If West leads a top spade, East should discard the heart ace! Wake up partner with an honorable signal. Yes, East could play the jack, which would presumably work, but the ace is much clearer, and the ace is much clearer ... and much more fun. What happens after the club-jack lead?

South has a decision to make.

If the spades are 1-1, he can play a trump. But if the spades are 2-0, that risks instant defeat. His only chance is to play on diamonds, hoping the defender with both trumps has at least 3 diamonds. Or, if the trumps are 1-1, the diamonds are 3-3. Then, on the last diamond, declarer can discard a heart loser. He concedes only 2 spades & 1 heart.
