BARN FIRED BY LIGHTNING BOLT

Big Building Near VanDyne Destroyed by Flames Today

MACHINERY IS ALL SAVED

Loss Embraces Quantity of Hay and Large Amount of Barley But Insurance Is Adequate.

A large barn on the farm of John Donovan, half a mile west of the village of Van Dyne, was struck by lightning at 6:30 o'clock this morning and was totally destroyed together with a large quantity of hay and five hundred bushels of barley. There was a great deal of valuable machinery in the building but this the members of the family with the assistance of neighbors were able to save. The loss is said to be entirely covered by insurance. Fortunately the barn was used purely for storage purposes and contained no animals.

The members of the family were not aware that the barn had been struck until shortly after a terrific crash of thunder, it burst into flame. Nearby neighbors reached the scene quickly but as the building was filled almost to capacity with hay, the hay crop having just been harvested, the fire gained with such rapidity that all efforts to extinguish it were fruitless.

A heavy downpour of rain aided the fire fighters in preventing the flames from spreading to adjacent buildings.

Confessed Forger Remains "Man of Mystery" to Last

COMMITMENTS MADE OUT

Roeland and Blair to Be Taken to Waupun by Sheriff Fick Friday—Rain Delays Trip.

Peter P. Roeland, given a six months' sentence for the passing of two worthless checks on the Helmer Milling company, and Charles Blair, sentenced for four months for securing \$15 on the purchase price of eight hogs which he never possessed, from George Wohlwendler, a South Main street butcher, will be taken to Waupun by Sheriff Fick Friday. The commitments were made out Wednesday, and the sheriff might have taken the men to the penitentiary today, but the roads were rendered so bad by the rain and the heat promised to be so unbearable, that he decided to postpone the trip.

Roeland will carry the mystery as to who he really is to the state penitentiary, and it is exceedingly questionable whether the veil shrouding his past life will be lifted during his confinement. Since receiving his sentence, which he courted in preference to seeking parole by revealing his identity, Roeland has said nothing save to express satisfaction with the leniency accorded him. Of one thing, however, all those connected with the case are positive and that is that his name is not Roeland. Owing to his peculiar spelling the authorities were suspicious of this fact from the first, and the man now admits that it was assumed.

Plays and given dances in a "swing around the circle" in New York, to get funds for the cause. Champlain L. Riley, of Plainfield, N. J., who held meetings at Ocean Grove and other New Jersey points enroute here, headed another large delegation of men. The brigade headed by Miss Mabel Vernon has just completed a "sweep" down the Jersey coast in a series of roller chair parades at all the resorts. Miss Margaret Foley, heading one of the Massachusetts delegations carried a banner which had been torn from her hands during the "March melee" and afterwards "recaptured."

Mrs. Inez Haynes Gilmore, the magazine writer, and Mrs. Glendower Evans, both of whom were chiefly instrumental in having the minimum wage law passed in Massachusetts, were among the Massachusetts delegation.

Forty automobiles, gaily decorated, were sent out from Washington to escort the pilgrims to the capitol. Wives of senators and representatives and government officials formed the escort party. With a band leading, and state banners mingling with the national party colors of yellow and white, the parade moved along New York avenue to Fourteenth street northwest, south on Fourteenth to Pennsylvania avenue and east on Pennsylvania avenue to the capitol steps.

While the demonstration was made ostensibly for the purpose of presenting petitions urging action during the present session of congress, the real object of today's "request" was far more serious. The national leaders of the movement now count their "strength in congress" as nearly double that of a year ago. There are sixteen senators from suffrage states, two from Illinois which has partial suffrage and a dozen from non-suffrage states who are favorable to their cause. Among the latter are

Bail Fixed at \$10,000 for Alleged Kewaskum Robbers

CASE GOES TO MILWAUKEE

Were Traced Through Information Furnished from Fond du Lac Where They Caught Train.

William, alias "Bird" Houlihan, James Barnes and Daniel Murphy, charged with the blowing up of the post office safe at Kewaskum, Wis., on July 8, were held to the grand jury at Milwaukee, by United States Commissioner Charles Buell, at Chicago, Wednesday.

The case was sent to Milwaukee on request of Assistant United States District Attorney David Sansberry, his contention being that it ought to be tried by the court having jurisdiction in the district in which the crime was committed.

Bail in each instance was fixed at \$10,000, which the defendants were unable to furnish.

The theory is that the men following the committing of the crime drove to this city leaving the rig near Calvary cemetery, and here purchased tickets, south bound, at the Soo depot. It was on information furnished from this city that the men were arrested in Illinois on their way to Chicago.
