

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JENNIFER ANNEAR & MICHAEL SIMEONE August 24, 2024





Jennifer Annear and Michael Simeone are both teachers in the same district in Rhode Island and in their spare time, they love taking the ferry to explore Block Island where they say they've had many happy memories, in all four seasons.

The two especially love to look for those elusive hand-blown glass orbs hidden along Greenway Trails and beaches that are part of Block Island's Glass Float Project. Jennifer says they are "avid orb hunters but have never found one in the years we've been searching, so Mike had a custom orb made by Eben Horton at the Glass Station in Wakefield, Rhode Island. On our first trip to Block Island in April, 2024, Mike hid the orb on the edge of the daffodil field at Clay Head, our favorite site from our first trip to the island together years ago. The orb was inscribed with 'Will you marry me?'"

Fast forward to summer, when the couple decided Block Island was the perfect place to get married because of the meaning it held for them, and they planned their entire wedding in just three weeks. For the ceremony, they choose the Southeast Lighthouse. "The beautiful ocean view and lighthouse provided the perfect backdrop for our wedding ceremony with our closest family and friends," say the couple. With perfect weather, "we held a unity ceremony after our vow, which included our three children, unifying our blended family."

The couple chose Painted Rock Designs to create an archway for the ceremony on the lighthouse lawn. "We sent Melissa a few pictures

and she created the perfect arrangement," they say. "All of our guests wore navy blue and white for the ceremony to keep with our nautical, beachy theme."

There was one little snafu, though. "We forgot the wedding rings in the taxi on the way to the Southeast Lighthouse and didn't realize it until we were in the middle of the ceremony. At the moment when our officiant asked our ring bearer to bring up the rings, he didn't have them. Our fathers both stepped up and handed us their own wedding rings to use in place of the rings that were intended to be exchanged during the ceremony. The taxis were called and brought the rings back for the end of the ceremony, and we were re-married with our real wedding rings."

The couple decided to celebrate their vows with a simple dinner at Dead Eye Dick's and an after party at Yellow Kittens. Originally, the couple planned to have a more formal and traditional reception with all their friends and family on the mainland at a later date, but have since decided they don't need to change a thing.

The staff at Dead Eye Dick's "was friendly and accommodating for the entire party, which included many young guests," say Jennifer and Mike. "All of the food was amazing, but the local seafood was the highlight of the menu." They also ordered a white wedding cake from Aldo's Bakery that was delivered to the restaurant. "The cake was delicious and everyone enjoyed it!"

"Block Island provided the perfect location for

the small, intimate wedding we were looking for," say Jennifer and Mike. "The focus was on unifying our families and our love for one another in a location that was special for us." And the mix-up with the rings? It's something they're still talking about - "the symbolism of getting married originally with our fathers' rings, who have both been married to our mothers for over forty years."

Top 3 Pieces of Advice:

- 1. Plan ahead as soon as possible, especially booking ferry reservations many vendors were already booked due to short notice and having a car can definitely be helpful if you can plan far enough in advance.
- 2. Have a backup plan for weather if planning an outdoor ceremony.
- 3. Contact the island taxis to assist with timing and guest transportation prior to the event! The island was holding multiple weddings on our wedding day and we were fortunate to have planned for transportation ahead of time.



They had a spectacular and unusual wedding on a floating dock in Block Island's Great Salt Pond.

The couple doesn't think of their wedding as a destination one, rather it felt like coming home, as Lily spent summers growing up and working on the island. She says the island remains her favorite place on earth and the place she feels she can truly call home. "There was never a question of the wedding anywhere else."

The couple say, "We love the water and most of our events were held on, or near the water." Lily adds, "As I was boating over to the ceremony, a pod of dolphins crossed our path. One of them got so close I could have reached down and touched it. I felt like it was my mom saying she was there on our special day."

Like most Block Island weddings, the


couple and the guests enjoyed more than just the wedding day. They had a welcome party with a bonfire on Scotch Beach where they had guests toast hotdogs and marshmallows for s'mores.

The rehearsal dinner was at Lily's family home on Cormorant Cove and was catered by Sediment, which specializes in lobsters caught just offshore in island waters. Lily, who spent summers working at Finn's Seafood Restaurant, says, "Having Freddie and Debbie Howarth's grandson host our rehearsal dinner added something really special. Plus, they always do a fantastic job."

The day before the wedding, the couple

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held a pickleball tournament at Ball O'Brien Park. "It was pretty epic with personalized trophies and cups and napkins – even a banner. The event was entitled 'Last Swing Before the Ring,'" say the couple.

The wedding itself was held at the Block Island Club with the ceremony taking place on the club's floating dock just offshore and guests watching from shore. As the bridesmaids proceeded down the main dock, Luke and the couple's minister, Reverend Eletha Buote-Greig of St. Anne's-by-the-Sea, shared a boat ride out to the ceremony. "She was such a sport!" say the couple. As the couple waited for the bride to make her entrance down the dock, she surprised everyone by arriving by boat with her father instead. And a special boat it was, her grandfather's 17-foot Boston Whaler named The Lily Putt Putt.

After the ceremony, the guests got to take a boat ride of their own, crossing the pond to the reception at the Block Island Maritime Institute. The reception was catered by Valencia Luncheria, a Venezuelan restaurant in Norwalk, Conn. that was featured in the TV show, "Diners, Drive-Ins and Dives." Lily says, "My mom and I used to go there religiously for brunch." There were also fresh ovsters from Block Island Ovster Company that even the ring-bearer slurped up.

Lily says, "The cake was made by our friend Kate Musso, who owns Oddfellows Café. I've known Kate for a long time and have sampled many of her desserts, but by far, my favorite is her carrot cake. Luke and his dad made a multi-tiered, beach-themed cake stand specially for the wedding. The top tier was her special carrot cake and then each of the subsequent lower tiers were a mix of her famous desserts like lemon bars, brownies, cupcakes, etc. It was so

The guests "loved the food and the band, our beer boat, the mix of desserts – everything," say the couple. "People were enchanted with the beauty of the island and I think they really felt a connection to us being in such a special and significant place for us."

Top 3 Pieces of Advice

1. Our caterer did not provide glasses and plates so we ordered them from Quality Rental on the mainland and then worked with the freight office to ensure they arrived safely. There isn't really any place to get rentals by themselves like that on the island any more. Caterers will provide though, if you book an island caterer.

- 2. Don't be afraid to get creative to do exactly what you want.
- 3. Luckily we know this already, but make those ferry reservations early!





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

Ken Panciera's connection to Block Island goes all the way back to 1978 when he was in fifth grade and had a teacher who liked to talk about a porkchopshaped island off the coast of Rhode Island. "I was 11 years old and couldn't convince my parents to take me there," Ken says. "Fast forward to 1992, when I was working for Block Island's radio station, 99.3 WBLQ-FM. My first visit was on the Fourth of July of that year, getting a chance to do color commentary for the parade on the deck of the National Hotel. I haven't missed a chance every year since to visit the island!"

Unbeknownst to the couple until recently, Lesley's connection to Block Island goes even farther back – all the way to 1661, when the first white settlers arrived. A genealogy done by her aunt revealed they were descended from the James Sands family.

"Given all of this, plus Block Island's unique qualities and of course being

surrounded by the Atlantic Ocean, it just made sense to pursue wedding plans here," say Lesley and Ken. "We wanted the wedding to be an intimate event at a unique location, near the water, that would also feel unique to friends and family who lived in Rhode Island, and especially those friends and family who lived out of state."

"Just like many love stories in the 21st century, we connected via the internet on Match.com," say the couple. Soon afterward, Lesley started referring to Ken as her "sweet boyfriend."

That sweet boyfriend also happens to

be a hobbyist videographer and he got especially creative in planning his proposal. He created a two-minute video that he hoped would be shown at the bar where the couple first met, but when that didn't work out, he rented a mobile digital billboard instead. He "strategically parked the vehicle near the pedestrian footbridge in Providence where we stopped for a stroll before our Valentine's dinner. What looked like a movie about to be played, to Lesley's surprise, was a two-minute presentation before the big ring reveal." Ken even arranged for a friend to hide and capture the entire moment. It was at that point, say the couple, that Ken became Lesley's "sweet fiancé." Later, when choosing rings, Leslev had one specially engraved to "My Sweet Husband."

The search for a venue was "challenging," say the couple, as they only started planning in April in the off-season. "Lesley was mildly frustrated, and created a Plan B to elope to New York City, where she had a venue and photographer ready to go," says Ken. But they ended up choosing the Manisses for their wedding venue, where they could either exchange their vows under the willow tree out back or indoors, if the weather didn't cooperate. The weather did,



though, and as family and friends waited for the ceremony to begin just before noon, some chickens showed up and joined the party, much to the delight of both old and young. The couple say that's one of the things they're still talking about.

They're also still talking about the food. Block Island Oyster Bar, inside the Manisses, provided the food and "absolutely all of it was delicious," say the couple. "The guests are still talking about it to this day!"

The cake, from Aldo's Bakery on Block Island, was also a hit. Ken says, "Steve Leone was incredible to work with and talked us through the planning phase. It was an easy, stress free experience, and the cake was so delicious that Leslev ordered a second cake to bring home with her!"

Some extra special touches were provided by friends. In addition to the speeches, and ordering a custom-made glass orb from Eben Horten of The Glass Station for a wedding gift, some snuck out to the island a few weeks before the big event, went to Painted Rock. "Yes, THAT Painted Rock," say the couple, and they left their mark, taking photos to include in a video that was shown at the reception. "What's more Block Islandy than this?" they say.

Top 3 Pieces of Advice:

- 1. Put your trust in the vendors, especially ones from Block Island who do this all the time. They are very experienced and work together often. When you think you don't have someone to officiate the wedding, that person just might be married to the person who is doing your flowers. You never know.
- 2. Visit Block Island multiple times during the planning stages. You may find something to consider that you haven't thought of. Even if something doesn't seem to be working out, trust that something else will present itself and it might even be better than your original
- 3. Relax you're getting married on Block Island.



WEDDING CHECKLIST 10 to 12 Months Out

Pick a Date and discuss a budget

Decide on three different preferred dates for your wedding and list in order of preference. Remember that June and September are peak wedding months on Block Island – venues may have restrictions that don't meet your guest count or budget. Most hotels will have a three-night minimum required of your guests in July and August. If you are on a tight budget, consider having your wedding on a day other than Saturday.

Come up with an estimated guest count

Make a list of all the people you would like to see at the wedding. Make an A list and a B list and be prepared to trim the guest list if budgets require.

Discuss what kind of wedding and reception you envision

Formal or casual, tented or indoor, buffet, plated, or passed hors d'oeuvres

Discuss what your priorities are

Food? Good music? Decor? Location?

Book ceremony location and pay deposit

Book reception location and pay deposit

Reserve blocks of rooms for wedding guests

Book ferry reservations for vehicles

Begin gathering ideas from bridal magazines and websites

See what your tastes are regarding flowers, decor, cakes, dresses, invites. Gather pictures to show these vendors your vision.

Select your bridal party

WEDDING CHECKLIST 7 to 9 Months Out

Finalize guest list Send out a save-the-date

Your guests will require more information due to the special circumstances regarding a Block Island wedding. An informational insert or e-mail along with the save-the-date will encourage them to make their travel arrangements early.

Things to include:

- Any other events outside of the wedding day that you would like to invite them to, such as a rehearsal dinner or Sunday brunch.
- Transportation info: ferries, plane, taxis.
- Room blocks or recommended accommodations.

Book caterer and pay deposit Book DJ or band and pay deposit

Book ceremony music and pay deposit

Book photographer and pay

deposit

Book videographer and pay deposit

Book officiant and pay deposit Book cake designer and pay deposit

Book a florist and pay deposit Book bride and groom's accommodations

If you are inviting all of your guests to the rehearsal dinner, consider integrating this into your invite and RSVP. Pocket-fold invitations are very useful for presenting information about multiple events, as well as gathering RSVPs.

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Like many Block Island wedding couples, Jia Li and Drew Jacob wanted to share the island they love with all their friends and family and this couple did just that by spreading the festivities over several days and venues. Although they met on a dating app in 2019 and got engaged while on vacation in Ireland, the couple consider the island their second home.

Jia and Jacob began their wedding day going to favorite island locations for pictures, including the North Light, The Hodge Family Wildlife Preserve, and the breakwater in Old Harbor.

Then came the main event at the Spring House. "Sharing our vows in front of friends and against the sweeping backdrop of the Atlantic Ocean," was what made the ceremony truly special, says Drew. "We were lucky to have an officiant who is a good friend from the local congregation, and we also borrowed a beautiful custom chuppah from another friend in the island community."

The couple kept it simple, foregoing bride's maids, groom's men, and a dance floor. Instead, the couple held a luncheon where guests got together for trivia and games. For wedding favors,

Drew and Jia made custom, Block Island-themed playing cards for their guests to take home.

The couple held a trivia competition and they say, "the trivia included a section on Block Island that became intensely and hilariously competitive." For prizes, the winning table won candles crafted by a local artisan. "There were speeches that were funny and heartfelt, an impromptu round of acapella singing from the groom's high school classmates, and we entertained guests by playing the Shoe Game," say the couple.

Drew says, "Many of our guests thought this was great, because it provided a relaxed atmosphere

for folks to socialize, and a lot of new friendships were formed that weekend."

At lunch, the Spring House chefs prepared a raw bar with oysters and the swordfish "was excellent," say the couple. The cake, too, was delicious – a vanilla frosted cake with flowers prepared by Aldo's Bakery.

But one of the couple's favorite moments was when they went to Block Island's iconic Painted Rock where the "bride's sister, a talented artist. decorated the landmark to commemorate the occasion."

The couple weren't the only ones out enjoying the island. "We ran into our guests in between events exploring the island, lounging on the Spring House lawn, and strolling downtown," say the couple.

"Working with on-island vendors was great," say Jia and Drew. "They did a fantastic job at every event and allowed us to showcase the best of Block Island's venues and food downtown. We were also lucky to have beautiful weather. But whether it was our friends renting mopeds to tour the island, stargazing on the beach, friends' kids meeting their first emu at the animal farm, or an impromptu orb hunt on the Greenway, what made it most special was just being able to share Block Island's beauty in big and small ways with our guests."



"The weather was perfect all three days," say Jia and Drew. "Nobody missed their ferry reservations, and everything went according to plan with no real hiccups! We had to break down the chuppah ourselves early Sunday morning before the next wedding on the Spring House east lawn that day, and in the process of doing so, we got to see a beautiful sunrise – the perfect way to start our first day as a married couple."

Top 3 pieces of advice:


1. Start planning early – we decided on our venue over a year in advance and still had limited options for time slots.

2. Be patient when working with local vendors and their response times – we are city folks who expect everything to happen fast, but things move



at a different pace on the island and it's important to be respectful of that.

3. Over communicate with guests about travel logistics – we put together an online slide deck for guests breaking down the options for getting to Block Island.

catered the menu to what we wanted and our price point. Everyone raved about the food, and it's so nice to support a small local business. The cognac dijon chicken was delicious."

Kate's mother Amy, who makes soups and baked goods for the Block Island Farmers Market, made a delicious wedding cake, salted caramel. Kate says, "She even had two figurines of our dogs made that she stuck in the middle so they could be part of our wedding."

Getting your Block Island marriage license

The Town of New Shoreham Clerk's office can issue a marriage license if you are planning a Block Island wedding and you live outside the State of Rhode Island. We also issue marriage licenses to residents of New Shoreham.

Call us to schedule an appointment (401-466-3200). We will meet with the marriage couple in person during regular business hours, Monday-Friday, 9 a.m. – 3 p.m. to see original documents, sign your worksheet and issue your marriage license.

Send your paperwork in advance: Please mail or e-mail good quality copies of your worksheet, birth certificates and proof of termination of previous marriage, if any. We will review your paperwork and contact you if we have questions. If any of your documents are not in English, ask us for translation guidelines. You must appear in person (see above) to obtain your license, so bring all original documents and your photo ID with you at that time. State law requires us to see your original documents before we issue the marriage license.

Worksheet: It is critical that you complete both pages of the worksheet. Include daytime telephone numbers, e-mail addresses, date of marriage, officiant information including name, address, phone number and denomination, and location of your wedding. You will sign the worksheet at Town Hall when issued your license. We keep the worksheet.

Birth certificate: We need to see an original certified copy of

the birth certificate issued by a state, county or city, and will look for a raised seal. We will return this document to you. We cannot accept a notarized copy, or hospital or baptismal certificate.

If this is not your first marriage: Provide proof of termination of most recent marriage/civil union. We can only accept original documents, either a final divorce decree certified by the Clerk of the Court or a certified death certificate. We will return this document to you.

Fees: The application fee is \$24.00. Per the State of Rhode Island, the first certified copy ordered in person at the counter is \$22, but the same document requested through the mail is \$25. In either case, additional certified copies ordered at the same time cost \$18. We accept checks or cash. Your certified copy(s) will be mailed to you after your officiant returns your signed and dated marriage license to our office.
