Ashville continues search for first win with new head coach

ASHVILLE – Starting his second year as head football coach at Ashville, Kirakias Shepard looks for his first victory. In order to get that first win, and hopefully many, many more, Shepard expects his guys to continue working hard, trust the process and know that hard work is going to pay off.

The Bulldogs are in Class 4A, Region 6 this year along with Alexandria, Anniston, Cherokee County, Etowah, Hokes Bluff, Oneonta and White Plains.

"New to our region is Alexandria, down from 5A, Hokes Bluff, up from 3A, along with White Plains and Anniston." Shepard said. "Cherokee County has played for the Class 4A state title the last two seasons, so you could say they have set the gold standard in our class and region. They are always tough and well-coached."

Shepard said Region 6. as a whole, has the chance to be a tough, competitive region.

"I would say it is probably the toughest region in Class 4A, top to bottom," he said. "Not only Cherokee County. But you have teams like Oneonta, Anniston and Alexandria who year in and year out are always good. Etowah is always tough."

Shepard mentioned the two county foes the Bulldogs will face this year in Springville and St. Clair County High.

"Springville head coach (Jon) Clements and I touch base periodically," Shepard said. "We thought it would be good to bring that rivalry back since it has been about five to six years since they have played each other. We thought it would be good for Ashville, for Springville, just good for high school football."

One of the key players returning for Ashville this season is senior offensive tackle Mike Tindall.

"We have a senior council this year, and he is the head guy," Shepard said. "His voice in the locker room carries a lot of weight. I look for him to have a breakout year and excel offensively and defensively."

Shepard said Jrey Colley played outside linebacker last year, and they are increasing his role by putting him at running back.

"He has embraced that role, and we are looking forward to seeing

what kind of season he will have," Shepard said.

The Ashville center is Justin Henderson.
"We call him 'Bull' and he started as a

freshman last year," Shepard said. "He's had a good off-season and has really hit the weightroom hard."

Shepard said he is looking forward to seeing what kind of season returning quarterback JB Potter will have.

"Not only was he our quarterback he was our starting free safety and leading tackler," Shepard said. "He has worked really hard in the off-season, and I expect him to be a leader for us."

"Williams has a lot of speed and knows how to run routes," Shepard said. "He makes coaches look smart. If we can get the ball in his hands, he can do some good things. Nate Huckbay was a two-way starter last year playing receiver on offense and safety on defense. We are moving him to corner this year because he is one of our best cover guys."

Shepard said Jaden Harris is a key player returning after getting hurt in the season opener last year with a high ankle sprain.

The main team weakness is that the team is so young, according to Shepard.

"When I got here last year, the two smallest classes were last year's senior class and this year's senior class," he said. "Last year we graduated eight seniors and this year, we only have four seniors on the team. So, we are having to rely on the younger classes a lot, which is a good thing and a bad thing. It's a bad thing now because you are getting babies prepared to play before they are ready. But it will be a good thing next year. We are building for the future."

Another weakness described by Shepard is depth.

"Our numbers are not where I want them to be," he said. "My goal is to have 20 percent of the student population to participate in football. That would be right at 60-to-65 boys. Right now, we have about 35 boys. It's not terrible, but it is not where I want to be. You live and learn and we are doing some different things this year in the weightroom from a conditioning standpoint to make sure our guys get deeper into the fourth quarter."

Shepard said the major key to a success-

ful season is that his kids have to continue buying in to the process.

"They are competing right now, but when we start playing games, they have to understand that they have a chance to win," Shepard said. "I do not want them thinking, 'Well, we are Ashville, they are Springville. We are Ashville, they are Cherokee County.' I don't want them feeling defeated before the game actually starts. I want them knowing that before that first whistle, they can't be beat. That is something we have preached all offseason. They put on their cleats and shoulder pads and strap up their helmets just like we do. Let's trust our preparation and trust our coaching staff and go be Ashville. Stand together like they are and not wilting away in the face of adversity. They have to learn leadership. I tell them all the time that great teams are player-led. We've got that for the most part, we just have to be consistent in our leadership in good times as well as bad times. We need that leadership and staying healthy is a must. If we can do that, I think we can have a successful season."

The Bulldogs open the season at home against Springville August 22, on a rare Thursday night special.





Leeds green waye

Leeds Green Wave reload for 2024 season

In high school football, as with most things in life, the only real constant is change.

This is decidedly true for Leeds High School as the 2024 season dawns. The program's schedule received a massive upgrade, both in region and out. The team's home stadium, Homer Smiles Field, will soon undergo renovations that will include a new fieldhouse.

On the field, Hood and his defensive staff will be replacing almost all of a front seven that has served as the bulwark for the Green Wave the past three seasons.

"This is high school football," said Hood. "When you play with kids that grow up in your town, every now and then you have to reload and replenish."

But one thing will not change for the 2024 version of the Green Wave.

"Winning every game," said senior defensive back Reece Bittner. "That's really my goal, and our team's goal."

Hood's LHS program has done an awful lot of winning since 2020 — that span has included 39 wins, a region title and four berths in at least the second round of the AHSAA 5A playoffs.

The 2023 version of the Green Wave finished the season ranked fifth in the state.

"The expectations really never change," said Hood.

To fulfill those expectations, Hood and his staff will focus on a defensive front that begins its first season without defensive ends Kavion Henderson and Chris Burge, each of whom is currently on a Division I roster. In fact, among the Green Wave's front seven, only "bellcow" linebacker Miles Jones returns.

Replacing that legendary tandem, Hood said, will require speed and depth.

"They all can run to the football pretty well," Hood said. "We feel

pretty strongly that we'll be solid

Experience won't be a problem on offense, where do-everything senior quarterback Conner Nelson begins his second season as the full-time starter behind center. Along with seniors Grayson Ford and ZJ Dale in the backfield, and an offensive line that includes Troy University commit Gavin Bowlin among a bevy of experienced starters, including Carlos Plascencia and Wilson Beasley, Leeds will continue to look to dominate opponents in the rushing game.

"ZJ is a hero for Leeds," Hood said. "We really didn't know what we had in ZJ until last year. We were even contemplating using a defensive player at running back, and ZJ just took the job."

The Green Wave's primary playmaker on the edge in 2023 was freshman receiver Taylon Gaiter, now a sophomore among a corps



of receivers that all return for the 2024 season

"Experience matters," Leeds offensive coordinator Jeremiah Millington said. "Having talented kids makes our job a lot easier."

There will be, as Hood said, "no gimmes" in the 2024 schedule. The region, 5A Region 6, traded Alexandria and Southside-Gadsden for Jacksonville (10-3 and a third-round participant in the 4A playoffs in 2023) and Center Point (7-4, 1st round in the 6A playoffs). Leeds travels to Springville, Lincoln and Moody in region play.

"My last game going against Moody," said Dale. "That's one game I'm looking forward to."

Additionally, Leeds kept its series vs. 6A Mortimer Jordan in non-region play, and swapped dates with Pell City and Sylacauga for games against 6A foes Shades Valley and Pelham, along with a midseason trip to 5A powerhouse Briarwood Christian.

"If we're going to go deeper into the playoffs as a program, I wanted the mentality to be, we're playing a great team Week 0, a great team Week 10," Hood said. "And you just better step up and play."

The Green Wave faces their first onfield opponent with a jamboree game at Helena on Thursday, Aug. 15.

Moody's 411 Boys enter Year 3

Jake Ganus is quick to acknowledge that "people just throw around" the word culture, particularly when describing football programs. Nevertheless, when it comes to describing Ganus' Moody High Blue Devil program, there seems to be no better term.

The "411 Boys" enter Year 3 under Ganus, following a season in which they finished the season ranked 6th in 5A, claimed a share of the Region 6 championship and hosted a third-round playoff game at Bill Morris Stadium for only the second time in school history.

The program's ascent hasn't bred complacency; in fact, to hear Ganus tell it, the opposite seems true.

"I get calls from people saying, 'Hey the stadium lights are still on and it's 11 p.m. on Saturday night," Ganus said. "It's my entire offense running through the plays."

That preparation will be necessary in 2024. The Devils' region now includes 2023 playoff squads in Center Point and Jacksonville — 6A and 4A playoff teams, respectively. Moody also scheduled nonregion games against Gainesville (Ga.), 6A Oxford, 6A Helena and 7A Auburn High School. In fact, the home date vs. Auburn precedes region dates with Center Point (on the road) and their annual grudge match with archrival Leeds.

It's all done with intention, according to

the third-year head coach.

"Each team we scheduled has a purpose for me," he said. "Regardless of what our record is, when we get to the playoffs, we will be the most battle tested team in 5A, no doubt."

Moody will take on that schedule with its own roster stacked with talent. Three names on the Blue Devil roster — quarterback Charlie Johnston, defensive back Sidnev Walton and linebacker Ba'Roc Willis - are already committed to major-college programs (Georgia Southern, Tennessee and Alabama, respectively) and Ganus said a total of 17 Blue Devils have college offers of some kind.

One of the more notable names on that list will be Johnston, who Ganus described as a "Sunday arm." Johnston will start behind an offensive line that returns en masse from the 2023 season, as the offense seeks to replace stalwart running back Blaine Burke.

"It's something that just progresses over and over again, as we throw," Johnston said. "We just stack days, and it's been a lot of fun. I'm excited for this fall camp and this season."

On defense, Moody is replacing its two leading tacklers in linebackers Zane Smith and Gavin Baker. Ganus and defensive coordinator Brandon Campbell have emphasized the importance of building

depth. Campbell estimated that the current roster has 11-13 "above the line" defensive players, while Ganus estimated that the squad would need around 18-20 reliable players on defense to stay competitive against the schedule.

"This year I feel as though people are more bought into the culture," said Walton, the Tennessee commit at defensive back. "I feel like the hard work we put in over the summer and the stuff that we're going to put in through the fall, that's going to show y'all just how big a step we've taken, because I know we had dogs and we're gonna have more this year. I'm extremely confident in myself and my team that I know that we're going to shut them down every time."

A veteran of the Thompson High School machine, Ganus and the MHS program have embraced the expectations that come with establishing a championship culture.

"We've had the best offseason in the history of this school," he said. "Hopefully that translates into the best season in the history of this school."

Moody's season begins at home against Gainesville, Ga., on Thursday, Aug. 22.



PELL CITY PATHERS

Gentry has Pell City believing in itself

PELL CITY — The Panthers have more than a chance.

They have an obligation. Pell City, which has endured three straight losing seasons, is ready to stand up and be accounted for.

The Pell City boys are here to play, compete and win football games. New Panthers head coach Nick Gentry is filling his players heads with knowledge, common sense and confidence.

Are we talking about the same Pell City team that flopped to 1-9 last season? No, we are not.

"We expect to be a surprise. We're figuring out how good we can be," Gentry said.

His first Pell City team as the head coach does include 109 hard-hitting football souls. The Panthers return 14 starters (five on offense, nine on defense) from a young Pell City team that lost five games by four points or less last season.

This is a totally different Pell City team. Yes, it's true, Pell City hasn't had a winning football season since 2017.

But this Panther team

is more mature and more equipped to get the job done from sideline-tosideline. Pell City isn't looking for excuses.

The Panthers are looking for wins with a twinkle in their eyes and some grass stains on their pants. Football matters plenty in Pell City, from the lake to the stadium.

"We want to build a championship program, but you have to put in the work to get the W's," Gentry said. "I see a winning season and a playoff-type of team (this year)."

Spearheading the Pell City offense will be junior quarterback Caleb Jenkins, the 6-2, 215-pound transfer from Lincoln. Jenkins can throw some spirals.

"He has a better throwing motion than (Tim)
Tebow. Leadership is his
No.1 thing, and Caleb studies film," Gentry said.

Pell City is destined to run the football, too, with a touch of speed and some stiffarms by the way of junior tailback Isiah Smith, and sophomore running backs Elijah Young and D.J. Burgess (6-2, 220 pounds).

The Panthers aren't hurting for game breakers at wide receiver either, not with seniors Tre Peterson and Jemareo Clegg on the premises, along with junior pass catcher Mayson Dates

and returning starter John David Propst (the former head coach's son).

Pell City has a wall of talent up front, too, with senior offensive linemen Malik Watts (6-4, 280 pounds) and Karsen Scott (6-1, 225 pounds), and freshman tackle Jamari Robinson.

"Our kids are going to play with heart and desire. They believe in our system, and they trust Nick (Gentry)," said Pell City athletic director Marty Smith.

The Panthers are also going to have a defense that looks like it belongs in Class 6A. The motors from the players are loud, and the talent is endless.

The Panthers are ready to battle with senior defensive lineman Jordan Woods (6-5, 315 pounds), junior defensive end Jordon Perry (6-1, 215 pounds), senior lineman Jachian Dunneville (5-11, 240 pounds) and veteran cornerback Jamari Johnson.

Burgess will also start for Pell City at linebacker.



Ragland hopes for a return playoff visit this season

RAGLAND — In the first three years Wes Tidwell has been head coach of the Purple Devils, he has guided them to the state playoffs each year and has an overall record of 21-13. Although Ragland won its first playoff game under Tidwell back in 2021, they have lost three playoff games in a row.

This year, Tidwell has hopes of leading his team into the playoffs again and picking up some wins along the way. To do that, he said his guys need to get better.

"Although the record doesn't show it, I feel like we have been better the past couple of years," Tidwell said. "We played a tougher schedule but just couldn't stay healthy toward the end of the year and we had key players getting injured. Our goal is to get better and improve from last year. We want to make the playoffs and have a chance to win the region. The main thing is for our kids to have a good time and enjoy playing football

while here at Ragland High School. We want to instill some character into our kids they can take with them after they leave here. Success off the field is just as important as success on the field."

As he discussed team strengths, Tidwell mentioned how he liked the offensive and defensive lines up front.

"We are not very big, but we are athletic and have some kids there in those positions that can really play and fun to coach," he said. "They are hard-nosed kids and kids that will get after you."

A three-year starter at tailback is A'aron Lee. Tidwell said Lee had a big year last year and should have another big year this year.

"Lee was an eighth grader when I first got here, and played a little bit," Tidwell said. "He has pretty much taken that job and it has been his ever since. Last year, he rushed for over 1,400 yards so I expect big things out of him."

Other key players Tidwell men-

tioned included Tacorion Soles, Jagger Cox, Brandon McCulley, Cash Robinson, Bradley Dill and Luke Brewer (160 tackles last year).

Tidwell said depth is going to be a team weakness this year.

"That has been an issue every year since I have been here and I guess it is at any Class 1A school," Tidwell said. "We do have better numbers this year, but it is a lot of young guys. It's guys that could give you reps, but they are not ready to give you reps.

Another weakness that Tidwell said is more of an inconvenience is having to break in a new quarterback.

"We have moved Jagger to quarterback, and he took his first snap from center a few weeks ago at an OTA and did a good job. He was playing in the slot position for us and out at wide receiver some. He's a good athlete and a smart kid."

Ragland moved to Region 8 in



Class 1A. Region opponents include Appalachian, Gaylesville, Ider, Spring Garden, Valley Head and Woodville. Every region opponent is new to Ragland except for Spring Garden. The Purple Devils did play Valley Head in the first round of the state playoffs last year and lost 30-14.

"Spring Garden is probably the team to beat in the region," Tidwell said. "I do not know much about the other teams, but I am sure they are all decent. Valley Head did beat us last year in the playoffs and they have always been a strong physical team."

Tidwell said keys to a successful season, if you're talking wins and losses, you need to hang on to the football, no turnovers and no penalties.

"We're going to make mistakes, but it doesn't need to be a mistake that leads to an extra possession for an opponent where they could score points. We don't want to punt the ball away because we jumped offsides. We need to cut down on mental mistakes and be a more disciplined football team. If we do that, we have a chance to be successful in the

wins verses the losses."

But Tidwell added that a successful season is seeing the kids gaining some life lessons out of what they have done.

"A successful season to us is when these kids get something out of the season character wise," Tidwell said. "If that happens, the wins will take care of themselves. Discipline teams win. Character teams win. That's the way I look at it. If we handle those off-the-field issues, the on-the-field should be fairly easy."

Ragland opens its season August 30, on the road against Donoho.





St. Clair looking to improve this season

Since the 2018 football season, wins have become few and far between for St. Clair County's football program, which yielded just three wins from 2018-2022.

Under first-year head coach Tyler Robinson, his team matched the win total of the previous five seasons in 2023, and with another offseason in the books, he said he believes his team can be more competitive this season.

"What's funny about our region is three teams, including ourselves, are all in one county," Robinson said. "Then, you add Leeds to the mix. They're not in St. Clair County technically, but they're right across the street. Four teams in close proximity always makes it interesting, and we're all in the same area - us, Springville, Moody, and Leeds. Those are three games we want



to win.

"Every week's a battle. It's hard to sit here and just circle one. Rivalries are always fun. I'm an outsider, too, so I'm not real familiar with the rivalries, but obviously, anyone in the county, you just want to beat them because you want to try to be the best in your county. Any three of those are going to be a tough matchup. We lost to all three last year."

According to the Alabama High School Football Historical Society, Springville secured a 42-13 win over St. Clair County in 2023 and reached the playoffs for the first time since the 2009 season.

"That was a big game in a big atmosphere, and they got the better hand of us that night," Robinson said. "They're well-coached, and Coach (Jon) Clements does a great job up there. So if I were, to I guess, just pick one, that would be one I'd circle this year to try to, I guess, get a little bit of revenge on from our encounter last year."

Robinson said the Fighting Saints graduated 11 seniors from the 2023 squad, but of those seniors, five saw heavy amounts of playing time.

"We hate to see those guys go, as always,

but we were actually still very young last year," he said. "Winning three games wasn't our goal going into it, but given our recent history in the past, it was definitely a stepping stone for us. Coming into this year, we'll have 10 seniors, with about five or six that'll be starters for us. That's counting both sides of the ball, so we're still very young, which is a good thing and a bad thing."

He added he hopes his team has gotten past the growing pains from the first season, but he has been impressed with the leadership of his seniors to help bring his vision for the culture of the locker room and team together.

"Last year, our best, probably overall, player was Jeremiah Thomas," Robinson said. "He's a senior this year, and he's our starting wide receiver ... He's been a really good player around this St. Clair County system for a long time. Everybody kind of knows his name, and he's one the defenses will have to be tuned into on Friday nights."

Another player primed for success on offense for the Fighting Saints in 2024

will be sophomore quarterback Landon Smith, who will run Robinson's collegestyle spread system.

"His name has become very popular, really and truly, last year because to do what he did as a ninth-grader was extremely impressive," Robinson said. "He's one who has become a well-known name, and (with) some of the things he's done at 7-on-7's this year, he's really starting to make a name for himself."

Defensively, Robinson noted junior Tra Jones and senior Carson Jones will be relied upon to help bring success to the team this season.

"He's (Carson) our Mike linebacker," Robinson said. "He's the quarterback on the defensive side of the ball. He's played a lot, he has great experience under his belt, and he has grown tremendously this offseason in that leadership role that he needed to grow in. I'm excited to have him back leading our defense."

One big difference Robinson noted could be a factor in how well the team fares in 2024 is how well the team has grasped the playbook. He said having another year in the system should open

up what they can do from an X's and O's standpoint.

"We had to be very vanilla on both sides of the ball last year," Robinson said. "It's great because it hopefully can give the kids a chance to play fast because they know what to do so well, but at the same time, you can become very predictable. This year, offensively, we'll have a lot of the same scheme, but we're very deep into our playbook with a lot more formations and a lot more plays installed because our guys actually understand what they're doing this year."

Perhaps the biggest obstacle on the path for the Fighting Saints in 2024 is the reshuffled Class 5A, Region 6, which saw Southside-Gadsden and Alexandria exit the region only to be replaced by Jackson-ville moving up from 4A and Center Point dropping down from 6A.

"Life did not get any easier for us," Robinson said. "I thought we had the toughest area last year ... There's no question in my mind now that we are the toughest region in 5A. We are the best region in 5A, and if you can survive our region, then you're set to do well in the playoffs in my opinion."

The Fighting Saints open their season at home Aug. 23 against Jemison.

Springville poised to continue its success this season

As the Springville Tigers' 2024 football season quickly approaches, the Tigers' players, coaching staff and fans alike are eager to take part in and witness what is bound to be an exciting fall campaign. In a season which is likely to be impressed upon by a class of returning players, senior leadership and increasing cohesion, Springville's football squad seems poised to remain on their upward trajectory.

Just a year prior the Tigers were coming off the heels of a dismal single-win season. Rather than accepting mediocrity, Springville's coaching staff decided that a philosophy change was in order. That off-season Springville head football coach Jon Clements spent a week in El Paso County, Colorado at the Air Force Academy in order to learn the offensive philosophy of an Air Force Falcons team which has come to be known for bringing the flexbone triple option to modern prominence.

"My time at the Air Force Academy and the Air Force tape was a great starting point for us." said Clements, "The triple option is hard to learn, but here at Springville we have some intelligent kids. It wasn't hard to get them to fully buy in because they wanted to get better." It would be next to impossible to deny that the team did get better from the get-go of their 2023 season as they bested Etowah 28-21, after losing to the same team the previous year in shutout fashion.

"The combination of our senior leadership and our change in offensive philosophy was a really big deal." said Clements. In the course of a single year, the Tigers had altered course with a new offensive identity and a willingness to do the hard work required for it to pay dividends. The season immediately following the Tigers' 1-9 2022 season, the team won five games and earned themselves a playoff berth in 2023.

Aside from the new offensive playbook, new offensive personnel also helped spark change for the Tigers. At the helm of Springville's revamped offense last year was newly minted starting quarterback Jake Conner (7), a dual-threat athlete with years of experience starting in the Tigers' secondary. Conner's junior campaign saw him record 537 passing yards, 455 rushing yards and 15 total touchdowns, earning himself St. Clair County football offensive MVP honors as he helped lead Springville on a much improved 5-6 season. "He started on defense as a ninth and tenth grader and then last year we played him at quarterback and safety, and this year he'll do the same thing." said Clements, "He's

the glue that holds us all together."

Now given the benefit of another offseason, the Tigers have continued expanding their offense. "This offseason we really dug into ways teams run the triple option outside of just Air Force. We looked closely at Navy, Georgia Southern, and Carson-Newman." said Clements, "We sent our staff all over the country; Searcy, Arkansas, Kennesaw, Georgia, Texas and Mobile. We went all over the place trying to find ways to get better." Springville's coaching staff spent countless hours in preparation for the upcoming 2024 season learning to implement and improve their offense, using prominent examples representative of their new playstyle such as reigning Division-II NCAA Football champions Harding University, who just broke the NCAA single season rushing yards record (6,161 yards). "Coming back, everybody's got their own input. Each coach has his own contributions, so everybody's got ownership." said Clements, "[...] our staff has really connected in the last 18 months. It's been really special, and I think our kids see it."

Aside from refining and evolving their coaching philosophies, the Tigers also seem poised to benefit from their senior leadership in 2024. Returning fourth year players such as defensive back Jacob Adams (2), interior offensive and defensive lineman Talan Swallows (50) and defensive back Brady Seaman (3) highlight



Springville's senior class alongside quarterback Jake Conners. The team also made an interesting addition, recruiting senior Brodie Frederick, a 6'6 athletic forward from Springville's basketball team. Frederick's presence is sure to bolster the Tigers' dynamism.

"These are guys that have been here the whole time with us, and we've developed them and they play within the organiza-


tion and I think that's probably what makes this group the most special. They're all from here. They're with us and they're about us." said Clements, "It's just all Springville kids. It makes coming to work really fun."

Springville now awaits their 2024 season to kickoff as members of what will likely be one of the most competitive regions in all of 5A, as Region 6 welcomes Center


Point (formerly 6A), and Jacksonville (formerly 4A) into the fold of an already competitive region, featuring the likes of Moody and Leeds.

Victory Christian heads into 2024 season with new coach

Victory Christian's football squad enters the 2024 campaign with a new head coach who may be new to the Lions, but he's a familiar face to many who call Pell City home.

Lions coach Matt Griffith first served as head coach of Pell City High School from 1998-2001, guiding the team to a 9-31 record in four seasons. Griffith, whose most recent stop in coaching was as a volunteer coach with Lincoln, holds a 107-95 record in 19 seasons, according to the Alabama High School Football Historical Society.

Griffith said he and his family had prayed hard about the decision as he mulled over potential coaching opportunities in play. He added he had not been actively looking for a head coaching role before Lynn Watson, a longtime friend who works as the Lions' athletic director, called out of the blue and made the pitch for him to lead the program.

"I felt led to come here, not only to coach football, but to teach full-time again and be around this atmosphere," Griffith said. "There's something really special about this place."

The Lions return seven seniors from a squad that finished 4-6 in 2023.

"I can't ask for a better group of kids," Griffith said.
"They have come all summer. They've been great leaders.
There's no doubt they are very, very, very hungry to win.
They showed great leadership all summer long...

"I really like our squad. We have a tremendous kid at quarterback in Shepard Sargent. We think we have some good pieces to build a quality football team, and this is going to come down to doing what we're coached to do and maintaining this great attitude that they've had."

Griffith said his team's offense will incorporate some of the philosophy he employed during his most successful run as a head coach in Sylacauga from 2005-2019. Under Griffith, the Aggies reached the postseason in 11 of 15 seasons.

"You want to run what you want to run, but you've also got to do a good job of adjusting to the talent that we have," Griffith said. "The good thing about it is we've got the pieces here at Victory this year to do pretty similar to what we were doing in Sylacauga, which was basically (to) be a spread option football team ... Now, we may not be as complicated in certain aspects until the kids learn the system, but right now, I'm pleased with where we are offensively."

"There's no doubt the strength of our football team, on both sides of the football, (is) going to be from tackle to tackle," he said. "We

have some older kids there. They've been playing a long time. They like football. They really thrive on it, and that's always a positive. They picked up the system pretty quick, and they're smart kids."

Victory Christian competes in Class 1A, Region 6 of the Alabama High School Athletic Association. During the association's biennial regional realignment, Spring Garden and Ragland moved to Region 8 in 1A, while Fayetteville and Woodland dropped down from 2A.

The regional shakeup continued when Talladega County Central closed following the 2023-24 school year.

"Fayetteville coming down from 2A and a couple teams coming down from 2A make it difficult because they're used to having a little more numbers than a 1A school has," Griffith said. "I think it's a competitive region. Wadley's a very good and talented football team and well-coached. Winterboro is going to see the rewards of a lot of kids from TCC going to them, so it'll be interesting.

"You know, 1A football is very, very different. It's old, iron-man football. You're going to have a lot of kids going both ways, and you're not going to have

a lot of depth. It's who can get their kids in better shape, and who is left with a lot of juice in the fourth quarter."

The Lions have not reached the playoffs since their 2019 campaign, and Griffith said he eyes an opportunity to get them back there in 2024 and beyond.

"You always go in with the goal of a winning season and to make the playoffs," he said. "Then, I've always said once you make the playoffs, it's anybody's ballgame because it's either one-and-done, or you go on to the next round. There's no doubt our goal is to have a winning season and to make the playoffs. That will be the goal here every year. There's no ifs, ands or buts about that. If you're not making that goal, then what are you doing?"

Griffith praised the administrators for not only bringing him into the fold in time to set his squad up for success entering summer workouts but also for their faith-first approach to education.

"Our first goal at this school is God first," Griffith said. "It is Christ-based at all times, and then everything else is up under that. God first, Christ-centered, and then, we start talking about football, having winning seasons and making the playoffs."

The Lions open the 2024 season Aug. 23 at Sumiton Christian.


