



various possible lines of play. In today's deal, South is in

3 no-trump. West leads a 4th-highest heart 6; East wins with the ace & returns the heart 8. What should declarer do now? With a long minor, no singleton, no void & no

no-trump to 3 no-trump. South starts with 7 top tricks: 3 spades, 1 heart (given the first trick), 2 diamonds & 1 club. If the diamond queen is singleton or doubleton, there are overtricks in declarer's future. But what if East has queen-third or -fourth? That doesn't look troubling, but South must be careful.
