U.S. Senate Race

Senator Steve Daines (R) Narrowly Leads Gov. Steve Bullock (D) in the Race for US Senate

First-term Republican Senator, Steve Daines, has a three-point lead over his Democratic challenger, Governor Steve Bullock, according to a new poll from AARP. According to the survey of 800 likely Montana voters, if the election were held today Daines would get 50% of the vote and Bullock 47%. And while Daines holds an eight-point lead among voters under 50, he is down one point among voters age 50 and older.

The race has a significant gender gap, with Daines leading among men by 17 points and Bullock leading among women by 12 points.

In a state with a clear advantage for Republicans (+11) based on professed partisan affiliation, the closeness of the race has to do with Bullock maximizing his partisan vote (97% among Dems), Daines not quite maximizing his (85% among GOP), and unaffiliated voters giving Daines a two-point margin.

Education level is playing a role in the Senate race, especially when viewed by gender. Daines has a 30-point lead among men with less than a college degree, while Bullock leads by 36-points among women with at least a college degree. Bullock leads by 6 among college-educated men, while Daines leads by 2 among women without a college degree.

Presidential Race

President Trump holds a 7-point lead over Joe Biden in Montana.

Fifty percent of Montana voters would vote for Donald Trump while 43% would vote for Joe Biden. The race is much more competitive among voters 50+, with Trump getting 48% of votes and Biden receiving 47%.

While there is a significant gender gap, with Trump winning men by a 16-point margin and Biden holding a slight 1-point advantage among women, Trump is more competitive with women voters vs. Biden than Daines is vs. Bullock.

Trump wins Republicans by a smaller margin (78-points) than Biden wins Democrats (95-points). However, GOP voters outnumber Democrats and Trump holds an 8-point lead among Independents, who make up a plurality of the electorate.

The presidential election in Montana also has a large education gap, women without a degree support Trump by a 14-point margin while Biden holds a 32-point lead with college educated women. Trump's advantage among men without a degree is 32-points while Biden leads with college educated men by 8-points.

Method of Voting

Majority of Montana Voters Will Vote by Mail - Likelihood Increases with Age.

The survey shows that a large majority of Montana voters (60%) will vote absentee/by mail. And while a narrow majority (54%) of voters under 50 will vote absentee/by mail, nearly two-thirds of voters 50+ (65%) say they will.

Voters' method of casting their ballots is also influenced by their party. A plurality (47%) of Republicans say they will vote absentee/by mail, while a large majority (59%) of Unaffiliated voters, and even larger majority (80%) of Democrats will.

A small number of Montana voters say they will vote in-person before Election Day, leaving 29% of the electorate saying they will vote in-person on Election Day.

Reduction in Postal Service

Significant Concerns Over Reductions in Postal Service Impacting Votes Being Counted Among 50+ Voters.

A majority (61%) of Montana Voters 50+ express some concern about the impact of postal service reductions on votes being counted, with 43% of 50+ voters saying they are "very concerned." Views on the impact of cuts to postal service in this election are strongly influenced by party. Eighty-four percent of Democrats express concern while Republicans are evenly divided. More 50+ Women (65%) than 50+ Men (57%) express concern, although a majority of both do.

Concern about the election impact to reductions in the postal service is higher among those planning to vote absentee (66%), than among those who plan to vote in-person on Election Day (47%).

Vaccine

A Majority of Montanans Would Not Get FDA-Approved COVID Vaccine if Available Now

A majority of Montana voters (51%) say they would not agree to be vaccinated if an FDA-approved vaccine to prevent coronavirus was available right now at no cost; 43% said they would. A plurality of voters 50+ seniors (47%) would agree to get the vaccine, while substantially fewer voters 18-49 (38%) would.

Voters with at least a four-year college education (51%) are more likely than those without a college degree (38%) to get vaccinated.

Partisanship has influence in the decision to vaccinate. Democrats (61%) are more likely to get vaccinated than Unaffiliated voters (43%), who in turn are more like to get vaccinated than Republicans (30%).

Methodology Statement

Fabrizio Ward and Hart Research conducted a statewide survey of 800 likely general election voters from August 30-September 5, 2020 in Montana, with an oversample of 400 likely general election voters 50+ for a total of 837 voters 50+.

- Seventy percent of the interviews were conducted via cell phone and 30% via landline, using live operators.
- Geography was matched to past voter turnout in recent Presidential elections. The 50+ universe was weighted on gender, age and party affiliation based off targets from voter file, and then weighted down into its share within the full voter universe.
- The full universe was weighted to targets on gender, age, party affiliation, race/ethnicity and education, which were derived from voter file data, recent exit polls and the Census.
- Respondents were randomly selected from lists of all registered voters.
- The margin of sampling error at the 95% confidence interval for 800 voters is $\pm 3.5\%$; 837 voters 50+ is $\pm 3.4\%$.
