Of their rabbi, Jeffrey Goldwasser, Jason and Stephen say he is “one of the kindest men

that we ever have met and he made our day feel truly special.”

Later, they enjoyed a reception, catered by Kimberly’s, at the Block Island Maritime Institute where they enjoyed terrific food and dancing to the Horah. The couple says the fish and vegetable pasta was fantastic, as was the wedding cake – a semi-naked two-tier raspberry rose champagne cake from Ellie’s in Providence, Rhode Island. It was so good, they are still talking about it today, say the couple.

“We felt our day was really authentic,” say Jason and Stephen. “The glamour of the event and the beauty of the island were secondary to the experience of committing our lives to each other. A beautiful memory is waking up the morning of and being excited to spend the day surrounded by friends and family.”

WEDDING CHECKLIST 10 to 12 Months Out

Pick a Date and discuss a budget

Decide on three different preferred dates for your wedding and list in order of preference. Remember that June and September are peak wedding months on Block Island – venues may have restrictions that don’t meet your guest count or budget. Most hotels will have a three-night minimum required of your guests in July and August. If you are on a tight budget, consider having your wedding on a day other than Saturday.

Come up with an estimated guest count

Make a list of all the people you would like to see at the wedding. Make an A list and a B list and be prepared to trim the guest list if budgets require.

Discuss what kind of wedding and reception you envision

Formal or casual, tented or indoor, buffet, plated, or passed hors d’oeuvres

Discuss what your priorities are

Food? Good music? Decor? Location?

Book ceremony location and pay deposit

Book reception location and pay deposit

Reserve blocks of rooms for wedding guests

Book ferry reservations for vehicles

Begin gathering ideas from bridal magazines and websites

See what your tastes are regarding flowers, decor, cakes, dresses, invites. Gather pictures to show these vendors your vision.

Like many couples across the northeast, Julianne Beck and Aaron Damesek dealt with rain on their wedding weekend. But they didn't let it spoil their fun and thanks to some quick-acting vendors who rearranged a few things, they took their vows under sunny skies.

"Our welcome party was at the National and they did a fabulous job accommodating us with the rain and moving everything under the porch at the last minute," say the couple. Because the party was on Friday night, the couple's guests had all morning on Saturday to explore the island, renting bikes, going shopping, and visiting the 1661 Farm and Gardens.

On the big day, "it was a somewhat stressful morning with how heavy the rain was and making sure that hair and makeup was happening on time," says Julianne. "Right before our first look we opened letters from each other, and it was a moment I won't forget – it really grounded me back in the day. And getting to see each other right after that was so wonderful and really relieved the stress of the day."

Julianne and Aaron met while in college and have been regularly visiting Block Island for over 10 years, so it was no wonder they chose the island for their wedding, especially since Julianne's parents have a home there. "Having everything at the house felt really intimate and I think the guests loved being able to walk



around the property and enjoy the view," says Julianne.

"We were somewhat untraditional – no bridal and groom parties, no flower girl or ring bearer. Our ceremony incorporated both Christian and Jewish traditions while focusing mostly on our love for one another and the importance of having our friends and family to bear witness."

"We used the Jewish tradition of stomping the glass at the end of the ceremony, which symbolizes how fragile life and love are, and a

reminder to cherish every moment together. We had personalized glass orbs created and hung from our altar arch within the flowers. Even though we haven't found one out in the wild, we loved having that special touch."

"Because of the rain, we had to switch the order of events and move our cocktail hour to before the wedding," say the couple. "Kimberly Ward was so flexible and quick thinking, and brought out cocktail hour appetizers and opened the bar for our guests waiting down in the tent. The lobster rolls and oysters were fan favorites. We pushed back the ceremony about 45 minutes to wait out the rain and were able to have a gorgeous, sunny ceremony. This certainly wasn't planned but everyone was a little more emotional during the ceremony after a few drinks!"

Use a planner who is a Block Island local. Using Julie Kiley was the best decision we made.

Send out a save-the-date

Your guests will require more information due to the special circumstances regarding a Block Island wedding. An informational insert or e-mail along with the save-the-date will encourage them to make their travel arrangements early.

Things to include:

- Any other events outside of the wedding day that you would like to invite them to, such as a rehearsal dinner or Sunday brunch.
- Transportation info: ferries, plane, taxis.
- Room blocks or recommended accommodations.

Book caterer and pay deposit

Book DJ or band and pay deposit

Book ceremony music and pay deposit

Book photographer and pay deposit

Book videographer and pay deposit

Book officiant and pay deposit

Book cake designer and pay deposit

Book a florist and pay deposit

Book bride and groom's accommodations

Book vendor accommodations and ferry tickets (if applicable)

Order bridal gown and accessories

Book rehearsal dinner location

Begin researching invitations and wording

If you are inviting all of your guests to the rehearsal dinner, consider integrating this into your invite and RSVP. Pocket-fold invitations are very useful for presenting information about multiple events, as well as gathering RSVPs.

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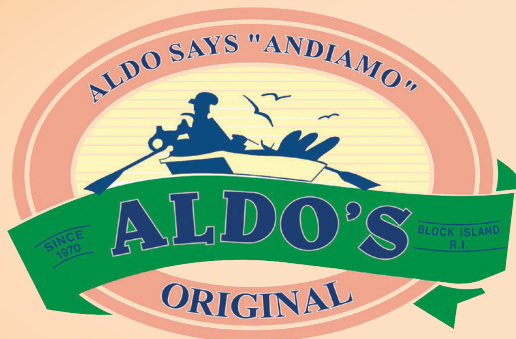


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The Man With Flour in His DNA

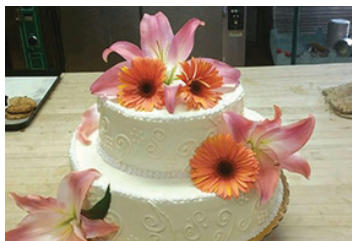
Andiamo! (Translation: "Let's go!")

Many businesses brag about how many years they've been in business; and while that is enviable it speaks strictly to staying power and not always to sheer talent and expertise. Just as delicious pastry and imaginative wedding cakes are a combination of ingredients that blend well together to create desired results, so is the attention to detail that the bakery has in the wedding plans from start to execution to glorious finish. This is not just another vendor who takes an order, bakes a cake, takes the check, and moves on to the next transaction. Aldo Leone is a man with flour in his DNA. His parents, Aldo Sr. and Maria must have passed it on genetically. Aldo and Maria emigrated from Italy to Providence where Aldo learned and perfected his craft at an East Providence bakery. From the first, he learned nothing but classic technique in baking bread with tutelage from a well-schooled Italian baker. In 1956, Aldo was invited to be head baker at the Spring House and Narragansett Inn, an opportunity at which he readily jumped. While there, an abandoned fire station caught his eye, and in 1970 Aldo and Maria began building a long and storied tradition in that very place on the island. It didn't take long before both island residents and visitors flocked to the bakery for the authentic taste of homemade bread and pastries.

Now in its 54th year, the legacy that began with Aldo and Maria has been passed down to Aldo, Jr. and his nephew and partner, Stephen Papa. It's a legacy not only of a fine reputation started many years ago, but of knowing how to please customers. And when it comes to weddings, they take extra care to personalize everything from the first meeting with the wedding couple, showing them photographs, engaging them in a tasting, and most important, finding out what THEY want. "Often they bring along photographs of what they have in mind, and we do our best to duplicate it. We like hearing what impressed them at other weddings and what they didn't care for, so we work together to make this part of their wedding on Block Island as individual and special as every other piece of the event."

One of the many choices that Aldo's is proud to propose is their Del's Cart, as they are the only ones on the island to offer this. The bakery will bring the cart filled with Rhode Island's signature



Del's frozen lemonade to the hotel, the house, or the wedding venue before the ceremony. It is served by the cup, and is the perfect way to get the party going and let people know THIS wedding is going to be awesome! Some wedding guests elect to put a shot of lemon vodka in their Del's cup, but that would be served by the facility or caterer.

Aldo's can design a wedding cake or a wedding dessert to fit the wishes, the taste, and the budget of the wedding couple. "While some people still want the traditional three-tiered cake, some ask for a smaller symbolic two-tiered cake surrounded by cannolis, eclairs, and our very famous tiramisu. Another trend right now is the "naked wedding cake" which appeals to couples who don't want a lot or any frosting on their cake. Aldo's can offer a number of options from adding fresh berries on top or working with your chosen florist to add floral accents. They can even incorporate scenes by baking a beach scene complete with dunes and Adirondack chairs.

The unique ideas that have given Aldo's Bakery their 54-year reputation don't end strictly with the cake. "We can also help with breakfast ideas for the morning after by delivering baked goods, breakfast sandwiches, fresh fruit, and hot coffee to the hotels where guests are staying or invite them to our covered patio for a breakfast buffet," Aldo says, or deliver to visitors on moored boats just as Aldo, Sr. did. He would call out, "Andiamo!" as he cruised Block Island Harbor singing Italian arias.

Although Aldo, Jr. and his staff are not opera singers they love bringing fresh baked goods to those passengers, crews, and wedding guests on boats or pizza, oysters, and shrimp cocktail in the afternoon...and here's a very popular idea from Aldo's. You can purchase breakfast coupons for your wedding party and guests staying on the island so they can choose their own breakfast sandwiches and pastries hot and fresh before boarding the morning ferry back to the mainland. What a delicious end to the delicious experience of YOUR very individual, very special wedding.

the absolute best scenario."

Their time before the wedding included a rehearsal dinner at Dead Eye Dick's and all the members of the wedding party wore traditional Pakistani saris and kurtas to pay tribute to pay tribute to Sohail's heritage.

Just before the wedding began, there was a drizzle of rain, but all was clear by the time the couple exchanged their vows, with Abby's mother as the minister.

When asked what was the most single successful thing they did for their wedding, the couple say "Having the best party!" From the food – filet and swordfish prepared by the Spring House – to the dancing, everyone had a great time. Jennifer Cretella says she has dreamed of getting married on Block Island since she was a little girl. “My love for the island started when I was 14 years old and we took our first boat trip to Block Island on my family’s boat. I loved being anchored in the Great Salt Pond – it was always one of my favorite trips of the year, and still is! Over the years, I would watch from the anchorage the weddings that would take place at the Sullivan House and dream of one day having my wedding on Block Island. So to then meet Adam, a man who also considered Block Island to be his happy place, it was like we were a match made in heaven.”

Jennifer and Adam met through a dating app in April, 2020 during “shut down” at the beginning of the covid epidemic. Their first date was a socially-distanced picnic in a gazebo in Branford, Conn. with take-out food from a deli. Two-and-a-half years later, Adam proposed in that same gazebo, with his children at his side.

Like their first date, the couple’s wedding was also under unusual circumstances. “Initially we thought the most unexpected thing that could happen would be our guests having to come across on the ferries in heavy downpours and five- to six-foot seas,” say the couple. “Little did we know that there would be a fire at the Harborside Inn later that night.”

With the power and water going out at 3 a.m. the night before the wedding because of the fire downtown, the day of the wedding started chaotically. Some of the guests, including a groomsman, were staying at the Harborside and lost all their belongings, including clothes for the wedding.

“At 7 a.m. we started to get word that ferries were only running for emergency personnel and no other passengers would be allowed over to the island till possibly the afternoon, and we were set to get married at 11:30 a.m.,” says Jennifer. One of the people stranded on the mainland was the photographer, Trevor Holden, who called the couple to let them know there was a good chance he wouldn’t make it but would do everything in his power to try and find someone on the island that could photograph the couple’s day.



“But,” says Jennifer, “At 11 a.m. Trevor Holden arrived on the island along with four of our guests that found their way over, and on that beautiful Block Island day, with nothing but blue skies, the perfect amount of breeze and just the right temperature, Adam and I got married in the most memorable wedding ceremony and reception anyone could ever ask for. It was so beautiful, you would never have known there was a fire happening just a mile down the hill from us.”

“It will certainly be a wedding no one will forget,” says Jennifer, “and for Adam and I, who started dating in the middle of lockdown for covid, we know that if we can date through a national pandemic and survive the chaos that ensued from the fire at the Harborside on our wedding day, we can make it through anything!”

Top 3 Pieces of Advice:

1. Start planning early.
2. Plan to make multiple trips to the island during the planning process.
3. Have a back-up plan for everything and anything. Remember, Block Island is an island, so it’s not always so easy to pivot when something completely unexpected gets thrown at you.

Caroline Anderson grew up spending her summers on Block Island in her parents' house on Minister's Lot, so she always knew she wanted to get married on Block Island. When her husband-to-be, who hails from the Midwest first visited, he fell in love with it instantly, she says, so the choice was a "no-brainer." They make sure to visit at least once a year, usually around the Fourth of July.

"The most special thing about having our wedding on Block Island was that our friends and family got to experience and fall in love with the magic of Block Island that truly doesn't exist anywhere else," says Caroline. "We got married the weekend of the Harborside Inn fire, and while the weather couldn't have been more beautiful, what I will probably remember the most, aside from marrying the man of my dreams, is how the island came together during such a tragic event."

There was some scrambling involved. Guests staying at the Harborside needed a new place to stay, and the band and photographer were temporarily stuck on the mainland. The photographer, who Caroline says made everything fun and lighthearted, even took his

own boat, a 24-foot Rampage Express, from Westerly, Rhode Island where he lives. The band was able to get over to the island when the ferries started allowing passengers again in the early afternoon. "Roxanne from Koru Eco Spa was a true lifesaver, acting as my therapist in all of the craziness, helping my parents with arrangements, all while making me and my wedding party look amazing," says Caroline.

Not missing a beat, the band was a big hit. "Boston Premier did an amazing job on all the songs and really got the crowd going," say the couple. "We had many people tell us that they were the best wedding band they have ever heard, and we agree! The best highlight from the night was the last song, Celine Dion's 'It's all coming back to me now,' which got everybody on their feet and singing."

"While I would like to assume our guests loved the ceremony and reception the best, I think what our guests really liked the most about our wedding was the fact it was located on Block Island. We had multiple people tell us that they are 'in love' and can't wait to come back, and others tell us that the island was quintessential New England and felt

like something out of a movie." Plus, the couple add, "everyone was obsessed with mudslides by the time they left the island."

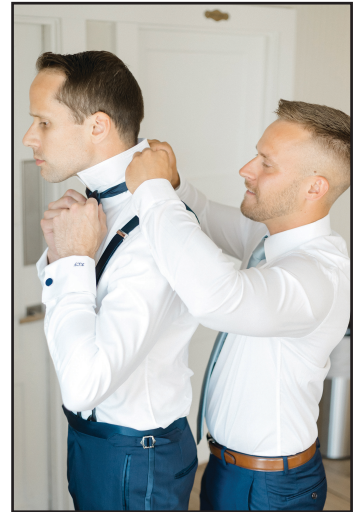
Top 3 Pieces of Advice:

1. Island time is a real thing, so be patient with high and off-season response times.
2. Over-communicate the logistics of getting to the wedding, especially if you have people flying in.
3. Make sure you have a clear understanding of how many rooms and beds your vendors need so you can factor that into the costs and plan accordingly.

On my way to church on my wedding day, I stopped at the cemetery and left a boutonniere for my dad."

"After we got engaged in Hoboken, N.J. in October 2021 and we started planning our wedding, we knew immediately that we wanted it to be different and memorable, and Block Island is exactly that," say the couple. "Kevin is from upstate New York and I am from New Jersey," says Stefani. "Most of our family and friends have never been to Block Island before and we wanted nothing more than for everyone to celebrate with us in one of our favorite places."

The wedding weekend started off on a Friday night with a rehearsal dinner at the Block Island Oyster Bar & Grill for the wedding party, followed by welcome drinks and a beach bonfire

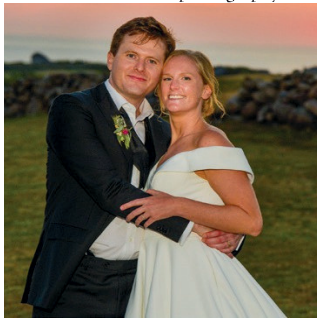
since she didn't know that Liam had made any set plans.

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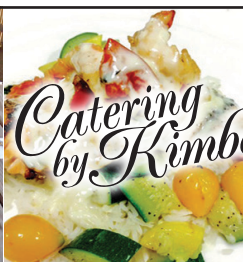


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MOLLY WELCH & JON TAGLIAFERRI *September 22, 2023*

That rainstorm turned out to be pesky in more ways than one. When asked what the most unexpected thing that happened

Dinner and dancing came later. The Spring House provided passed hors d'oeuvres and a sit-down meal. The mini lobster rolls were a favorite, say the couple, as was their signature espresso martini drink named Raisintini, after their little black pug, Raisin.

Finding a cake on Block Island in October seemed to be a challenge until one day the couple was getting coffee at Odd Fellows Café and saw a wonderful child's birthday cake being decorated with chocolate seashells by Kate Musso. Top 3 Pieces of Advice:

2. Weather on Block Island is unpredictable and rain and wind is probable. Be prepared to have plans A, B, and C for these possibilities.

3. Using almost all "on-island" vendors was really the best and simplest way to go. They know the island, the venues, and the people, so it's very helpful.

- Bride and groom! Don't forget to eat something, and drink water.

- Change bride's name if applicable and notify important parties
- Mail wedding thank you notes within three months after wedding
- Review proofs and order photos/video and/or albums
- Settle financial matters

Getting your Block Island marriage license

The Town of New Shoreham Clerk's office can issue a marriage license if you are planning a Block Island wedding and you live outside the State of Rhode Island. We also issue marriage licenses to residents of New Shoreham.

Call us to schedule an appointment (401-466-3200). We will meet with the marriage couple in person during regular business hours, Monday-Friday, 9 a.m. – 3 p.m. to see original documents, sign your worksheet and issue your marriage license.

Send your paperwork in advance: Please mail or e-mail good quality copies of your worksheet, birth certificates and proof of termination of previous marriage, if any. We will review your paperwork and contact you if we have questions. If any of your documents are not in English, ask us for translation guidelines. You must appear in person (see above) to obtain your license, so bring all original documents and your photo ID with you at that time. State law requires us to see your original documents before we issue the marriage license.

Worksheet: It is critical that you complete both pages of the worksheet. Include daytime telephone numbers, e-mail addresses, date of marriage, officiant information including name, address, phone number and denomination, and location of your wedding. You will sign the worksheet at Town Hall when issued your license. We keep the worksheet.

Birth certificate: We need to see an original certified copy of

the birth certificate issued by a state, county or city, and will look for a raised seal. We will return this document to you. We cannot accept a notarized copy, or hospital or baptismal certificate.

If this is not your first marriage: Provide proof of termination of most recent marriage/civil union. We can only accept original documents, either a final divorce decree certified by the Clerk of the Court or a certified death certificate. We will return this document to you.

Fees: The application fee is \$24.00. Per the State of Rhode Island, the first certified copy ordered in person at the counter is \$22, but the same document requested through the mail is \$25. In either case, additional certified copies ordered at the same time cost \$18. We accept checks or cash. Your certified copy(s) will be mailed to you after your officiant returns your signed and dated marriage license to our office.

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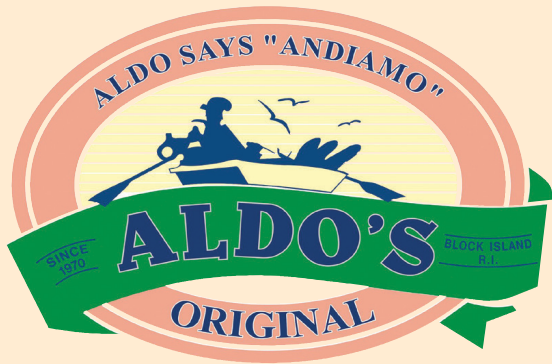
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
