of a bobbing limb line can surely excite anyone. This is also a great fishing method for kids. The good thing about nighttime limb lining is you can always come back in the morning to check your lines.

Beat the heat and try out limb fishing this month. As always, feel free to contact me for any of your fishing questions or quide needs.

had been on the grounds.



Coinciding with the food truck festival, the superspeedway offered attendees an opportunity to take their own vehicle around the track for \$50. Although I'm sure it would have been a once-in-alifetime experience, I was there for one reason and one reason only -- the food.

Walking through the gates, I instantly smelled the most amazing mixture of fried battered goodness. Countless food trucks were lined up in rows adjacent

Suddenly, my hunger turned to minor panic. How would I ever possibly decide?

Cuisines from all across the globe were represented, including American soul food, Italian, Mexican, and Filipino.

I knew to fully appreciate what the entire festival had to offer, it would be best if I took a few laps of my own around the food trucks, to attempt to draw up a menu.

As I circled the trucks, overwhelmed by thirst and the scorching heat, I noticed a lemonade truck. At first, I wondered if it was a mirage. It indeed was real. The Lemonaders food truck specializes in gourmet lemonades. It traveled more than seven hours from North Carolina to be part of the festival.

Glancing at the menu, I decided to try a peach lemonade -- but this just wasn't any regular lemonade. The large cup was adorned with a massive serving of sour and gummy candy. The beverage was, without a doubt, the best lemonade I had ever tasted.

My next pit stop was at the Cosmic Empanada food truck to order an entree.

Empanadas are essentially a Spanish meat pie, and a favorite food of mine. Cosmic Empanadas's food truck was space-themed, which I loved. I



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appreciated the creativity. I decided to order one chicken and one pork empanada, with a side of galaxy fries.

As I waited on my order, I spoke to Matthew Perez, whose family owns the food truck. Perez told me he and his family traveled all the way from Greenville, South Carolina, to participate in Foodees. "We are really excited to be here and meet everyone," he said.

The empanadas were everything I could have hoped for and more. The flavor was rich and savory, and the dough was soft, yet flaky.

The galaxy fries, which were smothered in different colored cheese and bacon, were out of this world. I wished I had ordered another plate for later.

The last and final stop on my food truck tour was, of course, for dessert.

Even though I don't have many memories of my first visit to the Talladega Superspeedway, one thing did stay imprinted in my brain since childhood --- eating funnel cake for the very first time.

Naturally, when I spotted The Funnel Cake Factory, I knew I had to stop.

The food truck offered just about every topping you could imagine to their confections. Because of the sweltering heat, I opted out of ordering any of the selections with ice cream and chose a red velvet funnel cake.

It tasted like the perfect marriage between red velvet cake and funnel cake. The red batter was sweet and rich, drizzled with cream cheese icing and powdered sugar. A sweet ending to a fulfilling day.

Despite the uncomfortable humidity, which showed no mercy, I hope the event returns – maybe next time the weather will have more mercy. Following the festival, I had the chance to learn more about Foodees and the inspiration behind it.

The owner and co-creator of Foodees is Tricia Croft, of Easley, South Carolina. She told me that the festival started out as a small family business venture but has quickly grown into something much more special.

Croft and her husband Ron worked in food service and wanted to start up a food truck of their own during the pandemic, but they soon realized their talents may be better suited for organizing a festival. "Our first event was in our hometown a few years ago, and we were completely blown away by the support," she said.

Foodees quickly gained a following, and its goal is to make stops all across the Southeast.

"We found out about Talladega through one of our team members," Croft said. "We were honestly shocked they said yes. We are excited to be here. The Alabama crowd has been the friendliest so far.





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Everyone has been really nice down here. We hope to come back again in the future."

As many as 80 different food trucks made the trip to the nation's fastest speedway. When asked what sets food trucks apart from other food establishments, Croft said it's all about community.

"It's all about bringing people together and helping small businesses in the process. It is our goal that each festival is like one large cookout. When you order from a food truck, you're meeting the people who prepare your food face-toface. They all work so hard to put love into each dish."

# Talladega celebrates Christmas in July with laughter and loved ones





With the sun flooding my senses, I carefully back my vehicle into a parking spot behind Talladega Bottling Works. Shutting off the engine and the air conditioning, I check my phone. Felecia has already texted that she is parked on the other side of the courthouse. Hot air rushes at me as I climb out of the vehicle, and I walk past the vendor tents filled to the brim with Christmas decor.

My eyes are drawn to the art decostyled theatre on the square before I recognize my friend's crossover vehicle. But she is not there. A movement from my peripheral vision directs my gaze to the courthouse instead. I spot Felecia's white felt hat. A smile curves my face as I rush over to hug her hello. It has been a while since we have seen each other. She has joined me to browse the Talladega Christmas in July booths and take a break from her caregiving duties.

With the scorching heat from the blinding sun overhead, I suggest that we go ahead and have some freshly squeezed lemonade. I opt for the peach flavor, whereas Felecia prefers classic. As we wait for the lemons to be squeezed, the owner's son smiles at us. We smile back and retrieve our large cups of lemonade. We stroll past more food trucks and booths selling sweets like fried Oreos and funnel cakes. Later, I whisper to Felecia. She nods as we continue on to other booths.

Felecia eagerly walks under the blue tent where iridescent colors gleam from 3-D printed mermaids and Chinese dragons. She picks up several items one at a time, and I feel a strong vibe from her interest. I lean over and



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ask, "Are you getting one of these?" as my eyes admire the iridescent colors. Nodding, she explains that Brandon collects these, and she wants to surprise him with one. After making the purchase, we dawdle around the other items in the tent area as I ask the vendor about the dice within the tree sculptures. The vendor demonstrates how it is a game of dice by dropping it from the top. Sighing, I tell Felecia how it would be cool for me to gift one of these to my nephews, but I have too many of them. We walk away to continue our browsing.

The smell of leather wafts through the air as I enter the MBS Custom Leather Works booth. Taking in the keychains, bookmarks, journals, wallets, backpacks, and clutches, I appreciate the quality of effort and design of each handcrafted item. I decide to come back later, even though Felecia selects a bookmark with a meaningful Scripture verse engraved on it to purchase for her stepfather's birthday. The owners wave at us as we walk away, my eyes still lingering on the handmade leather goods.



We agree to browse the booths to the right and circle back to the leather goods booth. As we pause at each to admire the displayed items, Felecia and I indulge in catching up with each other's latest happenings.

I stop talking when we approach the Weeping Willow Boutique's booth. It features light blue gingham overalls with a smocked collar decorated with three sliced watermelons. I practically stop breathing at the sight of such a



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perfect gift for my grandnephew, who is expected to be born during the holidays. Sorting through smocked dresses on the round rack, I pull out this navy corduroy dress with the smock collar featuring the nativity scene and whispershout to Felecia, "This is perfect for my grandniece, Mary Gail!" After determining the appropriate size for the dress to gift my grandniece is two years rather than her exact age, so she can wear it for a longer time, I plunk down my credit card with joy, excited about the two gifts of clothing for my grands. I still cannot believe that I am now at the grand level of family relationships, even though I have no children of my own, only two boy cats.

By this point, we are soaking wet in sun-drenched sweat. We agree to slip inside Talladega Bottling Works to cool off. Once inside, we are greeted with the sounds of two men playing the guitar. Along one wall, two tables are set up with sweets and other items, while on the wall with the windows, handmade candles are displayed for sale. I walk closer to see what the girl is selling—bowl koozies. Seeing the cardinals and birdhouses on one fabric-coated koozie, I immediately think of Grammy, whose centennial birthday is coming up in October. I know this would be perfect for Grammy, given her love of cardinals and birdhouses, and how my cousin AnnaSmith is always cooking plenty of soup. I pick up two more with the rooster-inspired toile fabric for my mother and her best friend, Sweetie Pie—she is a rooster collection aficionado. Everything in her Colorado Springs home is rooster-shaped. For the fourth one in the package deal, I select the airlish Eiffel Tower design in alittery silver and poodle pink for myself, as a nod to the upcoming Olympics in Paris. It is a choice between the Eiffel Tower or Hello Kitty, and Eiffel Tower fits my mood at the moment.

Since I do not have enough cash on hand, the girl accommodates my purchase of the bowl koozies by guiding me over to the bar to complete the sale. While I am at the bar, I ask for a margarita. Felecia takes advantage of this moment to slip away for the ladies' room. With my purchases in one hand and a cold cup of salt-rimmed margarita in the other, I turn as Felecia returns. We start talking about the latest in our lives as we stroll back out in the scorching sunlight.

After several booths, we peruse the woven rope coasters, trays, and ornaments. I am drawn to the Christmas red truck design, and after asking if there are more of the red truck ornaments, the artist finds another one for me. While I am counting up the cost of the three ornaments, I notice two with roller skates and let out a small shriek. Felecia turns around from studying the handmade ornaments hanging on the artificial Christmas tree, and I quickly say, "Nothing. It is a surprise." "Oh," she replies, turning back around. I am definitely getting these roller skate coasters for Felecia's August birthday, since she recently bought a pair of roller skates and I am still waiting on mine. Whether or not we actually skate, it is a fun way to bring back the childhood nostalgia of the 1980s.

We meander along the remaining booths, pausing every once in a while. I step inside one that showcases The Prodigal Pottery and its mission of serving women







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escaping homelessness, domestic abuse, and sex trafficking through their handcrafted pottery, including monogrammed mugs, crosses, and ornaments. After I snap some pictures of their Christmas in July set up, a lady hands me a swag aift of a handcrafted cross. Touched, I thank her for her thoughtfulness. I then pick up two snap bracelets from the Grinchfree table. I snap-wrap the Grinch green-colored one on Felecia's wrist, startling her, and laugh as I snap-wrap a red one around my own. "I love snap bracelets. They make me think of the 1980s!" I smile as I think of surprising her with those roller skate coasters.


We end up back at the MBS Custom Leather Works booth, where I give the man a cheerful greeting. Taking my time to choose from the handcrafted leather items, I run my fingers over the softness of the leather and admire the reptilian leather on one of the clutches. I bring my selections over to the man, and we chat for several minutes. I learn that he can customize anything in leather and that their business is



located in Homewood. Once the sale is complete, we exchange warm wishes before walking away.

"Okay, I'm ready for that burger," I nudge Felecia as we head towards the white food truck. After checking for the right name of the burger, I smile up at

the vendors and request the pineapple BBQ cheeseburger. While waiting for the burger, Felecia heads back to her car to drop off her purchases. I look around the town square before being called for the burger. Felecia meets me as I head to the shaded area





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under the huge ancient oaks, where the musicians are playing country music.

Settling on the sidewalk, I open the Styrofoam box to see the monstrous burger waiting for me. As I enjoy bites of the burger and converse with Felecia, at least four people stop to ask where I got the burger. After the last person asks about the burger, I look at Felecia and shake my head, "How do people know that I have this burger? I must be entertaining in the way I wolf it down." She bursts into laughter, agreeing. Once I finish off the burger and Felecia is done with the fries that I did not eat, I ask for her bottled water to clean my greasy fingers. She also hands over the water along with a hand sanitizer.

Now satiated with food in my stomach, I languish in the soupiness of the heated air as I listen to Felecia share what has been on her mind lately. The sounds of country music and conversations enshroud us as we go deeper in catching up on our respective lives. At one point, I look up to see the oak leaves swaying in the breeze, reminding me of how blessed I am to have loved ones, including Felecia, to give my attention and time.

A passerby pauses nearby to ask about the burger. Felecia and I look at each other and laugh.











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# Stomping Out ALS One Step at a Time

Miss Alabama finalist promotes awareness, seeks a cure for a rare disease

"What was going through your mind while you were waiting for the final name to be called?" I asked Emma Terry as she took in the view of Logan Martin Lake from the clubhouse at the Birmingham Sailing Club.

She smiled. "I was going to be happy either way, because I was standing there holding hands with Abby Stockard, our new Miss Alabama. Abby and I have actually known each other for years. We danced together in high school, and we've been friends for a long time, because we just we connected based on some similar circumstances. So when it got down to the two of us, I remember we looked at each other and I just thought to myself how I had been blessed to hold hands with the past two Miss Alabamas and stand there in such a moment."

"Was it an anxious moment?"

"It was actually this moment of peace," she replied, "because I knew I'd done all I could do at that point. And I just thought, 'I love Abby so much. She's an incredible friend to me and has done incredible things with her service initiative and has worked so hard. And I know if I end up being Miss Alabama or she ends up being Miss Alabama, I'm going to be happy and be so grateful for the experience that I've had.'"

Emma's visit to the lake came a few days after she had finished as first runner-up in the 2024 Miss Alabama competition, besides finishing as winner of the preliminary evening gown competition and finishing as second runner-up for the Catherine Crosby Community Service Award.

I've known Emma for seven years and wasn't surprised by her success in the Miss Alabama competition. If anything did surprise me, it's that she only finished as first runner-up. I could see big things in store for her the first time we spoke, when she had been named Miss Cahaba Valley's Teen. Six titles later, she's more seasoned, assured, and confident, but essentially the same Emma: optimistic, real, compassionate, and resilient.

Those characteristics are particularly unmistakable when she speaks about the circumstances that inspired her community service initiative for the Miss Alabama organization, Stomping Out ALS One Step at a Time. She developed it in honor of her grandfather, Stewart Simpson, who died in April after battling amyotrophic lateral sclerosis (ALS) for more than two decades.

Stomping Out ALS One Step at a Time became a 501c3 nonprofit earlier this year, and its mission is to promote awareness about ALS (which Emma says is considered "a rare disease" that affects 30,000 Americans) and support fundraising efforts toward finding a cure.




"As an advocate, the challenge for me is to generate momentum for finding a cure," she said. "The number of Americans with ALS is not in the hundreds of thousands. It's not in the millions. It's 30,000. That's why a personal connection is so important in helping people understand why we need to find a cure. When I talk to people, I provide that connection.

"Even if I have just met you and started sharing my story about how I changed my grandfather's diapers, how we dealt with bed sores, how I've taken exams from hospital rooms, how I've spent the night in an ER waiting room to deal with a feeding tube crisis and sepsis, that creates a personal connection. The main two connections that most people have with ALS is Lou Gehrig and the ice bucket challenge, but they don't quite know where to draw that connection, and how to make that connection between ALS and those two things. So I'm the person that can make that connection. Sharing my personal story can make them understand why this is such an important cause to support. And it's really been a beautiful thing over the past seven years to see my community and the Miss Alabama family support the cause and understand why it's so important to me personally and how it's affecting 30,000 other Americans and families and communities across the country."

The average life span after an ALS diagnosis is two to five years, but Stewart Simpson lived with the disease for 22 years. "That is remarkable," Emma said. "He was a very resilient person, obviously, and he fought every day not to give into the disease. I helped care for him since I was a little girl, and I appreciate the gift of having so much time with him, even though it was so sad to see transitions of the disease happen to him so slowly."

As a young caregiver, she was inspired by her grandfather's resilience.

"He taught me how to continue to find the light in the darkest moments. When you're in the middle of a pandemic, you're sitting in an ER parking lot because your grandfather's blood pressure has dramatically dropped and the paramedics are saying. 'You gotta get him somewhere now,' and it's midnight and they're wheeling him out to the helicopter pad to airlift him to Princeton because that's the only bed available in Birmingham, and he's



septic for the first time, and he had a kidney stone that became infected - just this perfect storm of pure chaos in life – you just have to sit there and be resilient. So life has taught me a lot about the importance of optimism and positivity because that is the only thing that I believe is going to carry you through those really hard moments.

"I'm so passionate about this cause because of those experiences that I've had, because of those things that I've gone through with my family. I mean, my mom has changed her dad's diapers. I've changed my grandfather's diapers. My uncle has changed his dad's diapers, and my grandmother has changed her husband's diapers because of this disease. No one should have to do that. It gives me such motivation, and I realize that my family was not the only one going through this and fighting and struggling through the disease. There are other people that are fighting the same fight. I want to contribute to something that's bigger than myself. And so that's why I do the work that I do."

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## 'Riverside is so supportive'

Owner of Local Sister says her home decor shop encapsulates the history and spirit of her hometown

"I've always been crafty, and I always wanted to do my own thing," says Maddie Staples, the owner of Local Sister, a home decor shop in Riverside.

Over the noise and bustle of coffee beans grinding and customers ordering iced coffees and caramel macchiatos at the Pell City Starbucks, Staples, her mother Shannon Cochran, and grandmother Cynthia Coleman, are chatting away about Staples' bold decision to launch a business in her hometown.

"I love to make stuff, build stuff, and create my own designs," she says. "Now that I'm doing that, there's no greater feeling in the world than creating something on my own and everybody else loving it, too."

At just 22 years old, Staples is making a go at being her own boss, establishing Local Sister in 2021 while still in college at Jacksonville State University. A seventh-generation native of Riverside, Staples is newly married, and with her whole life ahead of her, she is more than content to scratch her creative and entrepreneurial itch in her hometown rather than search for success





elsewhere.

"Riverside's not very big at all," she says. "It's a very small town and people have asked me, 'Have you thought about moving? Are you going to move to Pell City?' Yes, I have thought about moving, but, Riverside is so supportive of me."

The daughter of Chad and Shannon Cochran, a football coach at Oxford High School and language arts teacher at C.E. Hanna Elementary School respectively, Staples grew up in Riverside, the town her ancestors founded in the mid-1800s. Her greatgrandfather, Bill Coleman, was mayor of Riverside for more than 20 years while establishing himself as a successful businessman in the area.

After graduating from Pell City High School in 2020, Staples earned an academic scholarship and enrolled in the nursing program at Jacksonville State University. However, it didn't take her long to realize nursing was not her calling.

"I did all of my prerequisites and got into nursing school and went to orientation. Of course, it was during COVID and all that stuff going on. I left orientation and my dad called me, and I was just distraught in the parking lot."

Staples switched her major to business, but at the time she was unsure what career path to take. She leaned on advice from friends, her gut instincts,







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and a knack for creativity – a trait she shares with her mother – and decided she could be successful on her own.

"I think if you ask anybody who knows me, I've always been crafty, and my mom is very crafty. She can do, literally, anything in the world. So I got a lot of that from her," Staples says. "Many of my friends have told me, 'You need to have your own shop.'" Everybody's always told me that. 'You need to be your own boss and do your own thing.'"

She didn't wait until graduation, starting her business in 2021 at the age of 20. Staples opened Local Sister to the public twice a month and launched the Hat Bar, selling customized trucker hats, an item that remains popular.

Staples opened Local Sister in a building on some property that has been in the family for more than 100 years. Her parents currently live in the Coleman House, a historic home on the property built in 1848, 38 years before Riverside was incorporated, and is one of the oldest homes – if



not the oldest – in St. Clair County.

Coleman also owned several thousand acres in the area and, over time, either sold or donated parcels for various purposes, including the Riverside Post Office and Riverside Baptist Church, which was severely damaged in a fire in June.

According to Coleman, her father also ran a poultry business on large portions of the property. The farm, she explained, supplied eggs for

Kroger supermarkets throughout Alabama as well as local grocery stores and bakeries in Birmingham, and the building Local Sister occupies was part of the farm's daily operation. "I can't tell you exactly when it was built," says Coleman, adding that she believes her father constructed the building while she was in junior high or high school in the late 1960s.

"The building's main purpose,



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where Maddie's shop is, was where the egg crating room was," she explains. "The eggs would come in, and they had a station where they would wash the eggs, then they would go down a conveyor belt, and that's where they would grade them, where they would fall off into size, and then they packed them and store them in the room next door, the cooler."

By the time Staples got a hold of it, however, the building had been practically abandoned for three decades and used primarily to store old junk. Getting it ready for use as a boutique was, Staples says, not exactly a walk in the park. "Oh gosh! That was brutal."

Staples said she and her mother completely gutted the building, and, when possible, repurposed items from its early days. She incorporated a shelf from the adjoining post office which was once used as a small grocery store by her great-grandfather, and some tin from an awning that used to cover the carport of the Coleman house. "There's a lot of stuff in the store that was his," she says, "so that's really



sweet."

A year has passed since Staples graduated from college and dove head-first into owning and operating Local Sister full-time. And, while she understands that she will have to keep up with the times and continue to upgrade and repair her shop, she is

happy to live and work in Riverside.

"I really love where I'm at right now. Of course, the building is going to need more and more work because it is so old. Hopefully, it will keep going the way it is. It keeps getting better and better every year."



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




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## FINDING PARALLELS IN THE MIRACLE OF FLIGHT

It is unseasonably cool this midsummer afternoon, which means a lot of activity out on the water. My cousin already has the paddleboard inflated and ready on the pier for me to take out.

Since I plan to leave in the morning to get ready for my first day at my new job, I decide to brave the choppy waves churned by wakeboats, pontoons, and waverunners. It is definitely a

lifevest kind of paddleboarding day.

Feeling the familiar surface of the paddleboard under my feet, which I have come to know so well over the past several years as part of my healing from not one but two past chapters, I push myself up to stand, bending my knees for balance. After navigating the choppy waters past a few houses beyond my cousins' home, I lower myself into a cross-legged position to rest. I am feeling the fatigue from having run up and down a mountain for an 8-mile race earlier

this morning.

On the way to the lake, I met three vivacious red-haired young ladies who have brought plenty of smiles to my face. We immediately bond over so many things we have in common. I dearly love their personalities, which I can describe as freeing, like a bird in flight. As I am deep in thought about them, a great blue heron crosses my path, swishing its wings as it glides into the woods.

I stare at the way it flies, graceful and calm, mirroring what I am feeling at the moment.



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Straightening my shoulders, I continue to look in its direction long after it disappears into the thickness of the woods. Dipping the oar into the water, I steer the bright blue and white paddleboard past the peninsula, resuming my meandering path of nonconsequential direction.


The sun inches lower, its goldenness shimmering as the boat activity decreases until I am the only


one left on the water. Without my hearing devices, I can only hear the impactful claps of sounds around me. The birds squawking or yelling are silent to me, even though the water acts as a natural hearing aid, carrying the sounds across the surface. It is more about the depth of the sound frequency—the lower the frequency, the better I can pick it up. The higher the frequency, the more it eludes me, much like how a crow clings to a bald eagle. The lower the bald eagle flies, the better the crow can hold on; as the eagle soars higher and higher, the crow cannot handle the altitude and eventually lets go.

To be able to hold sounds like a white pelican with its large throat pouch, I receive large volumes of sound, which can be overwhelming and cacophonic. Sorting through the undecipherable sounds, I release some of the chaotic clamor to pinpoint what sounds familiar to me. Out on the water, I can relax, focusing only on the loudest claps of sound. For me, this is soothing. I know for others who experience hearing loss or impairment, it can be frustrating at times. But after more than four decades, I have found peace with what I have.

Having peace with what I have parallels with the








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grace, resilience, and adaptability of a great egret. These whiteplumaged, magnificent wading birds navigate their world with elegance, overcoming challenges through instinct and adaptation. Similarly, in any challenge I face—especially my hearing impairment—I hold on to the hem of the Scriptures, drawing strength and guidance to approach situations with dignity and grace. As the great egret finds excellence through flexibility, I have found ways to navigate my world and thrive despite my hearing impairment. My faith serves as a constant source of strength, reminding me to be above reproach and handle every situation with elegance.

Feeling the muscles in my upper body flex, I resume paddling through the now-smooth waters. The sun dips lower, painting the treelined horizon with fiery hues. The world transforms into a tapestry of deepening greens in the twilight. Over yonder, a green heron, its stocky form silhouetted against the fading light, takes flight with a single, powerful beat of its wings. Its dagger-like bill points intently towards the water, a patient hunter unlike any other. Unlike its larger cousins, the green heron prefers to stalk its prey from a low perch, and perhaps that is where it was moments ago, meticulously scanning the water's surface.

As the green heron catches its prey, I reach my cousins' pier. Standing on the dock ladder, I lean over to pull the paddleboard

up by its handle. I gently place it side up to lean against the lounge chair before unzipping my life vest. Letting out a sigh of relief, I stretch my neck for good measure. I now feel ready for the first day of my new job. Thinking about the powerful sweeps of wings of so many magnificent aquatic birds bolsters my confidence, inspiring me to hit the ground running and take flight in my new role.

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
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

A view of Logan Martin Lake from Angler's Pointe.





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
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RV, with the exception of a new piece of furniture to replace the Rogue's standard table and chairs: a massage couch for Fegarido.

Fegarido and Fortman began dating several years ago and, while they have plans to marry soon, Fegarido says they are the target of some good-natured ribbing for taking their time before tying







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
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








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the knot. "Everybody laughs about it because we've been together for so long. It's been what, 10 or 12 years? I don't even know how long."

Fegarido, whose husband died in 2010, met Fortman while he was recovering from an industrial accident that forced his left leg to be amputated. She was working as a nurse at the medical facility where he was doing some of his rehabilitation. Fortman adopted a no-nonsense approach to his accident and was back to work as quickly as possible, a character trait that caught the eye of Fegarido.

"Some of us get out unscathed, some of us don't. That's just the bottom line," he says. "I'm like 'Look, man, I'm fine. If we've got to cut the freaking thing off, let's cut it off, and let's get on with it, because I ain't got time for this.'"

"That was one of the reasons why I was so impressed with him, how quickly he got back on his feet," she says.

For now, the couple maintain homes about 30 minutes from each other. Fegarido lives in Sharpsburg, Georgia, while Fortman lives nearby in Greenville, and they plan to get married after Fegarido's children have graduated from college. They see each other two or three times during the week and on weekends.

Fortman operates his own machine shop business out of his home, keeping a busy schedule. Fegarido says she practically has to force him to take time off; otherwise, she's not sure he would ever leave his shop. For this trip, she says she told him well in advance to let his customers know they would be packing their Rogue toy hauler and leaving it all behind for a few days on the shores of Logan Martin.

"We have to get him away from home because, if he stays there, he'll be in the shop doing some emergency project,' Fegarido says. "I told him four weeks ago, 'Tell all your customers we're going to the lake.'"

Having successfully completed her studies at the Cumberland School of Law, Rolanda Turner was spending an afternoon at Lakeside Park, enjoying a break from her rigorous preparation for the Alabama State Bar exam.

"It's nice to get away for a few minutes in a setting like this," she said. "Studying for the bar is pretty intense. I was encouraged to treat it like a job – an 8-to-5 – but a lot of people say eight hours isn't even enough, and you need to be studying 10 to 12 hours a day."

She recalls when her bar exam prep books were delivered. "The package came, and it was so heavy that my mom said, 'What is this? Did you order some weights?' I was like, "No, Mom, that's my bar prep books."

Before heading back to the books, she dipped her feet into Logan Martin Lake and spoke about the path that led her to law school and where she hopes it takes her.

Her education: She completed undergraduate studies in psychology and political science with a minor in communication studies on the pre-law track at the University of Alabama. "I was accepted into a number of law schools, but I wanted to stay local, so I chose Cumberland. It definitely paid off."

How a change of plans led her to law school: "I planned to study pre-med for the longest time. I thought I was going to be an OBGYN. But during the 2016 election, with the question about were all the votes being counted, I became interested in the political process. In my research, I discovered how law concerns everything we do. I changed my major at the last minute, and ultimately I got accepted into every school I applied to."



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Basic truths she learned about law: "From how we should act in public parks to how we interact online to how our information is tracked, there is a law or a statute that says this or that is wrong. I quickly learned that everything that we do in life is essentially a contract - going to buy groceries, going to the thrift store, you name it. It's essentially a contract. Before I got into the legal field, the law was so mushy. I remember going to voting polls and not understanding how to read the constitutional amendments that people could vote on, and it led to me becoming a more knowledgeable citizen. And that led me to realize that if I have this knowledge, I can definitely apply it in a more practical manner. That's why I decided to switch to law. I definitely think that privacy and definitely our First Amendment rights are being tested more than ever in our generation. Our country may be shifting a little bit, but it's important to have those values that we still cherish every day."

Her career goal: "I hope to practice corporate law. I have. I've gotten the opportunity to work with some Fortune 500 companies and have come to understand that I work best when I'm serving one client that has multiple needs instead of multiple clients with multiple needs. I have been told by many people that I should probably go into federal court to be a clerk or something, but I really, really see myself working for a huge corporation, just serving that client and all of its needs."

How she describes herself: "I think I'm a hard worker. People always tell me all the time, 'Oh, you're so smart,' and I'm like 'No, I'm just a hard worker. Hard work beats talent and genetics any day. I'm no smarter than the next person, but I am an overachiever and a perfectionist. I value my attention to detail and work ethic. But I also think that I'm compassionate, caring, humble, and forgiving. I have really been shaped by my experiences, both good and bad, over the years."

The food she could eat every day: "Bread. I can eat it for breakfast. I can eat it cold. I can eat it hot. I can eat it with butter, and I can just eat plain bread by itself. If I ever was to be skinny, it would be because I've given up bread."

The food she hopes to never eat again: "It's a liquid – unpasteurized milk, like raw milk straight from a cow. Little fourth grade Rolanda has to tell the story. We went to a farm with a bunch of different activities we could do. One of them was where they gave us milk from a cow, like fresh-squeezed. It was in a little tiny cup, and it was so nasty. I still have nightmares about it."
