A Few Words From Billings Superintendent of Schools, Greg Upham



When I reflect back on my earliest memories in education, I think about the first time I was able to order and purchase my first set of books. I can still feel the eager anticipation waiting for my teacher to hand me the paper booklet that listed hundreds of books. The mix of excitement and agony choosing which books would best capture the interest of a young boy, knowing they would be mine to keep, became an annual medley of emotions during my elementary years, and still leaves me with a memory of accomplishment and maturity. It truly is the first memory that allowed me to feel that I was "growing up." I read the books, some good, some not so good, but it is the memory and experience that shaped my life; a confluence of the need for a robust education melding with a growing sense of independence.

School to me was a series of growth moments within the spheres of academics, relationships, and athletics. I still stay in touch with my oldest friend T.T. We met when I was in first grade and have been friends for over 50 years. We roomed together in college, stood up for each other at our weddings, and are godparents to each other's children. Who would have thought that a moment in time, deciding to play together as children, would last this long?

School allowed me to participate in one of my passion areas, sports. Not only was I able to hone my athletic skills, sports motivated me to do well academically, I built deep grit and resiliency, and was afforded the opportunity to attend college. There I was fortunate to pursue an area of study that matched my interest, which eventually led me to become the Superintendent of Billings Public Schools. This is a position that brings great humility, knowing I have the opportunity to be serving the students, staff, and community of Billings.

I have always felt that we are not in the "school business," but rather the people business. COVID reminded us of the importance of human contact and the means to connect with each other. Yes, the qualities to be successful in today's challenging world continue to require a strong literacy and mathematical foundation and the ability to problem solve and critically think, but it is also imperative to have dynamic interpersonal skills, demonstrating high levels of written and verbal communication skills, all while weaving a strong work ethic in the mix. President Theodore Roosevelt's famous quote still rings true today, "No one cares how much you know, until they know how much you care." Our schools are reflective of this by molding the environments for the powerful force of connections and a sense of belonging to thrive.

In the end, education allows us the opportunity to choose our lives, without it, life chooses us.

STEM Education: Funding relevant, hands-on Science, Technology, Engineering and Math education across all grades in our schools.



The Billings BackPack Meals and Teen Pantry Programs: Created in 2009 and 2011 respectively to ensure that all students who depend on free or reduced cost school meals have food on the weekends and school holidays, the BackPack Meals Program provides shelf-stable meal kits for an average of 300 K-5th graders every weekend and school holiday. Each weekend meal kit costs \$4.

The Teen Pantries, discretely positioned in middle and high schools, provide food and hygiene products for about 170 teens.

Thanks to an all volunteer work force and free warehouse space, over 99% of all cash donated to these programs is used to buy food.

The USDA has granted school districts waivers allowing all students - regardless of income - to eat free of charge. Meals include breakfast and lunch. Students must take the complete meal to receive it at no charge.

Ala carte sales including single milk, extra meals, entrees, or any item from the snack bar (middle & high schools) must be purchased.

FREE & REDUCED APPLICATIONS

Even though the meals are free of charge, we encourage households to complete a "Free and Reduced Meal Application". Approved applications allow families to take advantage of other benefits and services, including extended EBT benefits, fee waivers, and more.





Winters in Montana can be brutally cold, and it's important to remember that children and adolescents may not have the maturity necessary to dress appropriately for the cold. Students waiting for buses are particulary at risk, since cold weather can impact road conditions, and school buses may arrive late.

The Billings Schools' 16,000+ students live within a large area where road conditions often vary widely during severe weather conditions. Past experience has confirmed that there are many areas in School District II where school buses have a higher probability of getting stuck in the snow, so alternate bus stops have been established for these areas. More alternate bus stops could be added depending upon severe weather conditions, and the ability of school buses to maneuver safely through neighborhoods and subdivisions.

If the buses are using alternative bus stops, or if delays take place, we attempt to inform families and staff through a variety of ways. Communication with our Billings Public Schools' families is paramount to our students' and staff's safety. Below is a brief list of resources parents/guardians may use to learn about alternative bus stops and other effects of adverse weather conditions.

SchoolConnect System: Automated telephone notification system notifies parents within 45 minutes of being launched. Parents need to be sure that all phone numbers are updated with their children's schools.

SD2 Emergency Information Line: Call 406-281-5193 for updates on severe weather conditions and emergencies.

Stay connected: with local TV & radio stations and the Billings Gazette.

Check the district's website often for updates as well: www.billingsschools.org

Each year, Billings Public Schools builds an extra day - a Snow Day - into the school year so that - in the event severe weather requires a district-wide suspension of activities - we will still be able to put together a complete school year.

If the winter turns out to be mild, this Snow Day becomes a school holiday sometime in the spring. This year's Snow Day is April 14th!

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Billings' oldest high school, Senior High, was built "way out in the country" in 1939 for just under a million dollars, and his been expanded a number of times since then.

In 2021, Senior sits almost in the center of the city, south of Skyview, and east of the Career Center and West High. Senior is also home to Daylis Stadium, the multi-use field shared by all of the city's AA high schools. Around 1700 students - the loyal Bronc Nation - attend Senior, wearing

the school's colors, orange and black, and cheering for the fearsome Broncs, named after the school's heroic mascot.



Construction began on BIllings West High School in 1958, and was completed in time for the 1959/60 school year. In those days, middle school was called junior high, and students attended through the 9th grade. West High's first group of students were sophomores who'll be celebrating the 60th anniversary of their graduation in 2022.

West High is the city's largest school by population, and currently serves almost 2000 students from their freshman through senior years.

Their school colors are black and gold, and their mascot is the courageous Golden Bear.

Billings has 16,000 students attending thirty schools throughout the city. Eventually, every one of those students will complete their public educations at one of Billings' four high schools, each of which offers a rigorous and varied course of study to prepare students for success after graduation.

The Billings Career Center opened in 1975 with a curriculum focused on vocational education for high school students who weren't necessarily on the "college track". Early offerings at the Career Center included classes in broadcasting and accounting, and the school had both a real, working radio station and fully functioning credit union.

Almost fifty years later, the Career Center still offers vocational classes ranging from courses in welding to graphic design, but these days the school also offers a wide slate of academically challenging Honors and AP classes and a variety college level courses with a focus on post-secondary education. The Career Center's colors are maroon and white.



Skyview is the city's newest high school, although it's been servicing students in the BIIlings Heights since 1987.

Skyview's current student body numbers almost 1700, all of whom value the school's core values, which include passionate sincerity, and character demonstrated through commitment, courage, and a relentless pursuit of excellence.

In 2021, the ferocious blue and silver Falcons won the Montana State Class AA Boys' Basketball Championship. The Falcons were the only Billings AA school to bring home a championship in 2021.

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What is Career and Technical Education?

- Includes 92% of high school students taking part in CTE and 38% concentrating in a CTE program, as well as 8.4 million individuals seeking postsecondary certificates and associate degrees in CTE fields
- Is delivered flexibly through high schools, area career centers, career academies, community and technical colleges, four-year universities and more
- Educates students for a range of career options through 16 Career Clusters[®] and 79+ pathways
- Offers clear pathways to industry certifications, postsecondary certificates and degrees
- Partners with businesses to prepare students for tomorrow's workforce
- Fulfills employer needs in high-skill, high-wage, in-demand areas

CTE Works for High School Students

High school students involved in CTE are more engaged, graduate at higher rates and typically go on to postsecondary education.

- Participating in CTE is associated with a lower chance of dropping out and a higher chance of graduating on time.
- The average high school graduation rate for students concentrating in CTE programs is 94%, compared to an overall graduation rate of 85%.
- High school graduates who earn CTE credits are about as likely to enroll in postsecondary education as the overall student population.

Career Coaches and Community Outreach

Billings Public Schools has placed a "Career Coach" in each of our high schools in addition to the Career Center. These individuals have the sole responsibility of working with students, parents and staff to support them in their efforts to explore career interests and to work to place students in work based learning opportunities that will allow them the opportunity to begin their careers, or - in many cases - provide them with college credit as they head toward post-secondary education.

We will continue, due to the generous support of the business community, have a CTE Community Outreach Director whose role is to develop relationships with business and industry to build and strengthen our Career Technical Education programs and career pathways. As the liaison between industry and the school district, the director will facilitate work with the above-mentioned career coaches.

CAREER & TECHNICAL EDUCATION AT BILLINGS PUBLIC SCHOOLS

Billings Public Schools is heavily invested in CTE, and offers a wide variety of CTE-based classes at each of our three high schools. Billings students interested in pursuing a career are also served by the Career Center, which offers multiple opportunities in vocational and technical education. Career Center students can attend full or part-time, and are free to explore over twenty different Career-based classes, including Agriculture, Automobile Technology, Bio-Medical Science, Culinary, Early Childhood Development, Engineering, Graphics, Manufacturing and many more.

Billings Public Schools is committed to equality of educational opportunity. Because freedom from discrimination is a fundamental right under the Montana Constitution, it is the policy of this District to provide a learning environment free of discrimination.

Title IX (Non-Discrimination) Coordinators

The District has designated employees in each school to serve as a "Title IX Coordinator", also known as "Non-discrimination Coordinator", who is trained to understand and apply the procedures and policies for addressing sexual harassment, sexual violence, and discrimination. In addition, the Executive Director of Human Resources in Lincoln Center also serves in this role. These coordinators are not limited to addressing gender-based discrimination but can address all issues pertaining to harassment, intimidation, bullying, hazing, discrimination, and retaliation.

BPS Department of Special Education

Billings Public Schools provides a comprehensive special education program that serves students who need individual educational services. Depending on need, some students are fully included in general education with modifications and minimal support from special education staff. Other students are taught in the general education classroom with special education supports. Some students receive pull-out services while others spend half or more of their day in a special education classroom. Our Special Education Department staff includes teachers, physical therapists, occupational therapists, speech therapists, sign language interpreters, paraprofessionals, psychologists, vision specialists, nurses, social workers, and others. Parents are encouraged to contact the administrator at the local school of attendance for a description of services offered.

BPS Office of Indian Education

The goals of the Office of Indian Education are twofold: First, to support American Indian students in their academic achievement, and, second, to provide Billings schools, staff and the community with Indian Education for All knowledge, skills, and content. In doing so, the Billings Public Schools Office of Indian Education strives to ensure that Indian Education for All provides cultural enrichment, academic engagement, and equitable pedagogy for all students.





HOW TO HELP YOUR CHILD WITH TEST-TAKING: A FEW SURE-FIRE TIPS

You can be a great help to your child if you will observe these do's and don'ts about tests and testing:

Do talk to your child about testing. It's helpful for children to understand why schools give tests and to know the different kinds of tests they will take. Explain that tests are yardsticks that teachers, schools, school districts and even states use to measure what and how they teach and how well students are learning what is taught. Most tests are designed and given by teachers to measure students' progress in a course. These tests are associated with the grades on report cards. The results tell the teacher and students whether they are keeping up with the class, need extra help or are ahead of other students. Tell your child that occasionally, he will take "standardized" tests. Explain that these tests use the same standards to measure student performance across the state or even across the country. Every student takes the same test according to the same rules. This makes it possible to measure each student's performance against that of others.

Do encourage your child. Praise her for the things that she does well. If your child feels good about herself, she will do her best on a test. Children who are afraid of failing are more likely to become anxious when taking tests and more likely to make mistakes.

Do meet with your child's teacher as often as possible to discuss his progress. Ask the teacher to suggest activities for you and your child to do at home to help prepare for tests and to improve your child's understanding of schoolwork.

Do make sure that your child attends school regularly. Remember, tests reflect children's overall achievement. The more effort and energy your child puts into learning, the more likely it is that he will do well on tests.

Do provide a quiet, comfortable place for studying at home.

Don't get upset because of a single test score. Many things can influence how your child does on a test. She might not have felt well on test day or she might have been too nervous to concentrate. Remember, one test is simply one test.

Don't place so much emphasis on your child's test scores that you lose sight of her well being. Too much pressure can affect her test performance. In addition, she may come to think that you will only love her if she does well on tests.

Do help your child avoid test anxiety. It's good for your child to be concerned about taking a test. It's not good for him to develop "test anxiety." Test anxiety is worrying too much about doing well on a test. It can mean disaster for your child. Students with test anxiety can worry about success in school and about their future success. They can become very self-critical and lose confidence in their abilities. Instead of feeling challenged by the prospect of success, they become afraid of failure. If your child worries too much about taking tests, you can help to reduce the anxiety by encouraging the child to do the following things.

Please make sure your child gets plenty of rest and nutrition prior to testing days.

2021/22 FERPA NOTIFICATION OF PARENT AND STUDENT RIGHTS CONCERNING STUDENT RECORDS

The District will maintain two (2) sets of school records for each student: a permanent record and a cumulative record. The permanent record shall include: basic identifying information; academic transcripts; immunization records; and attendance records. The cumulative record may include: intelligence and aptitude scores; psychological reports; achievement test results; participation in extracurricular activities; honors and awards; teacher anecdotal records; verified reports or information from non-educational persons; verified information of clear relevance to the student's education; information pertaining to release of this record; and disciplinary information.

The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) grants parents or guardians and students over eighteen (18) years of age ("eligible students") certain rights with respect to the student's education records. They are:

ONE

The right to inspect and copy the student's education records, within a reasonable time from the day the District receives a request for access.

Parents or guardians of students less than eighteen (18) years of age and students older than eighteen (18) years of age have the right to inspect and copy the student's permanent record. Parents, guardians or students should submit to the school principal (or appropriate school official) a written request that identifies the record(s) they wish to inspect. The principal will make arrangements for access and notify the parent(s)/guardian(s) or eligible student of the time and place where the records may be inspected.

The District charges a nominal fee for copying, but no one will be denied their right to copies of their records for inability to pay this cost.

The rights contained in this section are denied to any person against whom an order of protection has been entered concerning a student.

The right to request the amendment of the student's education records that the parent(s)/guardian(s) or eligible student believes are inaccurate, misleading, irrelevant, or improper.

Parents/guardians or eligible students may ask the District to amend a record that they believe is inaccurate, misleading, irrelevant, or improper. They should write the school principal or records custodian, clearly identifying the part of the record they want changed, and specify the reason.

If the District decides not to amend the record as requested by the parent(s)/guardian(s) or eligible student, the District will notify the parent(s)/guardian(s) or eligible student of the decision and advise him or her of their right to a hearing regarding the request for amendment. Additional information regarding the hearing procedures will be provided to the parent(s)/guardian(s) or eligible student when notified of the right to a hearing

THREE

The right to permit disclosure of personally identifiable information contained in the student's education records, except to the extent that FERPA or state law authorizes disclosure without consent.

Disclosure is permitted without consent to school officials with legitimate educational or administrative interests. A school official is a person employed by the District as an administrator, supervisor, instructor, or support staff member (including health or medical staff and law enforcement unit personnel); a person serving on the Board; a person or company with whom the District has contracted to perform a special task (such as an attorney, auditor, medical consultant, or therapist); or a parent(s)/guardian(s) or student serving on an official committee, such as a disciplinary or grievance committee, or assisting another school official in performing his or her tasks.

A school official has a legitimate educational interest if the official needs to review an education record in order to fulfill his or her professional responsibility.

Upon request, the District discloses education records without consent to officials of another school district in which a student has enrolled or intends to enroll, as well as to any person as specifically required by state or federal law.

Before information is released to individuals described in this paragraph, the parent(s)/guardian(s) will receive written notice of the nature and substance of the information and an opportunity to inspect, copy, and challenge such records. The right to challenge school student records does not apply to: (1) academic grades of their child, and (2) references to expulsions or out-of-school suspensions, if the challenge is made at the time the student's school student records are forwarded to another school to which the student is transferring.

Disclosure is also permitted without consent to: any person for research, statistical reporting, or planning, provided that no student or parent(s)/guardian(s) can be identified; any person named in a court order; and appropriate persons if the knowledge of such information is necessary to protect the health or safety of the student or other persons

FOUR

The right to a copy of any school student record proposed to be destroyed or deleted.

FIVE

The right to prohibit the release of directory information concerning the parent's/guardian's child.

Throughout the school year, the District may release directory information regarding students, limited to: name; address; gender; grade level; birth date and place; names and addresses of parents or guardians; academic awards, degrees, and honors; information in relation to school-sponsored activities, organizations, and athletics; major field of study; and period of attendance in school.

Any parent(s) or guardian(s) or eligible student may prohibit the release of any or all of the above information by delivering a written objection to the building principal on or before the student's first day of school. Military Recruiter Access to Information. The United States Congress recently passed legislation that requires high schools to provide to military recruiters, upon request, access to secondary school students and directory information on those students. Both the No Child Left Behind Act of 2001 and the National Defense Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 2002 reflect these requirements.

However, a secondary school student or the parent of the student may request that the student's name, address, and telephone listing not be released without prior written parental consent.
