#### Celebrate the gift of reading

eading should not be presented to children as a chore, a duty. It should be offered as a gift."

That's what Kate DiCamillo (the Newberry Medal-winning author of children's fiction) has said, and Vallean Jackson believes it.

Since publishing her own children's book, the quote has taken on even greater meaning, and she's pleased to offer youngsters the opportunity to experience the gift of reading through her words and imagination.


"I love writing books," Vallean said. The Jacksonville State University alumna (class of 2015) has written adult fiction, but Colors at First Sight is her first effort aimed at children. "I have always had the idea to write a children's book but never pursued it further. Once I had my daughter, watching her growing curiosity has been an inspiration."

The 26-page book, brightly and whimsically illustrated by Navi Robins, is available through Amazon, Barnes & Noble, and Google Books. According to the author, its target audience is parents with children ages 2 and older, and it can be enjoyed by preschoolers and even elementary school students.

Its theme, Vallean says, is "learning and adventure, as with each page the main character Liyah explores a different color. Liyah is very curious, eager to learn, and loves taking adventures. This adventure involves colors we see everyday and makes the connection to how colors are tied to so much. This helps her learn her colors as well as explore things and realize what she enjoys and dislikes. The use of word and color association serves to help readers learn their colors. I have always believed that repetition helps learning."

Colors at First Sight's debut on Amazon has been met with 5-star reviews. "The reviews I have received have been beautiful," Vallean said. "That tells me people are seeing the vision I intended them to see, and that feels amazing. I'm glad people are reading it and reading it to their children. Reading is a way to gain knowledge, and knowledge is your power. No matter what is going on around you, your knowledge is something that cannot be taken from you."

Books -- print and electronic -- are great gifts at any time of year, and they take on a special significance when they're



written by local authors such as Vallean.

If her name seems familiar to you, it's probably because you've seen it right here in Lakeside Living. She's been among the magazine's regular contributing writers for a while now. For the summertime fisherman, I suggest a good PFD. Personal floatation devices are a must when the weather is warmest. Having a good life jacket could be the difference between life and death. Summertime always registers the highest numbers of boats on the

water, so please think safety and give the gift of a good life jacket.

baits, topwater
baits, and softbodied flukes. For
crappie fishermen,
a medium light dock shooting
spinning reels/rod combo will make
great gifts. Both are solid for the fall
months. All game fish will be feeding
heavily, and this equipment will get
the job done.

Christmas in the South means an extra










Little Stitches & Co. and Heirloom celebrated their grand openings in mid-October at 1st Avenue South. Little Stitches & Co. is a custom embroidery children's boutique. The storefront shares its space with Heirloom, a hair salon which specializes in color and extensions. Both businesses are owned by two of Pell City's own, Abbye Grimes and Tina Dailey. They're sisters-in-law, and they love working together to support both their businesses and others around them.

Little Stitches & Co. truly started in 2020. Previously an elementary school teacher, Abbye saw a gap in the market for charming children's clothes when she was expecting her son. She bought her own embroidery machine and started to

make children's clothing that she – and later many others – could enjoy. Facebook moms' groups and an Etsy page kicked off her online business, and she had a strong start sharing her designs with other parents, not just locally but across the country. While Abbye hadn't always intended on starting an ongoing business, she quickly found her passion.

Opening a storefront was not her initial plan, but Abbye found she needed more space for the expanding business. Now that the boutique has opened, she



'It's a dream come true,' organizers say of event's second year

t may be Christmastime, but it's still autumn until December 21.

It's my favorite season. Fall includes the festive Halloween and Thanksgiving holidays, and the season (especially to me) signifies community, family and sense of togetherness.

The St. Clair County Fair is a good example of an autumn event that combines all three. It returned for its second year in early November, and it served as the perfect platform to unite the community, spotlighting area agriculture students, local farmers, and vendors, musicians and veterans. I was glad for the opportunity to go again this year and see how it's expanded

since my visit last year.

The two-day event was once again spearheaded by the St. Clair County Soil & Water Conservation District and held at the St. Clair County Arena in Odenville.

It is also the brainchild of several of the fair committee members, including Jodi Shirley and Courtney Wren, who both had children competing in livestock competitions. According to Shirley, last year's fair had about 4,000 in attendance. "We want to continue to expand it," she said. "We are so proud of how it's grown."

As I did last fall, I took my boyfriend Corey along for the trip. We opted to go Saturday morning, a fun way to pre-game the Alabama-LSU football matchup, which highlights one minor change in this year's fair: its dates. Organizers said they wanted to push the event back several weeks to allow more livestock

Our first stop once we got to the fair was the lamb show, where I don't think a smile ever left my face while looking at those adorable creatures. Growing up in the city, I haven't been fortunate to be around livestock on a regular basis.

Courtney, who helped organize the fair's livestock competitions, explained to me, however, the shows are so much more than a beauty competition for animals.

"They really teach the kids about responsibility and how to take care of a living creature," she said. "The judges are looking for a variety of things, but how they maintain eye contact and handle their animal can make or break them."

Courtney added that in addition to exposing the children to caring for the livestock, it also teaches them how to be confident presenting in front of adults. She also told me that children as young as 3 signed up this year, with almost 40 total participants.

"It's such a unique environment," Courtney said. "All of the students mean serious business in the ring but always hang out around the tents with each other afterwards. I'm proud of their sportsmanship."

The fair's theme this year was "Red, White and Blue," which coincided with the Veterans Day holiday. The fairgrounds included several opportunities for veterans to be honored and to enjoy fellowship with one another, including at a special Veterans' Coffee Hour. "They really enjoyed it, and I'm glad we were able to honor them in some way for their sacrifice," Shirley said.

She was also proud that the fair added more live demonstrations, such as milking, butter churning, and beekeeping, providing up-close and personal learning





experiences for guests.

My next stop was the vendors market, because if you know me, I'm a shopaholic and cheerleader for small businesses. Once inside, Corey and I decided to do a walk around the entire premises, making sure not to miss anything that was offered.

Immediately I was drawn to the Cornerstone Bakery booth. Although it does not have a brick-and-mortar location, workers said they may be found on social media.

The independent bakery offers a plethora of options, including a hearty variety of sourdough loaves -- my recent obsession.

We decided to purchase a pumpkin cinnamon swirl loaf and a loaf of jalapeno cheddar. Naturally, I had to have something to spread on them -- that's where Grandma Betty's Pepper Jelly came to save the day.

I opted for the pecan apple flavor and got Corey's mother a jar of the peach for her upcoming birthday. She is the reason I'm somewhat of a pepper-jelly snob.



The Conecuh sausage bowl we ordered was overloaded with Conecuh sausage (as its name suggests), a substantial amount of queso; peppers; and tater tots. It was delicious and the perfect

#### Future pilots find their wings in Pell City

t's 8 a.m. on a bright and sunny Saturday, and a crowd is milling about at the St. Clair County
Airport in Pell City. It's not quite fall yet, but there is a crispness in the air that makes it clear autumn is just around the corner. The sun is high, the sky is a bright blue, as puffy white clouds meander by.

For an old sports reporter like me, it's a great day for college football. For those who get a thrill by defying the laws of gravity, it's a great day for something else: flying.

The St. Clair County Aviation Career Day is an annual event bringing together a mix of professional flight schools, industry recruiters, and hobby pilots eager to share their passion for flight and recruit the next generation of aviation professionals.

Hosted at the airport, the fair featured aircraft displays, helicopter rides, and



informational booths, all designed to showcase the wide range of careers available in aviation. From commercial pilot training and aircraft maintenance to air traffic control and engineering, the message was clear: there's a place for everyone in aviation.

Nicholas Jenkins, director of aviation at Wallace State Community College, was on hand to promote and recruit for

the school's aviation/flight technology program. A retired Army pilot, Jenkins said he became interested in flying when he was 13 years old.

With a high demand for pilots, mechanics, and other aviation-related roles across the country, Jenkins believes aviation career days are an important way to pass along the flying bug to the next generation of aviators.

"There's a large need across the world for pilots, mechanics, and everything else having to do with the aviation industry," he said. "Events like this are crucial for reaching the new generation of pilots and fostering interest in aviation careers."

Also attending the event was Nancy Miller-Borg, a representative of the Alabama Chapter of The Ninety-Nines, an international organization of women pilots founded in 1929 with Amelia Earhart as its first president. While she doesn't fly any longer, Miller-Borg obtained her pilot's license in 1972 and flew mostly single-engine prop planes for decades.

She began flying at a time when



female pilots at any level were rare. Today, she volunteers her time with The Ninety-Nines, which has members all over the United States and in 35 countries, encouraging young ladies to take to the air.

"We have scholarships for women

all over the state who want to earn their private, commercial, or instrument ratings," Cain said. "It's about visibility and opportunity and letting women and girls know this is open to them."

The event attracted many families, many with small children who enjoyed





looking at the various planes parked on the tarmac. Some of the other kids and young adults, though, were interested in pursuing aviation as a career. Among them was Evan Black, the son of former Pell City Schools Communications Director Matt Black. An aspiring pilot, Evan's interest in aviation began with a suggestion from his father.

"My dad really got me interested in flying," he said. "He threw it out there, and I came out here, enjoyed it, started looking at the planes, and thought, 'Yeah, I'll try it out."

Now training with Ben Bayless, Evan is working toward his private pilot's license in a Piper aircraft before transferring to Liberty University's aviation program. His long-term goal is to build flight hours and eventually move into the world of corporate aviation, flying private jets for business clients.

"I want to go into corporate flying," he said. "I want to fly with a company, private jets, something like that."

Another attendee was Phil Williams,



a retired Marine and Army veteran, who brought his Quad City Challenger, an experimental light-sport aircraft that looks like a go-cart with wings. It's emblazoned with custom graphics (including a pinup model) in the style of a World War II bomber.

"It's named after my wife, Patricia, and I've got my grandkids' names painted on

both sides. They don't even know it yet," he said.

Williams was in the process of shining his plane as he described the aircraft's capabilities. "Max speed's 100 miles an hour, usually cruises around 60 to 80. She only burns around three-and-a-half to four gallons an hour. I can run non-ethanol instead of 100 low-lead," he explained as I

tried to pretend I understood anything he was talking about. All I can think about is that scene in "Fletch" when Chevy Chase, disguised as an airplane mechanic, says authoritatively, "That's a nice wing. I love this shape."

A retired helicopter mechanic, Williams

keeps one plane in Talladega and another in Shelby County. "I grew up in Charleston. My dad was in the Air National Guard, so I guess it's in the blood," he said. "I've flown everything from Hueys to Blackhawks, but this one's special. I built it myself."

He points to a bright red handle among

the plane's controls.

"You pull that, a rocket shoots out the chute, and it brings the whole plane down slow and steady. Of course, it only works if you're at least 200 feet in the air. Otherwise, it's more of a conversation piece."

# FISHING beyond the waters

he fog hovers over the water, blurring the forests into a dark green Monet-style painting. The water itself is still; it is morning and untouched by watercraft. Or rather, is it the coldness of the morning that discourages humanity from encroaching upon the sacred stillness? And here I am, sitting on a newly sanded, newly painted Adirondack chair, hunched beneath a thick quilt, warming my insides with the spiciness of hot cider as part of my breakfast some mornings; and, this morning is no different. I already enjoyed my mother's ever-delicious homemade breakfast casserole and cinnamon rolls.

It is a rare weekend when my parents and I decided to visit their lake house so we could bring over the Adirondack chairs I blessedly found on the side of the road. They were of strong quality, but the dark pink paint was peeling horribly, and their feet were rotting a bit. After



a quick inspection, Dad said that with some sanding, a new coat of paint in another color, and sealing them, this set of four would last a long time. We pulled them into the truck and hauled them away to begin the renovation process.

That was months ago, when mosquitoes were feasting on our ankles and knees, and sweat beaded on our hairlines as we worked on the road-tossed chairs. Now, we are enjoying the fruit of our labors this weekend, and I am sitting in one, taking in

the sights of the silent, cold lake.

Since it is quiet out here in the cold season, more wildlife is out. Bald eagles, ospreys, egrets, and herons are fishing in their own manner. I watch as the ospreys circle before swooping down, feet-first, to catch flipping three-pounder prey, while the long-legged egrets and blue herons wade in the shallows, their beaks sharp arrows plunging below the surface to capture fish. Occasionally, a bald eagle circles in the sky before startling an osprey to drop its prey as part of its hunting strategy to secure food.

Observing this diversity of avian fishing tactics pulls my mind into this train of thought about the Scriptures where Jesus invites others to follow Him by saying, "Follow me, and I will make you fishers of men." These chosen disciples leave everything behind to follow Him.

Rubbing the smoothed, navy blue-painted wooden armrest of the Adirondack I am sitting in, I reflect on the spiritual meaning of fishing, where many people crave truth more than ever these days. The reflective surface of the lake captures what I perceive truth should be and is. Truth is a mirror, a reflection of who and what we are: image-bearers of our Creator. We are called to fish by creating connections with others, to seek out relationships. We are not created to live life alone. We are not meant to work alone, and the fact that Dad and I worked together on these four Adirondack chairs exemplifies the truth of our purpose, our being...to have relationships.

How do we fish? How do we seek to relate with others? The way the herons and egrets companionably fish while the ospreys take care to hold on to their prey in their spicules portrays the importance of not letting things hinder us from having camaraderie. Materialism is one of the strongest hindrances to our seeking relationships. Successful fishing sometimes means letting go of what holds us back, such as the bad prey of materialism, pride, jealousy, and gluttony. Bad prey also includes unforgiveness, bitterness, and the insistence on being right. Sometimes fear drives us to feel the need to keep up with the Joneses, or should I say, the Kardashians as the modern Joneses, in terms of possessions and appearances. By going in this direction of viewing fishing, we choose to let materialism and pride take over our senses, weighing us down to the dark depths of despair and overwhelm. We let such terrible carrion blind us to opportunities for making friends and having civilized, meaningful discussions about heavy topics such as "religion, politics, and her," or him, as Sammy Kershaw's song goes.

We need to view the purpose of fishing from a different perspective.

We fish for sustenance and clarity. Sustenance is quality time, because it is rare these days. When we fish, we fish with intention, patience, and care. We fish with respect for life, freedom, and relationships. In everything we do, speak, and act, we reveal how we are fishing. Are we fishing for genuine connections? Or, are we fishing to serve our own gains?



I am paraphrasing this adage: Feed a child with fish, and the child experiences instant gratification without seeing the value of taking time to connect with others in relationship. The child may fish for compliments to feed his or her own needs and wants without thinking about others.

In contrast, teach a child to fish, and the child sees the importance of taking the time to seek connection, ambition or desire. The child fishes for connection by giving and sharing quality time, understanding the integrity and free will that relationships require.

To reiterate, we fish for what brings sustenance to life. Some

of us may be afraid to seek to connect with others, because we have let the fish slip through our fingers due to rejection or abandonment. However, we are called not to worry or be afraid. More fish will come at the right time, especially after we gain clarity of how free will is a gift. Our fishing should allow for moments of letting go as part of our seeking true relationships. This time of the year brings us closer to the longer evenings and shorter days, bringing us closer together in fellowship as we celebrate the meaning of the season.

Bringing my attention back to my surroundings to see the birds in their various stages of fishing, I see God's hand in their beauty and ways of fishing. Each bird is different, yet they perform in ways that happen naturally, as we should live life naturally by seeking relationships through quality time and goodwill, both with our Creator and with others. In short, fishing is an act of seeking truth, which is learning what free will truly means. Furthermore, free will and quality time are gifts of love that we seek to give to others, not demanding others to love us, but allowing others to see that love in our actions, words, and thoughts as part of connecting with them and building their trust to engage in relationships with us.

When we let fishing happen naturally in our lives by not insisting on our own way and timing, we will see more opportunities for truth to be revealed to us through intentional connections, meaningful conversations, and by putting aside ourselves to be more present in the moment with others.

The sound of autumn oak leaves and pine needles crunches behind me, pulling me out of my thoughts.

"Think the dark blue is the right color for the chairs, hmm?" Dad asks as he leans down to take my now empty mug and hand me another steaming cup of hot cider. In this exchange of mugs, he tests the sturdiness of the new paint on the armrest. I nod in agreement.

"We did good with these Adirondacks. Aren't you glad?" I motion for him to sit in another Adirondack chair. He sits, and we turn to watch a bald eagle fly off into the sky with a twisting fish in its talons.
