East won with his ace & returned the club 2, his lowest card being a suit-preference signal for diamonds, the lower-ranking of the other two side suits. West ruffed and, being a well-trained partner, returned a diamond, which East won with his ace. But what did he do next? ace. But what did he do next?

Counting the points, East knew that his partner presumably had no honor-card. So the only chance for a fourth defensive winner lay in the trump suit. East, remembering that when you want partner to ruff, you should lead a loser, not a winner, continued with the club 6. When West ruffed with the spade 4, it effected an uppercut. Dummy had to overruff with the spade king, & East's spade queen had been promoted as a winner.
