



ways to keep kids busy in DOWNTOWN BILLINGS

In its 25th year, ArtWalk has grown to 35 downtown businesses and galleries

Art has long been a vital part of downtown Billings, and for 25 seasons ArtWalk has grown and flourished in the heart of the city.

It all began in 1994 with a handful of local artists, including Vicki Van Buskirk, then-owner of Toucan Gallery, coming together to promote their art. They chose five dates, all on the first Friday of the month. That tradition has continued with a sixth ArtWalk per year added last year.

The 25th season begins Friday, April 5, featuring 35 participating businesses and galleries throughout downtown - a 40 percent growth over time, though slightly less participants than last year.

When ArtWalk began, two horse-drawn trollevs would circuit 14 galleries. Since then, the event has grown to dozens of sites offering live music, dance, really enhance downtown. Buy-

"Every ArtWalk is different. The artists and galleries are always ideas," said Brvan.


Uptown Loop

Billings loves a good restaurant. Downtown has plenty of options for every kind of foodie. With the increase of food allergies and desire for natural options, businesses are becoming aware of the health-conscious community. The movement is more than a fad, it is a call for awareness that healthy eating isn't just trendy - it's necessary.

You are what you eat

Nicole Griffith, owner of Well Pared Eatery & Juice Bar, has been engrossed in health and wellness most of her life. With a degree in health and human performance, Griffith relentlessly researches to understand the "why" and "how" of nutrition to better edify the community and her customers.

"Nutrition is the key to everything," said Griffith. "We have a lot of customers who didn't or don't know the benefits of eating clean possible with raw fruits and vegfoods."

Griffith says eating as clean as etables, and simple ingredients, is



the key to long-term wellness.

"I don't believe in elimination." said Griffith. "Focus on eating healthy foods most of the time. It is so easy to focus on what you will miss if you remove something entirely. Don't do that. Take small steps and your mindset begins to shift."

A common argument for many is that healthy foods just don't taste good. The body and taste buds acclimate to certain flavors, chemicals and addictive ingredients, like refined sugar. Small steps allow an adjustment period and soon craving nutritional foods.

Another large obstacle is the high cost of healthy foods. Griffith wants to encourage the community to look at the bigger picture. While it is cheaper to eat most fast food, the long-term consequences can lead to illness.

"You have two choices: you can pay for it now or pay for it later," said Griffith.

Of course, convenience is another struggle for many downtown residents. While plugging away at lose weight," said Griffith. "Some computers, in meetings and running errands, eating our portion of fruits and veggies often gets neglected. That's where juicing comes in.





On-Street parking

On the city streets, there is both metered parking and posted parking. Metered parking times range from two hours to 10 hours. Some of the metered parking specifications are designated by colored domes on top of the meters. For example, green-domed meters signify that half of the proceeds of this meter will be given to Downtown Billings to be used for various downtown beautification projects, including flower baskets and street decorations. Also, meters may be mounted on colored posts to signify special parking. For example, yellow-posted meters indicate that from 6 to 11 a.m., this meter is to be used only for specially permitted loading and unloading. The posted signs around the parking meters, as well as Park 2 downtown range from "no park-

ing" to "2-hour free parking." These posted areas are still enforced by the chalking of your vehicle tires, instead of looking for an expired meter.

Meters

Most parking meters cost \$.75/ hour; however, the 10-hour meters are less per hour. The green meters are \$1.50/hour and the proceeds of these are shared with Downtown Billings as noted above. Another idea for the downtown employee is to purchase a monthly permit to park at the 10-hour meters. The DBA sells parking tokens. Stop in at their office - 2815 2nd Ave. N. - and purchase parking tokens to use in and 3 parking garages.

10-Hour meter permits

If you work downtown and you do not have a monthly parking space in a City Garage or Private Lot, how would you like to park at one of many "yellow top" 10-hour parking meters as long as you want without having to plug the meter? You can do just that for only \$20 per month with a 10-hour parking permit that you simply hang from your car mirror. Your BFD card gets you a \$5 discount - that's \$60 a year.

Smart parking

Since November, 150 smart parking meters have been running along and nearby Broadway Avenue. The meters take traditional coins and tokens as well as credit cards. A mobile app is planned to accompany the meters which will notify patrons of available parking spots, as well as allow visitors to add time to their meter.
