s Billings only Daytime Shelter, St. Vincent de Paul helps homeless and poor families, women, and men no matter what their age, faith, background, or despair.

In 2024, over 100,000 meals will be served, as more struggling with food insecurity have come the first time. We provide donated clothing. Also, life-skills training is offered, group recovery meetings held, and referrals scheduled with community partners to help those in need avoid or end homelessness.

Our charitable assistance includes one-time rent to a landlord to avoid eviction, or utility to avoid shut-off. This helps poor families get on track when wiped out by an emergency, because few can save for the unexpected. Scholarships for sober living home fees help those in recovery, because self-sufficiency requires a job which takes time to get in recovery.

Hoodies for Heroes

■ rederick "Rick" Baker, an Operation Enduring Freedom Combat Soldier was looking at the memorials outside city hall and realized there is no memorial to honor his fellow soldiers from Afghanistan and Iraq and all soldiers post-Vietnam. Rick wanted to do something about that. So, after researching he compiled a list of all Montanans who were KIA. He thought to put their names on the back of hoodies to raise money and community awareness. His classmate from Shepherd High School SGT Terry Lynch, KIA, was the inspiration of the memorial. Rick put SGT Lynch's dog tags on the front of the hoodies and named the organization Hoodies for Heroes. Rick mostly paid out of his own pocket for the first two years to raise awareness and seek help from the community. Rick had several businesses help him throughout 2020-2022.

Rick asked Eric Simonsen from Simonsen Architect if he could help. Eric offered their services and he and Thom Greenwood from Simonsen Architects jumped in full force. They both spent numerous hours getting this project off the ground. On Veterans Day November 11, 2022, Hoodies held its first official fundraiser and this is where Rick Baker met Ken Callahan. Ken a US Army Veterans shared his experience and showed Rick a photo of the Veterans Monument he just helped build in Williston ND. From this day forward they were joined at the hip, created the 501c3, formed the board of directors, and started to build the team who would build the wall. Rick and Ken's partnership grew over the next year as they looked at 87 city parks in Billings. On November 8, 2023, the park board unanimously approved to recommend Dehler Park for the memorial. On April 8th, 2024, the City of Billings granted their home for the Memorial. The location - the park just past left centerfield fence where the Billings Mustangs play baseball. They put a budget together, they started to recruit a team to build the wall and fundraise. Sandra Gebhardt utilized her marketing skills helping to get the word out faster than expected.

Ken and Rick visited with Knife River who committed to supply the concrete and volunteered to provide all the digging and dirt work. This was the first big accomplishment thy needed as the building season was underway. With help from Eric Simonsen and Thom Greenwood they formed the construction team. 4-Ground Structural Engineer, CON'EER, and Montana Dakota Utilities both jumped in to help. We needed a general contractor, and they recommended Bauer Construction. Rick and Ken met with Chris and Houston Bauer, and they did not hesitate. Rick reached out to LG Electric, Ed and Tyler agreed to be our electrical contractor. Alicia and Robert from the Counter Toppers





reached out to Rick and said they wanted to help with the granite. We modified the plans and needed a concrete finish person. Dustin Devlin from Devlin Contracting stepped up and said he wanted to be part of such an amazing project. Scott Aspenlieder from Performance Engineering volunteered to be part of the project. Rick started Metal Tech with his vision to make the memorial in 2020 and now the construction team was complete.

Now we need to fundraise, Bill Kennedy and Scott Aspenlieder both agreed to help Ken and Rick fundraise for the Memorial, now we have our fundraising team. This was a huge ask to raise \$400,000 before Veterans Day and another \$100,000 before Memorial Day when they plan to sign over the Memorial to the City. Rick needed to shift gears and start building the memorial. Ken, Bill, and Scott continued to fundraise, doing numerous presentations, and filling out many grants and achieved their goal of \$400,000!!

Rick's vision was to build a Veterans Memorial out of metal to recognize the Montana Soldiers who were KIA. Rick ordered the metal and put it on the wall. It became surreal when Rick put the first name on the wall. It has been four yours of challenging work, time, and money; but at the end of the day, it is humbling to see. The construction team put their business aside and jumped into the building of the wall and make this a reality!!



t YWCA Billings, we dare to dream of a world free from violence, where every survivor of domestic violence can heal and rebuild their life with hope. This vision isn't just an ideal—it's at the heart of everything we do. Every day, it guides us as we work to support survivors, strengthen our community, and build a future where everyone has a chance at a safe, fulfilling life.

Yet, the reality we face is stark. The demand for refuge from domestic violence remains high. Last year, there were 723 calls from individuals seeking shelter where we had to tell them we were at capacity and couldn't help them that day. This reality underscores the urgent need for more safe spaces and reminds us of the many people still struggling to find the support and compassion they deserve.

When Maya reached out to YWCA, she was desperate to find safety for her and her children after years of living with her controlling abuser. Although our shelter was at capacity, we immediately connected her with our other programs. Maya met with YWCA's Legal Advocate to secure a restraining order and worked with our Services Navigator to find a therapist, gradually healing from past traumas while rebuilding her selfconfidence. With assistance from our Housing Navigator, she moved into an apartment, where she started exploring her long-held dream of opening a small business. Maya worked tirelessly on her handmade products, and now her items are sold in local shops across the state. Maya's journey is a testament to resilience and the transformative power of community support, proving that with determination and the right

amily Tree Nurturing Center (Billings Exchange Clubs' Child Abuse Prevention Center) is committed to the prevention of all types of child abuse and neglect in Yellowstone County and the surrounding areas. Family Tree Nurturing Center believes that every child deserves the best possible start in life; believes in addressing problems early on before they require costly intervention; that every family needs support, and that support is most effective early in a child's life; and that violence needs to be addressed at every level of society. Since 1985, Family Tree Nurturing Center has been providing services to support, strengthen, and educate children and families in ways that enhance their growth and well-being.

Thousands of families have benefitted from the agency's Parent Aide In-Home Mentoring Services, Nurturing Parenting Classes, Free Respite Childcare, Parents' Evening Out, Family Fun Nights, Montana Women's Prison Parenting Program, Voices of Incarceration Re-Entry Project (an 8 week re-entry group and ongoing support for parents and resources and support for caregivers of children with incarcerated parents), Parenting Workshops, Prevention Education (which teaches parents, teachers, child care workers, and others about recognizing, reporting, and preventing child abuse and neglect), and Supervised Parenting Time. All of the services offered by Family Tree Nurturing Center are offered with the express purpose of preventing child abuse and neglect - "to stop the hurt before it happens," and are available to ANY family in the community without judgement. Please help us "stop the hurt" before it is too late!



Friends of the Children

riends of the Children of Eastern Montana is a newer nonprofit located in Billings, MT that is impacting generational change by giving children and families the ability to create a new story.

OUR STORY: Our model was founded on research showing that the single most important factor in overcoming childhood adversity is a long-term, nurturing relationship with a consistent, caring adult.

Like all children, the youth we serve have unique talents and big dreams. They also face more obstacles than others: things like systemic poverty, structural racism, childhood trauma, underfunded schools, violence, hunger and homelessness. We meet children between the ages of 4-6 and walk alongside them and their caregivers for 12+ years—from kindergarten through graduation and entry to postsecondary education and the workforce.

OUR FRIENDS: Friends are full-time, salaried professionals who spend 3-4 hours each week with each child. Friends teach valuable life skills, model healthy behaviors and create pathways to more choices and opportunities.

IT WORKS: 83% of the youth in our program graduate high school, although 50% have parents who did not have the support necessary to graduate

93% of the youth in our program avoid the juvenile justice system, although 60% have parents who have been impacted by the criminal justice system


98% of the youth in our program avoid early parenting, Although 85% have parents who started parenting during their teens

Billings Food Bank has one simple goal, to feed the hungry. Through this community's generous contributions of food and money, we are able to distribute nearly 30 million pounds of food annually and distribute an average of 10,200 food boxes per month. All of which we do with an operating cost of less than 2% - \$.98 of every dollar you donate goes directly to programs to benefit those in need.

Our programs include:

- Food to Trunk Special Food Distributions

Our facility allows for controlled storage of fresh, frozen and packaged food in additional to having a commercial kitchen. Our beautiful kitchen is used for our culinary training program and is available for rent by entrepreneurs.

baby pantry with diapers and other supplies for babies, and a pet pantry with pet food for your 4-legged friends. These are not always guaranteed to be available, but are available as often as possible as a resource for those that need them.
